The Way It Was—

Mt. Olive Church Becomes A Reality

In the year of 1887, the community now known as Mt. Olive became the home of John A. Neal. Soon other pioneer families came, which was comparable to the adventurous Plymouth Colony.

It seems as though the Lord had led a band of people of the same belief and faiths to this, a near wilderness, and with courage and determination began to build homes. They cleared spots in the fertile soil of brush and rocks for small farms so that a living for their families could be made. But there was one very important thing missing that was most essential. They did not have a place to worship the Lord with their families and friends.

On Friday, July 28, 1899, a group of men and women met under a brush arbor on a little mountain fifteen miles northeast of Goldthwaite and organized a Primitive Baptist Church.

The Presbytery consisted of the following men: Elders, W. S. Harris, F. D. L. Koen, W. W. Fowler, S. R. Woods, Deacons, R. McKenlogh, O. H. Kelly, W. B. Hedghspeth and T. J. Wesley.

A. B. Neal, Sr. was spokesman for this worthy group of pioneers wishing to become a church. All these people had letters from other churches of the same faith where they had previously been members. After the letters were read stating they all had full fellowship with their home churches, they were declared a church, and the Covenant was read.

The Covenant was signed by the following: J. D. and Elizabeth Callaway; Mrs. M. A. Wilcox; A. B. and Pernecia Neal; Almer B. Neal; J. W. Hodges and wife; S. F. Roberts; J. M. Smith and wife, Nora; Thomas and Argie Huchabee; Mrs. F. L. McConal; Mrs. Maude Parker; C. H. Koen; J. R. Furgeson and Katie Callaway.

The name of Mt. Olive was submitted by Mrs. Elizabeth Callaway. They chose the third Saturday and Sunday in each month for meeting, and have kept those dates all through the years, except for a short time for the convenience of a minister. Communion service is held in May and September, and observed as we believe the Bible teaches, in humbling ourselves by washing the feet of each other.

Almer Neal made another commitment at that meeting of long ago. A young lady, Elizabeth Roberts, had attended the meeting with her father, S. F. Roberts. Mr. Neal asked Elizabeth to marry him, and on the following Christmas Day they were married. They lived their entire married life within a few miles of this church, and lived to observe their 65th wedding anniversary. They devoted their lives to the church and family; never missing a meeting except when hindered by sickness.

When it was raining, people of Mt. Olive put wagon sheets on their wagons to keep dry, and loaded wood in the wagon to have a fire in the big stove that stood in the middle of the church building. Many times the road was so muddy that travel was almost impossible. Wagons were about the only means of travel, and a stick was carried to punch mud from between the spokes of the wagon wheels, as mud would ball up so much that it made the load too heavy for the teams to pull. But the people kept their faith and their covenant, no matter what the cost.

Life in those days had many hardships, but often during services shouting and praising of the Lord for all his blessings and care took place. Many Mills County citizen's heritage stems from the pioneer

families of the Mt. Olive Church.

After the organization of the church, and until one could be built, the congregation met under a brush arbor in the summer months, and at the home of J. S. Hodges if the weather was unfavorable. The

church building was built in 1901, and was used as a school until 1912.

In the early years, there was usually large families, and all went to church. The parents believed in strict discipline and it wasn't unusual to see a mother use a little persuasion

to teach a little one to be reverent in church. Pallets were put on the floor for babies. Church reverence has been taught down through the years.

We have had our trials and sorrows, but we have always gone in prayer to ask for divine guidance to lead us; thus, the church of Mt. Olive, a small community, stands strong today, 76 years after its beginning; the services being continuous.

The old Harmony Association, which is a fellowship of churches, was organized in 1879, and was held at Mt. Olive for the first time in 1906. Since then they have met here many times. As time drew near for the meeting of the Association, wagons started coming in — each family coming prepared to take care of its own needs. Many spent several days on the road coming and going. There was singing, preaching and shouting for three days, and almost every state in the Union has been represented at these meetings; each person greeting the other as brother or sister.

We now have a 50' x 50' tabernacle near the church, which is used as a central meeting place, with four different churches being host — Comanche, Brownwood, Gatesville and Mt. Olive. In recent years another tabernacle was built for serving meals. Meals are served from Thursday through Sunday noon, and everyone is given a hearty welcome, some coming from a great distance and express themselves as feeling at home.

A well was drilled in memory of my father, a descendant of a charter member, and song books were given in memory of deceased parents. Several ministers have come from this church — Elder Elvis Barrington of Midland, whose grandfather was a pioneer church clerk; and Elder V. M. Bleeker of Rising Star, who is a descendant of F. D. L. Koen.

There are many precious memories of this little Mt. Olive Primitive Baptist Church; the meetings under brush arbors, the wonderful fellowship with our members, the visitors, singing, prayers, and all the many services down through the years. These memories all of us love and hold dear.

