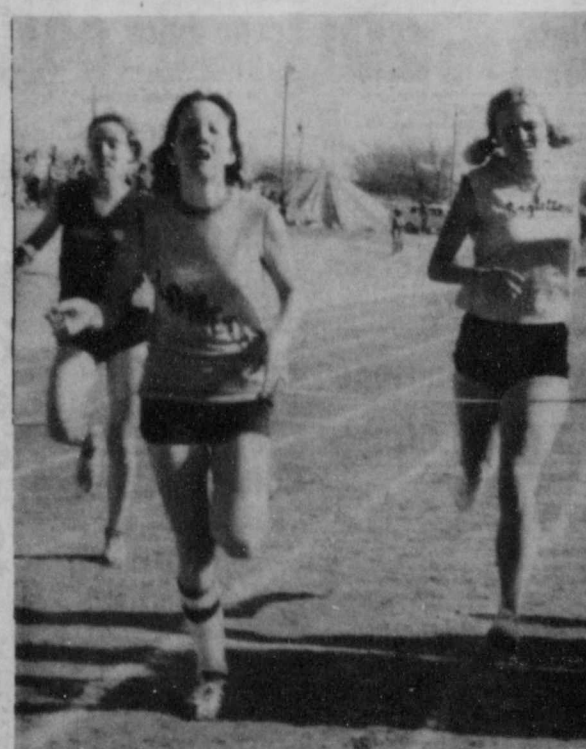

City, School Elections In Mills County Sat.

Water District Election Set

Mills County voters will go to the polls on Saturday to elect representatives to city and school positions.

In the municipal election, Goldthwaite will see four persons on the ballot seeking three positions.

Allen Moreland, Charles Conradt, Gordon Williamson

and Tom Cody Graves will be on the city ballot here. Only Graves is an incumbent, as Aldermen Loy Long and Felton Wright chose not to seek election.

The balloting will take place at the City Hall, with the polls open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Peanut Program Details Listed By ASCS Office

Program provides poundage quotas, acreage allotments, and two-tier price support system. When growers approve quotas, price support is mandatory.

1978 Poundage Quota is 1,680,000 short tons (3,360,000 pounds).

1978 Acreage Allotment is 1,614,000. Each is minimum required by law.

Price Support: Every farm with a peanut allotment will be assigned a poundage quota. Loans will be available on peanuts produced within the poundage quota (quota peanuts) at the domestic edible support rate, which shall not be less than \$420 per ton. Loans on additional peanuts produced within the allotment will be at a lower rate of \$250 per ton.

Penalty Rate: Peanut producers who plant in excess of their acreage allotments will be subject to a penalty on their excess production. The penalty rate is 120 percent of the support price for quota peanuts.

The Food and Agriculture Act of 1977 provides that the minimum national poundage quota will be lowered each year for the 1979-81 crops. These minimums are: (1979) 1,596,000; (1980) 1,516,000; (1981) 1,440,000. The Secretary may increase the quota if he determines it insufficient to meet expected requirements.

Lease and Transfer of Acreage Allotments is permitted within the county. Allotments may be transferred to farms that do not currently have a peanut allotment. June 14, 1978 is last date producer can lease acres and poundage quota from other producers within the county. After June 14 and up to November 30 quota can be leased.

No Retroactive Payments Services For Willard Davis Held In San Saba, March 29

What some people called
 "back pay" may no longer
 be paid by Social Security,
 according to Don Austin,
 Brownwood district man-
 ager. This is due to one of many
 changes in the law enacted
 by congress last month.

People who retire between
 age 62 and 65 get a perma-
 nently reduced amount each
 month. For years, applica-
 tions could be retroactive for
 12 months -- the retiree had
 an option and, says Austin,
 most people took it. For ex-
 ample, a man retiring at age
 64 could start his checks at
 age 64 at \$300 per month, or,
 if earnings were low enough,
 at age 63 at \$280 per month
 and get 12 months "back pay"
 -- retroactive pay-
 ments. No More! Effective
 now virtually no application
 can be retroactive if a
 reduced payment is involved.
 Payments will be effective
 the month an application is
 filed.

Austin added that problems
 have developed. His staff
 properly told some people
 in 1977 they could wait
 until 1978 to file, after
 figuring the exact amount of
 1977 earnings. This way the
 retiree could best decide how
 far back to make his applica-
 tion retroactive. Now, that
 same person is told the
 application can't be retroactive
 because congress has

changed the law in Decem-
 ber to apply in January,
 1978. Monthly payments will
 be higher but that "back
 pay" is a thing of the past to
 many people.

In cases where monthly
 payments are not reduced,
 such as payments to children
 and disabled workers, an
 application can still be retro-
 active up to 12 months.

 a.m. until 12:00 o'clock.

Accidents Report Made

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six rural traffic accidents in Mills County during February of this year, according to Sergeant Reinhart, supervisor for this Highway Patrol Sergeant Area.

These accidents resulted in no deaths and no injuries. The total rural traffic accidents for Mills County for this year is 13, which have resulted in no deaths and only one injury.

The twenty-four counties which comprise Highway Patrol District 6 B have had a total of 967 rural traffic accidents this year which have resulted in 27 deaths and 482 injuries. This compares to 842 accidents, 18 deaths and 346 injuries reported during this same period last year.

