

Record Total Paid At Livestock Auction

The 40th annual rendition of the Mills County Livestock Show was not an average run-of-the-mill undertaking.

A record breaking figure of \$24,717.10 was paid to exhibitors at the auction sale Saturday night.

Premium buying was carried out at a fast pace all evening by the Sales Committee of the Mills County Livestock Raisers Association, proving they had done their homework.

The quality and condition of the livestock shown in 1979 was also outstanding, according to most observers. Lamb and cattle judge Gene Young of Brownwood commented that most of the animals had been prepared very well for the show and he ranked this county show with many larger ones.

Special City Council Meet Scheduled Friday, Jan. 20

The City Council of the City of Goldthwaite will meet in Called Session on Friday, January 20, 1978, at 7:00 P.M. in the Council Room at Goldthwaite City Hall to discuss the following:

- Discussion of Water Problems with Rady & Associates, Engineers.

The City water filtering plant is overloaded, according to City Manager Allen, because of increased use of water by Goldthwaite citizens. The filters probably need to be enlarged. Also, the off-channel reservoirs are slowly eroding. These will need to be repaired if the system is to be continued. The Mayor and City Council urge any interested persons to attend the meeting and voice their views on the water system, or just come and listen and evaluate the problems personally. Tentative estimates range as high as \$300,000 to completely overhaul the filters and reservoirs.

Texas S&GR Association Issues Report On Bobcat Export Ban

Conditions have improved a bit since we last reported on the bobcat pelt export ban.

Texas Park & Wildlife Department officials have been working with representatives of the Endangered Species Scientific Authority in an attempt to clear export of bobcat skins from the state, and Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association executive secretary Bill Sims says he's "confident that suitable arrangements can be made."

ESSA is a relatively new federal authority charged with assuring that certain animal species are not endangered by export. The bobcat is one of the animals placed under ESSA's jurisdiction because of an international agreement seeking to protect, among other things, the entire cat family.

The cat family was added to the worry list at the request of certain African nations whose exotic felines were being decimated by poachers.

Without ESSA's approval, pelts of the bobcat, lynx and otter cannot be exported from a given state or shipped across state lines. Approval requires that the states show that export will not harm the species' survival in that state or in general.

It's a case of guilty until proven innocent, and Texas officials are moving double-time to document the innocence of bobcat export from our state.

Sims is encouraging trappers not to panic and either cease taking bobcats or sell skins too rapidly on the currently depressed market. Pelt prices of as much as \$75-\$100 a year ago dropped to \$25-\$30 recently, but some reports indicate that the market has shown some strength of late, possibly rising to the \$50 range.

Much of the blame for the price crash can be laid on fear of the export ban because the vast majority of bobcat pelts are sold overseas, but some observers say that other factors have also been at work. Cat pelts have reportedly stacked up at port during the last year, a situation bound to change as many states are barred from the export market.

Assuming that Texas is allowed export status, and there is no sensible reason why it shouldn't be, Texas trappers may be called upon to fill gaps in the market left by states unable to obtain clearance.

Another important point is that there is so far no trapping season on bobcats in Texas -- they may be taken year-round. In order to approve export, however, ESSA may dictate such a season, and trappers accustomed to year-round catches could find themselves barred from the field at some future time this year. It simply makes sense for them to think ahead now and prepare themselves for such potential federally-mandated curtailment by trapping while the trapping's good.

