People went to the creeks every spring in search of "poke salad";
A beef was butchered and

peddled from door to door; The ice-man called at your door with a block of ice for your icebox: Swiping watermelons was the

"in" thing to do among the younger set; "May Day" programs were held the first of every May, and girls looked like dolls in

their crepe paper dresses; Churches held a community Christmas Tree, and everyone there got a present;

Cupie dolls were won at County fairs; Mumble-peg and pop-the-whip was played at school;

Every customer tried to "jew" every merchant down, and every merchant priced his merchandise accordingly; Mud holes were common in

every road; Cars were cranked by hand and many arms were broken; Everybody sprinkled their beds with water on hot sum-

mer nights, and carried hot irons to bed on cold winter nights:

Men shaved with straightedged razors; Every child knew the meaning of "blinky" milk;

Women curled their hair with "curling irons" held over a coal oil lamp for heating;

Children wore strings of asafetida around their necks to ward off germs;

A newly married couple was given a charivarie; The first thing a preacher got when he arrived at his new church was a "pounding".

David Livingston was in on 19 tackles; Jim Smith, 12; Keith Williams, 11; and Carson Padgett, 9.



The Mills County Crops and Livestock Committee planned a Sheep and Goat Production Meeting for November 4, 1975. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Mills County

State Bank meeting room. Dr. George Alschwede will be on hand to present the program. Dr. Alschwede is the Texas Sheep and Goat Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service stationed at San Angelo.

The meeting is open to the general public and we encourge producer attendance. Dr. Alschwede will discuss various production aspects of the sheep and goat industry. Producers will also have the opportunity to ask questions and visit with Dr. Alschwede concerning production problems.

The Mills County 4-H Horse Club will sponsor an open play day at the T. A. Head arena in Goldthwaite on November 1, 1975. The books for Western Pleasure will open at 9:00 a.m. and close at 10:00 a.m. The speed event books will close at 12:30 p.m. Western Pleasure classes will begin at 10:00 a.m. and speed events will begin at 1:00 p.m.

Entry fees will be \$1.00 per event. Proceeds will go to the Mills County 4-H Horse Club.

A recent statewide hearing on brucellosis in Austin offered an opportunity for many livestock producers and market operators to voice their views on the present program and the changes proposed by the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Many of the beef cattle producers and market operators felt that the proposed changes would pose undue economic hardship to the cattle industry, while several dairymen felt that the Texas animal health authorities should carry out a program to eradicate the disease as soon as possible.

The nine-member commission, representing all segments of the industry, voted not to adopt the proposed changes after evaluating the testimony presented. The present program will continue until industry leaders determine future changes that may become necessary.

In conjunction with brucellosis eradication and the current depressed livestock market, producers should attempt to cull low producing animals or those affected with diseases.

The present indemnification is \$40 for grade and \$80 for registered animals found to have brucellosis when tested on the farm or ranch. In addition, producers with livestock in areas where brucellosis is more prevalent should consider using the calfhood brucella vaccine in all replacement heifer calves. However, accurate vaccination records should be maintained.

Every gardener worth the title has a few packets of flower or vegetable seeds left from spring and summer planting. Or they may have collected seed from their own or from their neighbor's plants.

Although old seed often has a lower germination rate as

well as reduced vigor, espectally if left in a hot shed or storage area, the temptation is to try to save it for next Proper storage car greatly increase the shelf life of many seeds.

The seed should be air-dried before placing in tightly sealed containers. It should then be kept in a refrigerator or cool basement at a temperature range of 35 to 50 degrees F.

When collecting seeds from garden plants, remember that many of the new improved varieties are hybrids and will seldom come true. This means that the offspring will have little or no resemblance to the parent plant.

Healthy trees are valuable in any landscape and they should be protected and cared

Homeowners should be on the lookout for possible damage to their trees and should know how to protect trees and

correct damage. Any cut or break in the bark of a tree leaves it open to insects and diseases. First, clean the wound and get rid of loose bark, then apply a special pruning compound. This will dry hard and pre-

vent insect or disease entry. We discourage wrapping a wire or metal band tightly around a tree trunk. breaks the bark and cuts off the flow of food from the leaves to the roots. If the band is left on, the tree will eventually die.

Since a tree's main "feedroots are in the top 15 to 18 inches of the soil, care should be used to avoid packing the soil. Soil that is compacted by automobiles or pedestrians can prevent normal root development. If possible, try to reroute traffic around the tree by fencing or by using

Landscape fills or the addition of more than four to six inches of soil around the base of a tree can be especially harmful. It suffocates the tree by keeping out water and air. If a shallow fill is essential, it's best to use sand or gravel

soils that let in air and water. One way of protecting a tree from a fill is to build a brick or stone well two to three feet out from the trunk.

The first step is to remove all vegetation within the wellarea around the tree. Then install agricultural drain tile out and down from the trunk in a spokelike pattern. Build the well around the tree and fill it gradually over two or three years with coarse sand

and gravel. Once the well is constructed, the outside grade can be raised as desired.

The best way to protect trees is to prevent damage before it occurs.






November! It can't be, but it is! A thankful month -- a Thanksgiving month. Let's start with home -






