# The Way It Was Fairs And Horse Races

Every county had a fair  
and. If for some reason one  
not, the county was con-  
sidered non-progressive and a  
poor place to live. But Mills  
County had a fair ground - and  
a race track, a baseball field,  
an exhibition building, a football  
field, a band and dance plat-  
form, an "old fiddlers plat-  
form" - all on the fair ground.  
This place of almost constant  
entertainment was located on  
the edge of every small town -  
a walking distance of the hardy-  
Goldthwaite's Fair Ground  
on the south side of town  
between a small brook and the  
Saba Highway, beginning  
east of the Livestock  
Commission and extending  
west along the highway  
about a quarter mile.

Every exciting thing imag-  
inable happened there from  
day afternoon baseball  
games to family reunions, but  
at things came first, and  
County Fairs were most  
important.

To be sure the Fair was  
successful, a "Mills County  
Fair Association" was formed,  
Dr. J. M. Campbell as  
president. The land was deeded  
to the Fair Association by the  
City of Goldthwaite for the  
purpose of holding a County Fair,  
included in the deed was  
a clause stipulating that the  
land would revert to the City  
if the Fair Association ever  
dissolved.

To prepare for the Fair,  
men over the County worked  
summer canning their choice  
specimens of cucumbers, figs,  
peaches, pears, string beans,  
peas and peas from their gar-  
dens and orchards. They saved  
their largest pumpkins and  
dried the longest ears of  
corn and saved for display  
ever might be growing in  
Garden at the time of the  
Fair. They made the clearest  
jelly and canned the tastiest  
serves they knew how to  
make. They brought their  
finest quilts, their daintiest  
tattling and crocheting,  
which had consumed a good  
part of the nights the winter  
before in the making - all with  
coming County Fair and  
ribbons in mind. Booths  
were roped off along each side  
of the exhibition hall for every  
man that wanted to compete.  
The last few days before the  
Fair started, old family  
treasures were put to use and  
the entrant tried her level  
best to bake the winning cake,  
or cookies.

When the booths were fin-  
ished and each display ready  
for the visit of the judges, the  
men stood by in anxiety as  
they passed slowly along the  
displays with their notebooks  
in hand, and stacks of blue,  
yellow and red ribbons. They  
checked pickles, plugged water-  
melons, measured pumpkins,  
checked crafts, eyed canned  
peas, tasted cakes and pies  
and finally, after much compar-  
ison and consultation, placed the  
winners.

The carnival was almost as  
popular in Goldthwaite as the  
Fair, and there was always  
a fairground at the County Fair. The  
way was lined with side-  
walks and games - from the  
"booth" to the "base-  
ball" booth. The back of every  
show or game booth was  
lined with shelves laden with  
"pops" and feather fans  
prizes. Voices of the side-  
walk barkers could be heard  
over all the noise of the mid-  
dle. There was the Carousel,  
those days called the Hobby-  
horse, and the Ferris Wheel  
all to enjoy. There was  
candy, the lemonade  
and oh, so much fun for  
everyone.

Farmers brought their  
champion pigs, best milk cows  
calves to be judged, but  
the biggest judging of all took  
place on a platform just east  
of the exhibition hall at the  
"Fiddler's Contest".  
Every fiddler in the county,  
there were many, includ-  
ing Dr. J. M. Campbell and  
father, Joe Langford, who  
been brushing up on their  
skills of "Cotton Eye Joe",  
"The Waves", "Red  
Waltz", "The Missouri Waltz",  
"Turkey in the Straw".  
The fiddlers platform was under  
the most dense shade of the  
oak trees and was circled  
by spectator benches, where  
one could give their aching  
bones a break and listen to good  
music at the same time.  
To the west of the Fair  
ground, the Association built  
a grandstand, and it was a  
big one, considering the size

of the county. In front of the  
grandstand was the race track  
with a baseball diamond just  
inside the track. Races were  
a part of the Fair, but were  
held at other times as well.  
Many people of Mills County

loved horse-racing, but Clabe  
Locklear and his sons were  
the authorities on horse-racing  
and race horses. They owned  
the winning "Harry M" and  
Dr. J. M. Campbell owned an-  
other winning horse called  
"Flying Lou".

