### The Mobs - Part I

Mills Baptist Annual Meeting Monday

CALLING ALL SOUTHERN BAPTISTS, MONDAY, OCT. 6

The Mills County Baptist Association will hold their annual meeting in the First Baptist Church of Mullin, Monday, October 6, 1975. There will only be one session this year, which will begin at 6:30 p.m. Supper will be at 5:30 p.m.

The congregational singing will be led by David Dillard of the First Baptist Church, Goldthwaite.

There will be reports from Tarleton Baptist Student Union and Howard Payne College.

The First Baptist Church of Mullin will host the evening meal at 5:30 p.m., just prior to the 6:30 p.m. session.

The Annual Sermon will be delivered by John D. Stanislaw, pastor of Star Baptist Church. The Denominational Emphasis will be brought by Dr. James Baden, Secretary of the Human Welfare Commission of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. Everyone is invited to attend the session.

At the end of the Civil War men were left homeless, harassed and some without moral standards. Most had been through a long siege of defeat and degradation. Others, however, also homeless and with families, had a hope of rebuilding their lives in a new land. Therefore, all began drifting West, each in search of what he sought most — the man with hope hunting for security and abundance; a place to rear his children in a law abiding, God loving atmosphere. While on the other hand, the men whose moral standards were gone sought a place without laws, where they might prosper by taking from the peaceful citizens to add to their own illegal gain. There were carpet baggers, cattle rustlers, deserters from the Army, and men of criminal backgrounds. For whatever reason, the men moved on, traveling Westward. It was once said that God made man and put him in the East so that he could travel to the West.

The early settlers that chose the area of Mills County for their homes were harassed by troublesome and hostile Indians, but this lawless element created a far greater problem for them. These desperadoes and gunmen chose this area for their depredations for the simple reason that there was little law enforcement on the fringes of the four counties that made up the area, Hamilton, Lampasas, San Saba and Brown. It was hard in those days for a criminal to be caught for a crime thirty miles away, and brought before a Court of Justice for trial. Travel was too slow to make this possible.

Therefore, a great crime wave plagued the communities. People had their cattle stolen; horses were taken, many times in such a way that Indians were blamed; men were killed for no apparent reason, and a generally unsettled and lawless condition existed throughout this area, with no hope of improvement or of a Court of Justice bringing these men to trial.

With this disorganized state of order, the peace loving citizens of the communities began trying to protect themselves, their families and their property. A Vigilante Committee was organized with the purpose of protection in mind, since it seemed the law could not do a satisfactory job.

The first Vigilantes became active at Williams Ranch about 1863, and was soon to spread to other communities: Center City, Iye Valley, Hanna Valley, across the river to San Saba County and as far East as Langford's Cove, now Evant. The Vigilante group was formed at Williams Ranch for the purpose of ridding the community of cattle rustlers and a bad element of men that descended upon them. However, the good turned bad, and the worst eventually happened. When the community of Williams Ranch was pretty well rid of lawbreakers, many of the law-abiding citizens wanted to disband the Vigilante group. But, as is usually the case when men band together to take the law into their own hands, a mob was born, not to be disbanded for several years after many innocent men and two children were killed.

A mob is likened to a fire running wild; a siege of terror and fear swept through communities that has never been equaled. Men were killed for no cause, and other mobs were formed; friends of the fallen men wished to reap revenge for their slain neighbors. Not a person felt safe. Every rap

at the door, a "hello" outside the house at night, or the crack of an unseen rifle brought shivers to every man, woman and child.

Three men were hanged in one day, and left in a pasture. Men were dragged to death behind horses; found hanging from trees in out of the way places; ordered at midnight to be gone before morning. Many left as told, taking their possessions away or just leaving them behind. They were afraid not to obey the voices in the dark.

The mobs rode by night, wore masks and had appointed meeting places, which were guarded by sentries. At these meetings, it was decided who would be the next "victim", and whether he was to be killed or ordered to leave the county. The identity of the members of these mobs was not generally known; therefore, neighbor could not trust neighbor; friend became wary of friend; strangers were not welcomed.

