





Probably the greatest enigma of modern political life is the growth of Communism. Communism purports to offer a degree of economic security for which all people strive. Yet no Communistic country has ernments demand the combeen able to give its people a standard of living even approaching the standard of the Free enterprise countries.

Most religions accept the expressed desire of sharing goods as morally desirable The pure Communist govmon ownership of all goods. (None of them have quite achieved this professed objective.) The Socialists only ask for common, or government, ownership of what munism is based on pure they conceive to be essential industries. At the same time. most Communist governvery small group makes all ments (Poland is an exception) repudiate all religion -

apparently to escape any feeling of moral responsibility for their acts. They deny the existence of God because the rulers seek to clothe themselves with the attributes of God.

MARKA MARKA

Most Communist countries have established very strict rules of conduct (and I must say in many cases have succeeded in securing a very substantial degree of compliance); but, the ruling class is generally exempt from the rules and government seems to operate on the rule of expediency - not morality. Of course, this is not expressed in their laws or Constitution, but how often have you observed a citizen of a Communist state successfully invoking constitutional guarantees?

The Communists have, in

many cases, been able to accumulate capital for investment in public works which could not have been accumulated in Free Enterprise countries. They have done this by using a capitalistic trick of creating artificial persons. In the 'Free World' we call these "Corporations" and our government uses them - but not to the degree they are used by the Communists. The state owns the corporations. The corporations are given monopolistic, powers. They can have no; competition. Their government-owned corporations are able to take all of the income of the people. This has enabled many Communist countries to build great public buildings; and, in the war machine. Such transfer of the earnings of the people can only be made at the

expense of the living standards of the population.

We are seeing our own government move in this direction. We can only extend government services by taking enough taxes from the wealth which the people have created to pay the bill (or by inflation). Basically, the difference is one of degree, or of speed, with which the public services are developed. In many Communist countries the rate of development has been so fast that the rulers have become afraid to take so much and have allowed a somewhat larger share of the national production to stay with the people. Apparently, this is happening in both the USSR and in the People's Democratic Republic of China. In many of the smaller and poorer nations which are trying Communism, governments are still taking

unbearable toll from their While I think it is clear that the Communists have been able, in many places, to eliminate a great deal of corruption and to greatly strengthen government, they have done it at a cost in human dignity and in personal freedom which no one here wants to pay. It is probably true that a benevolent dictatorship is the "best" (or most effective) type of government in most countries, but who wants to pay this price for efficiency? I don't, and I am sure most Americans don't. The real objective should be to reach a balance between complete USSR, to build a tremendous freedom of action (anarchy) and absolute dictatorship. We want neither extreme but the pressures of modern civilization and increasing population tend to lead us more and more toward greater government control (basically the kind of government we see and dislike in the Communist countries). I don't think we should try to impose our ideas of government on other people, nor should we allow them to impose their systems on us. I think that if we can remain strong no foreign power is likely to try to impose their system on us, but if we give

O. Does a limited-slip differential have

safety value? L.M., Austin A. A limited-slip differential sends power to both driving wheels, while a normal differential sends power to the wheel with the least traction. The limited-slip differential can keep a car moving in poor traction conditions-like snow, ice or mud-which may prove to have safety value in certain cir-

Q. I know it's legal in Texas to make a right turn on a red light after coming to a full stop, But what about left turns on red where oneway streets are involved-are they also legal? H.K., Lufkin

A. Yes. You can make a left turn on red from a one-way street into another one-way street after coming to a full stop and yielding to any approaching vehicles. The exception is where a sign is posted specifically prohibiting such a turn.

