Eagles Lose 37-10 To Hamilton; Face Santa Anna Friday

The Goldthwaite Eagles played much improved football in the first half last week, but Hamilton's Bulldogs, came on in the latter stages to defeat the hometown boys 37-10.

Playing before a nice season opening crowd at Eagle Field, the local eleven was leading 10-6 at the intermission.

The action in the game

On the first play following the initial kickoff, Eagles quarterback Jett Johnson scampered over right end on an option play for 79 yards and a touchdown.

The play developed so quickly that many fans didn't see what was going on until Johnson was 10 yards in the open.

The same play resulted in the two point conversion for the extra points, making the score 8-0 with just 21 seconds of time off the clock.

Hamilton got its running game in motion later in the first period and managed a 47 yard scamper for a score, but missed the point after. The tally was 8-6 at the end of the first frame.

The Eagles drove down to the Hamilton 14 yard line in the second quarter only to give the ball on downs four plays later. A nice pass completion from Johnson to Ted Tucker set up the drive.

The Eagles defense seemed to have the combination to the Bulldog defense and held them deep in their own territory.

On fourth and ten, the punter bobbled the ball, and the Eagles tackled him in the end zone for a safety, and two points. This made the score 10-6, the way the half ended.

Coach Joe Winchell's Eagles received a rousing round of applause for a job well done in the first half from the local fans as they left the field for the intermission.

Following an exchange of punts at the beginning of the second stanza, Hamilton pushed across a touchdown and a two-point play, leading 14-10 midway in the third period.

From this point on, Hamilton moved the ball well on the ground, and the Eagles offense didn't seem to have any spark. The Eagles gave the ball up on fumbles three times after this point.

Hamilton scored five times in the second half, four TD's and one field goal, utilizing short drives following the Eagles fumbles.

The Eagles played much better than in the Hico game a week earlier, showing especially strong on the defense at times.

