

# Wilcox, Holcomb Take Oath of Office At Board Meeting

Bobby Wilcox and Gary Holcomb were given the oath of office as new members of the Goldthwaite Independent School District Monday night at the regular board meeting. The election, held last Saturday, saw Wilcox with 189 votes, followed by Holcomb with 116 and Harlan Jernigan with 115. The board decided to let the vote stand and did not call a recount of ballots. Don Humphries led 63 votes, and L. B. Benson 14 votes in the election.

Board members for the next three years, Troy Berry, Nathan Carothers did seek reelection. After the votes were counted, the new board structure was organized. Tom Miles was named president, Gary Holcomb secretary, and Douglas Dennis vice president. Dennis is the oath of office to the new board members. Members on the board are Reese, Carroll Berry, Wendell Tucker.

The board set the tax rate for the coming year, lowering the rate from \$1.75 to \$1.70 per \$100 value. The lowering was made possible by a surplus in the building and operating fund. Usually 25c is added to fulfill the needs of this fund; however, in past years, the amount has not been enough to drop the rate to 20c. The regular rate is \$1.50 for local maintenance and was not changed.

Another related tax matter, the board was asked by President Elam to look for members of the district to sit on the next year's tax equalization board. This board meets during the year to set the valuation for the school district for the coming year's taxes. The people sit on the GISD Tax Equalization. Trustee Wilcox said he would talk to the three that sat on the board last year to see if they could handle that responsibility again.

The bus route structure of the district was discussed at length by the board. During the discussion, Superintendent Gilbert Davis reported the board that no student living outside the district may be picked up at residence and taken to school. The bus must not be used out of the district in the route of picking up students for classes, he stated. When there are questions of boundaries of the district, it is to be left up to the parents or guardians to see the student lives in the district.

Dennis moved that the district act in compliance with state law and that no bus be taken out of the district to transport students from classes or to be used at school bus drivers' residences. Trustee Berry seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

Other matters, the board decided to remain in a cooperative with four other areas on the use of a school counselor and nurse. The board will choose the personnel at a meeting later. The Goldthwaite schools will apply for a course in agriculture for the next school year. The course will be open to senior students who will attend two hours a day, for credits, in ag mechanics classes. The application fee possibility to receive \$20,000 in related funds for the course. The local district would probably be required to pay 10% of the cost of the tools. Tucker seconded the motion, seconded by Wilcox. It passed unanimously.

Some of the topics covered in the curriculum in this course are engines, electrical, cooling, fuel, air, hydraulics, air conditioning, painting (all types), metal working, farm and ranch, and electricity, and a safety program. Individual students may choose specific areas for study. The members each were on two committees by

President Miles. On the Five Year Improvement Committee, he named Trustees Dennis, Tucker and Wilcox. On the Summer Improvement Committee, he named Holcomb, Berry and Reese. These will report back to the board with any areas of correction they can find in the physical plant.

The board unanimously approved a list of twenty students that wish to transfer to Goldthwaite schools for the coming year. The students were read, individually, by Davis to the board.

The motion was made by Dennis and seconded by Berry.

In a matter of policy, the board unanimously voted to abide by the following guidelines in opening the gym to the community: 1) a responsible adult must obtain the key, 2) a signed statement must be issued of financial responsibility for repairs and damages, and 3) the facility will not be open past 12 midnight.

## Eaglettes Finish Strong Second In District Meet

The Eaglettes scored 103 points to DeLeon's 111 for runner-up honors at the District 10-A Track and Field Meet in Brownwood last Friday.

After the Eaglettes suffered a setback on a very questionable call during the Shot Put which cost DeAnna Henry a chance to advance to Regional and which cost the Eaglettes 10 team points, it became apparent that the race for the team championship was going to be between Goldthwaite and DeLeon. Sheila Vaughan placed fourth in the long jump, with a jump of 5' 7 1/2" and Melanie Vaughan was sixth with a jump of 5' 2 1/2".

DeAnna Henry was fifth in the triple jump with 32' 10 1/2". She also won the high jump for the third straight year with a leap of 4' 10". Molly Winters was second after clearing 4' 8, and Stephenie Landrum was fourth with a jump of 4' 6.

