The Way It Was

As told by Mr. Brian Smith

In the years 1909-10, Haley's Comet came into view, and could be seen for many months. It was a beautiful sight, with a circle of large stars and a tail of smaller stars following. In those days, people knew little of astronomy, and after a few months, word spread around the communities that this might be a sign from God that the end of the world was near. Not many would admit they really believed this, but when the summer revivals and camp meetings came along, there were more conversions and baptizings than had ever been on record in Mills County.

Mr. Smith remembers one, in particular, that was held at Warren's Crossing on the Colorado by the Goldthwaite Baptist Church. It was held on a warm Sunday afternoon, after many had been converted in a revival just past. All the women that were to be baptized made white flannel dresses for themselves especially for the occasion, putting the soft fuzzy side of the material out. He says this was one of the most beautiful and impressive services he can remember, as the voices of the choir echoed along the river banks, and the women, all dressed in white, came down into the water to be baptized. There were 70 people baptized at this time.

Shortly after, a revival was held at Big Valley, and to the best of Mr. Smith's memory, there were thirty-two people baptized as a result of this revival. All other churches in the county had record numbers join them.

Now, whether Haley's Comet and the widespread talk that the world might be going to end had anything to do with so many people joining the church in 1910 Mr. Smith could not say, but it is food for thought.

City Council Votes Rate Increase For Phone Co.

Compromise Proposal

Immunization Stressed Here By T.D.H.R.

Diseases such as diphtheria and pertussis (whooping cough) are not a thing of the past - they are still occurring today, reports the Texas Department of Health Resources.

Immunizations to protect against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, measles, and rubella are required for admission to school, but whooping cough is a disease which strikes the very young and can be deadly.

Immunizations for all ages will be offered at the clinic in Goldthwaite on Thursday, July 24, 1975 at the Courthouse from 1 to 3 p.m.

A nurse from the Texas Department of Health Resources will give the immunizations. The clinic is sponsored by M. A. Childress, M.D., city health officer.

The Goldthwaite City Council passed an ordinance granting a rate increase to General Telephone Company for its local operations.

The increase, reached after more than three months deliberations with phone company representatives, is a compromise increase. The amount applied in the ordinance is about one-half the increase as asked originally requested.

The ordinance has to be approved by the telephone company and then passed two more times by the Council, before it can take effect.

In dollars and cents, the increase will amount to \$3.15 for one-party business phones; 75 cents for each business extension; \$1.10 for residence one-party service; \$1 for residence two-party; 75 cents for residential extensions; \$6.15 for semi-public service; \$18.45 for PBX-Trunk; and \$13.50 for Key Line service.

These increases are figured per month for each individual customer.

The original telephone co. brochure asked for increases up to 50 per cent more than those adopted by the council.

The utility asked for the increase to keep their rate of return at a level to keep up with inflation and the overall increase in operating costs.

General says in the brochure that present rate of return is 6.59 per cent and their request was to raise that level to 9.81 per cent.

In routine matters, the council approved the regular quarterly treasurer's report, the monthly and year end operations report and the minutes of the previous meeting.

James Boykin was in attendance at the meeting to talk to the council about the water line that was constructed to his home on the hill east of Goldthwaite. The original water line as installed by Boykin, was added to and now includes three homes.

Prior agreements with former City Manager Don Petty were reviewed by Boykin and the Council, and some tentative agreement was agreed upon, however, more thought

will be needed before further agreement is reached on the cost-share proposal.

GARBAGE RATES

Minimum garbage collection rates were adjusted by the council. The minimum residential rate will be \$2.00 instead of \$1.00 and the minimum business collection rate of \$2.00 will be raised to \$3.00 effective with the August 20 reading.

Hours of the new Sanitary Landfill were broadened by the Council.

New hours will be from 9 a. m. until 7 p. m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays until further notice.

In final council action, an application form for city manager and for all future city employees was approved and will be used effective immediately.

Present for the meeting were Councilmen Jimmy Smith, Loy Long, Frank Bridges, James Carter and Howard Campbell. Others in attendance were Mayor J. D. Harper, City Secretary Glynn Collier and Acting City Manager Dale Allen.

Present from the General Telephone Company was W. R. Cornelius of May, and James Boykin.

