Legend Of
Jackson Crossing

Just south of the Jackson Bridge crossing on the Pecan Bayou is an old Mexican crossing where there is a flat bed of rocks, making the crossing easy for the early Mexican traders and the

Mexican Army that came back and forth through this area before Texas gained its Independence. Many of those Mexican mule-trains were carrying gold and silver from mines west, and were always guarded with a few Mexican soldiers.

On one particular trip, a band of Indians happened to be camped near the crossing, and they attacked the Mexicans as they crossed the river. The Mexicans were carrying 10 loads of gold in buckskin bags and guarded by a detachment of Mexican soldiers. The Mexican army tried to hold the Indians off, while the gold was buried, but most of the Mexicans were killed, however it is said the gold was hurriedly buried in a secret spot and a map made of the location.

Many years later, a descendant of one of the Mexican soldiers that escaped came back to this area and worked on a farm adjoining the place where the fight took place. He worked for the grandfather of Mrs. W. T. Lee - a Mr. Stebbins, on land that then belonged to the Chessar family, but now belongs to W. E. (Bill) and Ann Murray.

The Mexican descendant described the map of the place where the gold was supposedly buried, and it is thought to be on the Murray place on what is now called the "Old Duck Pond". About 1914, different men in the community of Chessar Valley gathered with teams and scrapers and dug the deep depression in the ground looking for the gold after the Mexican described the place so well. This depression is the Duck Pond, but no gold was ever found.

There is an old Indian camp ground on the Murray place not far from the flat bed-rock crossing where the fight took place.

The gold had been hunted from Jackson Crossing to the Prock McCullough Ranch near Goldthwaite. Mexican graves, probably the men killed in the battle, are located on Wasserman land to the left of the road just past the Jackson Crossing to the West.

Council Discusses Traffic, Property Situations At March Meeting

The Goldthwaite City Council met in regular session on March 3, 1977. All members were present. Also present were Manager Allen, Secretary Taylor, James Reese, Ronnie Rush and James Knight. Minutes of the February meeting were read and approved.

Bills for the month of February and Operations Report were reviewed and approved. Manager Allen noted that Delinquent Tax Notices were sent out and are receiving good response. Mayor Harper read Ordinance 227, to formalize action of the Council to increase rate for sewer system use. Alderman Long moved for approval of the Ordinance, at first reading, seconded by Alderman Carter, followed by unanimous vote.

A request has been made for the City to re-open a street connecting Hanna Valley Road and Peach Street. By Council action, engineers will survey the street and establish boundaries.

Assurance from Santa Fe Railroad is that traffic control arms will be erected at 4th Street this spring.

There continues a 45 mph speed limit through the City, established by the Railroad.

Manager Allen shared with the Council that agreement has been reached to remove Goldthwaite from the danger zone of possible flood disaster. A preliminary study, if unaltered, would be costly to the city.

Mayor Harper reported that he and Manager Allen had canvassed the city in terms of properties which may be hazardous to life and/or other property. After discussion, Alderman Long moved, seconded by Alderman Bridges, that the Mayor send property owners a letter on behalf of the Council asking them to renovate the property or clear the

grounds. Motion carried with unanimous vote.

After discussion of traffic control signals in the city, there was consensus to ask John Arthur, of the Highway Dept., to attend the next Council meeting.

Alderman Graves commended the City for completing the sidewalk near the locker plant.

City Manager reported:

1. The Water District elec-

tion can be called for August.

2. City Equalization Board should be appointed.

3. Public Hearing set for April 25th for Revenue Sharing budget.

4. The recent industrial inquiry did not materialize.

5. There are 3 candidates for Council positions for the April 2nd election.

The council meeting was adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

FB Conference

The Mills County Farm Bureau will send 1 representative to the Texas Farm Bureau's National Affairs Conference in Washington, D.C. and Williamsburg, Va. March 21-25.

James A. Wells, President of Mills County Farm Bureau, will attend the conference representing Mills County.

The local county organization qualified to send this representative by complying with requirements of the state organization concerning its 1977 program of work and membership acquisition program.

The Texans will fly in two groups from Dallas - Ft. Worth airport on Mar. 21, and will return from the Nation's Capitol on March 25.

Purpose of the conference is to give county FB leaders an insight into the workings of our national government, familiarize them with crucial national issues, and strengthen relationships with members of the Texas delegation in Congress.

One of the highlights of the trip will be a visit to the U.S. Department of Agriculture complex and hopefully a meeting with Secretary of Agriculture, Bob Bergland.

In Relays

The Goldthwaite Eaglette track team secured 41 points to take fourth place out of 35 schools in the Santa Anna Relays last Friday.

Mina Kay Johnson set a meet record in the 80-yd. low hurdles in the time of 11.6. Tamra Long placed sixth in the Long Jump with a jump of 15' 3 1/2". Ruth Ann Johnson jumped 4'10" to win the High Jump. Ruth also placed fourth in the open quarter in a 67.0 and fourth in the hurdles.

