Hartgraves Named HCEC Manager

John B. Hartgraves will succeed Weldon Groves as general manager of the Hamilton County Electric Cooperative Association on February 1, 1979. Groves will retire but will be retained as consultant.

The cooperative serves electrical power in Hamilton, Coryell, Lampasas, Mills and San Saba counties.

Hartgraves, who grew up in Hamilton, has been with the company since August, 1966, when he went to work as billing clerk. He was

named office manager in 1967 and was promoted to assistant manager in 1974.

After graduating from Hamilton High School, Hartgraves served four years in the U.S. Navy, including duty in Japan as communications technician. He achieved the rank of Third Class Petty Officer. Before joining the Hamilton County Electric Cooperative, he worked for Collins Radio, Delta Airlines and Gulf States-United States Telephone Company.

Groves has served 34 years as general manager of the Cooperative and 50 years in the utility business. He was previously employed by the Texas Power and Light and Lower Colorado River Authority.

He became general manager of the Hamilton County Electric Cooperative Association in 1945. Since he held the post, the Cooperative has grown from 1,800 consumers to 8,400, and from 800 miles of line to 3,000 miles.

If the commissioners are trying to make an impression on people, its time to hear the hands side of the story. As some of them said, they have never gotten a Christmas bonus much less \$10 per year of work.

Some people think the hands are overpaid. Think of this: Most truck drivers are paid not less than \$5.00 per hour. That would be \$40 a day, ten days would be \$400. In some states road grader workers are paid \$20 per hour, that would be \$160 per day. In checking adjoining counties, one has been paying \$800 for some time. As some said, when thousands of dollars are spent in 3 months, not on men's salaries, nor badly needed machine repair, well—we wonder.
