

Hunters Invade Mills County This Week

The annual migration of deer hunters to Mills County begins this week, as deer season officially opens here on Saturday, November 12th. The season continues through sundown on January 1, 1978.

The hunters coming to the county are hoping for a better reception from the weatherman than they received last year when a combination rain-sleet-snow storm hit the area with frigid temperatures and scattered both animals and humans alike . . . the humans either staying home or bundled under covers in their camps.

And as if the opening day last year wasn't enough, the season never did fully materialize and kills never reached the proportions which had been anticipated prior to the season's start.

The Parks and Wildlife Department's outlook for deer in the Hill Country is for "fairly lean deer" although "antler development is good this year." Antler growth was spurred by the wet spring which immediately preceded the summer drought.

A fresh "norther" arrived in Mills County Tuesday night and seemed to aggravate that already "itchy finger" condition.

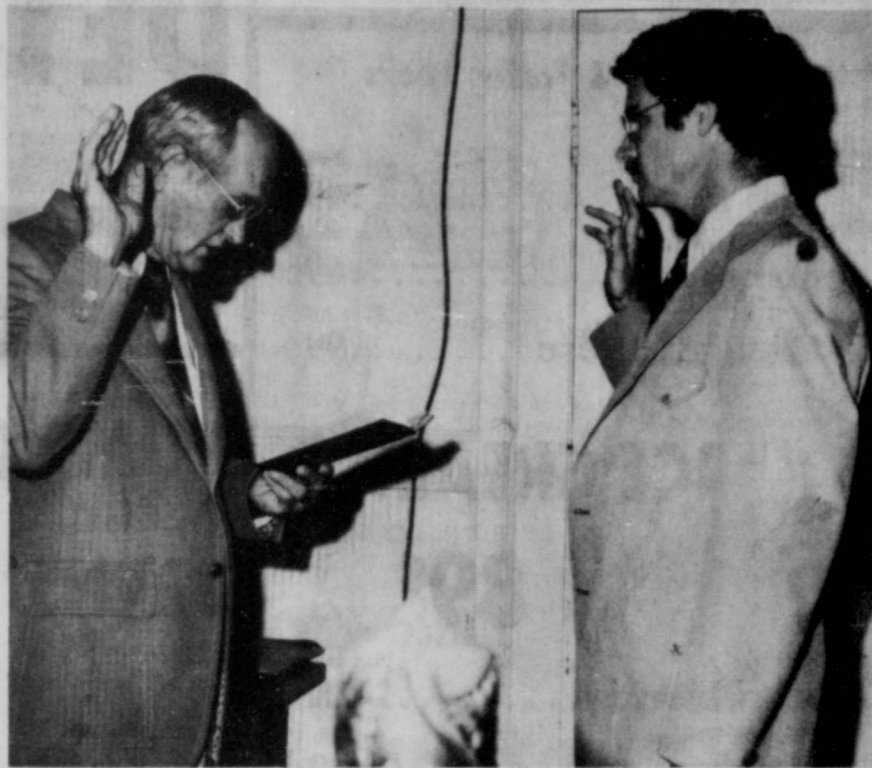
Basketball Year Begins Tuesday

City Council Holds Regular Meeting

The regular City Council meeting for November was convened in City Hall on November 3, 1977, at 7 p.m. All Councilmen were present. To the surprise of all, Councilman Bridges was early. Minutes of the October meetings were read and approved.

City Manager Dale Allen shared the October Operations Report and presented October bills. After review, the Council approved the bills for payment and accepted the Operations Report, in the total amount of \$2,178.41, including a payroll of \$10,794.20.

Mrs. Annell Vick from General Telephone visited with the Council regarding the recent re-evaluation of property by the Tax Equalization Board. Although the total tax dollar for City and Water District amounted to a reduction in cost, Mrs. Vick was concerned about the upward evaluation of property. She thanked the Council for listening to her concerns and City Councilmen expressed thanks for interest on the part of property owners in City business.

