





concept, which was de-veloped a few years ago and designed to let the legislature and the public have some estimate of the cost of legislation before we vote I feel that the program promotes fiscal responsibility, something that is

ernment. A similar program contained in House Bill 796 and is designed to re duce the size of state government. The legislation requires the attachment of a Man-power Impact Note to all legislation. The law allows the Legislature to estimate how many additional em-

needed at all levels of gov-

ployees will be needed to administer any new laws which we pass. The purpose is to try and stop the rapid growth of bureaucracy. If a Senator or Representative saw that a bill added 100 more employees to state payrolls,

they might be more reluctant to pass the legislation. As a freshman, I am already aware of a number of state agencies which have grown top heavy with employees hired to administer some function of gov-ernment. I feel that one striking example can be found in the Food Stamp Program, which is administered by the Texas Depart-

nent of Welfare. The Food Stamp Program spent over \$28 million dolars to determine who was eligible to receive the benefits of the program and employed 3,249 persons in the program to distribute a little over \$24 million a month in benefits.

The total administrative cost of the program was over \$36.7 million dollars last year. This means that for every eight dollars in benefits the State spent, a dollar in administrative cost

The State employed one person for every 302 welfare recipients and this figure does not include the contract work used by the Welfare Department.

# NEWS...From The County Agent

By DANNY LONG

The Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) as amended, enforced by the Environmental Protection Agency, includes among other requirements (1) the classification of all uses of pesticides as either restricted use or general use and (2) certification of applicators (private and commerical) as a requisite to the legal use or supervision of use of restricteduse pesticides.

The Texas Pesticide Control Act, although not requiring certification of private applicators, authorizes the Commissioner of Agriculture to establish a program to certify private applicators, on a voluntary basis, who wish to use or supervise the use of restricteduse pesticides in compliance with federal law.

The term "private applicators" means a certified applicator who uses or supervises the use of any pesticide which is classified for restricted use for purposes of producing any agricultural commodity on property owned or rented by him or his employer or, if applied without compensation other than trading of personal services between producers of agricultural commodities, on the property of another per-

The program established by the Texas Department of Agriculture provides three options for certification of private applicators to include:


1) Completion of an approved training program conducted by a qualified institution or training group,

2) Submission of a completed questionnaire to the Texas Department of Agriculture following review of self - study material, and

3)For emergency situations a single - product, single - purchase, single use certification available through the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Private applicator certification training programs will be scheduled as a means by which Mills County producers may qualify for certification as private applicators. Dates, locations, and times of the training program sessions will be announced in the near future.

An alternative to participation in a training program, self study materials are available at the county Extension office. To complete the self study option the person seeking certification must submit a completed questionnaire to the Texas
