September bills are received, and the number of KWHs is considerably smaller in September than in July.

Authority

The City Council voted unanimously to charge an additional 2 mils' (two-tenths of one cent) per KWH to Goldthwaite customers until LCRA notifies the City that the difference is made up, LCRA is also changing procedures to insure that the difference does not happen again

Allen pointed out that the loss would be made up in about six months. He also said that the fuel charge for the next billing period would be 17 mils per KWH. This is the highest figure ever for a fuel charge.

In other matters, the council: Appointed Lee Roy Stacy to fill a vacancy on the Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery Board.

- Set Christmas bonuses for all employees of the City. - - Heard from local highway patrolman Ronnie Rush concerning stop signs and yield signs within the city limits of Goldthwaite. In the late 1880's the T. C. Burnhams were living near the banks of the Colorado River. At that time range country was unfenced, except for small enclosures which were fenced with either rock or split rails.

Horses were usually turned out of the small pens or pastures when not in use and a bell placed on one of them making it less difficult to find them when they were needed. They would sometimes stray quite a distance from the home range

One evening the father and husband, T. C. Burnham, with his two sons, L. B. (Lit) and T. J., came home from their work about dark to find the evening meal prepared, fire still burning briskly in the kitchen stove and everything in readiness for supper with one exception - Aunt Mary, as the boys called their stepmother, was not there. After a reasonable length of

time went by and she did not return, they became worried as to just what her absence meant, as by calling her and searching around the place they failed to discover Aunt Mary They soon became genuinely alarmed and called in the neighbors to help and the entire night was spent hunting and searching, with no results. The next morning found a weary, worried and troubled

family, when about nine o'clock a man who lived several miles away came driving up; in his vehicle was Aunt Mary, safe and sound, except that she was extremely upset, knowing how much her family has "o" about her through the mand Her explanation ran some-thing like this: the horses had been gone for several days and were needed at home. She had finished preparing the evenheard the bell on one of them Without waiting for the men to come in, she immediately went in search of the horses, knowing how badly they were needed.

As she got on her way, the sound of the bell became more difficult to hear but after a bit she was sure she heard it again. This went on for some time until she finally decided she would return home. However, in her concern to catch the horses she had neglected any thoughts of where she was; but now, unsuccessful in catching the horses, she tried to turn toward home and realized that she was hopelessly lost in the dark. She spent hours trying to find her'way.

Finally, she came to the edge of a mountain looking down into a valley and saw a light. She spent some time feeling her way down the mountainside toward the light. It was late in the night when she arrived at a man's house near where the San Saba flows into the Colorado. This family took her in for the night but refused at that late hour to take her home until morning. You can be assured that Aunt Mary, knowing how frantic her family at home must be, didn't sleep a wink that night.

This story and many more happened to our pioneer fathers and mothers and should help us to appreciate their contribution to our welfare.

Mrs. Lottie Langford Rudd, the former Lottie Carter of Center City Community, remembers a very special event that took place about 1902; or at least it seemed special to Lottie as she has remembered it all these years. Cakes were a rarity during those early times; fiour had to be milled miles from home and sugar was so expensive that to be invited to a cake cutting and andy breaking was an excitng event.

That party was given by Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Owens and their two teenage daughters, Lufa and Sadie. Lottie remembers that when she arrived at the party, Mrs. Owens, who was gracious hostess and a delightful cook, had the table

of all kinds. The cooking of the taffy began right away and there was much laughter and fun as the pulling and breaking of the candy took place. But the cutting of the cakes was the thing that impressed Lottie as being the most fun. She remembers a young boy, Bill Lucas, of the same community, being there and she has never forgotten the look of Bill's eyes when he first saw all those beautiful cakes. He seemed unable to believe that he could just walk up and take a piece of cake at any time, and asked, "Do you mean I can just get a piece of cake whenever I want it?" Lufa answered, "Help yourself, Bill. There's plenty of cake for everyone." And Bill did, eating piece after piece of whatever kind of cake he chose and so did everyone there. All the guests went home that night feeling they had been to one of the most delightful Christ-