It was considered urgent by the City Council that the Santa Fe Railroad be notified that the crossing arms are not functioning properly. Citizens should be cautioned to exercise care at the crossing.

The Council discussed the new Texas Employment Insurance regulations and costs. Options for payment were: 1% of payroll on an annual basis, or reimbursement of claim costs. After consideration, the Council acted to pay the 1% of payroll.

City Manager Allen shared

that the costs for employee health insurance are increasing to \$32.56 per month. Employees have been contacted as to their personal wishes about the plan and have expressed desire to maintain the insurance program. The Council acted to accept the increased cost of the plan in favor of City employees.

Councilman Graves moved the City Budget be revised to reflect purchase of a Chevrolet pickup from the general fund. Bids were reviewed at a recent meeting of the Council. Motion carried with unanimous vote.

Among reports from City Manager Allen were:

- The lights are set to come on 3 seconds before the arms begin to lower at the Railroad crossing.
- The Mayor's Special Group needs more money to fight LCRA rate increase. The Council acted to forward \$248.49 to continue participation with the group.
- Reimbursement of stop signs was approved from the Council of Governments in the amount of \$1560.
- Goldthwaite is #70 on the list for sewer plant construction projects. It is rumored that the top 100 on the list will be funded this congressional year.
- 24% of the billed taxes have been collected.
- County Commissioners voted to pay all expenses of the white firetruck, 1/2 of the cost of fire phones (about \$70 per month), and 1/2 of the fireman insurance, plus gas for the old red truck on County fires. The Councilmen expressed thanks for this consideration to the County Commissioners.
- Miscellaneous work tickets were processed, 65 loads of trash hauled out of the City to the dump, street work and water leaks, etc.

The Council voted to light the holiday season street decorations.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:10 p.m.

Only 126 voters turned out for the balloting. This is about 2 percent of the voters.

Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Harris visited Mrs. Laverne Doss at Brookesmith Sunday.

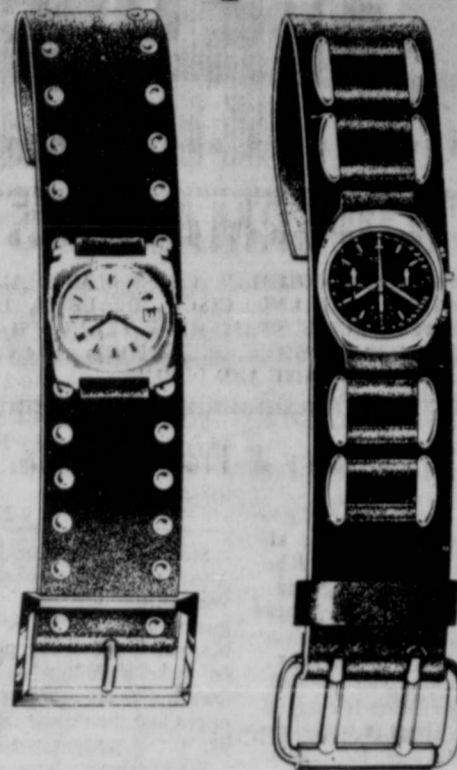

Immunizations that give protection for measles, polio, lockjaw, whooping cough, diphtheria and German measles will be given free at the Senior Citizens Center, Hwy. 84 and Old Priddy Rd., in Goldthwaite on Monday, November 21, 1977, between 1:30 and 3:00 p.m.

Health authorities say that too many people are neglecting to obtain the essential immunizations for themselves and their children. Paul Turner, Public Health Advisor in the Immunization Division of the Texas Department of Health Resources, said that measles and rubella have rebounded dramatically this year. For example, he said, last year there were only 105 reported cases of measles during the first three months of the year; this year, in that same period of time, there were 896 reported cases. Similarly, there were 316 cases of rubella this year compared to 81 for the same period last year.

Children who were immunized against measles

before their first birthday have only limited protection unless they receive a booster vaccination.
