

Absentee Voting Deadline May 6 For Primary Election

Only a few days remain for Mills County voters to vote absentee for the May 6 Democratic Primary election. The deadline for submission of absentee votes is May 6 according to County Clerk Walter A. Bryant, who has the absentee voting box in his office at the courthouse in Goldthwaite.

Absentee voting is open to those who cannot be on hand for the election on May 6th. In addition to voting in the statewide races for various offices and the five-man race for U. S. Congress in the 11th District, Democratic voters in Mills County will also be casting ballots in multi-candidate races for county judge, county clerk, county treasurer, Justice of the Peace in Precinct 1. Mills County has no Republican Primary election.

If a runoff will be needed following the May 6th balloting, it will be held the first Saturday in June.

The Eagle expects to publish a sample ballot in the issue if May 4th, and also

refresh voters memories on the exact boundaries of precinct lines in the County. This will be the first county-wide election held since the county redistricted two years ago.

City Receives \$380,000 Sewer Grant

\$130,000 To Come From Sale of Bonds

A five-year waiting period is over for the City of Goldthwaite.

The sewer grant, applied for in 1973, has been funded to the tune of \$380,000.00 by the federal government.

The money will be used to

construct a new sewer treatment plant, extend lines, and repair and improve the entire sewer system that underlines the city.

Final engineering will now be undertaken prior to the actual construction phase of

the project. Rady and Associates of Fort Worth are the consulting engineers for the project.

The citizens of Goldthwaite voted to issue \$130,000 in bonds, also in 1973, to cover the city's 25% share of the cost of the construction. These bonds will have to be sold in the near future and applied to the entire cost of the sewer expansion.

WATER WELLS discussion garnered much of the time for a special City Council meeting on Monday afternoon.

The two city wells located on the north outskirts of town have been revamped and are ready for use again. As soon as pumps and motors can be installed, the water from these two wells, about 200 gallons per minute, 288,000 per day, will be put into the general system of the city. This amount will run the city about five months of the year, without having to tax the river system so heavily.

The two wells were put out of condition by what was thought to be a drop in the water levels, and general mechanical deterioration. The "rest" given the wells in the past two years may have some bearing on their response.

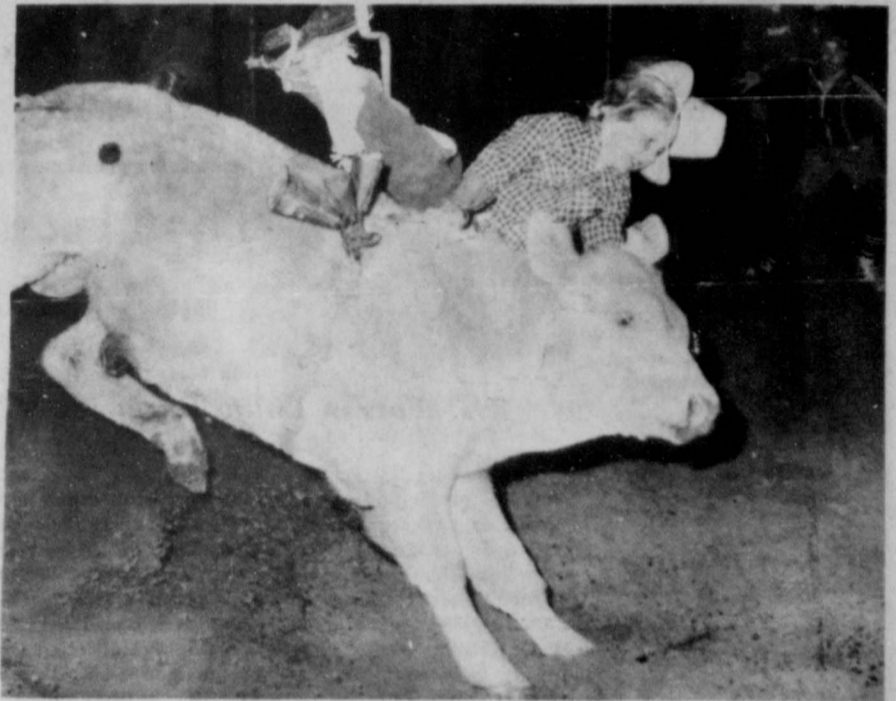
A REVENUE SHARING budget hearing was held at the special meeting. The council heard from Ruth Dumas and Louise Long, who were appearing in behalf of the Mills County Senior Citizens Center. The two ladies were asking that some of the city's revenue sharing money be used to help in the operation of the center here. Since this was just a budget hearing, final action on the request will come at the regular May meeting of the council. No other official requests for funds under this category were heard.

