Melanie Gibbard was third in the hurdles in a time of 13.97. Laura Muse placed second

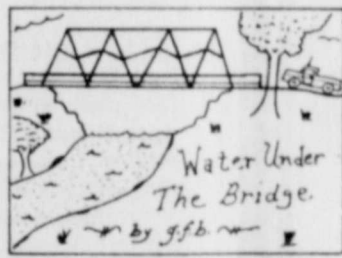
in the high jump with a jump of 4' 4".

All five starters for the Eaglettes were named to the all-district first team.

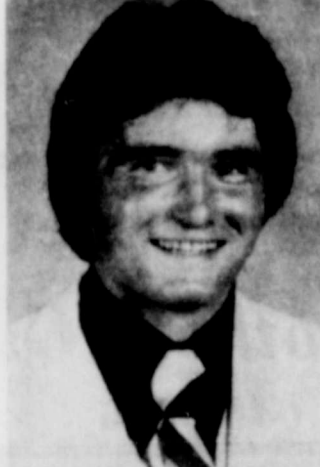

U.S. Census Bureau Has Temporary Jobs

The U. S. Census Bureau has a number of temporary jobs open during the next few weeks in Mills County to help prepare address lists for use during the 1980 census. Temporary census workers usually will work three to four weeks each and will be paid on a per-address collected basis. For an 8-hour

day, the average worker will earn \$27 to \$30 per day plus 17¢ per-mile for any driving done in a private vehicle. Applicants for the jobs must be 18 years old, or over, a U.S. citizen, and pass a written test.

The work involved driving or walking to compile lists of addresses of each dwelling

unit in designated areas of the county. These address lists will play a vital role in taking the 1980 census. They will be used to produce mailing labels for the census questionnaires to be sent to each household in America on March 28, 1980. Then, a few weeks following the April 1 Census Day, census officials will use the address lists to determine which households have not returned their completed questionnaires. Census takers must then be sent to each non-responding household to collect the information required on the census form.

The 1979 address collection activity in the county is part of a Census Bureau program involving 35,000 temporary workers nationwide to compile lists containing approximately 30 million addresses. Another 50 million addresses have been purchased from commercial mailing list companies.

Exclusive features of Tex-Pack service include waybills to both shipper and consignee on all shipments; cost-free handling of change of address; WAT's tracing, also without cost; dislocated shipments; collect calls to arrange pickups in remote areas. Tex-Pack carries current application for the Texas Railroad Commission by United Parcel Service for authority to duplicate Tex-Pack's semi-Spokesmen contented. Such authorization would damage current shipping their local agents and result in deterioration of current service to Texas communities.

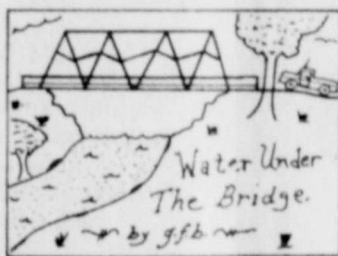

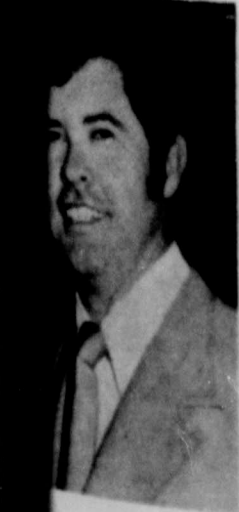

Habits are a very important part of life. We must be careful in selecting them because they carry big price tags. They can be damaging and destructive. Dependence on alcohol, drugs, or tobacco by adults and teenagers alike can literally drain away life and cause misery and suffering. A bad temper that is not kept under control has brought us to a day of wife beating and child abuse.

The price tag of habits is pushed higher because they become ways of life. As patterns of daily living, they produce strange stranglehold effects upon us, causing us to do things we shouldn't do, or maybe don't even want to do. In Peter's second letter (Chap. 2, vs. 19), the apostle sets forth what we might call the "principle of Human slavery." The principle states that a person is a slave to whatever controls him.

