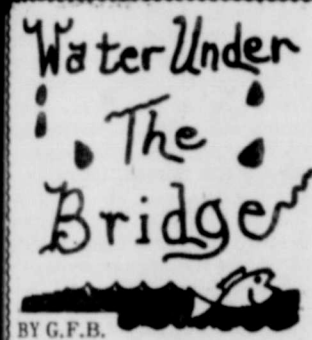

Indictments Returned

Football 1975 Thirty-Five Eager Eagles Make First Football Workout

Monday morning was the first workout session for the Goldthwaite High School football players. A total of thirty-five boys turned out for the session. Eight of the players were lettermen back from last year.

The Way It Was-

Killing Of John Morris

The following article was submitted by Mrs. Virgie Morris Johnson, great-niece of John Morris.

In August, 1868, John Morris and his brother, Bill, sold their

small stock of cattle to James Burleson, a regular driver, and were then employed by him to help drive the herd on to Fort Sumner, New Mexico. There they were paid for their cattle and wages in cash, except for one check for the sum of \$600.00, and started their trip home, some 400 miles away. The Morris family lived on Bennett Creek, near Center City in Mills County, Texas.

Accompanied by several of the cow hands, the Morris brothers came home by way of the Conchos, the Jim Ned and the Pecan Bayou where their companions began to leave to their homes. A few came as far as where Brownwood now stands.

For the next thirty-five miles, the Morris boys would be traveling alone, through country that was infested with hostile Indians and sparsely populated by the white man. They were traveling with one wagon and three horses; John driving the wagon and Bill riding the extra horse, and were armed with six-shooters only.

When the two reached the head of Brown's Creek, just thirteen miles from home and four miles northeast of Williams Ranch, Bill saw several deer some distance away and went forward to kill some of the game.

He had not gone far when he discovered, to his horror, a large party of Indians, some of them coming toward him and the others headed for the wagon. (It was later determined that there were twenty-six Indians in this raiding party). Bill immediately returned to the wagon to assist his brother, who having also realized their peril, climbed from the wagon, and the fight was opened.

The Indians first succeeded in capturing Bill's horse, then shot one of the horses hitched to the wagon with an arrow, causing the team to bolt and run away. The boys, being left afoot, managed to reach some thick brush. Knowing this country well, the brothers decided to try to reach a certain high bluff on Brown's Creek where they might stand a better chance of stopping the fighting, determined Indians. It was a running fight all along the way, and was kept so until the brothers reached an open prairie. In the battle, John had received four wounds, and at the edge of the prairie he sank down, begging his brother to go fast and save himself if he could. The Morris

taken a toll of their own on the Indians, killing several and wounding others. For the moment, the Indians had retreated to gather their forces, and this gave Bill a chance to slip away. So, leaving his brother, he made his way to Williams Ranch where he secured help and returned as quickly as possible, only to find they were too late. John was dead, scalped and his body horribly mutilated.

The news of John's killing reached Langford's Cove that day, and his father, Dave Morris, Sr., requested Mr. B. F. Gholson of Evans (then known as Langford's Cove) to go to the Langford graveyard and prepare a grave for his son, which he did. But Mr. Gholson, in telling of this killing in 1911, says, "They decided to bury him at Williams Ranch, thus the grave I prepared for John at the Langford graveyard stands open, even unto this day."

At John Morris' grave there was placed, shortly after he was buried, a large sandstone rock with this carved inscription: "John Morris, Killed By The Indians, ? - 1868".

In 1963 Mrs. Bob (Virgie) Johnson made application for a Civil War marker for his grave. She was told that if she could prove his age and rank she could receive one of these. She did this, and more. The new grave marker reads, "John Morris, Lampasas County, 27 Brigade, Texas Militia, CSA, 1840-1868". When the cement foundation for this new monument was poured and still wet someone etched "Killed By The Indians" into the wet cement, just as it had been on the old sandstone marker.

Both Bill and John Morris served four years on the front in the Civil War.

Mrs. Hollis (Hartal) Blackwell, also a great-niece of John Morris, has in her possession an Indian arrow taken from his body and kept by his only sister, Mrs. Asa Langford, this arrow being in the possession of the family for one hundred and seven years.

Mrs. Johnson is survived by seven sons, Everett, Cottonwood, Ariz., Milton, Clarkdale, Ariz., Harold, Austin, Texas, Ray, Tifton, Ga., Ernest Johnson, Austin, Tex., Charles Johnson, also of Austin, and Larry Johnson, Fairborn, Ohio; six daughters, Mrs. Ruth

Giffin, San Antonio, and Mrs. Rhoda Miller, Austin; fourteen grandchildren and eight great grandchildren.

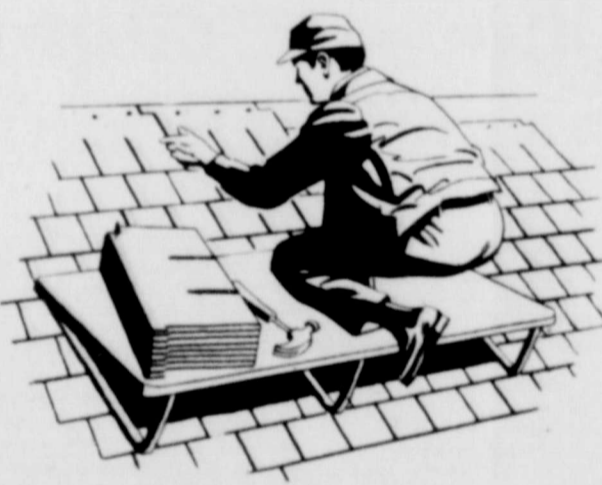

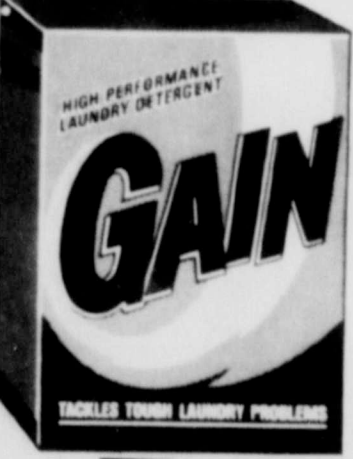