At the end of the field events, DeLeon led the Eaglettes 32 to 30.

Cynthia Berry ran third in the 880 yard dash in 2:38.88. Renae Hill was fourth in the 880 in a time of 2:52.06.

Molly Winters was second in the 440 yard dash in 64.86. Melanie Vaughan was first in the 220 in 27.45. Angela Beavers was third in 28.41.

Stephenie Landrum won the 80 yard low hurdles in 11.38. Beverly Carothers ran sixth in the mile in 7:30.14.

The 880 Relay (Sheila and Melanie Vaughan, Angela Beavers, and Stephenie Landrum) ran second in the time of 1:54.96. The team championship came down to the mile relay with DeLeon leading the Eaglettes 95 to 91. The Eaglettes had to finish ahead of the Bear Kittens to insure themselves of a tie. Although the relay team of Cynthia Berry, Molly Winters, Stephenie Landrum and Melanie Vaughan ran their best time of the season (4:29.02), they ran third to first place Dublin and second place DeLeon.

# 17.8 Million In Food Stamp Program During Jan., 1979

The Food and Nutrition Service estimates that 17.8 million persons participated in the food stamp program in January of 1979. This is an increase of 1.7 million over the month of December 1978. According to the local office of the Texas State of Human Resources, approximately 60 families are receiving

food stamps in Mills County. The majority of the persons on assistance for food stamps in the county are over 60 years of age. The overall increase from December, nationwide, was because of the food price inflation. The program has been changed in that low income families do not have to

buy their food stamps. For instance, a family that formerly paid \$60 for \$100 worth of stamps, now received \$40 in stamps without charge. Studies have shown that many poor families did not receive food stamps in the past because they could not afford to buy them. The new program was designed to eliminate this problem.

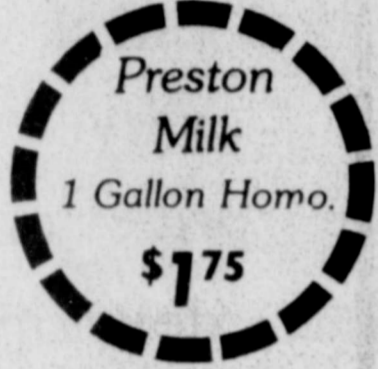

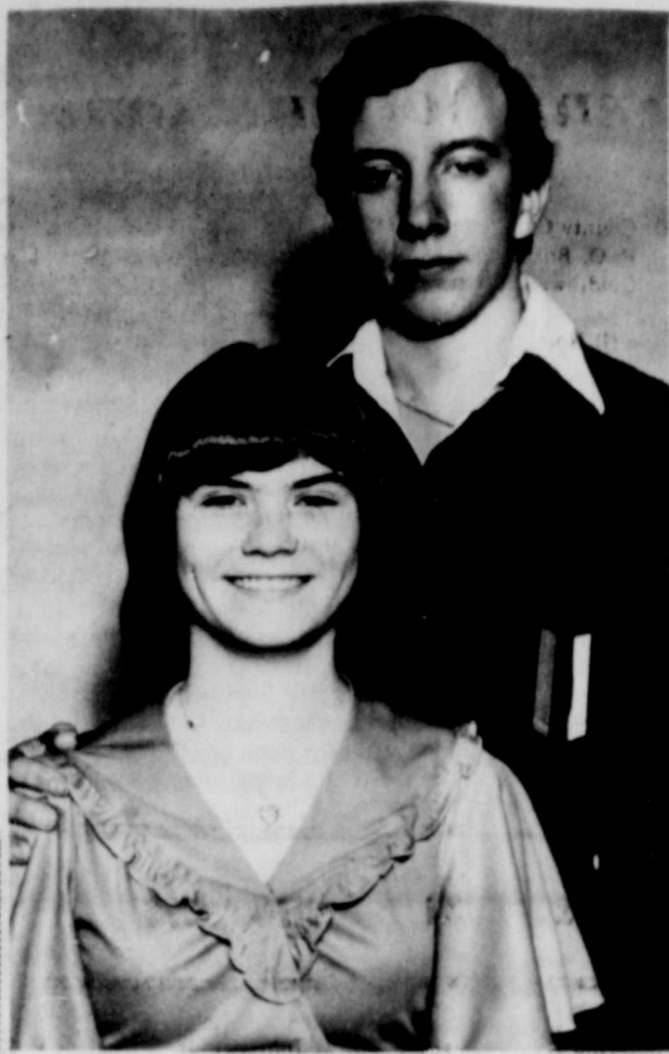

important during the first year. Although it is not a perfect grass, Kleingrass deserves consideration in any pasture program.

