He was instructed by Sam Houston, then Governor of Texas, to go to Fort Cobb, then headquarters for the Indian Territory, enlist Plasedo, chief of the Tonkawas, to pick forty-five warriors from that reservation and join ther regiment with them when we reached the Indian Territory, which he did. Col. Johnson was at the same time in command of the regiment.

How many times have we passed San Saba Peak and, perhaps, glanced its way without a single thought of the important part it played in history throughout the

By Mrs. Hollis Blackwell

The Peak is oblong in shape, flat on top with a rim-rock edge encircling most of it. It has been a part of Mills County since the year of 1887, but was a part of San Saba County for many years prior to that time.

Over 7 million years ago shallow seas, covering most of Texas, began to recede and finally withdrew to their present position. They left behind a shrunken and shriveled land with hills, cretacious rock formations and reefs-San Saba Peak was one of them.

"The Feak", as so many call it today, is 7 million years old according to The Texas Handbook and the Texas Almanac, Elevation is 1650 feet, and it lies less than ten miles from the edge of the Edwards Plateau and just inside the Cross Timbers Section of Texas.

It lay in the plains Indian country and the Comanche and Apache fought among themselves for possession of its advantageous height as a lookout point until the 1850's.

But long before the day of the Comanche and Apache, earlier tribes of Indians roamed this area and San Saba Peak was used by them as a landmark; they used its cave as a place of shelter and its height as a lookout. Archeologists believe tribes were present here as many as 5 to 8 thousand years ago, from examination of artifacts

found in this vicinity. There is strong evidence that early Indian tribes chose to live by springs that flow abundantly on land belonging to Allan Horton close to the base of San Saba Peak. Large Indian bread trays are worn in stones there and buffalo bones, authenticated by the University of Texas, were found near the Indian

The San Saba Peak was just off the trail used by the earliest Spanish explorer to this region, Pedro Vial, when he traveled in 1786 and again in 1789, from San Antonio to Santa Fe. No doubt he used the Peak as a landmark to

find his way. When the San Saba Presidio and San Saba de la Santa Cruz Missions were established in 1857, on the San Saba River, to serve the Lipan-Apache Indians, San Saba Peak was undoubtedly used as a landmark for the commanders of military troops and occupants of the churches in passing back and forth to protect and supply the Missions.

The Spaniards named the San Saba River many years ago, and in all probability, they also named the peak 'San Saba'' because of its importance in finding the river. Once the Peak came into view the early travelers knew the river could not be far away; when they reached the river, they turned west along its banks until they found the Missions. After Texas gained its

Independence a number of military forts were established along the western frontier and one of them was called Fort Phantom Hill, located near Abilene. The military fort had to be supplied, so a trail or road was built from San Antonio to Fort Phamtom Hill-this called "The Wire Road" Again, San Saba Peak







## Feeding Boosts Fish Production

If your farm pond is not producing fish up to its potential, maybe it's because of an inadequate feeding program. "A proper feeding program

will increase fish production tenfold," says Don Steinbach, fisheries specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Commercial fish feeds will produce more catfish per unit cost than any form of grain. In addition, feeding helps congregate fish for good fishing."

Sunfish and catfish benefit most from commercial feeds but bass do not readily take

artificial feeds. However, they may benefit from increased forage production caused by the

"Feeding should begin when the water temperature reaches about 70 degrees F. and should continue into the fall until the temperature drops below this level," points out Steinbach. Both floating and sinking

Both floating and sinking food pellets are available, with the floating type being more

expensive. However, with the floating feed, the fish can be observed while feeding and the correct amount can be determined by how much the fish will eat in a 15-minute period. A feeding area constructed with redwood boards will protect floating feed from wind.

Steinbach advises feeding fish once a day, preferably in the late afternoon. The amount of feed should be based on what they will eat in about 15 minutes but should never be more than 15 pounds per surface acre per day.

surface acre per day.
"With sinking feed, estimate
the weight of the fish and feed 3
percent of this estimate daily,"
suggests the Extension specialist.

Since fish do not eat as much or as often during the winter months, periodic feedings once or twice a month based on one-half percent of body weight will suffice. An automatic feeder would be best for pond owners who are unable to feed on a daily basis during the

summer. Such a feeder dispenses a measured amount of feed once or twice a day.

"With a proper feeding program, commercial fertilizer should not be applied," emphasizes Steinbach. "Healthy, growing fish produce enough waste products to serve the same purpose as an inorganic fertilizer."