The team of Lydia Muse, Cynthia Berry, Gwyn Saylor and Ruth Ann Johnson placed third in the Mile Relay in 4:35.5. Coach Yarbrough hopes to do better in the Bangs Relays when Deanna Henry, Marcia Henry, Tina Studer and Dedra Long are able to participate. Federal Laws Topic
For TS&GR Meet

In our increasingly complex society, agricultural producers are learning that the greatest problems they face are not always those posed by nature, but by people - while natural laws have remained constant and basic, laws created by man change frequently and become more and more capricious.

Much of the discussion during the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Tri-annual Meeting in Austin concerned itself with this problem. Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe offered an excellent example in his address at the meeting. "Having gotten into the eagle situation a bit," he remarked, "I am familiar not only with the difficulty of raising a kid and lamb crop, but also the difficulty of dealing with the Federal bureaucracy in trying to do so."

Briscoe, of course, was referring to federal laws limiting control of predatory eagles, but the problem is not confined to the feathered feasters.

Federal involvement in land use control is one area that concerns agricultural producers, and Tax and Labor Committee chairman Joe Mertz outlined new developments in this area. Mertz said that Congressman Morris Udall, chairman of the House Interior Committee, has increased the size of the committee and restructured the sub-committees. "All the new members," said Mertz, "are environmentalists or conservationists. We will have no chance of defeating these bills in committee any more." With the Federal penchant for overkill, sheep and goat raisers, not to mention other producers, may someday face very detailed Federal control of their activities on their own land, all in the name of protecting agricultural land from urban sprawl. Federal estate tax provisions are greatly to blame for the loss of productive land in the first place.

One Federal law, however, received offhand and relative approval by Mertz. While agriculture as a whole has fought inclusion under the National Labor Relations Act, Mertz pointed out that a recent California State Law gives union organizers free access to private lands for the purpose of unionizing workers.

"We feel," he added, "that the National Labor Relations Act would have been of more benefit to them than what they are facing on a state level," referring to West Coast producers. Mertz said he feared the spread of such laws to other states.

Health and Product Development Committee Chairman Martin Mardlaw alluded to yet another governmental problem. New blue tongue and sore mouth drugs may never materialize, he explained. "Because it would cost about \$10 million to clear a new drug product." The clearance problem is based on the Federal opinion that no product is safe until proven so. Theory tells us that it is impossible to prove a negative assumption, though this must be done before a drug is approved for marketing.

COLLEGE STATION-Three separate fashion trends for spring indicate that trimmings will be garment highlights.

county school trustee election.

4. In Priddy School District at Priddy School House and the election officials appointed to hold the election for said district's trustee election (both absentee voting and regular polling place) shall hold said county school trustee election.

5. In Star School District at Star School House and the election officials appointed to hold the election for said district's trustee election (both absentee voting and regular polling place) shall hold said county school trustee election.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

The returns of the election shall be made to the County Clerk within 5 days after said election and delivered by the County Clerk to the Commissioners Court to be canvassed by the Commissioners Court.

A copy of this order shall serve as notice of said election and said notice shall be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation published in this county and said publication shall not be more than 25 days nor less than 10 days before the date of the election or said notice shall be posted in each precinct in which this election is to be held at least 20 days before said election.

From The County Agent

Screwworm eradication efforts stayed on course as February closed with no positive screwworm samples collected anywhere in the U.S. so far this year. Only two other years, 1968 and 1970, in the 15-year history of the Screwworm Eradication Program have gone through both January and February with no screwworms identified in the laboratory.

Dr. M. E. (Cotton) Meadows, Jr., director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program, worries about an apparent lack of sampling by livestock producers. Only nine screwworm samples were mailed to the lab in January, and ten in February. "There are other worms that look much like screwworms and we should be getting more of them," says Meadows. He urges producers to submit samples of "anything that might possibly be screwworms." The 1,500 Texas livestock producers who attended the "Governor's Conference on Screwworms" in Austin on Feb. 24 were told this is the year screwworms can

finally be eradicated from Texas. Slogan for the campaign is "Mission '77 - Stamp Out Screwworms."

Governor Dolph Briscoe said: "This is our most crucial year. We either get the job done this spring, summer and fall, or we lose the program."

Dr. Frank Mulhern, administrator of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, which administers the program, said: "The Lord has provided us a cold winter that has reduced infestations thus far in 1977 to zero, and the governments of Texas and the U.S. have provided us the money. It is now up to the individual cattlemen in every county to keep check on maggots in open sores and fight as best he can against the screwworm fly. Then the sterile fly program can cover the infestations with flies."

Mulhern said the sterile flies must outnumber native flies by a ratio of at least ten to one as they are released for the program to be effective.


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
