

Goldthwaite School Board Sets Tax Equalization Group At Meet

The Goldthwaite Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session Monday night at the high school.

The Board of Equalization for the coming year was named and unanimously elected in. They are Sonny Robbins, Roth Robertson and Lloyd Daniel.

In other board matters the group set policies for bus use. School buses may be used for any school related activity. Students must be taken to the school and home again. Students must be brought to the school by the sponsor or by a parent, and so picked up after the activity by the sponsor or parent. This must be done personally by a parent.

The board accepted the bid for Kirbo's Office Machines for the service to all school machines for the 1979-80 school year.

The board approved the

school calendar for the next year and voted to pay school board elections judges the minimum wage per hour for their work.

The calendar reflects that school will begin on August 20, with the teachers scheduled for four days of

in-service work.

The actual first day of school will be August 27. The list included eight teacher in-service days and 17 regular holidays, and totaled the mandatory 175 days of classroom time.

Priddy Ag. Dept. Course May 21-24

A Farm Electric Wiring and Safety Short Course for adult farmers will be held May 21 - 24, under the sponsorship of the Priddy High School Vocational Agri-

culture Department, according to Mr. James Whitehead, Superintendent, and Mr. Melvin Eilers, Jr., teacher of vocational agriculture.

The short course is being sponsored by the Vocational Agriculture Department of Priddy High School.

Mr. Cleve Walkup, Farm Electrification Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Walkup holds a B.S. degree in Industrial Education and a M.Ed. degree in Agricultural Education.

The short course at Priddy is scheduled to begin May 21 at 7:30 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. Other

meetings in the series of four will be held May 22, 23, 24. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Walkup will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to the Vo-Ag teacher, Mr. Eilers.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should call or write the superintendent of schools, Mr. Whitehead, or the Vo-Ag teacher, Mr. Wilers. An entry fee of \$8 will be charged. Farm Electric Wiring and Safety Short Course certificates will be presented to each farmer who attends all the training sessions.

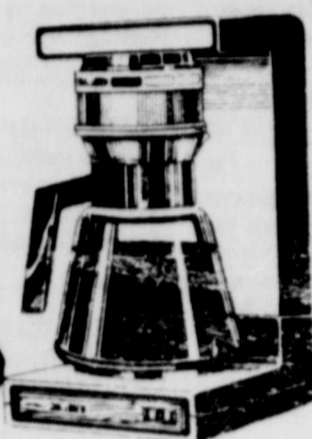

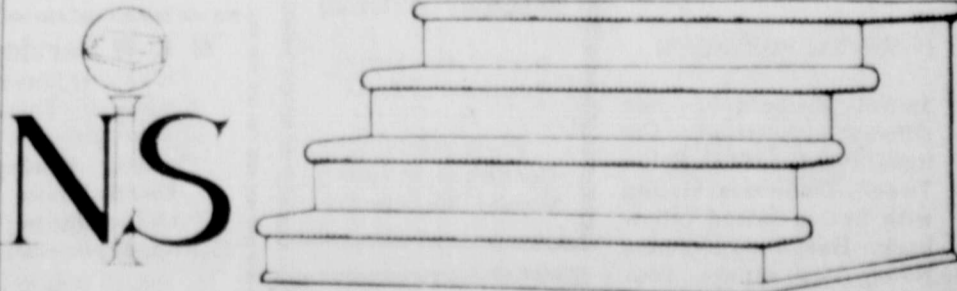

WHEAT, FEED GRAIN PROGRAM - Farmers in Mills County have indicated they plan to set aside or divert 726 acres of cropland.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service says Mills County producers intend to set aside 351 acres under the Wheat Program and 375 acres under the Feed Grain Program. They will receive payment for grazing, or cutting for hay, 77 acres of wheat, and for diverting an additional 3 acres of feed grain.

ASCS officials say program participation shows that many farmers want the benefits and price protection offered by the program.

Local program participants intend to plant and harvest 1755 acres of wheat and 3642

acres of feed grains. One hundred and twelve (112) Mills County farmers are participating in the program. Final figures will be available after producers certify their acreage later in the year.

EMERGENCY FEED PROGRAM - The Emergency Feed Program in Mills County ended April 14, 1979. You are reminded to turn in feed receipts at this office by the May 14th deadline. Feed must have been purchased and fed before April 14 to be considered for cost-share.

AERIAL SPRAYING OF SHRUBS - The sign-up continues for shrub control by aerial spraying. Deadline for signing a request is Friday, May 11. Spray must be applied between May 15 and July 1.

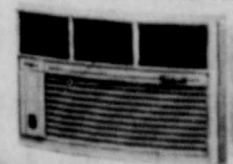

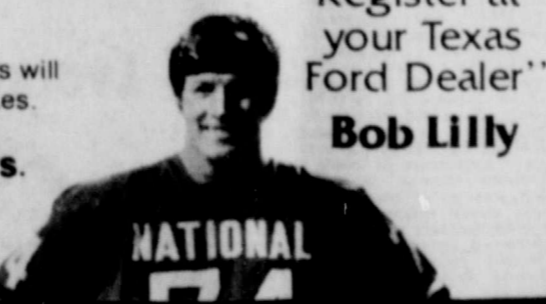


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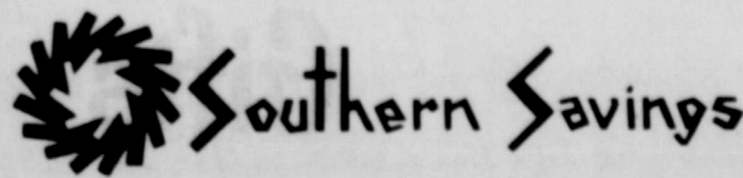

Plans were finalized for a trip to Granbury, also for a district luncheon and workshop for retired teachers to be held in Brownwood.

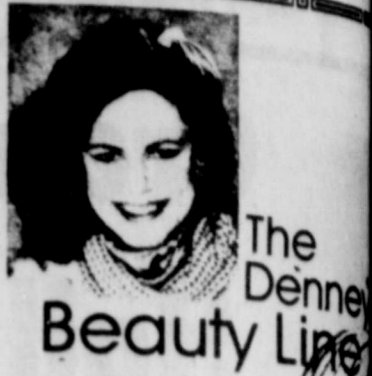