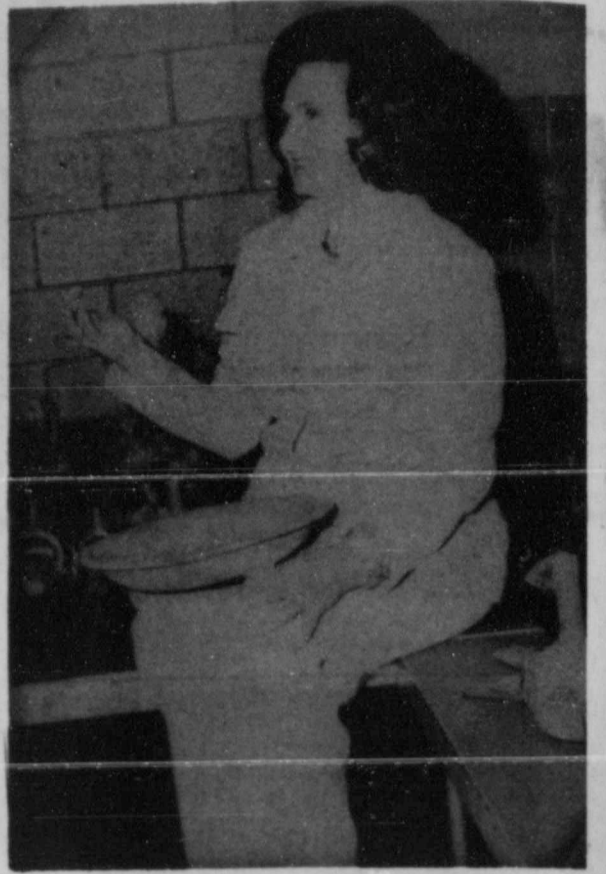

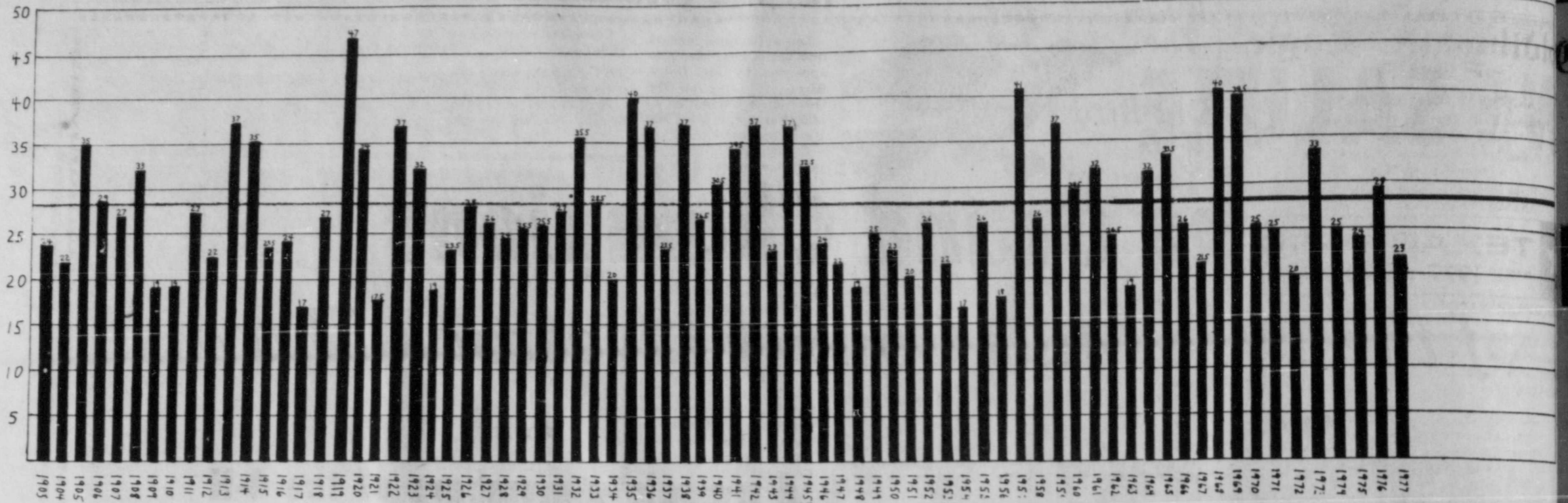

The rainfall chart above shows the inches of rainfall received since 1903 in Mills County. The average rainfall is 28 plus inches; however, this is somewhat misleading because in 46 of the past 74 years the rainfall has been below the "average" with 28 years where rainfall is above the "average". To see how to deal with extended dry spells see the article in this paper entitled "Mills County Suffers From Drought". There are various degrees of fluctuations from year to year, and from decade to decade today just as in our grandfathers' day. This map will show that our forefathers had to deal with drought, insects, hail, fires, prices, etc., just as we do today.

Mills County is experiencing a period of very little rainfall. The intensity of the drought varies from place to place, but most of the county has suffered considerably since May, 1977.

Forage production has been very small this summer and fall resulting in a rather hazardous position for the Mills County Stockman. From a conservation standpoint, grasses that are abused during a drought often take several years to fully recover and in some cases never fully recover.

Several ranchers who have

experienced similar turmoil in the late 1940's and early 1950's, initiated their drought plan in late summer and fall of 1977. Some remember the large feed bills as they mounted in the fifties, and then finally the selling of their livestock for a drought deflated price. Some remember paying the 1950's feed bill in 1972 --- yes 1972!

Many Mills County ranchers started feeding last year in August. Their grass was short, but there was still hope for fall rains. It never came, in most cases only record high temperatures.

Droughts have been with mankind from the beginning

of time and will always be in evidence from now on. There are several management tools that a rancher may use to make a drought less harmful. Nothing will make a drought easy, but some adjustments may make it so you are able to live with it.

