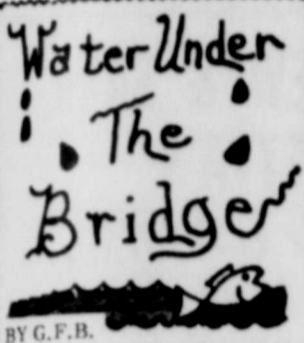

Indians, Booms, And Pride Mark History Of Hannaville

Following is some history of Hannaville, Texas, then in Brown County, which was later changed to Regency, Texas, Mills County.

The article is by Alton Jones, as told to him by his father, Mr. J. M. Jones.

This part of the country was a fine grass and cattle country. The Hannas, Jesse P. and his sons, came here from the older states prospecting and settled in this, the Hanna Valley, about 1850. Then the A. J. Jones family settled here about 1860.

There were no fences, just open country, and the Colorado River had plenty of water.

The people cut timber for logs to build their homes, and put in some land for planting corn, wheat and gardens. But then the Indians came on moonlight nights, stealing horses, killing people, and burning houses. But the old timers met them face to face in battle. My grandfather, A. J. Jones, was shot in the leg with an arrow during one of these fights. Mr. Baz Lindsey put up a brave fight during the same battle, but lost his life. This battle took place on the Glen and Lora Nichols ranch, about eight miles east of Regency. My father has shown me, many times, the exact location of the battle. My dad was in several of these Indian fights in his younger years, and said the Big Chief's war whoop and yell would make every hair on his head stand on end.

I remember my father telling about one of the sons of Jesse Hanna hearing what he thought to be a turkey gobble. He took his cap and ball pistol, loaded it, and went in search of the turkey. He could still hear it gobble as he drew nearer, and when he got to a close range aimed his pistol at the exact spot he thought the turkey to be. Having his pistol aimed in the right direction he saw not a turkey but an Indian peek his head around a tree, and having the draw on the Indian, killed him instantly.

Later, after the Indians had left this part of the county, a lot of stealing, hangings and house burnings took place and were blamed on the Indians. My father, however, thought it was the white men trying to run the settlers off, but failed in their try.

At one time, the men of this little community built a dam across the river at the nearby falls. This dam was built of logs tied to iron posts that had been imbedded in the solid rock bottom of the river. I can remember seeing these iron posts. The first big flood washed the dam away, after so many hours of hard labor had gone into the building of it.

There was a water wheel to run a gin just below Mesquite Creek, now on the Barney Edmondson place. Later, a gin was built higher up on the hill, and this one was run with steam. I went to see this steam gin many times with my Dad, and found the steam engine very exciting.

Then Regency got on a boom. Charles Eubank put up a gin just a few hundred yards north of our present store. It was, at that time, an up-to-date job, and people came from far and near to have their cotton ginned. They came on Saturdays with their corn to have it ground into meal for the family's bread. There was a blacksmith shop, owned by a Mr. Crowl. Ab Singleton later bought the gin, but it soon burned. Mr. Singleton then put in a little shop. The first store was owned by a Mr. Doran. The second store was owned by my father, J. M. Jones, Baz Lindsey and Bob Watkins, both relatives of my father. They had to go to Austin by ox wagon to bring in supplies for the store, and later brought the supplies, even lumber, by mule team.

A dry-goods store, run by D. J. Jones, burned about 1913. There has been a store here from the 1870's until I closed the last one in 1971. Ben and Henry Egger ran the Regency Store from 1919 until 1957. The people built a big brush arbor down on the river, and every summer there would be old time camp meetings. People would come from all around

and stay for several days at a time to enjoy the services. This was in the horse and wagon days. A lot of people have been baptized right here at Regency Falls. There was a church building on the Perkins place, now known as the Andy Rowlett place.

I was born in our old home, one mile east of Regency, in the old house that still stands. Half of it is built of logs. There are log walls, log rafters and hand hewn floor beams that were cut in the 1860's. The lathes were made of rawhide. The flood of 1936 failed to move this old house, while many others were washed away. However, the flood did take its toll on the old building. My mother lived in the old home until we brought her to live by us in March, 1957.

Jesse P. Hanna, my great grandfather; A. J. Jones, my grandfather; and J. M. Jones, my father, helped to carve the way to a free and useful community here in this peaceful little valley, and I am proud to be a twig from this vine of old pioneers on Hannaville, Texas, now known as Regency, Texas, Mills County.

James May Named 'Breath Of Life' Campaign Chairman

Mr. James D. May has been named chairman of the Breath of Life Campaign to fight children's lung diseases, according to Chuck Laurent, president of the Lone Star Chapter, Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Mr. May, Mullin, Texas, will lead local volunteers in raising funds to support research and care programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition called "childhood emphysema".

Cystic fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for CF. It is believed that one in twenty persons or 10 million Americans may carry the CF gene, usually without knowing it. Current research funded by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers.

Because of improved therapy and constant research, many CF patients are living beyond infancy to their teens and into young adulthood. That same kind

of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from other respiratory afflictions whose symptoms resemble those of CF.

The Breath of Life Campaign supports not only research but over 100 CF Centers for diagnosis and treatment across the country, six of which are located within Texas.

Kindergarten students will be in attendance from 8:40 a.m. until 12:00 noon Monday through Friday for the entire school year.

Students are eligible for morning bus transportation, but parents must pick them up at the school at noon.

Children may eat lunch in the school lunchroom or may go home for lunch.

All parents wishing to start their children to kindergarten should do so August 17, 1975.