There was entertainment at  
all times at the race track.  
A baseball game was always  
in progress while the horses  
were preparing for the next  
race. When the bugle blew the  
signal for the horses to come  
out, the ball teams stopped  
wherever they were to  
watch until the race was over.  
Then they resumed play until  
the bugle blew again.

Usually the Fairs lasted for  
two or three days and people  
camped on the outskirts of the  
fairgrounds rather than travel  
the long distance to and from  
their homes.

Mrs. Jack Huffman remem-  
bers going to the County Fair  
with her father, and seeing  
him water his team of horses  
in the horse-trough that stood  
near the courthouse lawn. She  
also remembers a large covered  
wagon loaded with water-  
melons standing on the corner  
of the square for people to buy  
and take to the fairgrounds to  
eat; and that her family spent  
the entire three days of the Fair  
camped close by.

All Goldthwaite football  
games were held on the old  
Fairgrounds until a field was  
finally constructed on the school  
ground in the late 1930's. There  
were no bleachers then, and  
spectators stood along the  
sidelines for the entire game,  
running along in droves as the  
plays progressed. At times,  
they crowded onto the field  
until the referees were forced  
to stop the game and ask the  
people to move back.

The Fairgrounds were never  
void of fun for long, and when  
nothing else was going on,  
a skating rink was usually there.  
Mills County had many good  
skaters, but Horace Gray was  
by far the best. For many years  
he operated the rink at night,  
and taught many boys and girls  
the art of skating.

The most historically excit-  
ing event to occur on the old  
Fairground was a buffalo bar-  
becue given by a few Goldth-  
waite businessmen to honor a  
Texan they all admired - Lyndon  
Baines Johnson, who was a  
candidate for the United States  
Senate at the time. Earl Fair-  
man, president of the Trent  
State Bank, organized the affair  
and was helped by Hollis Black-  
well, a young wool buyer, and  
Dr. Tom C. Graves, a young  
local dentist. The occasion was  
one that will linger in the  
memory of all those present  
for many years to come.

A huge trench was dug for  
the pit and hundreds of pounds  
of buffalo, beef and goat were

have been dubbed this honor.