The mob became a melting pot of grudges and greed, now their underlying purpose. Many of the original members either quit or were "dropped" when they objected to this unfair killing of men, and their lives were in danger from that day forward. Lone killers occasionally used the mobs as a cover-up for their own slayings.

While the mobs were at the height of their reign of terror in the present Mills County area, they were also equally active in San Saba, McCulloch and Hamilton Counties. It is estimated that close to one hundred men were killed within these few years in our surrounding areas, most from ambush; and children died as well as adults from these senseless, lawless attacks. Countless numbers were driven from their homes. Truly, it was a good thing gone bad.

## Eagles Overpower Hornets Last Friday

Following three consecutive weeks of losses, the Goldthwaite Eagles made up for lost ground by dumping the Lometa Hornets 40-0 last Friday night at Eagle Field.

The Eagles led the local fans know they had come to play football early in the contest, as on the second play from scrimmage Eagle halfback Tim Spradley raced through the left tackle spot and out into the clear for a 60 yard touchdown run. Only 38 seconds had elapsed on the stadium clock. Byron Landrum booted the extra point.

Another booming play came off the passing arm of quarterback Ray Frazier about midway in the second quarter. He hit Spradley on about the 25 yard line and the speedy back raced in for paydirt. Again Landrum's kick was good.

Another unexpected turn of events placed lineman Frank Herrera in the right place at the right time. He picked off an errant Lometa pass and raced down the left sideline for over 70 yards for the score. Landrum's good kick made the score 21-0 at the intermission.

All the time the Eagles ofense was generating power, the staunch defensive unit was busy curtailing the Lometa machine. The Hornets were scarcely able to get a first down in the first half.

A screen pass from Frazier to Spradley with 9:32 to go in the third period netted the Eagles their next TD. The play covered 37 yards. Landrum's PAT was good.

Freshman running back

Randy Benningfield plowed in from three yards out for the Eagles fifth tally. A run for the conversion failed.

Reserve quarterback Jeff Johnson came in during the waning minutes of the game and did a creditable job of maneuvering the Eagles' offense. One of his passes hit end Jay Sims who raced in for a touchdown with 2:46 remaining. It was a well executed play on both ends, the passer and the receiver. Another run try failed for the two point PAT. This made the final score 40-0.

An apparent early whistle robbed the Eagles of another touchdown. Johnson took the snap and faked into the line with Delbert Berry as the intended ball carrier. But as the play had been designed, Johnson pulled the ball out at the last minute and set out around right end. But the fake was so well executed that the referee had already blown the whistle. It would have been smooth sailing for Jeff all the way to the goal line. It was a good thing for the ref that the Eagles were 34 points ahead at the time.

"The boys' playing Friday night was more uniform than it had been in the three preceding games," stated Head Coach Gene Auldridge. "Lometa never was a serious offensive threat to us any time during the game. The defense played a real good game."

This week the Eagles are doing some general practicing. Next week they will be working extra hard in order to meet their first conference

game of the season, Cross Plains.

Cross Plains has a good team with a strong lineup and quick backs. The game will be played at 7:30 p.m. on Eagle Field October 10.

After the meal a short meeting was held.

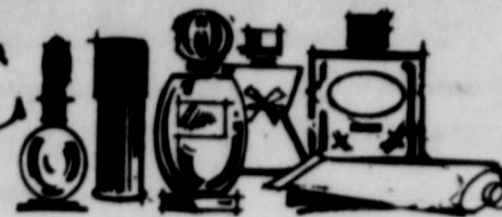

They arrived in Goldthwaite that night about 10:00. Each scrambled to get his belongings together so that he could get home and to his own bed.