In other business, the

council unanimously voted approval of Mayor J. D. Harper's selection of a Board of Equalization for the coming year. He cited W. P. Duren, Carl Letbetter and Loy Long as members of the board that reviews taxes each year.

The City will have almost \$23,000 in revenue sharing funds to be allocated during the next year. In the past, most of the money has gone into the area of street improvement.

The cost of putting the two wells back into commission will be about \$15,000, according to City Manager Dale Allen.

In the District 10-A meet at Brownwood last Thursday, Goldthwaite emerged 4th place with 60 1/2 points, placing behind Dublin with 92, Early with 114 1/2, and Bangs with 144.

Eagle high jumpers Kenny and Lester Saathoff took 6th place after clearing 5' 8". A three-way tie between the Saathoffs and an Early high jumper gave us 2/3 of the sixth place point.

The Eagles took most of their points in the two relays that qualified to go on to regional this Friday. The 440 yard relay team did an outstanding job running a season's best of 44.6 to place second. The relay team consists of Mike Connally, Tommy Collier, Mike Lee and Jett Johnson. The same tracksters make up the mile relay team, which also placed second. This race was only one example that hard work and devotion payed off as another season's best, 3:35.0 turned up. Individual quarter times were: Connally 54.56, Lee 53.44, Johnson 53.6, Collier 53.4.

Another regional qualifier was Jett Johnson in the 440 yard dash. He took second with a blazing 52.8.

The Eagles did exceptionally well in the 120 yard high

hurdles by having three men take awards. Lester Saathoff took third, running a 16.7, followed by teammate Stephen Schwartz, who ran 17.0 to place fourth. Kenny Saathoff took sixth place honors with his time of 17.45. Sprinter Tommy Collier brought in more team points by running a 23.9 to receive 6th in the 220 yard dash. Distance men Stephen Coronado, Robert Berry and Mark Lewis represented Goldthwaite well in the 880 and the mile run. Coronado took fourth place honors, with a 5:01.6. Berry in fifth place only one second behind Coronado. Half miler Mark Lewis placed fifth with a 2:12.6.

Distance runners Kenneth Martin took fifth in the 880 and Curtis Holland took 6th in the mile run.

