# Rock Springs - As It Was

Five miles to the west of Goldthwaite, just north of Anna Valley Road, are five bubbling springs where clear, cool water flows gently from between rocks as old as the hills.

In 1874, a pioneer man named John Tisdale came by the springs - decided he wanted to live there and built a large log cabin with a huge fireplace at one end. However, Mr. Tisdale was not to enjoy the bubbling springs and big fireplace for many years, for he died in 1881 and was the first person buried in the cemetery across the road from the site of the cabin. Others settled there, and the community was named Rock Springs because of the rocks and the bubbling water.

There was no school building in the early days of the community, so they used the log cabin vacated at Mr. Tisdale's death as a school and carried water from the spring in buckets.

In 1887, another early pioneer family settled not far away from Brown's Creek - the Abijah Smiths, and some of their children went to school in the little log cabin school, but in not many years the community lost the cabin to a fire.

In 1894, the community was becoming thickly settled and there was a great need for a school building, so men of the community built a lumber building just south of the springs. A. J. Gatlin and his family had moved into the community not long before and purchased land, so he gave the land for the school grounds. The building stood through many years to be used for school and church. Mrs. Minnie Gatlin is the only person living today that started to school in the first grade the first year the new school building was used in Rock Springs.

The teacher was a Mrs. Porter. Water was carried from the springs to the new school building for several years, but a well was drilled and a hand pump was installed. At the lunch hour and at recess, every child would make a dash for the pump to get a drink before the books took up. We played games at recess, such as Ball Sticks, Wolf Over The River, Pop-The-Whip, baseball and basketball.

A few teachers through the years have been Fred Dew, Mrs. Rosie Fletcher, Mrs. Mollie Daniel Hawkins, Annie Armstrong, Lora Miller, and

Nell Miller, the last teacher before Rock Springs children started going to Goldthwaite schools in 1936. A bus route was established and George Bohannon was the first bus driver. Joe Davis, Austin Whitt and Barney Tippen were trustees at the time. The school was officially consolidated with Goldthwaite Public Schools in 1946.

The building stood idle for several years, and some had visions of using it for a community center, but it was finally sold to Dr. M. A. Childress and moved to his ranch across the Bayou. All that is left of Rock Springs is the cemetery, the bubbling springs and memories.

There were many singing schools in the summer months. At times the school lasted two weeks, and singers came from Williams Ranch and Regency; some wonderful singing took place.

Most youngsters had to help with the crops, so fun times came on Saturday nights. We had community singings at the schoolhouse once each month and there were always play-parties to look forward to. Many times young people came to the J. C. Stark home - gathered around the piano and sang until midnight.

In those days, the word "neighbor" had a true meaning. When sickness struck, neighbors went to help for as long as they were needed. When a death occurred, men in the community gathered to dig the grave. When a crop needed planting or a field needed breaking, men went with planters and plows and got it done.

We grew most of our food. We killed hogs for meat; fruit was canned or dried on tin roofs; cabbage was chopped, made into sauerkraut and stored in five gallon stone jars in the storm cellar; corn was made into hominy; cotton was ginned and the seed brought home for cattle feed; pumpkins and kershaws were buried in the cottonseed so they wouldn't freeze. A pit was dug and lined with straw for sweet potatoes and turnips - corn tops were ricked over the potatoes, and sheets of tin or boards were piled on top of the ricks to keep the whole thing dry.

There was an abundance of milk, butter, buttermilk, cream, chicken and eggs - always. There was honey from which pies and cakes were made when sugar was scarce. We never once dreamed of going to the grocery store everyday, as people do now. An occasional trip for staples and a few treats was all that was necessary.

Cane, maize and other hay crops were cut with row-binders and the bundles were hauled and stacked close to the feed lots. In spring there was always fun when everyone gathered for a rat-kill. Rats and mice started running in every direction when they were disturbed as the bundles were moved away. Everyone started flailing away with their sticks, trying not to let any escape; however, a few did. With the dogs barking, people stomping and hitting at rats with their sticks - combined with yells and screams - the picture was quite a sight. Once a bundle was moved, and we found that a bumble-bee had his home underneath it. That ended the rat-kill for that day, then and there.

Some early settlers in Rock Springs were the Traylor's, Grahams, Mrs. Mollie Daniel, the Thompsons, Smiths, the Beards, Moores, A. J. Gatlin's, Coopers, McGowans, Lewises, the Mills, Gentrys, John Roberts, Mrs. Love, J. T. Sarks and Bob Cooks.