Reducing livestock numbers to fit the amount of forage produced is less hazardous than to gamble on the "one more good rain". Selling old and/or non-productive livestock is essential. You cannot afford to have any "free boarders" any time, but especially during a drought - they are costly. Selling all of the replacement

livestock; or selling the least productive kind of livestock whether it be cattle, sheep or goats. One of, if not the best, tool to use is a flexible operation. One such type of operation would be one with a basic herd made up of 50 to 65 percent breeding animals and the remainder of stock type animals, such as yearling cattle, lambs, or mutton goats. With this type operation producers are not reluctant to sell these animals as they would be with a choice breeding herd.

A key item in trying to deal with a drought is to recognize low production as soon as possible and make adjust-

ments early. When the rancher waits until he is short of forage before making adjustments, he most often finds the market unfavorable, animals in poorer condition, feed cost higher and most important, his forage plants damaged.

There is presently a drought feed program in Mills County that has given some ranchers a false sense of security. Whatever the price of feed and regardless of the "help" received, the facts are the same. The cost of feed soon will eat up all the profits if you must start feeding before winter gets here. The second fact being

that if you are out of grass now, you will not have any until late spring or early summer, if it rains then.

During the 1950's, ranchers went one of two directions. One group fed their stock every bite they ate, and did eat literally hundreds of ranchers out of house and home. Their range plants and top soil was badly damaged, the feed bills were high, and bank accounts were destroyed. When it finally rained in the late 1950's, grass could not respond due to severe and prolonged overgrazing. The other group recognized drought early and reduced their herds to match the decrease in grass growth. This income was put into savings. Although they did

not get rich on the interest they weren't spending great sums of money for feed. They also received better prices for their livestock. Since the herd was reduced early, the grass stubble was not destroyed and was able to respond. They did not have a big feed bill and had some money to re-stock. They were bent, but not broke.

Should anyone desire information on developing drought plans and grazing systems, the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service is ready, willing and able to furnish this information. The type of assistance is provided through agreements between the SCS and the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District.

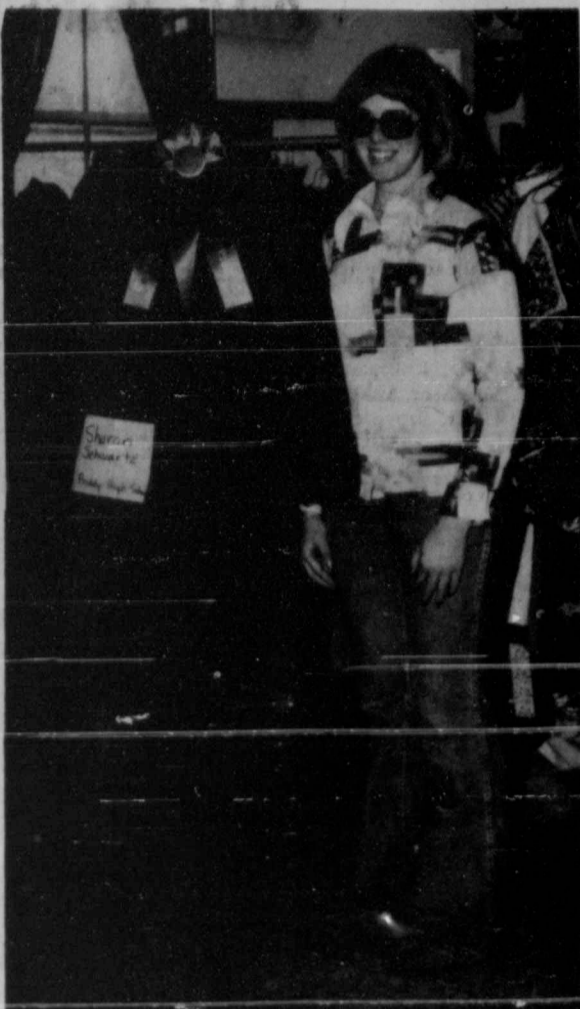

Social Security: A Dangerous Fraud

Belmont, Massachusetts — In the closing days of 1977, Congress passed and the President signed the largest peacetime tax increase in our nation's history. Few called it that, however. Instead, they said it was "the savior of the Social Security System." Never mind that saving Social Security might kill the nation.

Congress Excludes Self

Social Security, federal government style, is a monstrous fraud kept alive only by compulsion. It's a chain letter scheme and a con man's dream. Doubters need only realize that successive Congresses, which have forced millions into the program and then upped the ante repeatedly, have also pointedly excluded themselves from its none-too-tender clutches. That's right! Members of Congress and employees of the federal government are not compelled to pay Social Security taxes for the dubious benefits available. So they don't pay them. And nowhere can anyone find these privileged few demanding to be let in on the scheme.