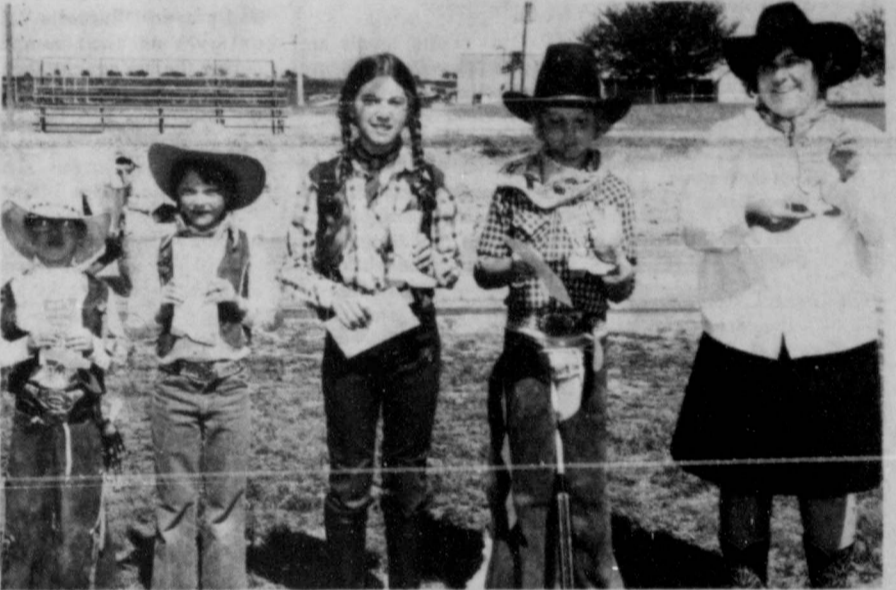

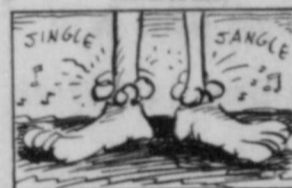

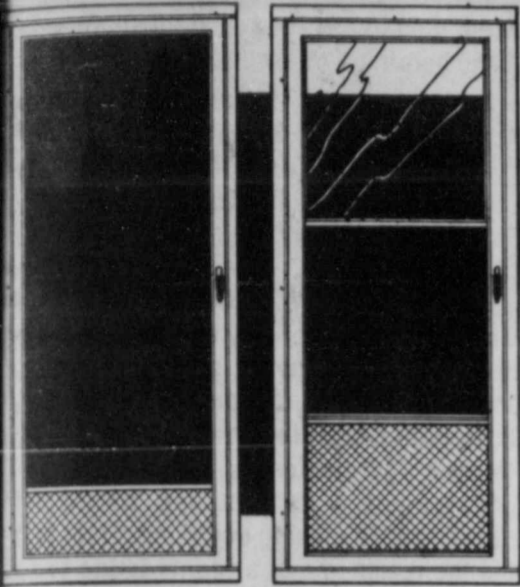

The Historical Commission of Mills County will have a covered dish luncheon at the Senior Citizen Center May 1, at 12:00 noon. Precinct members are urged to attend.

The bill accomplishes three things: (1) It reverses the present formula, allowing beef imports to decrease when domestic production is high. The present formula causes domestic markets to be swamped with foreign meat at a time when domestic production increases. (2) The legislation includes all processed meats in the quota system. At present, the law includes only boned, chilled meat. (3) Presidential authority to suspend quotas would be reduced unless a national emergency is at hand as defined by the National Emergency Act.

There has been no time table set as to when the measure will reach the Senate floor.

