Number one authorizes the Legislature to increase its contributions to the Teacher Retirement system of Texas. Present Registration Procedures For Selective Service Terminated

AUSTIN - Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, State Director of Selective Service for Texas, announced recently that President Ford has issued a Presidential Proclamation dated March 29, 1975 that terminates present registration procedures for the Selective Service System. April 1st will be the last day 18 year-olds will be registered by Sel. Serv. Registrars or at the draft board area offices. This will be the first time since August 31, 1948 that men will not be required to register upon reaching their 18th birthday. Glantz said that although registration is being terminated at this time, new procedures

providing for periodical registration are being developed and will be tested at a later date. The Selective Service System

will continue to carry out its mission on a "stand-by" basis and will continue to classify men in accordance with current

Regulations, and maintain a "pool" of available manpower for the military as a part of the overall Emergency Preparedness Program of the Nation.

Glantz pointed out that Selective Service has sufficient men registered and classified to continue the First Priority Selection Groups through the end of 1976. The First Priority Selection Group for 1976 will be those men who were born in 1956. These are the men who would be called first should Congress renew the induction authority because of a national emergency.

Glantz expressed his sincere appreciation to the more than 1,600 volunteer registrars who have served without compensation in all communities of Texas. Their willingness to assist in this public service, giving freely of their time, has shown that they have done their best to keep America a strong and free country.

Mills County Formally Approved As Bicentennial Community

The American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas has formally approved Mills County's application as a Texas Bicentennial Community according to announcement by Judge Herbert Faulkner, Chairman of the local Bicentennial committee. The announcement of the approval was made to Judge Faulkner by Sam Kinch, Sr., chairman of the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas. The application will be forwarded to the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration in Washington, D. C. for ultimate endorsement of Mills

County as a National Bicentennial Community. Two books, "The Early American Songbook" and "America's Birthday", can be checked out at the Jennie Trent Dew Library as a planning and activity guide for citizens' participation during the Bicentennial years. Judge Faulkner issued a plea to citizens and organizations for funds to the Bicentennial committee. Construction Bennett Creek Watershed, Site 3 Scheduled Soon

Lyle and Lyle Construction Co. of Ballinger was apparent low bidder for the flood control dam on the Muse ranch known as Site No. 3, Bennett Creek Watershed, located 7 mi. N.E. of Goldthwaite, at a bid opening in the Soil Conservation Service State Office at Temple. Lyle and Lyle's bid of \$293,842.81 was low for the four bids for the job. Lyle and Lyle expects to begin work on the job within

the next two weeks. He will have 395 calendar days for completing the job which consists of 351,996 cubic yards of earthfill embankment, 184 cubic yards of concrete, 370 linear feet of 36 inch concrete pipe, 9292 pounds of steel reinforcement bars, and 6930 linear feet of fencing. The construction of the flood-water retarding structure will be under the supervision of Johnnie J. Bohuslav, Project

Construction Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service at Brownwood, with Bill Hamilton serving as construction inspector, according to Charles F. Studer, District Conservationist. When the job is completed, it will be established to grass. Bids for the vegetative work will be handled by SCS. The work of the vegetative contractor will be under the direction of Ed Leonhard. Following es-

tablishment of vegetative growth on the dam and emergency spillway, the project will be turned over to the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District and Mills County Commissioners Court for operations and maintenance for the life of the facility. Studer states. The three other structures in the Bennett Creek Watershed are already constructed. This completes the construction of all planned structures in Bennett Creek.

Co. Commissioners Name Historical Survey Committee

The Mills County Commissioners' Court appointed a county-wide historical survey committee at the regular monthly session Monday. The State of Texas had asked the court to assume this responsibility to coincide with other committees in Texas.

Named to the committee were chairman, Mrs. M. F. Horton; vice-chairman, Mae Feathers-

ton; Mrs. Floyd Manuel, Mrs. Aubrey Hudson, Mrs. Gerald Head, James Ledbetter, Mrs. Warren Duren, Mrs. T. C. Graves, Mrs. Delton Barnett, Mrs. Emily Gilliam, Mrs. Lloyd Laughlin, Mrs. Hollis Blackwell, Mrs. Robert Steen, Mrs. V. Z. Cornelius, Julian Evans and Mrs. Charlie Sheldon. The committee's duties include the selection and approval of sites to be designated with official State of Texas historical markers.

Amendment Vote Set Tuesday

Tuesday, April 22nd, an election will be held in Mills County on two proposed constitutional amendments. The polling place will be the Commissioners' Courtroom at the local courthouse. The polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m.

The amendments to be voted on are:

No. 1
"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

No. 2
"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

The court voted unanimously to ask the administration of the Hill Country Community Action Association be handled under the present system, instead of being administered by the Manpower arm of the Central Texas Council of Governments. The issue is a dead one, however, as enough commissioners' courts in the CTCOG have already given the authority to Manpower. Bell County's Commissioners' Court administers the Manpower program. The consensus of the court was that this would remove some of the control of the HCCAA from its own ranks.

In other court matters, the regular quarterly treasurer's report was read and approved and the road and bridge money was divided among the four precincts.

The Commissioners' Court meets the second Monday of each month in the commissioners' courtroom of the Mills County Courthouse.