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Q. Generally speaking, is it safer in an emergency to brake hard or to maneuver abruptly in trying to avoid an accident? L.L., Dilly

A. Situations vary, but usually it's safer to take evasive action rather than slam on the brakes. We all have a tendency to hit the brakes in an emergency. But it's hard to control a car in a panic stop, and vehicles need considerable distance to stop. A quick steering maneuver to avoid a hazard, such as an animal in the roadway, takes less time and involves less chance of losing control. Learning to use evasive action demands practice. It can be practiced mentally, while driving, by imagining an emergency situation and playing out, in your head, what you would do. Actual practice can be gained in safe, off-road areas, like a deserted parking lot.

Most Christmas trees are cut four or five weeks before they arrive on the lot. The sooner you can get the tree home and into water, the better 2. Select a full, dense tree that is evenly branched. The

branches should be firm and flexible. Shake the branches when selecting to see if needles fall. Fresh, healthy Yule trees do not drip their needles. 3. Select a tree with good

green color. This indicates that the choice is fresh, has good needle retention, fragrance, fire resistance and longer holiday beautyh.

4. Once you have selected your tree, saw off the lower two inches of the trunk. This will help the tree absorb water which will insure freshness and lasting quali-

5. Stand the tree in water in a cool location outside until you are ready to trim it. Then, place it in a tree stand that holds water and keep it filled during the holiday season

6. Place your tree in the coolest location possible indoors, away from the open fireplace, radiators and heaters

While it might seem a thousands of trees every year just to have something to hand ornaments on at Christmas, we really should not criticize this practice.

The majority of trees cut for Christmas are grown specifically for the purpose on commercial Christmas tree farms. They are just as much a crop as fruits and vegetables. In addition, we can be sure that, like fruits



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

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

## Texas To Begin Implementing 28X9 Texas Food Stamp Act Of 1977 Dec. 1

Texas will begin implementing the much-delayed Food Stamp Act of 1977 on December 1, 1978, a month ahead of all other states

The first change to go into effect will eliminate the purchase requirement, a move designed to make food stamps more accessible to the lowest income families. Other provisions of the bill. intended to simplify and tighten program administration, eliminate higher income households, and reduce the potential for errors and fraud, will go into effect

Formerly, food stamp users paid a portion (up to 88%) of their food stamp allotment, receiving an adve ditional portion, called the 'bonus amount," without charge. The size of the allotment depended on the size of the household; the amount charged the food stamp user depended on hisincome. Under the new program, users will receive only the bonus amount.

According to officials of the Texas Department of Human Resources (DHR), which administers the program in Texas, the elimination of the purchase requirement is expected to add 30,000 households (102,00 persons) to the program by June 30. Some 230,000 Texas households (773,000 persons) currently use food stamps. adding more than \$21 million in federal funds to the state's economy each month.

DHR Commissioner Jerome Chapman said the change will be of special benefit to elderly people on fixed incomes. "Accumulating enough cash to pay for rent and utilities and still have enough left over to buy food stamps is more than many low-income people can handle," he said.

### Drop Expected In 1978 Texas Pecan Harvest

AUSTIN-Texas pecan production in 1978 is expected to drop considerably below last year's crop due to a late freeze, drought and insects, according to the Texas

Department of Agriculture. This year's harvest will total only 28 million pounds, a 12-per-cent decline below the 32 million pounds recorded in 1977, a Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service survey

"It looks as if this will be tie-breaking' harvest, however," commented Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown, "While Georgia remains the number one pecan producing state, our production this year should break the second-place tie between Texas and Alabama, making Texas the undisputed second largest producing state. Alabama production is to drop to 16 million pounds this year.'

The Texas crop was set back early in the year, with trees in the Trans-Pecos area total income. being damaged by a late freeze. Then a lack of moisture across the state during most of the growing and other mandatory deseason caused many trees to begin shedding nutlets soon after they were set.

The March 1 provisions will streamline the application process by using standard deductions. This is expected to disqualify at least 23,000 higher-income food stamp users.