Also, William, Charlie, Walter and Fayette Stark, the Lindseys, Sam Cooks, Austin Cooks, Charley Lomis, Jim Traylor's, the Morris family, Millers, Jim Slacks, Harrells, Westons, the Davis family, McNutts, Tippens, and the Tom Nichols family. Mr. Nichols was our mail carrier until his death, when his daughter, Earlene, carried the mail until another carrier could be appointed.

There were the Westernmans, Circles, Bohannons, Deckers, Forehands, E. L. Pass, and family, whose children walked seven miles to school, and the Jacksons, Austin Whitts, the Arthur Wilcoxes and the Bill Daniels.

## City Manager Pitts Resigns Position

Goldthwaite City Manager Max Pitts, who has served since February, resigned his post on Monday of this week. His resignation stated "personal reasons" as the cause for the change. The City Council did not accept the resignation, but tabled the matter until a called meeting can be set up in a few days. The Monday night session of the Council was an emergency meeting to discuss personnel, budget review, and Pitts resignation.

Pitts told the council that after the personal problems had surfaced he has been talking to the City of Rockdale about their city manager position which has been offered to him. The Council skimmed over the next year's city budget, passing it on to a public hearing, to be conducted at the next regularly scheduled session on August 5th at 7:00 p.m. The total city budget for 1976-1977 is \$549,926. This represents about a 10 per cent increase over 1975-1976. Grace Smith was hired to enter the bookkeeping department of the city. She began work immediately. Yvonne Bruce has resigned and Rita Pafford has been elevated to head bookkeeper.

## 1976 Football Program Takes Shape

A meeting of all boys interested in playing football will be held at the Eagle Field House July 23rd, 7:30 p.m. At this meeting plans will be made for an overnight camping trip to be staged in the near future. The representative of the football shoe company will be here August 4. The time of his being here will be announced later. Coaches further announced that two-a-day workouts will begin on August 9.

## Committees Formed For Museum

The Board of Directors of the Mills County Historical Museum Corporation met on Friday, July 16, to begin forming committees needed to remodel the Palmer Building which will house the Museum. Jesse Clyde Cokrum, of Gilliam, Cokrum and Duren Attorneys, attended the meeting and is drafting resolutions necessary for the appointment of those committees - Building, Interior Exhibits, Membership and Ways and Means. A. D. Kirk, formerly an engineer for Dow Chemical Company and now retired in Goldthwaite and Floyd Fox, also retired in Goldthwaite and formerly a finishing carpenter with Lauretzen & Makin Con. Co. are being consulted as to practical and economical ways to refurbish the building. The organization is grateful to Mr. Fox and Mr. Kirk for their willingness to provide their knowledge and experience to the Museum project.

## Fine Rains Cover Area

Goldthwaite and the surrounding areas were again the recipients of rain during the past week. Anywhere from a trace to approximately six inches of rain were received by the Mills County residents. The official city rain gauge located at the Water Filter Plant located one mile southwest of Goldthwaite measured .57 inches. Darrell Head at Center City reported .47 inches in that vicinity. According to Ramona Corona in the Big Valley Community, they measured 3 inches rainfall. In the Priddy Community at Farmers and Merchants Bank, it was reported that 5 inches of rain had been measured. Mullin received 6 inches of rain according to A. R. Whisenhunt. To date during the month of July the Goldthwaite area has received a total of 3.88 inches of rain and some reports in and around town report as much as seven.

## Mills County Historical Commission Report

The history of Mills County, entitled "Mills County - The Way It Was" by Hartal Langford Blackwell, sponsored by the Mills County Historical Commission, will be ready for sale and delivery to those who have already bought them, Sept. 1, 1976. The book is being published by the Goldthwaite Eagle Publishing Company. This history is compiled of early-day stories, written by the people of Mills County from most all communities in the county. Some of the stories have been printed in the Eagle. This year, 1976, is the 200th birthday of our country and the 92nd birthday of our town - a year to preserve our history. The first County Commissioners Court met on Monday, the 12th day of Sept., 1887, to form a new county out of the counties Brown, Hamilton and Lampasas. On Dec. 31, 1887, a new county was formed. The new county was Mills. Our rugged, pioneer ancestors came and carved a beautiful place for us to live peacefully. They worked from daylight until dark, some times later by candle or lantern light. Our forefathers preserved and kept for us the things that were valuable to them. They are valuable to us now and will be to our grandchildren in the future; therefore, it is our duty to preserve the past. The interested people of Mills County have donated money to buy the Palmer Building for the Mills County Museum. Work is to begin soon inside to get display counters ready for the move to this building. We are also preserving history by placing historical markers on historical sites, buildings, cemeteries, etc. We have placed one at Mills County Park, formerly a Santa Fe landmark. The coming of the railroad was the beginning of Goldthwaite in 1885. A marker has also been placed at North Brown Cemetery, one of the earliest cemeteries in the county. A marker will be installed soon at Mullin on their United Methodist Church. The congregation met first and organized in 1857. A marker is to be placed at Williams Ranch Cemetery at the grave of John Williams who founded the settlement of Williams Ranch. Also, a marker is to be placed on the highway in Mullin at the intersection of the Williams Ranch road, marking the Williams Ranch settlement. It was one of the first towns on the old Fort Phantom Road. A historical marker also has been designated for the Regency Suspension Bridge, a rarity left in Texas. This marker will be placed in Goldthwaite at the intersection of Farm Road 574 that leads to the Regency Bridge. A historical marker for Center City and the Oak Tree, which is famous in a lot of Texas books, is in the hands of the Research Committee at the State Commission Office in Austin. Mrs. Deloce Parlarmer, a research person, is trying to find evidence that Center City is the center of Texas. A marker for Pleasant Grove Cemetery has been applied for and if sent, it will be placed at the entrance of the cemetery. The Historical Commission was appointed by the County Court, May 28, 1975. Officers are changed every two years. We have had full cooperation from everyone, so let's keep preserving history and give the Museum full cooperation, also.

