There were two Kirkpatrick brothers, Moses and lames, living in Mullin in Moses was a banker as well as a mercantile merchant and James was a doctor, commonly called Dr.

Dr. Jim had been educated in medicine in Kentucky and rode over all the western part of Mills County with his "pill bag", adminis-tering to the ills of the frontier people. He was a lover of the out-of-doors. All kind of rocks from the smallest Indian mano to the largest Indian grinding stones which e sometimes spent a whole day carrying home. His hard working brother, Moses, at times thought Dr. Jim wasting time with such folly. When Dr. Jim was close to fifty, he married a young woman half his age. They never had children, but it is said he often delighted his young nieces and neph-ews with his stories.

One day a "stranger" came to Mullin. In a town so small as this village all strangers were looked on suspicion, especially when the man seemed strange, slow to talk, and seemed to be the holder of

Since Dr. Jim was the friendliest man in town, the stranger naturally turned to him for information - for nformation the stranger had to have to accomplish his mission. The story ran something like this:

He had in his possession map or chart showing where a treasure of silver before by a Spanish or Mexican banking mission, somewhere north and a little east of where the San Saba flows into the Colorado River. The Mexicans regularly made voyages through this area to and from New Orelans and nta Fe, at times from as far as Denver, with loads of silver and gold to be ipped to Spain or Mexico. The treasure had to be hurriedly buried on one rticular trip because of essure from Indian raids, and was to be picked ter. However, most of the Mexicans were killed by the ndians before they could get away, and only one Catholic priest and a few Mexicans escaped. This man let Dr. Jim have a fleeting look

at the map, but not copy it.
The stranger was looking a wrought iron spike iven into a liveoak tree, and if he could find it he was sure he could then find the Spanish treasure hidden cording to the map, the tree should be somewhere north and east of the junction of previously mentioned

After searching for several months, and without finding the spike, the "stranger" finally left the country. But the news of the foreigner's story spread over Mullin. It is no surprise that when one day the fol-lowing winter a resident of Mullin found a wrought iron spike in his fireplace when cleaning it of ashes that he quickly took the spike to Dr.

After a little questioning, Dr. Kirkpatrick soon learned that the wood was cut and sold to the resident, and came from the top of a mountain on land now belonging to Mr. and Mrs. 0. 0. Smith, not far from foldthweite and your called Goldthwaite and now called "Dry Pond."

Dr. Jim immediately set out searching the area for further clues. The country was thickly wooded with brush, and an ax had to be used to penetrate its den-

he first exciting find was flat limestone rock about four feet long near the stump of a tree from which iron spike apparently ne. One side of the rock was covered with a picture, partly etched and partly painted with red and yellow ochre such as Indians used in their paintings. There were numbers and geometon the rock and

remembered the picture of the train of pack mules trailing acorss the rock toward the drawing of the mouth of a cave on the side of a hill. On each of three packs and over the mouth of the cave was drawn a half-moon, a

Dr. Jim worked for days deciphering the map on the rock, and soon made two other astonishing discoveries in the area. He and his searching party found two hand - hammered copper plates - twelve to fourteen inches in diameter and about one-quarter inch tick protected by rocks that they were not in the least tarnished. They were covered with much the same engravings as the limestone rock had shown. On one plate were jacks loaded with treasures and headed for the mouth of a cave - again showing a sign of treasure.

Dr. Jim studied the markings on each of the plates for months and apparently understood their meaning, for he soon found a triangle of three trees about one-haif mile east of where the plates were uncovered. At the base of one of the trees, about two feet down, the laborers dug up a hand-hammered copper box about ten to twelve inches long. The lid was etched with the same string of pack burros heading for a cave. In addition, the name of Padre Lopez was etched over the date 1762. Inside the box was a crucifix set with pearls and two rosaries - one made of ivory and the other of expensive rosewood.

The public was allowed Dr. Jim to view the findings, but only he understood the ciphers.

Dr. Kirkpatrick, due to health and other reasons, decided to wait a while before going on with search. He was sure how that he knew exactly where the silver was hidden. But soon Dr. Jim took seriously ill and then died - never revealing to anyone his treasured secrets.

The two copper plates were taken to California by young widow and she sold the copper box, crucifix and the rosaries to dealer from Dallas. The findings of Dr. Jim were lost to residents of Mills County forever.

People through all the years have dug and hunted around Dry Pond for the treasure. They discovered a large number of mining tunnels running along the terrain there, showing that sometime in the distant past extensive mining had been

Treasure seekers still come - some from far away places - and spend days and months looking for secrets of Dr. Jim.



Twelve weeks seem a long time to wait, but it will go by soon enough because the last quarter of each school year is always the busiest. teachers' preference.
Friday, February 25, was scheduled to be a teacherin-service day and a holiday for the students, but considering the two days we missed school because of bad weather, we must use Friday to make up one of these days. It will not be necessary for us to make up the other day because that day was given to us by the State, who were con-cerned with the gas shortage. 

1. I'm not OK-You're OK 2. I'm not OK - You're not OK 3. I'm OK-You're not OK

4. I'm OK - You're OK

Now all children, being small and helpless, begin life with the position of "You're OK but I'm not OK". Having this perspective, the child spends much of his time asking himself, "How can Iact so these OK people (big people will say I'm OK too? So, the child develops pat-

ceive approval. The second life position, "Im not OK-You're not OK" is typical of the child who failed to receive the approval of OK people. If his needs are not going to be met, why be troubled with trying to gain approval?

The third position, "I'm OK-You're not OK'' is developed by the child who decides he is not going to find approval from an unfrien world and begins to 'stroke' himself. He builds a protective shell from which he lashes out at the world.

The fourth position "I'm OK-You're OK" is the mature position. It envolves mutual trust.

We tend to carry these life positions or attitudes in-to adulthood. I see so many individuals who go through life with a "I'm not OK" position, and are never able to accept themselves.

After reading Harris' book, I came to the realization that the good news of Christ is "You're OK"