Kleingrass Selection - 75 is an excellent pasture orage. The warm-season perennial is readily grazed by livestock. A tall-growing bunch grass, Kleingrass is relatively drought tolerant. It has a long growth period, producing green forage from the last spring frost until the first frost in the fall.

Tests for digestibility and protein content indicate that Kleingrass maintains good quality throughout its growth cycle. This allows more flexibility in grazing management without hurting animal performance.

Kleingrass has been used in rangeland plantings following brush control and as a pure stand in improved pastures and has performed well in both instances.

Despite all its advantages, Kleingrass is not a "wonder" grass. "Swellhead" has been a problem in grazing sheep and goats - but thus far, no ill effects have been reported in cattle or horses.

Kleingrass is not a winter pasture forage. Green growth may occur around the base but not enough for grazing. Until the grass starts to grow again in the spring, standing dry forage may be grazed. However, a protein supplement should be fed, too.

Almost anyone can plant their own pastures since a Kleingrass stand is established from seed. However, seed are too small and slick to plant with a standard grain drill, so a small seed box designed to meter out the recommended two pounds of seed per acre is needed.

Establishment of Kleingrass is sometimes a problem because of the small seed and slow seedling growth. Because of its size, the seed should not be planted more than one-half inch deep. The seedbed should be firm and weed free. A packer wheel or roller should be used to compact the seedbed. Seed planted in loose, freshly-plowed seedbeds need exceptionally good moisture conditions to germinate.

Seedling growth is slow following germination. Weeds and other grasses severely compete for light, moisture and nutrients during the first growing season. Therefore, weed control is

## VA Payments Boost Mills Co. Economics

Recent statistics from the Veteran Affairs Commission, Austin, indicate that the economy of Mills County has received a significant boost as a result of Veterans Administration payments to veterans, their dependents and their survivors.

According to J. D. Robertson, Jr., Veterans County Service Officer for Mills County, VA payments for fiscal year 1978 totaled \$304,377.00. Of this amount, \$208,559.00 was paid in the form of compensation and pension; \$79,943.00 for readjustment and vocational rehabilitation; \$15,875.00 for insurance and indemnities; and None for direct loan. All of these amounts were paid

directly to the residents of Mills County.

The County Service Officer stated that in addition to materially adding to the economic health of the county, these benefits have alleviated many hardships for veterans and their families in time of need.

Mr. Robertson added that his office was ready to assist any county residents who believe that they have a claim for veterans benefits.

## ASCS News

Feed Grain deficiency payments are being issued to Mills County farmers who participated in the 1978 Set Aside Program. The feed grain deficiency payment rate is the amount that the target price exceeds the higher of (1) the national average market price received by farmers for the first 5 months of the marketing year, or (2) the national average loan rate for the crop involved.

Sixty-four producers will receive payments totaling approximately \$20,033.85. Only those producers who sign an intention to participate in the 1979 Set Aside Program will be eligible for deficiency payments or other program benefits next year. The deadline for signing an intention is April 30.

Around 250 Mills County wool producers are being mailed their share of approximately 100 thousand dollars incentive wool payments. Wool is recognized as an essential and strategic commodity not produced in sufficient quantity in the United States. An incentive price for wool encourages production. The support price for the 1978 marketing year is \$1.08 per pound. The national average for wool sold has been computed and farmers received 45% of net sales made and \$1.34 per hundredweight for unshorn lambs. Promotion Fund Deductions were made at the rate of 2.5 cents per pound for wool and 12.5 cents per hundredweight for unshorn lambs.

The mohair average received by growers exceeded the mohair price support level of \$1.647; therefore, there will be no 1978 mohair payments.

The Emergency Feed Program ends April 14. All feed receipts must be received in the ASCS Office by not later than May 14.