For the first time in 27 years there was a total eclipse, lasting from 9:12 p.m. to 12:50 a.m. Gib Callaway, B'wood attorney, was sentenced to 3 days in jail and fined \$50 by Judge E. J. Miller on a charge of contempt of court. The charge was made after Callaway had cursed the court Saturday. Upon pronouncement of the fine Callaway slapped Judge Miller, knocking him from his seat. A scuffle then ensued after which the attorney gathered up his papers and walked out.

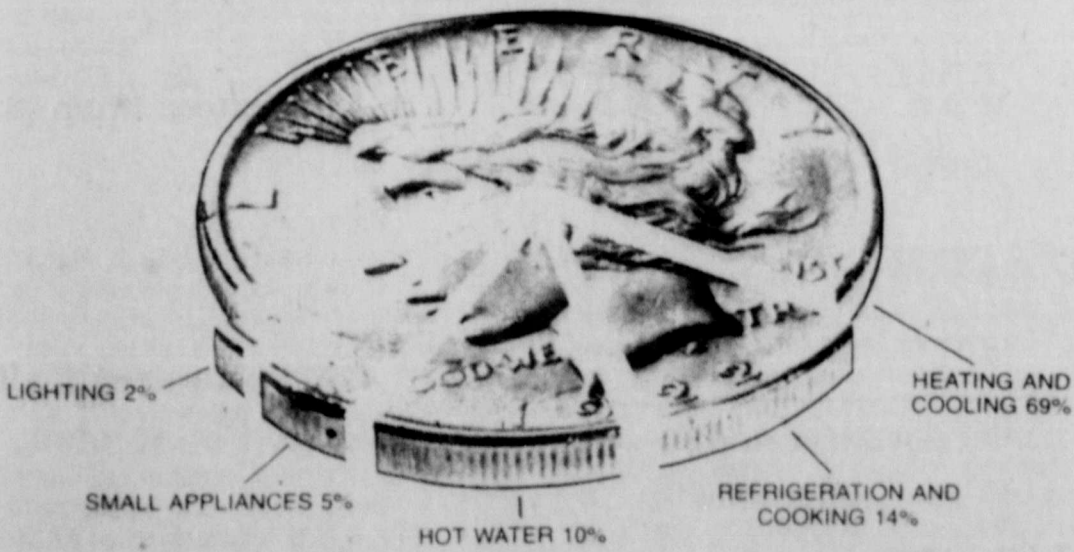

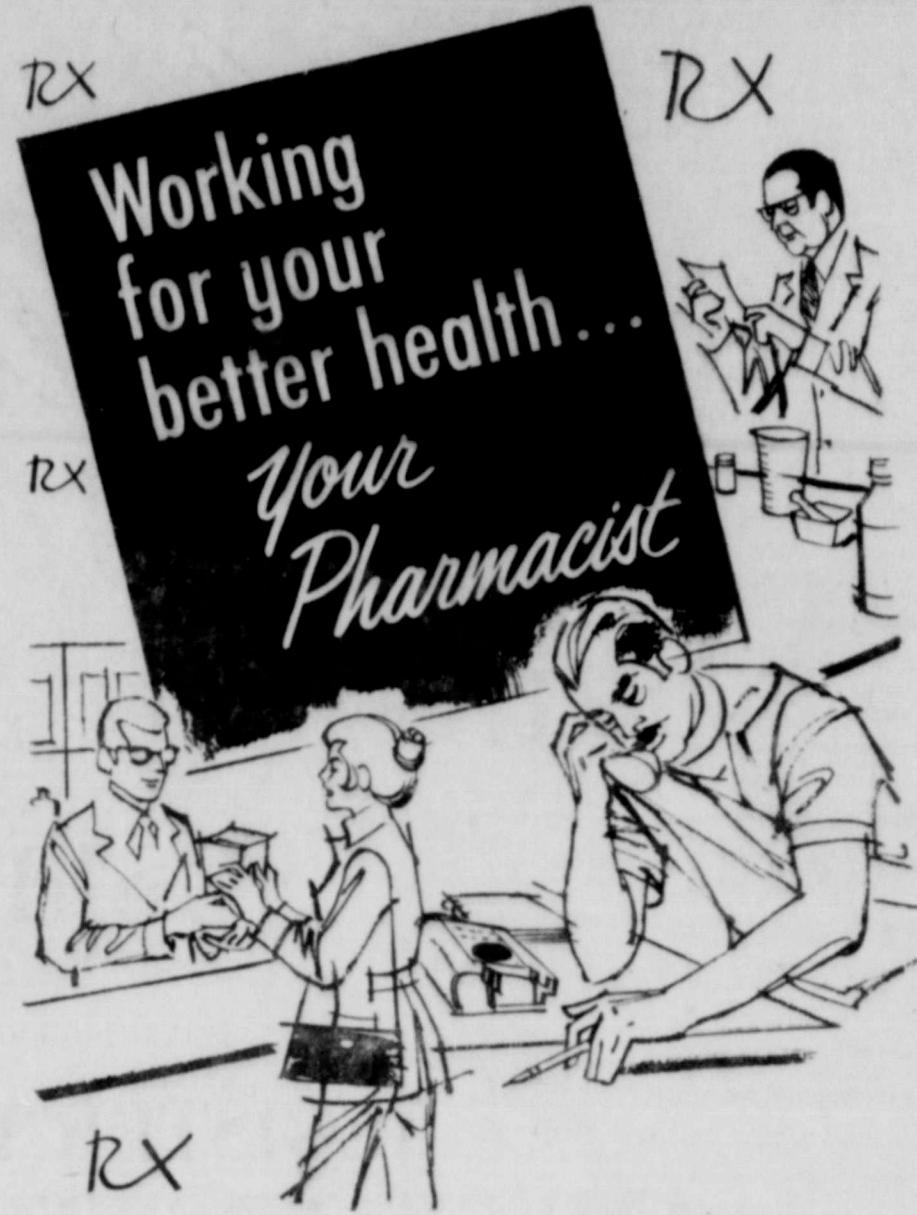

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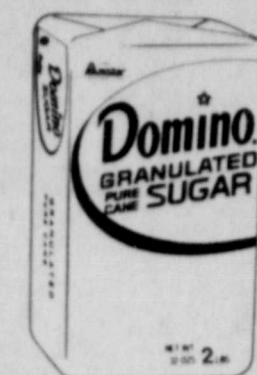

Cattlemen should give particular attention to controlling internal parasites in cattle during this time of year.

Stomach worms can pose a major hazard to late winter and spring calves. This mild winter along with recent weather conditions have been favorable for the development of the parasites.

Another factor pointing to a buildup of internal parasites this summer is the increased number of cattle on farms. Overstocking is evident on many pastures and ranges.

Using clean pastures helps reduce problems from internal parasites. We suggest moving cattle to small grain and other stubble as soon as the crops are harvested. Hay stubble fields which have not been

grazed since last year should also be utilized. Clean pastures reduce the chances of reinfection with worms, especially if cattle are treated with a wormer before being moved.

Several products are available to remove cattle worms. These include Thibenzole and Tramisol, which should be given in dosages based on the weight of the animal, along with Loxon. Loxon in bolus form is a recent addition to the battery of worming products for cattle and calves.

