Jack Elms place that have always been a mystery, yet un-solved. When the wells were dug is beyond the rememberance of anyone living today. They are hand-dug to a depth of about fifteen feet and have never been known to go dry. One well is about three feet from the other, and the mystery is - why two wells so close together? It is known that pioneers over the community hauled water for home use, and that women of the community went there to do their washing. They gathered around the wells on wash day with their washpots, wash-boards, tubs and lye soap to spend most of the day chatting, washing, and visiting while their children played nearby.