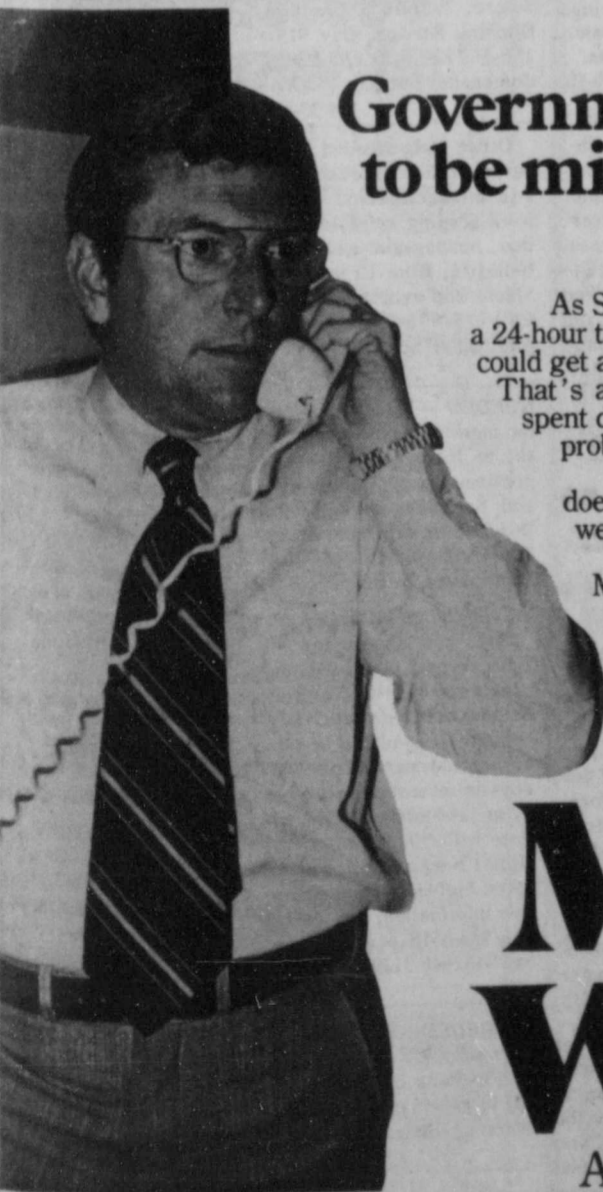

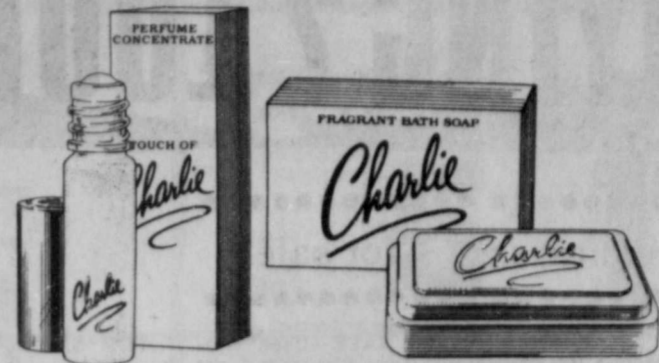

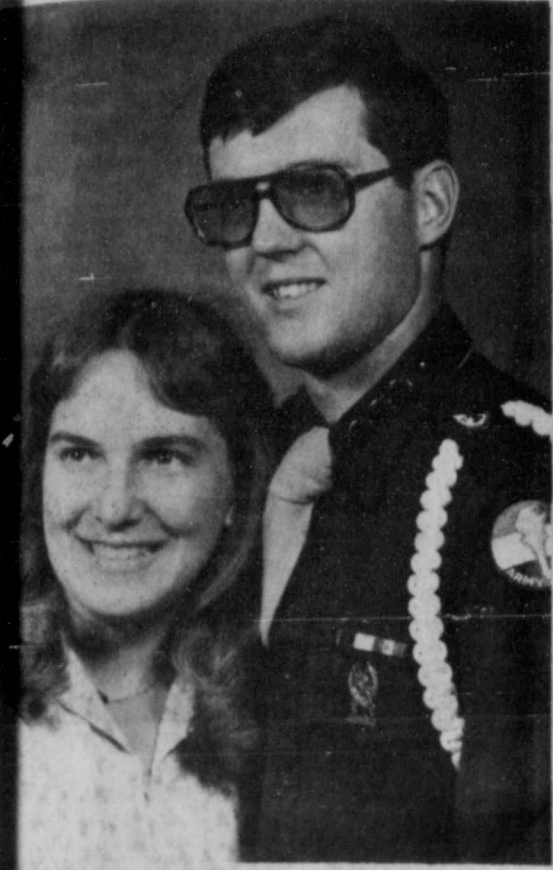

Some of the recommendations that have been made to the Texas Farm Bureau Board of Directors are: Texas FB consider expansion of voluntary producer investments to the National Livestock and Meat Board to ten cents a head on all cattle marketed in Texas; consider the feasibility of establishing a voluntary in-state beef promotion investment program; study all information regarding application of counter-cyclical beef import proposals; study effect of
