County Horse Show June 9th

The annual Mills County Youth Horse Show will be held at the T. A. Head Arena in Goldthwaite on June 9, 1979. The event is sponsored by the Mills County Livestock Raiser's

Association and is open to any youth who are attending school in Mills County in grades 1-12.

Registration will begin at 9:00 a.m. and judging will begin at 9:30 a.m. A small

entry fee will be charged per class. Awards will include first place trophy in most classes, a champion showmanship trophy, and ribbon awards in all classes for places 1-6.

Rules for the events include: 1. All horses must be owned by the exhibitor or a member of his immediate family 60 days prior to show date. 2. Participants must be attending school in grades 1-12.

Classes will include filly colts under 2 yrs. of age, horse colts under 2 yrs. of age, mares, geldings, barrels, poles, western pleasure, reining, and showmanship.

W. W. Linkenhoger, 73, of 3512 40th St. in Lubbock, well-known in this area and a frequent visitor to San Saba, died Monday, May 28, at Cleburne where he was visiting in the home of a daughter.

Services were held at 2 p.m. May 30 in Broadway Church of Christ in Lubbock where he was a member and had served as a deacon since the early 1960's. Officiating the services were Dr. Joe Barnett, minister, and Horace Coffman, assistant minister.

Interment was May 31 in Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery, with Kenneth Beard, Church of Christ minister of Plano conducting the graveside services.

A native of Waco, Linkenhoger grew up in Goldthwaite and had resided in Lubbock since 1955 after moving there from Eastland. He married Kathryn Baxter, October 6, 1930 in San Saba. He was owner of a wholesale truck supply business.

Frankie Vann Golightly Funeral Conducted May 29

Frankie Vann Golightly, 80, popular newspaper columnist for 50 years, passed away at the Hamilton County General Hospital Sunday night, May 27, after a lingering illness.

The Rev. Ted Elmore and the Rev. Ike Tension were in charge of the funeral service in Riley Funeral Chapel, Hamilton, at 4 p.m. Tuesday, May 29. Burial was in the Wieser addition to the I.O.O.F. Cemetery.

Mrs. Golightly began her newspaper career as a reporter for the Hico News-Review in the 1920's. Out of the love in her heart for her fellowman, she also began to write a folksy column about the people in the community, a column that was continued in The Hamilton Herald News after she moved to Hamilton.

The column eventually assumed the name "Dink" and was expanded to include folksy bits about travel, real estate trade and postcard collecting. It always had something nice to say about someone in the community.

Mrs. Golightly wrote the column without pay, just as she performed many other services for the community purely from the love in her heart.

She was born in Mills County Dec. 6, 1898, and was the daughter of Lazarus J. and Hattie Shelton Vann. On Nov. 9, 1935, she was married to George B. Golightly who moved to Hamilton from Hico in 1928 and became a prominent new car dealer, banker and rancher. He is now retired.

Together, Mr. and Mrs. Golightly were among the leaders who founded the Hamilton County General Hospital and, together, they have contributed to many other Hamilton institutions and traditions.

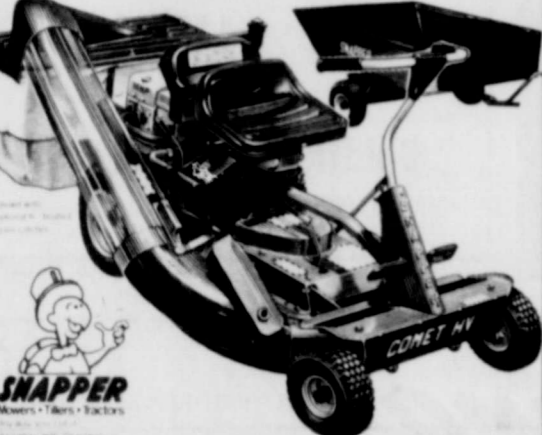

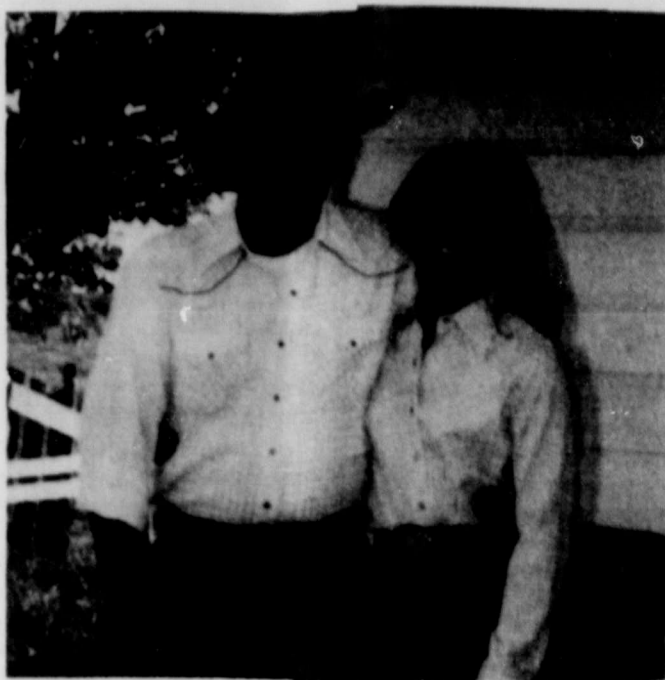

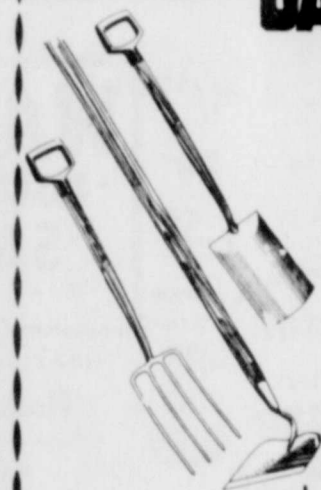
