Enrollment In Four Mills County Schools Totals 745

Historical Comm. Discusses Markers

The Mills County Historical Commission met at the Court-house on Tuesday, August 14, with the chairman, Mrs. M. F. Horton, in charge.

The treasurer reported a balance of \$613.25. This amount is made up of memorials given by interested persons, proceeds from a bake sale held a few weeks ago, donations from interested people, and a generous gift from the Commissioners Court. Most of this money will go toward the purchase of historical markers which run in price from \$125 to \$250 each.

Work is being done on applications for markers on Mills County Park, the Oak tree at Center City, the swinging bridge at Regency, Mt. Olive Primitive Baptist Church, North Brown Cemetery, the ghost town of Williams Ranch, Mullin Methodist Church, the Mullin Bank building, Lake Merritt, Star Baptist Church, and the Eagle Office. The money in hand will be sent in with the first applications which are completed and turned in to the chairman, Mrs. Warren Duren. The applications will be mailed to the Texas Historical Commission in Austin. If the Commission approves the application, it will take about three months to process it and then a dedication program will be held near the site. If the application is turned down, the Commission will return the money sent.

If you are interested in any or all of these projects and would like to send a donation or a memorial gift, please mail it to Mrs. Aubrey Hudson, Goldthwaite, Texas 76844. All memorials and donations given will be published in the Goldthwaite Eagle.

Mae Featherston, Historical Preservation Chairman, gave some suggestions for a history of the county to be compiled. Mrs. Hollis Blackwell, History Appreciation Chairman, reported that the history of the Center City, Goldthwaite and Pleasant Grove Methodist Churches had been gathered and other church histories were being compiled.

The Commission will have a picnic lunch in the park on Friday, August 22, at noon. This will include all the precinct members and their husbands or wives. Each member will bring a covered dish. After the lunch a business meeting will be held.

The Way It Was

When The Thresher Came

Women in our community of Pleasant Grove were well accustomed to cooking for large numbers of fieldhands, reapers and threshers were still used some after I married. Mr. Hap Arrowood did a large part of the threshing in this territory for many years. He had a threshing crew which consisted of men with their wagons and men with pitch-forks, called pitchers, who helped the wagon men load the bundles of grain from the field so that the wagon men could take them to the thresher. At the thresher, there was a machinery or maintenance man, and Uncle Charley Berry worked at this job for years as an assistant to the owner. He usually received about \$5.00 per day. Pitchers received about \$1.50 per day and men with wagons and teams received about \$2.00 a day. The young boys usually held sacks. That was the job of catching the grain as it came out of the spout.

The thresher was always placed at the location where the farmer preferred to have his haystack. This was the straw and husk residue from the grain, and was good for the cows and horses in the winter. They ate little caves in the sides of the haystack until it tumbled down into waste and decay. No sooner had the thresher gone than we children ascended on the haystack, and climbed to the top of it. They were usually as tall as the average house. A new haystack was horribly dusty and anyone that bogged to the top of one was plenty dirty.

The neighborhood men helped haul the grain to the barn, this being one of those swap jobs. One of the neighbor ladies usually came over to help the lady of the house with dinner. The owner of the thresher was usually responsible for feeding his regular hands. Along with the thresher came the cook shack. This was a little rectangle shaped house on wheels, with a stove pipe sticking out the top. Mrs. Arthur Hunt was the cook for many years. The cook shack was parked under a tree whenever possible, and the wood from the house where they were located was used. The sides of the cook shack had dropped end-gates on the lower part of each side, about two and one-half feet wide. They were propped up to make tables for the men to eat upon. The men stood on the ground outside and ate, unless they could find someplace to sit. The men had their bedrolls and slept on the ground at night.

The cook shack was always near the house because of wood and water, and none of us will ever forget the excitement we felt, as children, when the thresher came puffing to our field, nor will we forget how intrigued we were by all the activity and the delicious odors of the food being prepared in the cook shack.

Cotton Picking Time

Cotton was the cash crop of the community during my childhood and those of us that had to stay in the field week after week will never forget it. We tried to get to the cotton field about sun-up or shortly thereafter. When our sacks became full, we lifted the heavy sacks on our backs and went to the wagon to weigh and empty them. Mother weighed the cotton. Daddy emptied the cotton in

the wagon and stomped and packed it thoroughly with his feet. The wagon held between fourteen and fifteen hundred pounds to make a bale before Daddy hooked the team to it and hauled it to town. While our parents were busy, we children drank our fill from the cotton covered water jug. No more time must be wasted than possible. If we worked in a field as much as half a mile from home, we usually took our dinner to the field. Mamma often bought something easy to carry such as cheese or canned sardines, which we thought were special. However, our main field diet consisted of pinto beans seasoned with plenty of home cured pork, cornbread made from corn out of our barn, onions from our garden, baked sweet potatoes also from our garden, plenty of milk, butter and syrup cake. We worked hard, had ravishing appetites, and I have eaten steak dinners that did not taste as good.