It will be tougher for students to get food stamps under the new law. Previously, students were ineligible if they were claimed as dependents by parents who were ineligible. Under the new law, even students who are not claimed as dependents will still be ineligible if they properly could be claimed by ineligible par-

The new regulations also tighten work requirements All recipients between 18 and 60 must register for work, must look for work. and may not turn down or quit a job without good cause. Exceptions are those who are already working, people caring for someone at home, the handicapped, people in drug or alcoholic treatments programs, and SSI (Supplemental Security

Income) recipients. The new law increases the federal matching funds to the states for investigating and prosecuting fraud from 50 to 75 percent.

Procedures for implementing the new law were developed with the assistance of the Good Stamp Advisory Committee, an ad hoc, statewide group that includes representatives from the Community Nutrition Institute, Texas Retailers Association, Texas Farmers Union, League of Women Voters, Texas Farm Workers Union, Governor's Committee on Aging, Houston Interfaith Hunger Coslition, Texas Retail Grocers, and the Texas AFL-CIO.

No one will be automatic ally eligible for food stamps under the new program, although generally families whose net income is below the poverty level will be eligible. The poverty level is determined annually by the federal government; the present level for a non-farm family of four is \$6,200.

\$60 from the household's • A 20 percent deduction from earned income to make up for taxes, Social Security,

• Up to \$80 per month for dependent care and excess housing costs, but the total of both amounts cannot exceed \$80. Housing costs included rent, mortgage, payments, property taxes, utility payments, and home insurance; expenses in this category that exceed 50 percent of the household's income are counted as "excess housing

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

## **Extension Highlights**

Quality of venison is not determined solely by the culinary talents of the homemaker. The entire process of handling the carcass ecoming members of Texas from field to table can add or detract from the desirability of the final product. The hunter plays an important role in determining whether a deer steak is tender and tasty or tough and bad-

> The following general recommendations can be made for Texas conditions:

flavored.

1. Whenever a choice is available, select a female animal for less flavor intensity (gaminess). This does not mean that male animals provide undesirable meat. but rather that most consumers may prefer the less flavor of the female.

2. Whenever possible, place the shot in the neck or head to insure a clean, rapid kill. This prevents post-shot stress and also reduces tissue damage considerably.

3. Field dress the animal as soon as possible. If contents of the intestine or paunch have been spilled. the carcass should be rinsed with water. A publication, L-634 entitled "Field Dressing Big Game," is available from any county Extension office and provides more

4. If weather permits, leaving the skin on the carcass will help conserve moisture. However, a little common sense dictates that carcasses should be skinned and covered with a fly proof bag in hot weather if a cooler is not accessible. Also, a strong urine odor on the hind legs and probably should be

5. If the family prefers a somewhat more intense flavor which is similar to aged beef, the carcass may be hung in a locker for about a week before final processing. Again, common sense dictates storage in a clean locker

which elinimates contamina tion of odors from poorly handled carcasses.

These recommendations are not the only way to handle carcasses. For the hunter who has a preferred method which differs somewhat from these recommendations but whose family is satisfied with the venison brought home, change is un-

If a hunter has no experience in handling deer carcasses or has had a bad experience with deer meat, these suggestions may help increase the use of the deer resource

Further suggestions on care and cooking of venison can be found in publication MP-1333, "Big Game Cooking Care," also available from your County Extension Office.

The Christian practice of and relatives follows the example of the Magi, "three wise men from the East" Testament (Matthew 2:1-12) who traveled to ethlehem to present gold, frankincense and myrrh to the Christ child 12 days

Another tradition credits the ancient Romans, who exchanged presents during their midwinter Saturnalia festival from December 17 to 24 in honor of the birth of the sun.

It was not until 353 A.D., when Pope Julius I set De-cember 25 as Christ's probable birth date, that the feast of the Nativity was first observed in Rome. Before that time, many Christians felt gift-giving was a heathen custom.

By the Middle Ages, how-

ever, the practice was firmly established. Tradesmen honored their patrons, while servants temporarily en-joyed some of the good things of life with their masters. In Russia peasants received gifts while they sang outside the houses of


