There are a few issues in government which provoke more interest than taxation. As a member of the committee on Ways and Means, which determines the state's tax policy, a large portion of the questionaire which my office mailed out during the past legislative session was dedicated to the issue of evenues. Basically, the voters of the

Forty-Third Legislative Districk agreed with the fiscally conservative approach which I advocated during the past session Evidence of the trend

towards regulated spending can be found in the response to the proposition that an election should be required before any long-term debt can be assumed by a govern-mental unit. 965 voters favored such a policy as opposed to 186 who did not. Of the polled households which responded, 780 agreed

with Gov. Briscoe's "no new-taxes" approach to government while 289 disagreed. One of the main issues of

concern, which showed up on the questionaire, was tax reform. 782 respondents wanted to enact a statewide program to insure equality in property valuation as opposed to 369 who did not favor such a proposal.

When asked if they would favor financing public education by some means other than by the property tax, 929 voters answered affirmatively as compared to 225 who preferred the current system

A large number of the individuals answering the questionaire wanted to plan ahead on tax matters. 917 persons felt the need to set aside a portion of our current tax revenues in a reserve account, should our oil and gas revenues dwindle in the future. 218 voters opposed

uch a proposal. Finally, for future planing, the voters of the Forty-Third Legislative Distict favor annual sessions of the Legislature, if one seson is dedicated to approriations and revenues.
