### Clements Labels Schlueter Bills Emergency Measures

Texas Governor Bill Clements labeled as "emergency measures" three legislative bills by State Representative Stan Schlueter of

Killeen. This action brings the proposals to the top of the agenda for the Sixty-Sixth Legislature.

The emergency measures are a constitutional amendment to repeal the State's ad valorem tax, a constitutional amendment to limit the consecutive terms of the Governor, Lt. Governor and the Attorney General and legislation to tax agricultural land based on productivity rather than market value.

Schlueter said that he was extremely pleased that Clements had recognized the importance of the proposals and had labeled them as emergency measures.

"With the weight of the Governor's Office behind these proposals this Session, I am certain that we will be able to accomplish these goals," Schlueter said.

The Mills County Program Building Executive Committee met February 19, 1979, in the Mills County Commissioners' Courtroom. The purpose of the meeting was to continue effort of the County Program Building Organization.

Under old business, the committee heard a report on the progress of the completion of the draft copy of the Long Range County Program. This project has been referred to the Crops and Livestock Subcommittee.

## Pirates Take Bi-District; Lose Regional To Lipan

The Priddy Pirates took the Bi-District Championship Tuesday night, Feb. 20, when they defeated the Lometa Hornets in a double overtime. The lead changed

hands many times, but neither team ever led by more than 5 points. Priddy led at halftime by the small margin of 2 points, 27-25. With 10 seconds left Priddy

trailed by 4 points. Ricky Feist made a lay-up and was fouled in the act of shooting. He added the free throw to leave Priddy one point behind. As the Lometa

Hornets advanced the ball down court, the Pirates intentionally fouled a Hornet causing tempers to flare. A technical was called on Lometa. The Hornets failed to sink their free throw. Ricky Feist came to the free throw line and sank the technical to tie the score 45-45 at the end of regulation. At the end of the first overtime the score was tied again, 49-49. During the second overtime, Priddy Pirate Ricky Feist took charge making one lay-up and 5 of 6 free throws, putting the Pirates out front 56-51. The Priddy Pirates tangled with the Gorman Panthers Friday night. The first half was fairly close with Priddy holding an 8-point lead at halftime 40-32. The Pirates outscored the Panthers 31-22

Priddy returned Saturday evening to play Goree for 3rd place in the regional playoff. The Pirates held their own during the first quarter with the score 17-17. Goree took the lead in the remainder of the game making the final score Priddy 52 and Goree 68. Pirate Troy Goerdel scored 17 points and Dale Drucekhammer 10, Ricky Feist 8, Ricky Holmsley 8, Andy Schwartz 5, and Kevin Hohertz 4.

Dale Drucekhammer was selected All-Regional. Congratulations to the Priddy Pirates on a fine season.

**School Statistics —**

Payroll during the year totals \$514,495.02 which is paid to 52 members of the faculty and employees.  
Annual budget for the Goldthwaite school system this year is \$606,561.00 This does not include lunchroom operations.  
There are 41 teachers and administrators in the school system.  
The school system operates seven buses, driving approximately 96,000 miles per year.  
Estimated value of school buildings, land and equipment and all physical facilities of the district would run in the neighborhood of \$750,000. These include Elementary School, High School, Gymnasium, Stadium, Agriculture Building, Storage Building, High School Lunchroom, and approximately 80 acres of land.  
Total enrollment for the 78-79 year has now reached 425 pupils including high school, junior high and elementary.  
Goldthwaite schools operate two modern lunchrooms serving an average of 320 meals daily and total meals expected for the year of 62,000, plus Breakfast Program put in this year with an average of 28 participating daily.

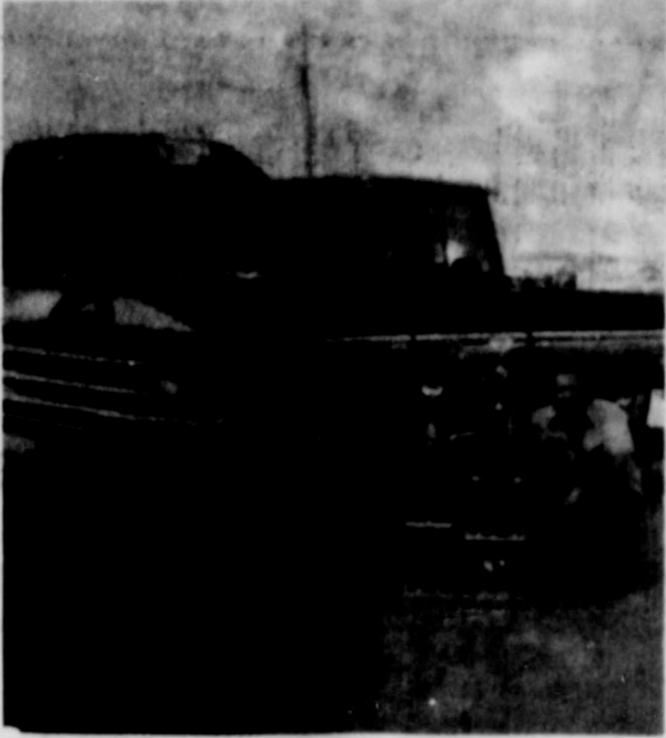

# A Look At The Migrant Program

## Who Is It Really For?

IN THE 1950's, the problem of the migrant child surfaced when in South Texas the children of crop pickers began to overflow classrooms. First Grade classes of 20 would bloat to 50-60 during the crop season. As a result, the Texas Child Migrant Program was formed and financed through Title I funds.

The goal of this program was to help eliminate the migrant child dropout rate. In South Texas, the Spanish-speaking child seemed to gain very little in a school where he could not read or write, or even verbally communicate in his environment. Bi-lingual teachers were hired, and eventually the program gained momentum. It is now a nationwide program.