No Trust Funds

Its promoters like to talk about Social Security's trust funds as if the program were being run like an honest insurance fund. But the truth is that there are not and never have been any trust funds for Social Security. The money taken as "contributions" has been spent as fast as it has been collected. When Social Security promises come due for more and more Americans, the government simply raises more taxes to pay for them. If a private company ran a retirement fund or an insurance program that way, its officials would be jailed for fraud. Why government should be exempted from the same set of rules is never explained.

Not only is there no trust fund, but there isn't even any ironclad guarantee regarding benefits. Congress has the power to pay whatever benefits it chooses, or none at all. The age at which benefits are to be paid can also be raised or lowered. And the government can also pay benefits in dollars that are far less valuable than the ones put into the program. Call that a consequence of inflation, another form of government fraud.

When Social Security began forty years ago, its take per worker never exceeded \$60 a year from both worker and employer. Now, the maximum tab is \$1,930 a year. And by 1987 the combined employee-employer tax will be \$6,092 for those in the highest bracket. All along the economic scale, taxes will be zooming.

Same Goal as Marx

When Social Security is stripped of all its cosmetic camouflage, it is clearly a scheme designed to gain political power and to redistribute wealth. Karl Marx had the same goals in mind, and his program wasn't so cleverly disguised. If, instead of Social Security, America's working millions had been able to put their dollars to work in industry via private investment programs, their return and the boost to the nation would be immense. The growing stagnation in America's industry has been caused by the stifling drag of too much government. Tripling Social Security taxes is like trying to cure the stagnation with suffocation.

The Social Security System should be scrapped. But it has to be done in such a way as not to abandon those who are already dependent on it. Those on a pension, or about to obtain one, must be guaranteed the promised benefits. But most who have paid into the system should have their funds returned. The consequences of continuing the Social Security fraud include economic ruin for most Americans, and for the nation itself.

Stockmen can reduce hay feeding losses this winter by giving more attention to how they feed hay to their cattle.

Losses vary by feeding method, time intervals between feedings, and amounts fed. Research studies have shown losses ranging from 2% with conservative feeding methods to more than 60% when no attempts were made to reduce waste.

Here are some suggestions to reduce losses when feeding one of three types of hay packages:

Large round bales or stacks -- Excessive waste will result if cattle are given unrestricted access to hay. This can be reduced by placing some kind of barrier such as an electric wire, gates, panels, feeding wagons, or feeding racks -- between the hay and the cattle.

Small round bales -- These usually are fed in the field where they were dropped by the baler. To reduce waste, use a temporary electric fence to restrict cattle to a 2 or 3 week supply. Make the cattle clean up the hay before moving the fence to a new area.

Conventional hay bales -- Waste usually isn't much of a problem when these small rectangular bales are fed in a bunk, manger, rack or wagon in the barn lot. But if you move the bales out to the field for feeding, as many cattlemen do to avoid hauling manure, you can prevent waste by giving cattle only a one-day supply at a time.

When feeding hay outside, use a well-drained site. If hay or pasture sod is damaged in

the feeding area, re-seed in late winter. Force cattle such as mature, dry pregnant cows with lower nutritional requirements, to clean up hay that might otherwise be wasted.

EMERGENCY WATER PROGRAM

The Mills County ASCS Committee who is J. D. Berry, Lee Roy Schwartz and Howard Ethridge extended the sign-up through January 31 for applications for tank enlargements, drilling wells, building water storages and water pipelines for livestock water.

To qualify under this emergency water program a farm must have a water facility that failed due to dry weather.

This is not our regular ACP program but is limited to people who are out of livestock water.

WOOL PROGRAM

To obtain incentive payment on wool, applications must be signed by January 31. With the high price of mohair, there will be no incentive payment. Producers who purchase unshorn lambs and then shear or resell them must report the transaction, provided a claim

is filed on the purchased lamb.

EMERGENCY FEED PROGRAM

January 31 is the last date to sign up for the emergency feed program. If a producer has signed up but

has not brought in the tickets of feed purchased, please bring them in as soon as possible. Tickets must be signed by both the seller and buyer before any payment can be made.

In Mills County we have about 450 producers signed up. Some are eligible and some will be ineligible. For

the producer who had almost a normal crop of oats, hay or milo, it will be difficult for his farm to qualify for any payment.

We at the county office realize people want to know the results of their application. During January we will make all possible effort to process your application.

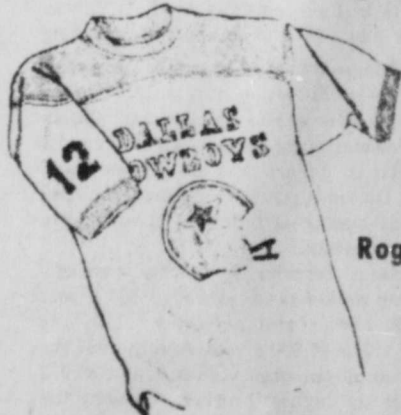