We walked home at sundown. We children even skipped and played until dark after we had helped with the chores. We ate our supper, washed our feet in cold water, fell into bed, and slept like logs all through the night, which was all too short. God's seventh day was appreciated.

One of the most pleasant diversions of those days in the cotton patch were the trips of Grandpa Berry to the field. In his older days, he walked from field to field visiting his children and grandchildren. When he came, he often brought news of the families he had visited and he always picked cotton for the children's sacks. If we were behind, he picked from our row and piled a pile of cotton in our row to put in our sack when we got there. He often brought news of a Saturday night ice-cream party.

Aunt Mary warned me not to paint like in the days that have gone in too dark of colors. There is so much that is good in any age or generation. The greatest treasures of this world are not found in material things; however, I think I would class the Berry Family as average or middle class materially. The real treasures have to do with human relationships with one's fellowman and God. In so many ways we Berrys have been rich.

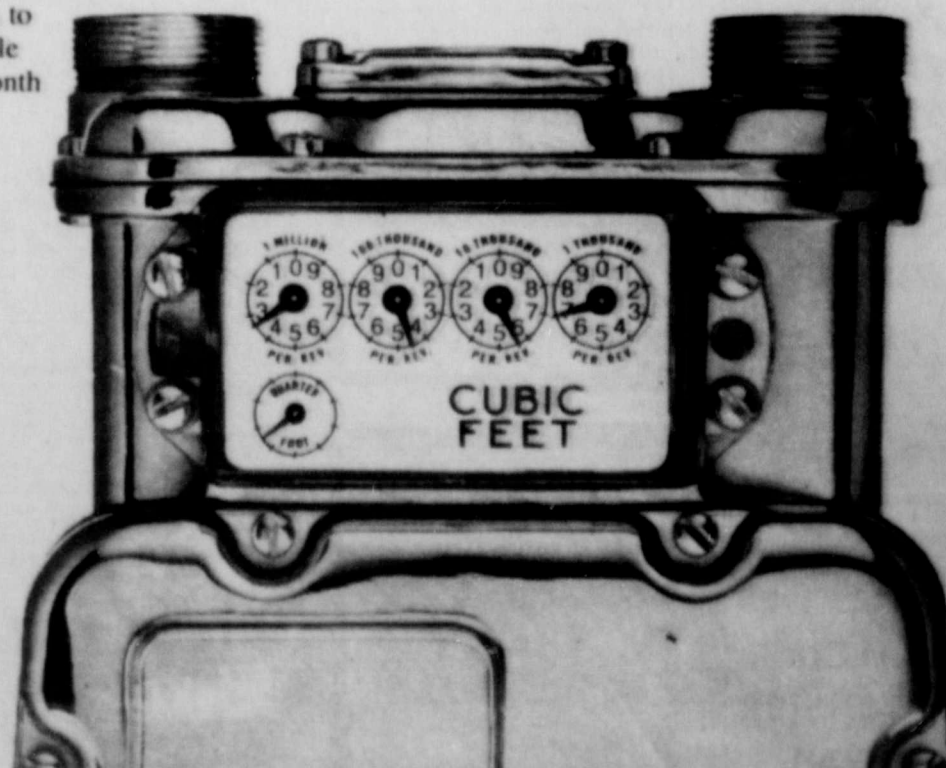

Screwworm Infestations By-Pass Mills County During July

Light screwworm infestations reported in most Hill Country counties during July provide the seed for an anticipated great increase in infestations of this flesh eating parasite during the next few months. Mills County has been fortunate and not had any cases during July. Ranchers should continue to be on the alert, however.

Dr. M. E. Meadows, Jr., director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program, says: "For the rest of this summer and fall, case incidence will depend more on what livestock producers do to protect their neighbors than what the program does."

He explains no more "stretch" is feasible for the program, administered for USDA by the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS). "We're producing as many sterile flies as possible, and distributing them as far as they can go," reports Meadows.

Fertilizer supplies are up sharply over last year at this time, but high prices are contributing to low usage. Supplies of fertilizer in the United States are up about 10 percent compared to 1974 tonnage.

Nitrogen supplies have increased more than 8 percent, phosphate supplies are up 13 percent, and potash tonnage is up 11 percent.

Fertilizer usage dropped last fall as well as this spring due to high prices for the nutrients while low crop prices were in prospect. Usage was up in the fall of 1973 due to anticipated shortages, price increases and availability of funds to purchase fertilizer.