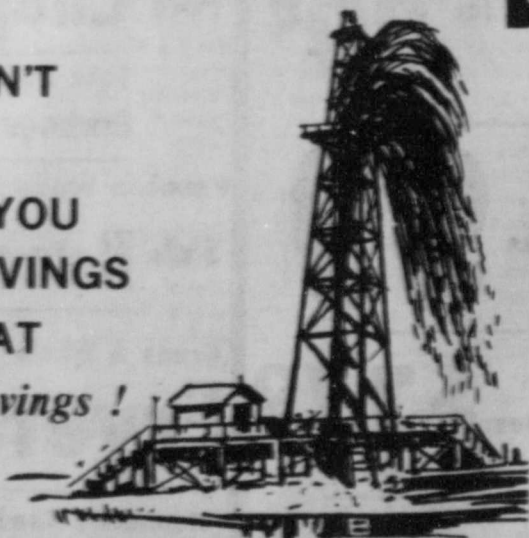

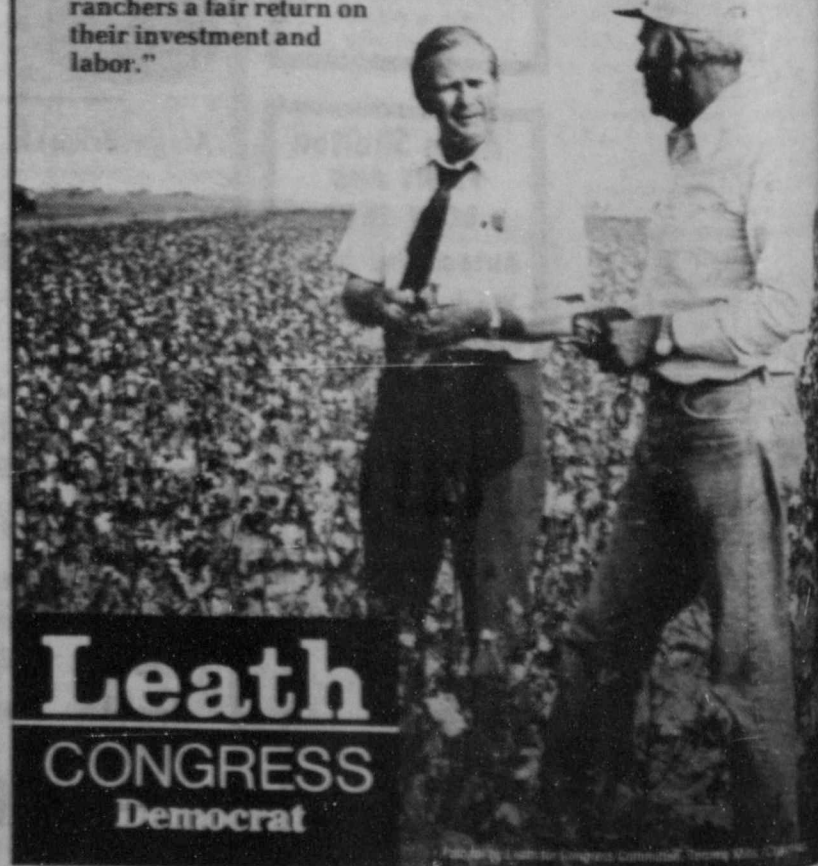

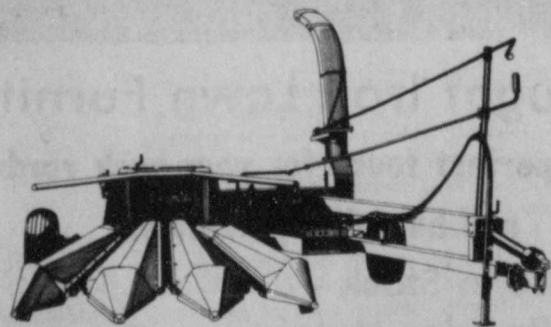

Racing on Ballot

Both Democrats and Republicans will vote May 6 on whether pari-mutuel on-track race horse gambling should be legalized in Texas on a local option (county) basis.

Party executive committees last week certified the non-binding referendum for the May primary ballot along with the list of statewide and multi-county candidates.

Actually, Republicans earlier had agreed to the straw vote. Democrats waited until horse race advocates submitted petitions signed by 96,000 asking for a referendum.

In a surprise move, which irked consumer loan representatives, Democrats also submitted for a vote the question of whether the 1979 legislature should authorize higher interest rates on loans under \$5,000.

Sen. Bill Patman of Ganado guided the latter through the committee. Consumer loan advocates have been pushing for an increase in rates. Since voters are almost certain to vote "no," the referendum (although not binding on the legislature) is seen as a major obstacle to an increase.

Highway officials warned that long lines await those who have not obtained new auto registration validation stickers. April 1 is the deadline.

Judges T.C. Chadick and Franklin Spears were winners in the State Bar's lawyer poll in two State Supreme Court races. Judge Jim Vollers and Marvin O. Teague were winners in the poll for Court of Criminal Appeals races.
