## Eaglettes Preparing For Wall Bi-District Shootout Monday

The Goldthwaite Eaglettes wrapped up the District 10-A championship Tuesday night with a 60-36 victory over San Saba and will advance to the bi-district play against Wall, the winner of District 9-A, Monday, February 26, at 8:00 p.m. in the Brownwood Coliseum.

However, Thursday night the locals fell to awesome Comanche team 60-51. The game was the first of three tough practice games slated for this week. Coach Yarborough stated, "We need tough competition to help us prepare for our ultimate goal which is bi-district. I feel that we've scheduled some of the best teams in the state. We're finding out some things about ourselves that will benefit us on Monday." The Eaglettes will put a 14-0 season record and a 14-0 top record on the line when they tangle with the Wall Hawks for bi-district.

The number four ranked Wall Hawks earned the right to advance by defeating number six ranked Eldorado in a district finale last Tuesday. The Hawks sport a 22-2 season record and a 10-0 district record.

Coach Rhonda Yarborough's Eaglettes are averaging 66.2 points per contest. Leading the team in scoring is senior Sheila Vaughan with a 15.6 scoring clip. Sheila is also averaging 15.0 points and 10 rebounds. Senior Ruth Ann Johnson is averaging 14.6 points, 8 rebounds, and 12 assists. Angela Beavers is a sophomore who is averaging 14 points, 5 rebounds, and 3 assists. Junior Cynthia Berry is averaging 6.4 points and 4 rebounds. Seniors Carrie Gray and Dedra Long, and Tina Studer, Beverly Carothers, DeAnna Henry, and Sophomores Stephanie Landrum and Sunnye Sims continue to provide superb bench strength.

The Eaglettes defense has been stingy, allowing their opponents only 34.8 points per contest.

The most points scored this season in a single game was 94 against San Saba. The fewest points yielded was 15, also against San Saba. Sheila Vaughan's 33 points

against Hamilton earned her the year's individual high scoring honor.

Cynthia Berry's 24 rebounds against Early, Ruth Ann Johnson's 18 assists, and Angela Beaver's 8 steals

against Ranger are tops for the year in their respective categories.

The Eaglettes will play a practice game against third ranked Eola on Friday night at Santa Anna at 7 p.m.

### Conradt Nominated For Coach Of The Year

Jody Conradt, women's basketball coach at the University of Texas, Austin has been selected as one of 20 finalists from throughout the nation for the AIAW Coach of the Year Award. The winner will be announced in New York in March.

Miss Conradt in her third season as UT Women's Basketball mentor, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Conradt of Goldthwaite.

According to a Ft. Worth Star Telegram report, Conradt has modeled a powerhouse at UT in three short, sweet seasons.

"The intent when I came here," the Longhorn coach said, "was to build a nationally competitive program. We've gotten to the top because the resources have been available to us."

"My first year here we had a good record (36-10) and were competitive within the State, but we were thin in depth. Last year we were more solid and this year for the first time, we're fielding a team that's strong in every area," she continued.

The Longhorns are ranked

second among all college teams in the country by the Associated Press. They have only two losses (to Tennessee and Wayland Baptist) and have only been involved in four close decisions. They have surpassed the 100 point mark four times and in three encounters have scored in the 90's.

"I still don't feel we've played up to our potential," Conradt stated. "We're in sort of a lull period right now. The only motivating factors we have are the pride of the players and the poll."

The National championship is the goal of the Longhorns. To reach that goal the Horns first must concentrate on the Texas State Collegiate Tournament beginning today (Feb. 22-24) in Nacogdoches, where they could meet up with such top ten contenders as Stephen F. Austin and Wayland Baptist College. The struggle will continue in the Southwest Regional Tournament March 8-10 in Tulsa, where only the top two finishers will continue toward the top.

At regionals, No. 2 Texas, No. 3 Louisiana Tech, No. 4 SFA, No. 9 Wayland Baptist, and No. 17 LSU will compete. If Texas finishes top, or runner-up, in the region, they will advance to a national satellite tournament and the winners there become the Final Four. These four will meet in the AIAW National Basketball Tournament March 23-25 to be held in Greensboro, N.C.

Miss Conradt is not predicting the outcome of her season. Of a national championship she says, "We have the potential for that, but that's a prediction definitely not from me. When it gets to where it's a game-by-game situation, you've got to be lucky because everybody else is gonna be good."

## Plane Crash Near Democrat Fatal To Baptist Minister

Friday night at 10:20 p.m., Mrs. Charles Dudley called Comanche Sheriff's office reporting having heard a low flying plane, then a loud noise as if the plane had crashed on their property.

The Dudley ranch is 1 mile east-northeast of Democrat. Comanche officers and an interested and curious citizen of Comanche, Sam Marshall, arrived at Dudley ranch about 11:30 p.m. and conducted a search-rescue effort until 3:30 a.m. Saturday, but were unable to locate the plane.