Habits have a way of becoming like the eight arms of an octopus, or the strands of a spider's web. They surround us, entangle us, choke us, squeeze us, and sap vitality and energy from us. The tragedy lies in the fact that we seldom run headlong into a habit. We slip, drift, and slide into a regular routine and before long the hook is set.

Several years ago I heard my wife's pastor recall a story told by Harry Emerson Fosdick, noted pastor of Riverside Church, New York City. He referred back to the days of Model-T cars and unpaved roads. After heavy rains, huge ruts and deep tracks would be left on the dirt roads. When dry, those ruts became rock hard and difficult to get out of. Fosdick tells of seeing a sign beside one of the dirt roads of his day: "Be careful which ruts

you get into. You may be in them for the next 20 miles."

I am confident that the One who releases us from the penalty of sin and death can also liberate us from the damaging, damnable, destructive patterns of living.

Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is able to rescue us from the tenacles and arms of habits that side track and carry us in the wrong directions. A word of caution and warning, a road sign, as we travel down the interstate of earth's existence: Be careful which ruts you get into. You may be in them for the rest of your life. That being the case, look unto Jesus, the Author and Finisher of our faith, trusting Him to free us from the habits that ruin and reduce the meaning of life.

ASCS NEWS

Secretary of Agriculture, Bob Bergland, recently suspended the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture's technical and cost-share assistance of the herbicides 2,4,5-T and 2,4,5-TP for forestry, rights-of-way and pasture uses. Earlier, the department suspended its use of the herbicides for those purposes. "We do not want to take even a remote chance that any of our programs will result in health hazards to the American people," Bergland said.

The department will, however, continue to provide financial and technical assistance to farmers and ranchers using the above named herbicides on range or rice fields. These uses were not included in the March 1 emergency suspension by the Environmental Protection Agency on the sale, distribution and use of these herbicides. The herbicides are widely used in the U.S. and other countries to control brush and weeds on forest, pasture, range and other land, including rights-of-way.

Department agencies affected include the Forest Service, which administers the national forest system lands; Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), which provides cost-sharing assistance to farmers and ranchers for installing conservation and forestry practices; and Soil Conservation Service (SCS), which provides technical assistance to land users.

Bergland said SCS and ASCS field personnel will review their cost-share agreements and contracts with farmers and ranchers as soon as possible so they can be modified to comply with the suspension order. The rate and frequency of 2,4,5-T or 2,4,5-TP use for brush and weed control on range and rice fields is not as great as in other agricultural and silvicultural uses, Bergland explained.

"And the alternatives are costlier, less effective, or have other undesirable environmental tradeoffs," he said.

It was announced by Bergland that the department's field personnel would continue helping farmers and other land users understand the potential health hazards of these and other herbicides in all allowable uses.



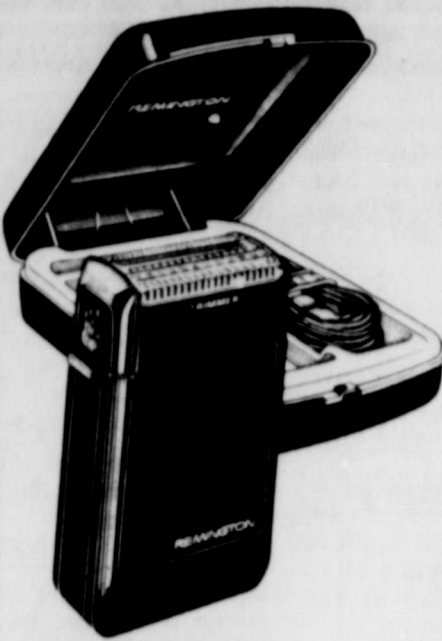

Teenage Smoking

One million teenagers start smoking every year. To be one of the gang? To look like the ads? To seem adult? To defy parents & teachers? To take risks? To seek pleasure?