For detailed information on the kinds of worms affecting cattle and the most effective medication, we suggest a visit with your local veterinarian.

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Extension Highlights

People on special sugar-limited diets may enjoy trying pickles made with artificial sweetener.

Bread and Butter Pickles

- 15 medium cucumbers
- 4 large white onions
- 1 large sweet pepper
- 1/2 cup salt
- 2 1/2 cups cider vinegar
- 5 tbsp. liquid saccharin
- 1 tsp. mustard seed
- 1/2 teaspoon cloves

Slice the cucumbers as thin as possible. Chop onions and pepper and combine with the cucumbers and salt. Let stand three hours and drain. Combine vinegar, liquid saccharin and spices in a large kettle and bring to a boil. Add drained cucumbers and heat thoroughly, but do not boil.

Pack while hot into clean, hot jars and seal at once. Heat in water bath for five minutes. This recipe makes seven pints of pickles and a one-third cup serving contains 15 calories.

To whip instant nonfat dry milk, use equal amounts of instant nonfat dry milk and liquid, such as 1/2 cup nonfat dry milk and 1/2 cup water or fruit juice. Put liquid in mixing bowl; add instant nonfat dry milk. Whip

with rotary beater or electric beater until stiff. The colder the liquid, the faster it will whip. For a more firm or stable whipped product, add 1 tablespoon of lemon juice for each 1/2 cup instant nonfat dry milk.

Spice up your summer treats by using fresh fruits on your favorite salad and dessert dishes or by themselves for a cool refreshment. Top your bowl of ice cream off with slices of fresh peaches and whip cream... or add fresh blueberries to your bowl of cereal in the morning... Mix bananas, fresh coconuts, cherries and oranges into your favorite salad or gelatin mixture.