This, along with increased production, has led to increased inventories in both the U.S. and in many foreign countries. Ammonia production has increased almost a million tons during the past year and is expected to reach 18.8 million tons by January 1, 1976, up two million tons from 1974. An additional eight million tons are expected to be added to the production line by 1979.

Reduced demand for fertilizer in many countries has had a dampening effect on U.S. exports. Exports are expected to drop 9 percent during 1975, with nitrogen shipments down 21 percent and potash shipments reduced 16 percent. The U.S. continues to be a major supplier of phosphate rock for other countries.

Despite increased fertilizer production in the U.S., imports are expected to be up about 10 percent above 1974. Nitrogen imports should be up 14 percent and potash imports should increase 11 percent, but phosphate imports are expected to decrease 15 percent.

Although the supply-demand situation for fertilizer was fairly stable during the past two years, supplies are again rising more rapidly than demand. Expanding agricultural production, both here and abroad, will absorb some of this excess, and usage should also increase if farm prices remain compatible with fertilizer costs.

Infestations of aphids in pecan trees has increased greatly during the last few days throughout Mills County. Some homeowners believe the "honeydew" found on tree leaves and automobiles left parked under trees actually comes from the tree itself. This is not the case, as the honeydew is a waste secretion from these small insects known as aphids. The aphids are very small, soft bodied, pear shaped insects of many colors, but usually green. Most aphids attack in mass, preferring young shoots and leaves. Their attacks can, if severe, cause damage to plants. Aphid damage stunts growth, deforms leaves and fruit, or causes galls on leaves, stems and roots. Honeydew secreted by the aphids is a medium in which sooty mold grows soon after the honeydew appears. This mold not only mars the appearance of the plant, but it also restricts certain physiological functions such as photosynthesis.

During this time of year, the best control for aphids and consequently honeydew, is an application of malathion. Malathion should be applied at the following rates: 50 percent EC - 2 tsp. per gallon of water or 25 percent WP - 4 tsp. per gallon of water.

One additional chemical is also recommended. This chemical is meta-systox-R. Use only the 2.0 lb. concentrate at the rate of 2 tsp. - one gallon of water.

Follow all label instructions when using these and any other chemicals.

Although it's the middle of summer, that's the time to

start getting things in shape for your fall vegetable garden.

Springs gardens generally do and I might add did very well this year in most parts of the county.

Now the fall gardening season is approaching, and that means getting land prepared and getting transplants started.

Many popular vegetables such as tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, pole beans, potatoes, okra, cucumbers and squash can be planted during late July and August.

Also, the so-called "winter" vegetables such as broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, greens, parsley and carrots can be planted at this time for early harvesting. Later plantings of these cold-hardy crops will supply fresh vegetables well into winter.

What are some of the important aspects of fall gardening?

First of all, get the land into good shape. If a garden was planted this spring and fertilizer was applied, little if any additional fertilizer will be needed before fall planting.

For new gardens, we recommend applying two to three pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 10-20-10 per 100 square feet and working it into the soil. If plants make slow growth, a light amount of fertilizer may be applied between the rows and watered into the soil.

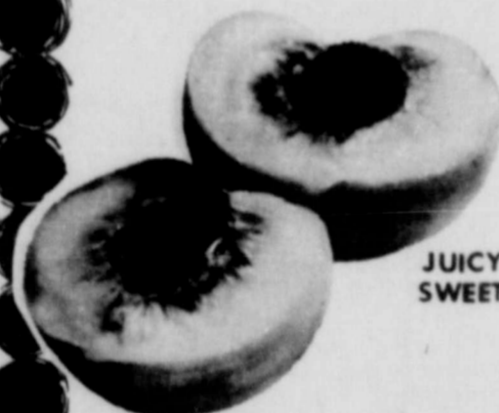

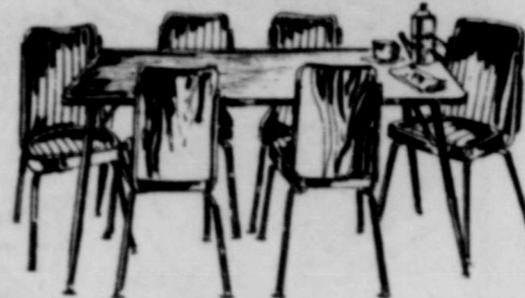

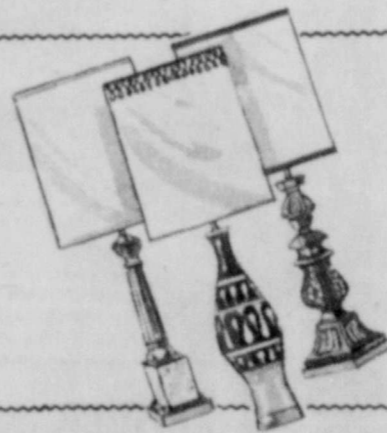