Sgt. Terry Williams Dies In Germany; Services Here Friday

Sgt. Terry G. Williams was killed in Germany on October 17, the result of an injury received in a tank accident while participating in a military training exercise.

Funeral services for Sgt. Williams will be held at 2:00 p.m., Friday, October 24, at the Church of Christ in Goldthwaite. Burial will be at the Goldthwaite Cemetery with Joe Woodrum officiating.

He was born on June 23, 1954 in Goldthwaite. He was a member of the Baptist Church. Sgt. Williams had been a member of the Armed Forces since September of 1972. He was stationed at Ft. Hood for 18 months and was stationed in Schweinfurt, Germany for a year and three months. He achieved the rank of Sgt. E-5, and was married to La Nora Price on May 22, 1975 at Goldthwaite.

Survivors include his wife, a daughter, Melissa Kay Williams; his mother, Mrs. Vivian Williams of Goldthwaite; his father, Ned Williams of Houston; a grandmother, Virginia McDonald of Goldthwaite; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. David Walter Williams of Goldthwaite; four sisters, Mrs. Shirley Casbeer of Goldthwaite, Mrs. Benjamin Herrera of Baumholder, Germany, Mrs. Virginia Martinez of Goldthwaite and Mrs. Frances Covey of San Diego, California; and one brother, Lonnie Williams of Goldthwaite.

Mike Skiles Lions Speaker

Mike Skiles, a native of Goldthwaite, and an executive with the American Heart Association in Fort Worth, was the guest speaker at the Goldthwaite Lions Club Tuesday night.

Skiles, presented by Lion Del Barnett, spoke on the pros and cons of charity organizing efforts by communities. He listed three ways in which a community could control charitable giving.

The United Way was the first to be outlined by Skiles. This group puts together mostly welfare and recreational charities and divides the money collected by a percentage. A local charity fund, the second category, could be set up in a community, according to Skiles, and the specific charity and the amount of money given to each charity would be under the authority of a committee of locally selected persons.

The third alternative was the solicitation permit. It is an ordinance passed by the City Council that sets certain guidelines to charitable organizations who operate within the city limits of a community. Such things as the percentage of money spent on fund-raising would be limited by the organization.

Eagles Fall To Dublin; Meet Ranger Friday

Goldthwaite took an early 3-0 lead in the first quarter of the homecoming game on Eagle Field Friday night against the Dublin Lions when Hyron Landrum booted a field goal from 27 yards out.

However, the early lead did not last long for the Eagles. Dublin broke loose in the second period of play, scoring on a sweep play, and made the extra point a good one. During the same quarter, the Lions racked up another six pointer on a boot-leg play from nine yards out. Again, the extra point try was good.

Following halftime, the Lions were still on a touchdown

streak as they racked up a six-pointer on a dive play 15 yards out, followed by a good extra point. The scoreboard lit up only a short time later on a 38-yard pass play. This time the extra point try was no good.

Eagle feathers began to fly in the fourth quarter as Ray Frazier took the pigskin on a trap play from eight yards out for the six-pointer. The extra point was no good.

Again the Eagles rallied when Miller connected with Landrum for a 63-yard TD run. The two point conversion, a boot-leg pass from Miller to Delbert Berry, was good.

Dublin turned loose again and scored two more touchdowns on runs of 19 yards and 74 yards to bring the game to an end. Final score was Goldthwaite 17 and Dublin 40. The loss leaves the Eagles 1-6 for the year, 0-2 for district play.

"Mistakes and turnovers hurt us more than anything Friday night. During some of the most crucial points in the game, when we were making advances with the ball, the drive would be stopped. The playing was good enough for a win; it just wasn't consistent enough," commented the coaching staff for the Eagles.

Frazier carried the ball 17 times for a total of 89 yards; Landrum, 12 for 84; Spradley, 7 for 14; and Miller, 4 for 2.

Miller attempted 14 passes and completed 6 for a total of 99 yards.

Berry caught two passes for a total of 11 yards; Jett Johnson, 1 pass for 27 yards; and Landrum, 2 for 88 yards.

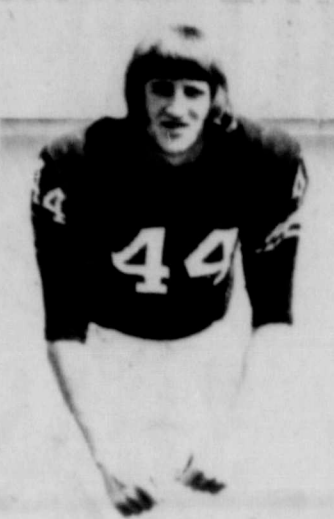