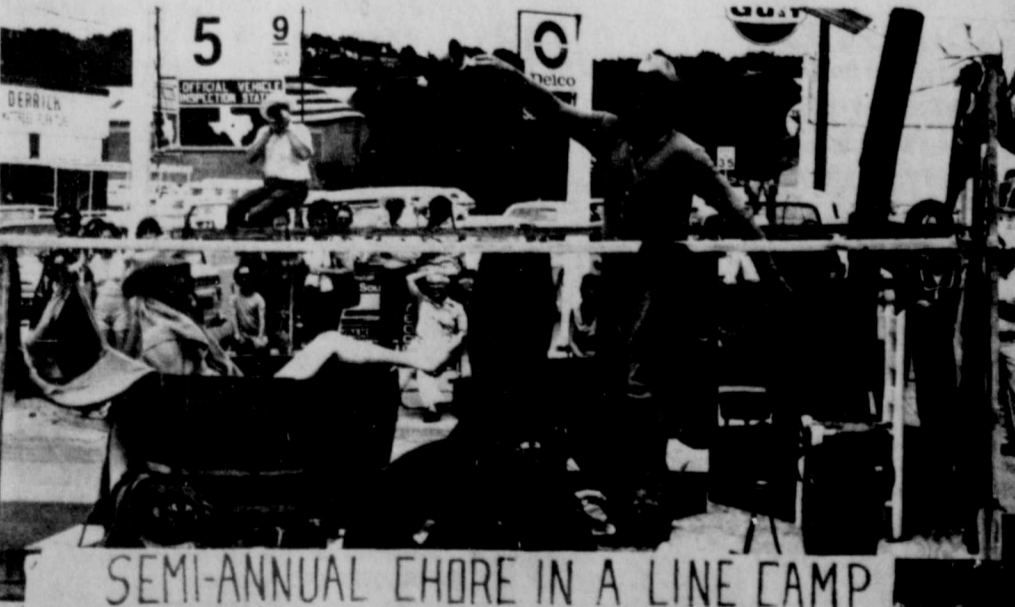
Earl Dumas was raised in

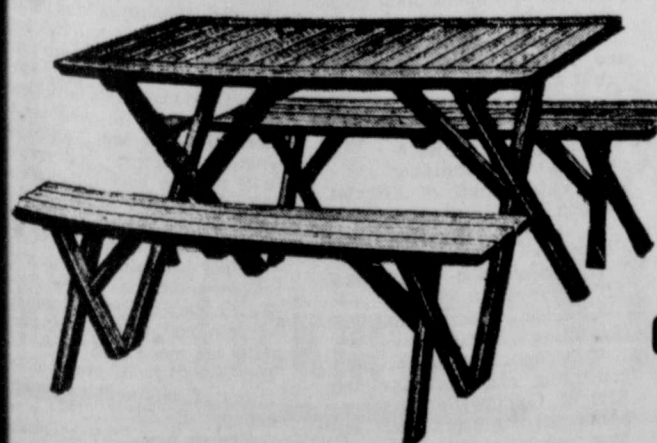

## From The County Agent

Swine dysentery will cost hog producers throughout the U. S. an estimated \$64 million this year and losses from the disease are increasing.

The disease, which is caused by harmful bacteria in the digestive tracts of pigs, is characterized by diarrhea with blood or mucous in the feces, reduced feed consumption and gauntness in pigs. It is highly contagious and is transmitted by pigs eating the feces of infected animals. Infected feces can be carried on inanimate objects or by animals who physically move feces from one place to another.

Because swine dysentery has many of the same symptoms as salmonella and whipworms, a laboratory confirmation must be made before the disease can be absolutely verified.

Also, an animal with a health certificate does not necessarily mean the animal does not have swine dysentery, as some animals with the disease will not show any symptoms.

Treatment is costly to the producer, so preventive measures are especially important. One way to keep the disease from infecting your swine herd is to buy pigs from sources with no known history of the disease and to maintain a closed breeding herd.

Isolate newly purchased animals for at least 30 days and check them once a day for signs of symptoms. Plan your chores so that the new animals are cared for last and do not

return to the main herd unless all boots and equipment has been thoroughly cleaned.

Keep in mind that every animal, vehicle or person who comes into contact with your swine herd is a potential carrier of the disease.

If your herd does become infected, tell your veterinarian and accept any type of quarantine to slaughter arrangement.

Be sure to inform all nearby neighbors of the appearance of the disease in your herd so they can watch their animals for symptoms.

If any infected hogs are taken to market, clean and disinfect the transporting vehicle before using it again.

Practicing good sanitation is the best way to minimize the severity of losses from swine dysentery.

Keep hog pens and lots as clean and comfortable as possible and try to reduce stress from overcrowding, chilling, filth and poor nutrition. Keep traffic between pig lots to a minimum.

To rid the disease from your herd calls for the slaughter of all infected animals and then a thorough cleanup and disinfection of the areas where pigs were kept.

Let hog lots idle for several months before moving in new pigs. Then stay on the alert as the disease commonly re-

With 333,000 lbs. produced in Mills County, mohair production for 1975 stands at 8,600,000 lbs. statewide, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service's recently released 1975 Livestock Statistics Report.

Other Texas counties in the top ten in Angora goat production include Edwards, Val Verde, Sutton, Uvalde, Kimble, Terrell, Mason, Crockett and Gillespie.

