

While the plant you

Once the colorful bracts of the plant are no longer Very nice and large 2 bed. attractive, gradually reduce watering until the soil is dry. Water just enough to prevent the stems from shriveling. Store the dormant plant in a cool, well ventilated place at

> 60 deg. or above. About mid-April, cut the stems back to six inches above the ground and re-pot the plant into a container that is one to two inches larger than the original pot. Use a good potting mix - one of two parts soil, one part peat moss and one part perlite by volume or one of the commercially prepared pot-

ting mixes Water the plant thoroughly and place in a sunny window, keeping it at 70-75 degrees F. When new growth begins, fertilize the poinsettia every two weeks with a water soluable,

complete fertilizer. Use the rate recommended for pot plants on the label of the fertilizer container.

Once the danger of frost is past, move the plant outdoors where it will receive moderate shade in midafternoon. As growth develops, cut or pinch back the top, leaving three or four leaves on each shoot. Repeat this procedure each time the plant sends out new shoots until mid - August. Then bring the plant indoors and set it near a sunny window where the temperature will remain between 65 to 70

Continue to water and fertilize but take care not to overwater, since the plant requires less moisture indoors. As the plant puts on new growth, it will need more water, especially after the heating system is turned

To have the plant in full bloom by Christmas, keep it in complete darkness from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m., starting the first week in October and continuing until Thanksgiving. Flowering will be delayed if the plant receives any supplemental length during this period. The poinsettia will set

Doctors gave him no hope of ever walking again. This idea he could not stand, so he began to exercise daily and planned ways to get out of that bed. Later Del Barnett bought the farm and made it into the Boys Ranch. The rock barn that stands on the New Horizons Ranch was built in 1937. Ashley and Frank Weathers drove the wagon and the Weathers girls hauled the rocks and Ahsley hired Bert Weathers and Louise Hodge of Goldthwaite to build this barn. Something else keeps running through my mind. My father had a watermelon stand out by the mailbox on the raod and a sign saying 'Put the money in the cigar box and get all you want." Farewell To The County School Board

By W.H. Wasserman

The history of the Mills had qualified efficient county County School Board and the reason for its birth and recent demise goes back to the early one-room, oneteacher schools in Mills County. The county board preside over the county played a vital part in bringing peace and progress to the local school systems for a good part of its near eighty year existence. However, the sixty-fifth Texas Legislature disbanded all county school boards at the end of 1878 and, even though there were a few contemporary politicians and statesmen who felt that boards and bureaus should be increased rather than eliminated, this action came as no surprise to

The Mills County School Board served primarily during pioneer days and for two or three following decades. Since that time there has been a general opinion that the need for a county school board no longer exists. At the same time, it is interesting to review the history of the board.

The county board was formed in the early part of 1900 when there were approximately 71 schools in Mills County. This fact causes one to wonder where they were located in a county so small and why there were

It was generally agreed, as the population grew and need for schools increased, that no child should walk farther than three miles to school from home. School districts were often bounded by ravines, creeks and rivers and these crude boundary lines created a need for more schools than would have otherwise been necessary. At this stage of the county school development, the county board did not exist.

It was difficult to find qualified teachers for so many early day schools. Many of them were staffed by young maiden teachers who married in a year or two and left vacancy after vacancy. The turn-over was

After the Mills County School Board was formed it was given authority to supply the demand for teachers by by way of an examination wayside. Many of our best educators began their teaching careers with teaching certificates such as this.

After World War I, the tempo of work for the county school board began to pick up. Many parents felt that the one-teacher school had served its day. They began to look for larger schools and a better education for their children. In spite of sentimental attachments, oneteacher schools were
