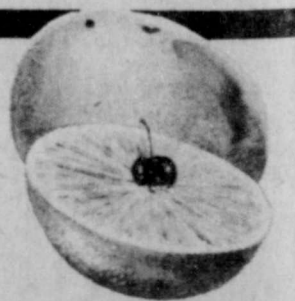

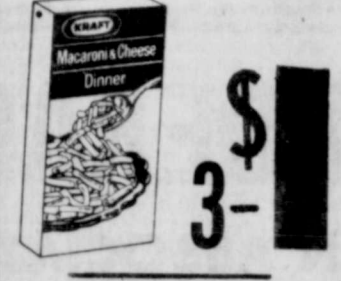

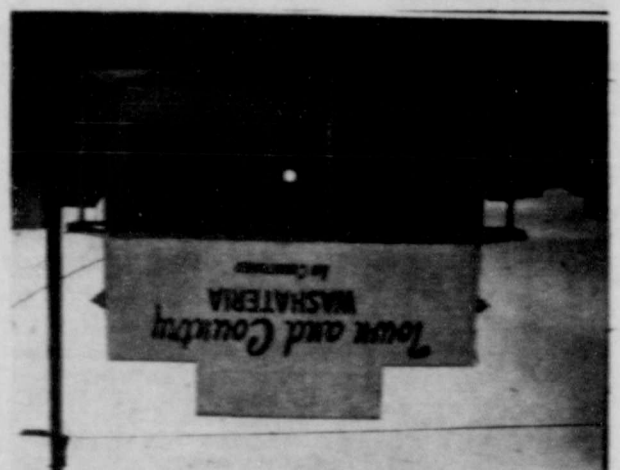

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## Newly Elected CTCOG Executive Committee Conducts Business Meeting

The first regular meeting of the newly elected Executive Committee of the Central Texas Council of Governments met in Gatesville recently with 1976 President, Temple Mayor David Bandy, presiding.

The Committee accepted the representatives presented to them for approval by the Health Coordinating Committee to serve on the governing board of the new thirty-county Health Systems Agency. The Committee also authorized the signing of a contract with the consulting firm selected by the Evaluation Team for the Multi-County Correctional Facility.

President Bandy appointed three special committees. A COG Reorganization Committee will be chaired by immediate past president, San Saba Mayor H. D. Chadwick, and consists of fifteen members.

A five-member Budget and Audit Review Committee will be headed by R. L. Waters, and a Social Services Committee with five members, and Loretta Mayor Clyde McAnelly as chairman, will coordinate the activities between the Hill Country Community Action Agency and CTCOG.

Alternate members to the Executive Committee for six of the seven county membership

were approved. The Bell County alternate will be presented at the February meeting for approval.

The Committee also author-

ized support of a Department of Welfare request that a Human Resource Advisory Committee to CTCOG be set up to help improve interagency

coordination. They also passed a resolution calling for the continuation of the regional drug abuse program under CTCOG instead of with the new Health Systems Agency.

In other business, the Committee passed a resolution stating the position of the Central Texas Council of Governments in regard to its future roles and responsibilities. Highlights of this resolution were that it "is and should continue to be primarily a planning and research and development organization"; "should not be given

regulatory authority"; "does not need or desire taxing authority"; that its review authority "should not be expanded to the approval or the disapproval of applications"; and that it "is not and should not become another layer of government."

The Committee also adopted resolutions honoring the memory of Mr. Albert Hastings, President of the Central Texas Economic Development District; Mr. Talmage "Bucky" Wilson, Past Mayor of Belton; and Basil Wilson, Past Mayor of Cameron.

Our speaker this month was James Whaley from the Waco Department of Public Safety. He spoke about Self Protection for yourself. Some of the precautions he told about to protect ourselves when on the road were:

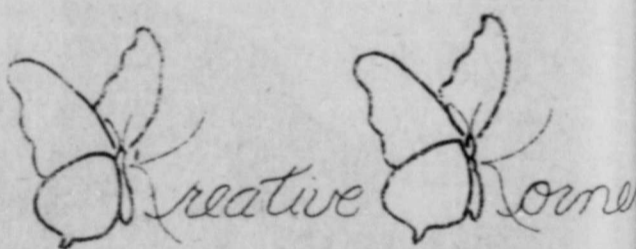
1. Don't pick up hitch-hikers
2. Make sure your car is in good shape if you drive at night or day.
3. Keep doors locked and windows rolled up.
4. If you have a car problem and somebody stops to help, roll your window down just enough to talk through.
5. If you are driving downtown, stay away from the lane by the curb and keep your doors and windows locked.

If you leave your house at night, leave an area of the house that is lighted. When you dress, stay away from unshaded places and don't advertise! Keep your doors locked and before you open your door at night make sure you know who you are talking to.

Mr. Whaley showed us a film strip on the different ways you can protect yourself if someone attacks you. It also showed statistics about the crime increase. Mr. Whaley said that one violent crime (forceable rape, murder, aggravated assault) happens every 43 seconds in the United States.

The four best means of self defense are:

Screaming - he won't want to attract attention.  
Striking - size doesn't matter; he won't want to be marked.