## Inspections Should Be Made For Sorghum Midge & Army Worms

Mills County Farmers and Ranchers should be making careful and regular inspections of pastures and grain sorghum fields. This past week has shown a marked increase in the infestation rates of two potentially destructive insects; the Grain Sorghum Midge and the Army Worm. The sorghum midge has been very active in many fields the past few days and this insect can do considerable damage to a sorghum crop. The danger period for grain sorghum is during the bloom stage when the heads are in pollination. Once the pollination period has past and the heads begin to form past and the sorghum midge can no longer be considered a threat. The problem we are having now is that many fields are maturing irregularly. We have a percentage of heads already past pollination, some now in pollination and some just beginning to pollinate, in the same field. This makes the decision regarding chemical control one of percentages. It is considered feasible to spray grain sorghum if a field has as many as 20-30

percent of the heads in pollination and if you can find one sorghum midge adult per head. The army worm is now becoming active in our county also. We recommend that all producers be on the careful watch for this very destructive insect. The army worm is a very destructive yet easily killed insect. The most important facet of control is timing and thorough coverage. Fields should be inspected regularly to avoid losing forage.

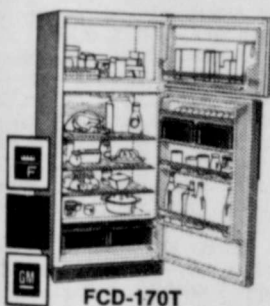

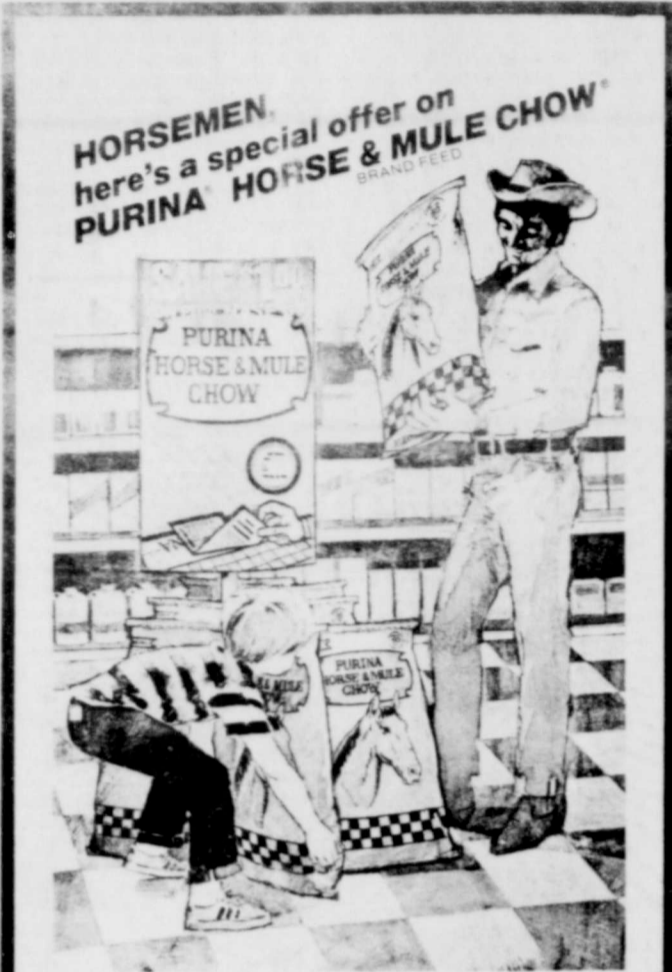