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Local Utility Users Committee Receives Reply from Lary

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Wood:

I want to express my appreciation for your interest in utilities regulation. The efforts of concerned citizens such as yourself were fundamental in stimulating action in this area. Even though the subject has been covered extensively by the media, I wanted to contact you personally to give you my assessment of the legislation that was approved.

A statewide utilities commission was established consisting of a 3-man board appointed by the Governor. It is scheduled to be in operation by August of this year with actual regulation phased in over a two-year period. The Commission will regulate all telephone rates within and without incorporated cities. Incorporated cities do have the option of regulating other utilities; they may, if they choose, utilize consultants furnished by the State Commission.

It is extremely important for us to be realistic about the Commission with regard to what

it can and cannot do. It is my opinion that the Commission cannot significantly lower utility rates, for it appears that energy costs will continue to push rates up. However, the Commission, if properly run, can provide some major benefits by standardizing installation charges, types of service, and basic service charges. It can also make certain a company does not unduly profit by a sudden change in rate structure and that it provide the service it has agreed to in the past.

Food Stamp Allotments Increase

Food stamp allotments will increase and new families will be eligible beginning July 1. Food stamp dollars buy 20-30 percent more groceries for the average family that is eligible and 50 percent or higher for very low income families.

July 1 food stamp allowances per family will increase \$2 to \$10 and more for larger families. The same food stamp money in a two-person household will buy \$90 food instead of \$84. Five-person household allotment will increase from \$182 to \$192 for food items only.

Maximum incomes for eligibility have also been raised \$20 to \$40 for most families. Food stamp income is based on all money received by the household. Income tax, social security or retirement, child care, transportation expenses for employed persons, and medical expenses may be deducted. Maximum net food stamp income for two-person household has been raised from \$280 to \$300, and from \$606 to \$640 for five persons.

Food stamp workers may assist the household in planning a family budget. USDA bases food stamp budgeting on 30 percent of net income for food and 30 percent for housing costs. If 30 percent of net income will not adequately feed the household, the family would be then eligible for food stamps.

Families who wish to apply for food stamps should contact the State Department of Welfare housed in the basement of the Mills County Courthouse.



The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—With the current tight job market, increasing numbers of persons are responding to help wanted advertisements similar to this: "Earn up to \$500 a week as a heavy machinery operator, truck driver, or construction worker. No experience needed. Training will be provided."

That may sound good to a job-hunter, but our Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division lawyers urge that you use caution if you decide to answer this type of help wanted ad.

Often when you apply for such positions, you will be told you need "proper training" to be hired for those high-paying jobs. At that point, the prospective "employer" may suddenly become a salesman for the training program or course he says you need in order to become qualified.

To convince you, the salesman usually describes the course as a sure path to steady employment in a lucrative field. Typically, he says the school's equipment and instructors are the very best, that you will be trained to qualify for jobs in the advertised sal-

ary range, and that the school will place you in such a job upon completion of the course. Often the outcome is that you sign up for the course for a fee that may range into hundreds of dollars. If you do sign up, what are you likely to get? Our Consumer Protection attorneys say generally it's not nearly as much as you are led to expect.

You may find out later that the job market for such positions is overcrowded, that the "latest, most up-to-date" equipment the school uses is sadly outmoded, that your instructors have little practical experience themselves, that you don't get the number of hours of instruction you signed up for, or that the training you get in the course is so basic and elementary that plain common sense would have served you better.

Worst of all, if you complete the course, you usually discover that the school has no placement service and cannot get you one of those \$500 a week jobs—or any job, for that matter.

The fact is that unless you have some actual experience in the field you are highly

unlikely to get a job just on the basis of what you learn in such a course. And many employers of truck drivers, construction workers, or heavy equipment operators say they prefer to do their own on-the-job training.

So don't deal with companies that run "help wanted" ads and then attempt to charge you for training, dues, equipment, or merchandise. False, misleading, or deceptive advertising is a violation of the Deceptive Trade Practices-Consumer Protection Act. If you want to work in a particular field, check with potential employers to see if they would hire a graduate of such a training course. And, if you decide to take such a course, get all the salesman's promises in writing.

If you have a consumer complaint about deceptive advertising, contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, your county or district attorney, or your local Better Business Bureau.