In Goldthwaite the Migrant Program is for grades K - 6th. The personnel consists of three women: Marge Studer, Title I Migrant Resource Teacher; Lupe Ynostrosa, Instructional Aid; and Dolores Humphries, Community Aid.

Mrs. Studer is in her sixth year as Migrant Teacher in Goldthwaite. To qualify for this position, she had a B.S. in Elementary Education. She is not bi-lingual. As the traditional teacher, she is accountable to Superintendent Gilbert Davis and her principal, T. J. Williams.

Mrs. Ynostrosa is bi-lingual. She was a migrant herself and started school speaking no English.

"Lupe is invaluable to me," Mrs. Studer said. "She understands the problems of the migrant student and is devoted to helping them," she continued.

Dolores Humphries works in the community. She goes out into the community and finds help where it is needed for the migrant student and his family. She goes into the home and works with the pre-school migrant student. She is involved with ancillary services and puts to use the very limited federal funds available for dental, medical, and other needs. (This year these funds amounted to approximately \$3.00 per child). Mrs. Humphries acts as liaison between the school and the community.

At the present, Mrs. Studer and Mrs. Ynostrosa are working with 48 enrolled

students. They have these students for 45 minutes a day.

As with any government program, the Migrant Program must operate under specific guidelines. Mrs. Studer and Mrs. Ynostrosa are required to make two home visits a year. The work is divided into four areas — Oral Language Development, Reading, Math, and Self Concept.

The Migrant Program is an enrichment program. In addition to the four areas, science, spelling, art, creative writing and other activities are stressed.

When the child first enters the program, he is pre-tested to determine which areas he needs the most concentration. If there is a language problem, that is the area upon which Mrs. Studer and Mrs. Ynostrosa focus.

There are two prominent goals of the Migrant Program: (1) To help the migrant child reach his fullest potential and to help him to understand the importance of staying in school; (2) To prepare him to take his place in and function on his own in the classroom.

"Our job is simply to find out where the child's weaknesses are and turn them into strengths," Mrs. Studer said. "We want to give the children an understanding of our language. You don't have to be a Mexican-American to fail to understand our language. There are numerous children in our schools today who do not understand our language - who can't communicate properly," she added.

With the bi-lingual hearings in Austin this year, the Migrant Program has become a topic of interest and a topic of misconception, Mrs. Studer feels.

First, many people think that the Migrant Program is for Mexican-American children. This is not true.

According to the United States Office of Education, the definition of a migrant child is:

A migratory child of a migratory agricultural worker is a child who has moved with his family from one school district to another during the past year in order that the parent or other members of his immediate family might secure employment in agriculture or fishing, or in related food processing.

In Goldthwaite, most of the migrant children are Mexican-Americans, but that is because most of the people who migrate to Goldthwaite are Mexican-Americans. In other schools, there may be

no Mexican-Americans. Caucasians, blacks, Vietnamese - any race's children migrate. Anyone who has moved to Goldthwaite during the past year for the purpose of seeking or gaining employment in an agricultural-related field qualifies for the Migrant Program.

The second misconception is that the Migrant Program is for educationally deprived children. The program is not for the low academic achiever. It is NOT a remedial program. The misconception is formed because many of the migrant children are educationally deprived. Changing schools puts pressure and hardships on the brightest of students.

This, coupled with the language difficulty that many Mexican-Americans in Goldthwaite and nation-wide experience causes generalizations. And the result is that many people think the Migrant Program is a "Mexican program for the remedial child". It is not. "I believe in this program. I don't believe in excessive government control, but I do believe in what we're doing for the children," Mrs. Studer concluded.

The Migrant Program has recently been housed in a new building. The money for the building came from Migrant Funds allocated by the U. S. Government Office of Education.

Mrs. Studer, Mrs. Ynostrosa, and Mr. Williams cordially invite everyone to come by and visit with them and see the new building at Open House March 6, 1979.

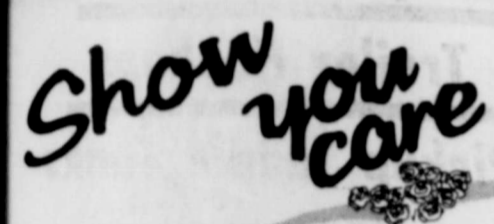

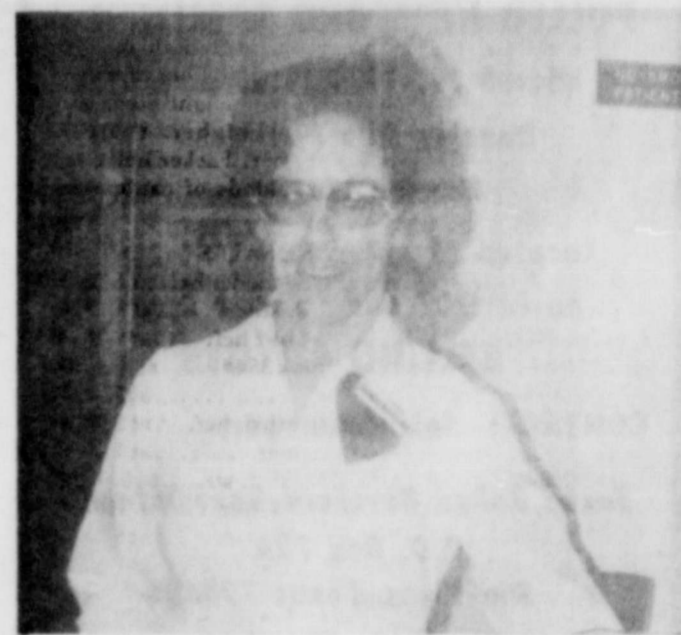

# The Moline Menace