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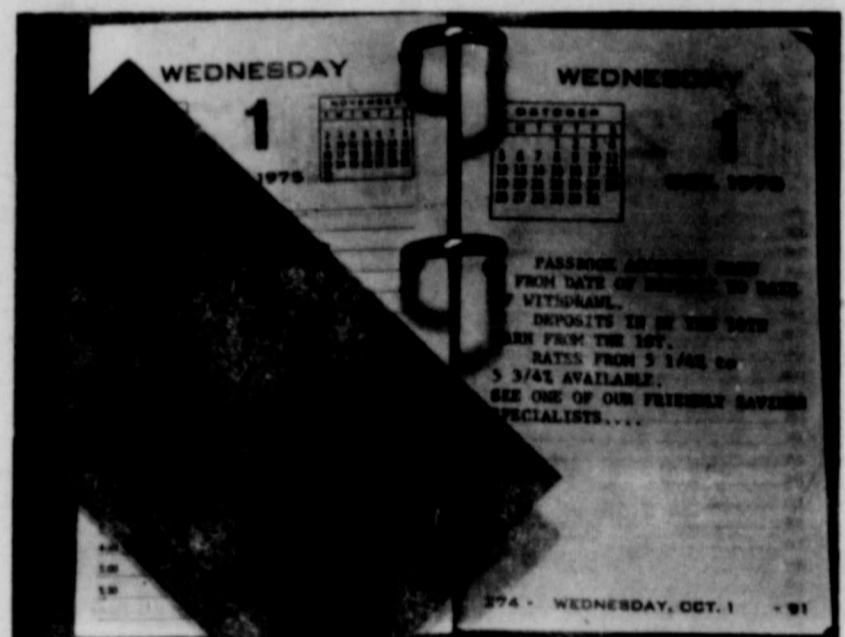

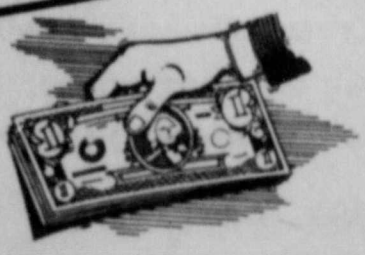

Late in the first quarter on a screen pass from Mike Connally, Williams ran the ball 28 yards for another Eagle touchdown. The extra point try failed.

San Saba pulled through in the second quarter when Bret McCall scored on a 10 yard run. The extra point try failed for the 'Dillos.

With 6:53 left on the clock

in the second period Tommy Collier broke loose and took the pigskin for a 71 yard TD. Score at the end of the half was Goldthwaite 20, San Saba 6.

QB Connally sneaked in for a one yard TD for the Eagles during the third period of play which gave the Eagles a 20 point lead over their opponents. Tommy Collier scored on a three yard run for the Eagles and Mark Lewis intercepted a pitchout and went 42 yards for a TD.

Final score of the game was made by San Saba with 3:13 left in the game.

Tommy Collier was the leading rusher with a total of 97 yards, 7.5 yard average for 13 carries. Mike Williams was second with 91 yards, 7.5 yard average for 14 carries.

Other rushers in the game were Dean Humphries, 9 yards for 2.3 average for 4 carries; D. D. Terrence, 5 yards for 2.5 average on 2 carries; and Mike Connally, 12 yards for 2.0 average on 6 carries. The Eagles racked up 11 first downs; 214 yards rushing; and completed one passing attempt which scored a TD.

Leading tacklers were Williams with 15; Robert Berry, 14; Sammy Padilla and Mike Jenkins, 12 each; Randy Williams, D. D. Terrence, and Collier, 10 each; James Green, 9; and Charles Davis, 7.

"The boys were outweighed by San Saba, but managed to hold their own and displayed some great playing ability during the game," commented Coach Perry Farley.

"Also, the intercepting of a pitch-out by Mark Lewis and taking it for a 42 yard TD certainly deserves recognition."

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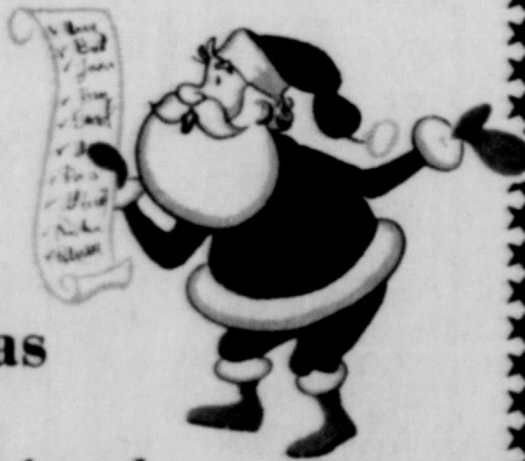
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