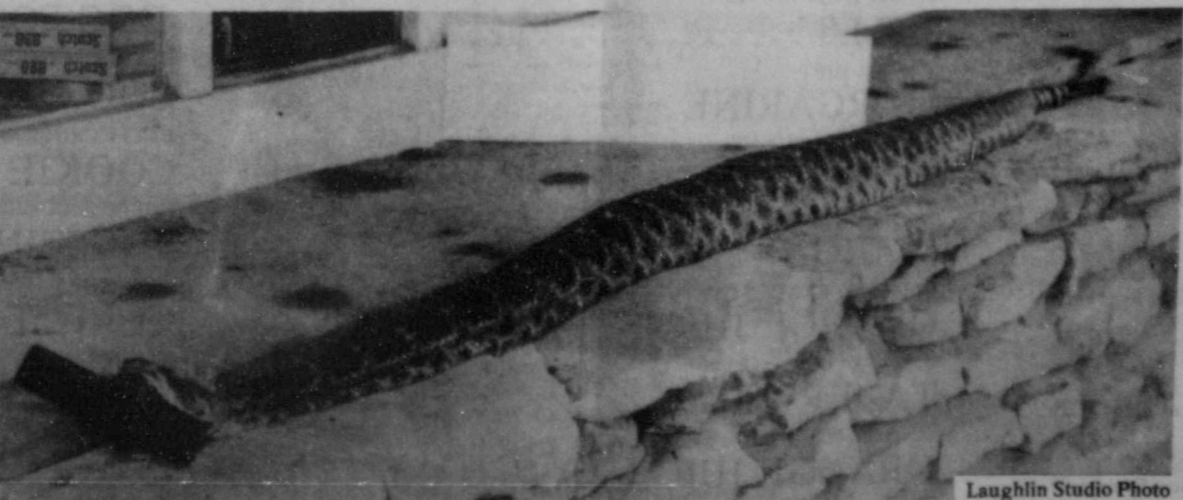


Creepy Crawler

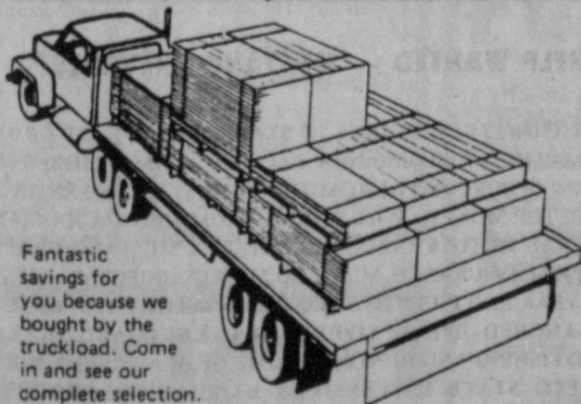

PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978

"The Tax Relief Amendment"
(H.J.R. 1)
H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation. The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity. The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons. The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased. The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased. The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies. The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing

bonds would be payable solely from the revenue from the sale or lease of these facilities. The building or acquisition of such facilities must be determined by the local government to be necessary to develop employment opportunities. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide that the legislature may permit political subdivisions to issue revenue bonds to develop employment opportunities for its citizens."
NUMBER THREE (S.J.R. 44)
S.J.R. 44 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas. The bonds are to be paid solely from revenue from municipal tax increments. Payment cannot be made from the revenue of municipal taxes, utilities, or other services. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize cities and towns to issue bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas and prohibiting any city or town from granting its money or lending its credit for such purposes."
NUMBER FOUR (S.J.R. 53)
S.J.R. 53 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to exempt from taxation solar or wind-powered energy devices. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from taxation solar and wind-powered energy devices."
NUMBER FIVE (H.J.R. 37)
H.J.R. 37 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to grant exclusive jurisdiction to justices of the peace in civil cases where the amount in controversy does not exceed \$200, except where the legislature gives exclusive jurisdiction to another court. The amendment grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with county courts where the amount in controversy is between \$200 and \$500, except where the legislature gives the county court exclusive jurisdiction. The amendment also grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with both county and district courts where the amount in controversy is between \$500 and \$1,000, except where the legislature gives the county or district court exclusive jurisdiction. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases."
NUMBER SIX (S.J.R. 45)
S.J.R. 45 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to expand the number of judges on any court of civil appeals. Presently, courts of civil appeals are limited to a chief justice and two associate justices. The amendment also would allow the courts to sit in sections, with the concurrence of a majority of the judges sitting in the section necessary to decide a case. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to increase the number of justices on a court of civil appeals, permitting a court of civil appeals to sit in sections, and requiring a concurrence of a majority of justices to decide a case."
NUMBER SEVEN (S.J.R. 48)
S.J.R. 48 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution eliminating the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund. The authority of the State Building Commission has been transferred by law to the State Board of Control. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional authority for the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund."
NUMBER EIGHT (H.J.R. 42)
H.J.R. 42 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing certain political subdivisions or districts in the state that can presently issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit for fire-fighting purposes. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendments authorizing certain districts to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise indebtedness or to issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit for fire-fighting purposes."

Public Health Clinic For Immunizations Here Wed.

A public health clinic for immunization against polio, measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus will be held Wednesday, September 27, 1978 between 10:30 a.m. and 12:00 noon, at the Senior Citizens Center in Goldthwaite. Tetanus isn't a disease to be taken lightly. About half of its victims in Texas die. Consider this true story which happened in San Antonio, and you can see the danger. --A man went out barefoot to change a sprinkler on his lawn and in doing so stuck something in his foot. He paid little heed to the puncture wound but became ill a few days later and was taken to the hospital with what his physician said were classic symptoms of tetanus. Five days after the minor injury he was dead, victim of tetanus.

Santa Fe RR Crew Laying Rail

A Santa Fe Railway steel gang of 117 Navajo Indians started Monday, Sept. 11, laying 63.7 miles of welded rail from Lometa to Brady on the line's San Saba District. Estimated time for completion of the \$2,375,000 project is about two months, reports B. B. Laughlin, division engineer at Temple. The gang will be replacing the current light rail with the longer, stronger welded rail. The 90-pound welded rail comes in 1440-foot lengths, approximately a quarter mile each.