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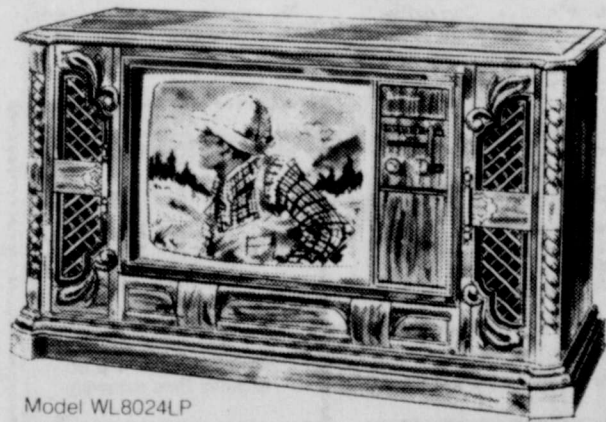

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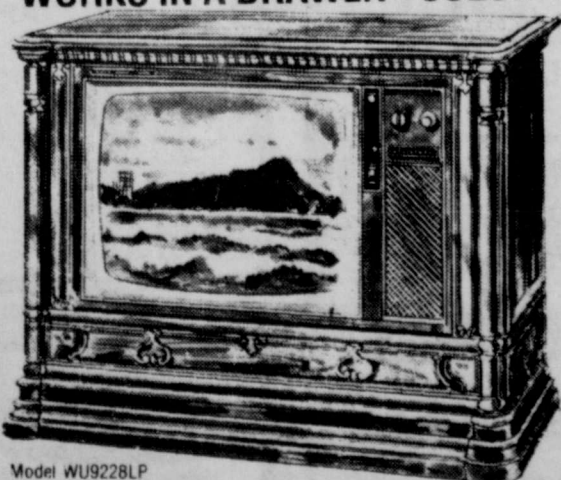

## Piranha Found

### To Be

### Harmless Fish

What was first thought to be a piranha found on a trotline in the upper Colorado River in early June has turned out to be a harmless plant-eating fish.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department inland fisheries biologist Roger McCabe had identified the fish as a "pacu", a South American species similar to the piranha but a vegetarian.

The piranha-like fish was first discovered by a Brownwood fisherman checking his trotline set in the Colorado near Brady. It weighed 1 1/4 pounds and measured 13 inches in length.

Parks and Wildlife Commissioners in 1974 banned piranhas and 11 other groups of potentially harmful fish from importation into Texas.

Pacus are common aquarium fish available from most tropical fish dealers. McCabe speculates a fish enthusiast grew tired of feeding the pacu and dumped it in the Colorado River.

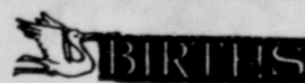
## Thalia Shelton Services Conducted

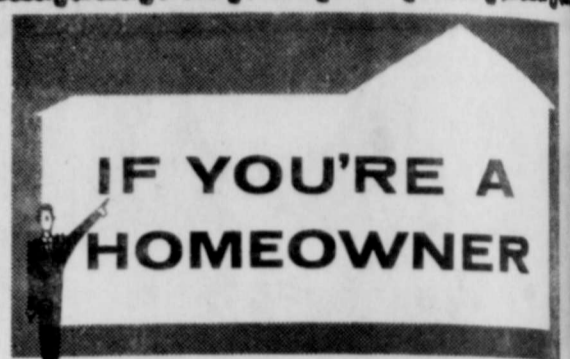

There is a part of Individual Retirement Accounts (IRA) that has not received much publicity. We have seen how you can place up to \$1500.00 per year into an IRA without being subject to tax until retirement, but little has been said about the other parts of the same law.

Primarily, we speak of the person that works for a company who has a retirement program of their own for the employee. Without the use of IRA, when an individual retires from a company and receives a lump sum settlement, this amount is immediately subject to taxation. However, if the amount received from the retirement program, less voluntary contributions, is deposited within 60 days to an IRA, tax can be avoided until withdrawals begin. The taxes will normally be less when the total annual income has been decreased by retirement.