At that time it was not believed by Comanche Sheriff's office a plane had crashed for Abilene airport had not monitored the flight, nor had lost a plane on their radar tracking equipment.

Still concerned about this matter, Sam Marshall accompanied Bill Dudley to the ranch Saturday afternoon to feed the livestock and make another search of the area. The plane, a 1970 model Piper 130, was discovered at 4:20 p.m., lodged in a small

liveoak cluster only a few hundred yards from the Dudley residence. The single occupant, Buford Harold, 52, of Taylor, Texas, was killed instantly upon impact with the liveoak trees.

Harold, preacher at the Lakeview Baptist Church of Taylor, was enroute from Amarillo to Taylor at the time of the crash. He was pronounced dead at the scene by F.A.A. Medical Examiner, Dr. Fred Spencer, of Brownwood.

F.A.A. inspectors were unable to determine the cause of the crash. Engine trouble was not believed to have caused the crash. F.A.A. estimated airspeed at 130 MPH.

Comanche County S.O. conducted the investigation for it was undetermined whether the accident occurred in Comanche or Mills County.

Comanche County deputies described the plane as being pieces.

## Caution Urged For Eclipse Watchers Mon.

Texans should not look directly at the sun February 26, according to the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness. Although Texans will notice no visible difference in the day's brightness, a total solar eclipse will occur in a path from the Pacific Ocean crossing the northwestern United States. The eclipse will occur partially in virtually all the rest of the continental United States.

The solar eclipse will begin in Houston at 9:11 a.m. as the moon first touches the sun's upper right corner. The moon will hide 57.8 percent of the solar disk at 10:23 a.m. when the eclipse reaches its mid-point. The eastward moving moon will slowly pull away from the sun after mid-eclipse. At 11:45 a.m., the dark new moon will leave the sun's upper left corner.

Prevent Blindness recommends indirect watching as the only safe way to view the solar eclipse. The simplest indirect way is the "pinhole" method. Take two pieces of white cardboard, make a small hole in one, and with the sun at the back, focus the eclipse through the pinhole onto the second board. The size of the image can be changed by altering the distance between the cardboards.

NEVER LOOK AT THE ECLIPSE THROUGH THE PINHOLE, OR THROUGH BINOCULARS OR A TELESCOPE, OR A CAMERA VIEWFINDER.

Following the last total eclipse seen in the U.S. (March 7, 1970), 145 cases of eye injury were reported in a Prevent Blindness survey. Sixty percent of the casualties had looked at the sun directly with the naked eye.

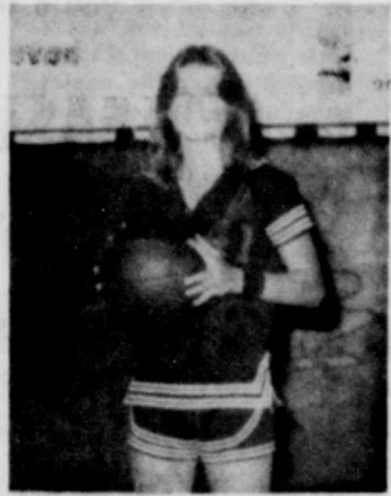

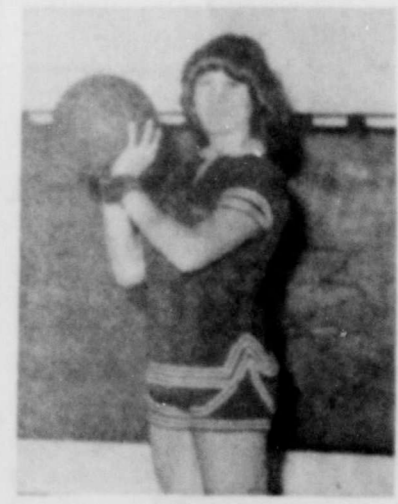

where I planned next year's corn. We went into the house. Pork-pie had to squat under a line of long underwear that stretched through the dining room and into the kitchen, drying near the stove. We sat on the couch in the living room and he dove into his briefcase. In the barn the cows for whom I was a butler all had individual smells. Dolly smelled like Dolly. Posie like Rosie. And Snotface, her darling little self. But I, their butler, was a living condensed version, a composite of all 22 milkers, and the calves. Pork-pie moved away from me a few inches as we sat together and talked. I moved close to see his notebook, listening to a point he was making. He moved again. I had finally chased him clear to the other end of the couch.

When he left I didn't get the booklet, but I felt warm inside feeling that I had done a good thing in this old world. When Pork-pie is in a fancy restaurant in a big city like Milwaukee sitting on his chops in the warmth, eating butter, milk, or cheese. (I was going to say eggs, but these come from chickens), he will surely remember what a man has to do to get these products to him.
