In-Service Education Program Conducted At Childress Hospital

An in-service education program was held at Childress Hospital on March 24th with Bob Ryan of Stephenville, representing the American Heart Association, and Sara Kilpatrick R.N., Director of Nurses at the hospital, in charge of the program.

Mr. Ryan lectured the group on Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation. He also demonstrated cardiac massage and mouth-to-mouth resuscitation on "Recorder Annie", a special life-like mannequin, designed to train personnel in the proper procedure for Resuscitation in Emergency Situations.

The group divided into teams and a return demonstration was given by each team, with each

individual taking turns doing mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and cardiac massage.

Mrs. Kilpatrick stated she was very pleased that also attending the meeting and participating in the return demonstrations were Felton Wright, ambulance attendant; Randal Ratliff, deputy sheriff; and Roger Horton, fire chief. There were also two nurses, RN's, LVN's and aides, present.

If there are other people in the community, or clubs, who would be interested in learning these lifesaving measures, other programs can be set up - even at night. Anyone interested should contact Mrs. Kilpatrick at the Childress Clinic and Hospital.

For the Mullin Board of Trustees Charles Mangham and Ezelle Thompson are seeking the three-year positions. In the Mullin city election, those running are A. G. Whisenand, Ronald Calder, Archie Keating, G. I. Aldredge, Grady Hancock and Ed Ferguson. Polling places will be the Community Center for the city election and the High School for the school board election. Time is 8:00 until 7:00.

C. R. Emdy and Glen Dale Duncan will appear on the ballot for the Star Independent School District Board of Trustees. Persons in the Star school district should vote at the school house from 8:00 to 7:00.

B. E. Baird will be running for county trustee of Precinct No. 3.

W. H. Wasserman will be running for county trustee at large.

All home owners, residents and business men are urged to do their part by helping with this clean-up drive.

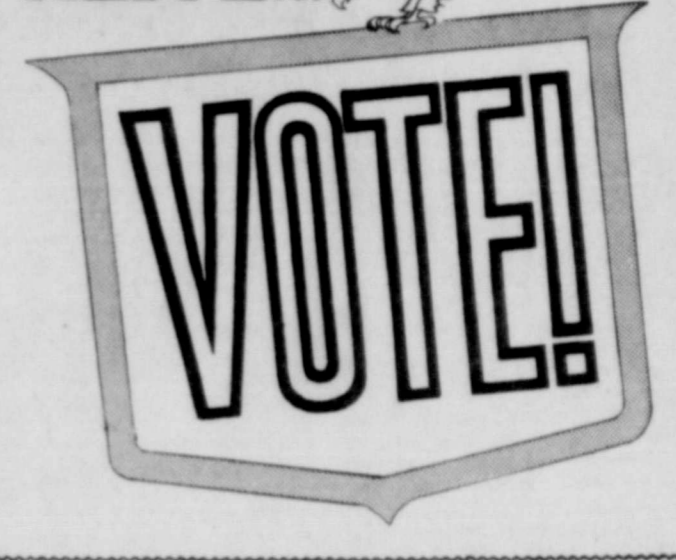

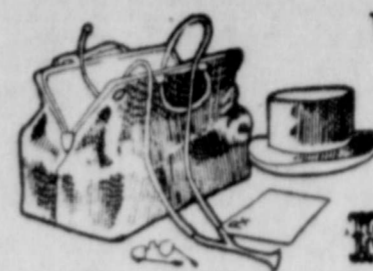

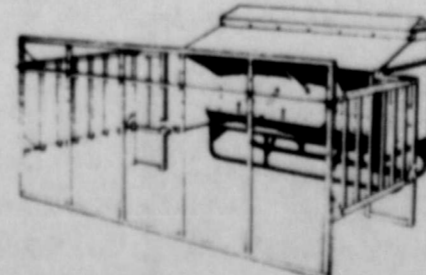

The annual Swine Short Course will be held on the Texas A&M University campus April 10 and 11, 1975. The Board of Directors of the Texas Pork Producers Assn. will meet on Wednesday evening, April 9, 1975. Short Course presentations will be made from 9:00 A.M. until 4:00 P.M. April 10, 1975. The Friday meeting will adjourn at approximately 3:00 P.M.

Cancer eye is a common focus of screwworm attack on South Texas livestock. Last year, 5.6 percent of the 6,273 worm samples received at the Mission Lab were found in eye lesions. A new technique called cryogenic surgery looks promising in aiding losses in their area. Treatment has been effective with cancers on both the eyeball and eyelid. The process entails quick freezing with liquid nitrogen.

Several homeowners have asked what can be done to pecan trees this time of year in an effort to control disease and insects. The only applications required by pecans for this time of year is an application of fungicides and zinc sulfate. Using maneb, Di tee, Polyam or Dodine will aid in scab control. Where rosette is a problem, an application of zinc sulfate should be applied. Do not apply either the fungicides nor the zinc sulfate until the leaves on the tree are about one third grown. The recommended rates are as follows:

SCAB

Dodine - 3/4 lb. 65 percent WP

Be sure to make application when leaves are one third grown and before pollen is shed.
