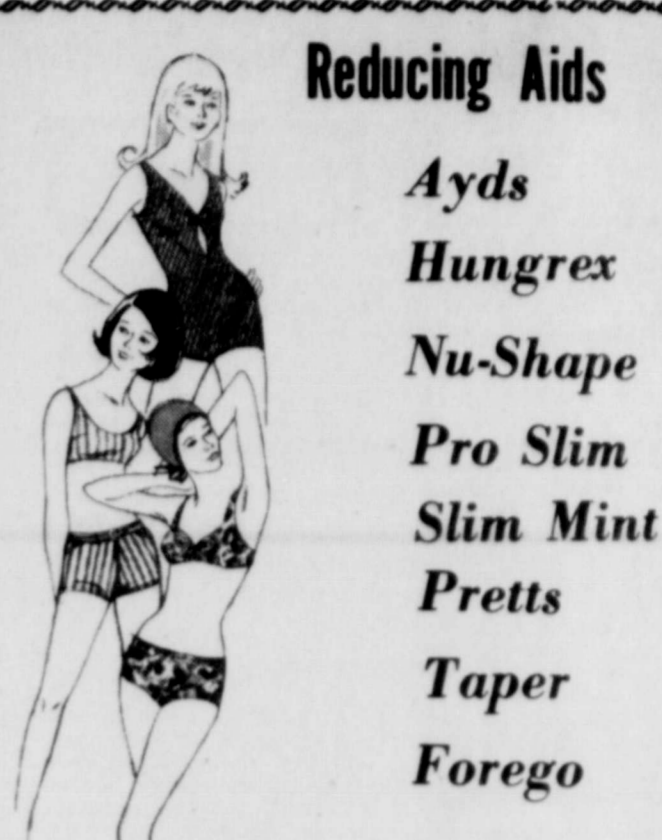

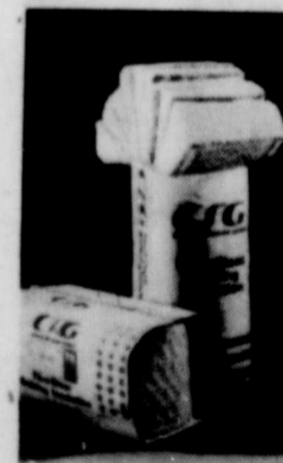

Release Of Book Party

From three to six on the afternoon of June 14th friends and family of Lewis B. Porter met at the Jennie Trent Dew Library to celebrate the release of his new book, "Early Civilization on the Washboard".

The Honorable Herbert Faulkner, County Judge of Mills County, made the introductory speech outlining Mr. Porter's career of public service and familiarity with his subject.

Judge Faulkner has been an active force in promoting Bicentennial activities for Mills County.

The library was decorated with red, white and blue flowers. Guests were served punch, cookies and coffee. Mr. Porter autographed copies of his book for those desiring it.

Following is a short biographical sketch of Mr. Porter:

Mr. Porter's father, Andrew B. Porter, settled on the headwaters of Washboard Creek in 1892. He came from North Carolina by way of Falls Co. and Hamilton Co. His mother, Frances Elizabeth Barlow, came from Alabama and married Mr. Porter in Falls County.

Their older son, Lewis, was born October 3, 1895, and grew to manhood on the farm at the head of Washboard Creek. He started school at Mt. Olive in 1903.

Some of his classmates were Mrs. Tom McArthur, Thomas and Pearl Huckabee, M. G. Roberts, Sadie Black, Berta Horton; all still live in this area.

Judge Porter served in the Navy during World War I. He taught school in this area both before and after his war service.

In 1926 he was elected County Clerk of Mills County and held that office for fourteen years. He was then clerk of the Selective Service Board, then acting Postmaster, then County Judge and County School Superintendent of Mills County for two terms.

In 1947 while he was County Judge and School Superintendent, sweeping changes were made in Texas schools after the passage of the Gilmer-Aiken Bill. It was his duty to implement these changes. As county judge he encouraged the county commissioners to purchase new equipment so that county roads could be upgraded. A new farm to market road from Indian Gap through Priddy and to Zephyr was built. The Commissioners Court also supplemented the funds left by Mrs. Jennie Trent Dew to build and maintain a county library to serve all the residents of Mills County. During his tenure as judge, the Commissioners Court also provided the county employees social security coverage.

Judge Porter has also served as volunteer service officer for veterans of this area since 1957 and continues to be active in this capacity.

His family consists of Mrs. L. B. Porter, Jr. of El Paso, Texas; and their daughter, Dolores Gordon and husband, I. L. Grant Gordon from Del Rio, Texas; and grandson, Daren Gordon of Abita Springs, Louisiana; Albert Johnson and Pete Johnson and Miss Becky Ramos, all of San Angelo, Texas; Mr. and Mrs. Arthur J. Dankers of Austin (Mrs. Dankers is the former Jean Porter); Mrs. Azalea Ellis, County Treasurer of Comanche and a pupil of Mr. Porter's at Pompey Creek School, and two associated from Comanche; Mr. M. H. Curb and two daughters from Comanche (the author lived with the Curb family when he was a school teacher in Scurry in 1920); Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Barrington who are retired and living in Coleman, Texas; and Jesse Cody and wife and Albert Cody and wife from out-of-town. The Cody brothers are brothers of Mrs. T. C. Graves and longtime friends of the Porters.