According to studies included in the new Surgeon General's report on smoking, children, usually between 4 and 10, take quite literally the dangers of smoking. They are especially worried if their own parents or older brothers or sisters smoke. But as they approach adolescence, many of these same children begin smoking themselves.

Smoking is forbidden to young children. It is adult behavior; and smoking announces to the world that the teenager has left childhood far behind. Younger adolescents, some investigators have found, live almost completely in the present and are

preoccupied with the future or its dangers. Since they see that people around them who smoke do not die instantly or may not show any apparent ill effects from smoking, that's enough evidence for them.

Everyone, including teenagers, is bombarded by cigarette ads; and teenagers are especially influenced by hip images projected by young adults in the ads. Peer pressure as well as the behavior of people older than themselves, including other family members, have an impact on teenagers. The

percentage of teens who smoke is higher when one parent smokes -- compared to teens with nonsmoking parents -- and still higher when both parents smoke.

If an older brother or sister as well as both parents smoke, the chances are four times higher that the teenager will smoke that if there are no smokers in the family.

To find out more about smoking and how to help anyone in the family stop, contact your local American Lung Association -- the Christmas Seal people. It's a matter of life and breath.

The Senate is now considering House Bill 1060 (Tax Relief bill). Contacts should be made with Sen. Grant Jones and urge him to give favorable consideration of the bill with no damaging amendments to Article 1. Also encourage him to ensure that all school districts are fully reimbursed.

The Senate is also considering SB 665, by Farabee, reported favorably by the Senate Natural Resources Committee, prohibits hunting on a public road. Use of a spotlight on a public road while possessing a loaded, readily accessible firearm, is presumed to be a violation.

Farm Bureau favors Farm Bureau policy states: "It should be illegal for a person to use a spotlight from a public road, other than onto his own property, except in cases of emergency."

The House is now considering HB 1569, by Nabers (Intragovernmental Affairs) would allow county commissioners to use county employees and equipment in the construction and maintenance of private roads when requested by a person owning an interest in the private road.

Farm Bureau amending this bill so this authorization does not extend work to any subdivision. Farm Bureau states: "We recommend that if legislation is passed to county equipment for private property owners, that use be excluded for any subdivision work."

The Navy Selection Board in Washington, D.C. chose Massey and twelve others for selection to Commander as Public Affairs Officers in the U.S. Naval Reserve.

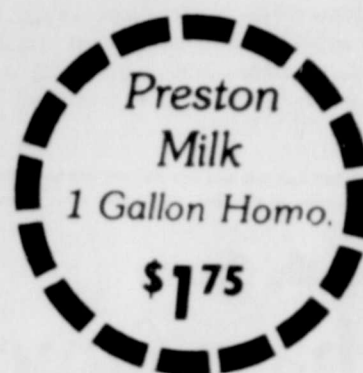

The most important management practice to a successful cow-calf operation is the development of a definite calving season. Many products allow bulls to run year-round with cows, resulting in calves born each month. This means the herd will be in all stages of production during the year and creates problems in feeding, marketing and total management. Furthermore, calving out of season or at a wrong time of the year may cost the producer an extra \$50 in feed bills and a loss of up to \$25 in reduced weaning weights. Cows that calve from late January to April need little supplemental feed even though their nutrient requirements are high due to milk production. As spring approaches, good, lush, desirable pastures produce plenty of forage for lactation, rebreeding and calf growth. Cows that calve in the winter will require about \$50 worth of additional hay and supplemental feed. In addition to reduced feed costs, Texas research has shown major differences in weaning weights between calving seasons. For example, calves born in February, March and April averaged 478 lbs.; those born in November, December and January averaged 466 lbs.; May, June and July calves averaged 430 lbs.; and August, September and October calves averaged 415 lbs. Calves born in the Feb.-April period were worth from \$7 to \$25 more, depending on season of birth. Producers can gain as much as \$75 per cow each year by selecting the best calving season. The season should allow cows and calves to take advantage of the greatest forage quality and quantity in spring and early summer. Cows calving in late winter and early spring also obtain adequate nutrition to get in good breeding shape and thereby increase conception rates.
