## Census Bureau Will Conduct Survey Of Employment Information Here

Local representatives of the Bureau of the Census will conduct a survey of employment in this area during the work week of July 16-20, 1979. Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau's Regional Office in Dallas, announced today. The survey is conducted

for the U.S. Department of Labor in a scientifically designed sample of approximately 76,000 households throughout the United States. Employment and unemployment statistics based on results of this survey are used to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation.

For example, in May the survey indicated that of the 102.2 million men and women in the civilian labor force, 96.3 million were employed. The Nation's unemployment rate was 5.8 percent; it has been in the 5.7 to 5.9 percent range for the past 10 months.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept strictly confidential by law and the results are used only to compile statistical totals.

## Council Sets Wheels Moving For More Sr. Citizen Housing

The Goldthwaite City Council gave vocal approval to surveys being conducted were with the end in mind to secure Senior Citizens Housing at the regular July meeting last Thursday. Representatives from the Pecan Valley Economic Development District and the Central Texas Council of Government were present to map out plans for the 24 units.

Ed Koplan and Vicki Holcomb of the EDD and "Buzz" McKethan of COG talked to the council.

The surveys will consider employment, labor figures, and other items. No formal application will be undertaken until these steps are compiled and completed.

At the present time Mills County has 39% of its population over the age of 65. Only Hamilton County ranks above Mills County by a very small percentage.

Koplan pointed out to the Council that 47% of these over 65 live below Federal poverty standards. This level is \$1600 per year per person.

COG representative McKethan added that unemployment figures based on census statistics have been misleading and in error, according to factual information. McKethan said that under the census percentages only 18 people were unemployed.

The visitors stated that Mills County residents should be very careful and report all information when the next census is taken.

The Senior Citizen Housing applications will come through the Goldthwaite Housing Authority. Average cost of \$20,000 for each unit multiplied by 24 units would mean an actual total cost of \$480,000.

Councilmen discussed the Sewer Grant and Sewer Treatment Plant proposition with Tommy Vogt and Sammy Martin, with Rody & Associates, and were told that Step II, which is the specifications part of the project, is nearing completion and the actual bidding on the construction should be coming shortly. Rody & Associates of Ft. Worth is handling the engineering for the City of Goldthwaite.

Final reading of the Garbage Rate Increase Ordinance was passed unanimously by the Council and will be in effect with the August 20, 1979, billing.

Dr. M. A. Childress was appointed by Mayor J. D. Harper to a two-year term as City Health Officer. The appointment was approved unanimously.

The regular quarterly Treasurer's report was submitted by City Manager Dale Allen. The report is published in its entirety on Page 6 of this week's Eagle, and shows the total City financial structure.

CM Allen presented the statement of operations for the year. The City's fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30.

When the actual operations are compared with the budget, collections reflect 110.16% and disbursements 110.31%, showing that the City collected more than was budgeted and spent a like amount. The total 1978-79 budget was nearly \$776,000.

The regular monthly operations report was approved as presented showing total collections of \$55,891 and disbursements of \$92,670. The large difference comes about be-

cause a double power bill is paid to LCRA every June in order to close the City books for the fiscal year. The City will not pay a power bill in July.

#### CITY MANAGER MONTHLY REPORT

• City crews handled 70

connects and disconnects for utilities during June and completed 17 work tickets.

Plans are to seal-coat 45 blocks of City streets in July and August. Street repairs are partially paid out of Revenue Sharing Funds.

pressing official City thanks for concrete work done around the swimming pool.

Discussed irrigation and related items at the L. B. Burnham property. Mr. Burnham uses water from the Goldthwaite Sewer Treatment Plant for irrigation purposes.

## 1979 Football Season Begins August 9th

This is just a brief schedule of our tentative plans for physicals, two-day workouts & pre-season scrimmages. This will kind of give our players and their families an idea about our 1979 football season, which is just around the corner. It may aid with planning last minute vacations, or work scheduling with the players.

I would also like to remind each player that the fieldhouse is open from 10:00 a.m. till 10:00 p.m. each day for their use. I have been real pleased with the extra work most of our athletes have been doing this summer. Hard work often turns to good luck during the course of a season.

#### SCHEDULE

AUGUST 9 - 1:30 Physicals at Fieldhouse (all male athletes grades 6 thru 12 who plan to participate in any sport)

1. Athletes can buy

shoes and pick them up after physicals. Approximately \$15.00 per pair.

2. Athletes can buy off-season black Goldthwaite shorts and shirts if needed also. Shirts \$3.50, shorts \$4.50.

3. Insurance can be purchased at this time. School insurance only is \$8.00. 24-hour coverage is \$23.00. (NOTE: All athletes must have insurance before they can work out or be issued any equipment. Each athlete must have school insurance or a personal family policy that meets the requirements of the policy obtained thru the school. This policy is for the best interest of the athlete and the school.)

AUGUST 13 - 8:30 and 6:00 - First day of two-day workouts (shorts and shoes only) 9th grade thru 12th grade.

Workouts in shorts will be at 8:30 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. each day from August 13 thru August 16, 1979.

AUGUST 17 - 8:30 and

6:00 - First day of two-a-days in full pads (9th thru 12th grade). These workouts will continue at these times each day until August 23, 1979, except Sundays. Saturday workouts will be in the morning only at 8:30. No afternoon workouts on Saturdays.

AUGUST 23 - 8:30 workouts only. 6:00 Scrimmage, Eastland J.V. and Varsity at Eastland.

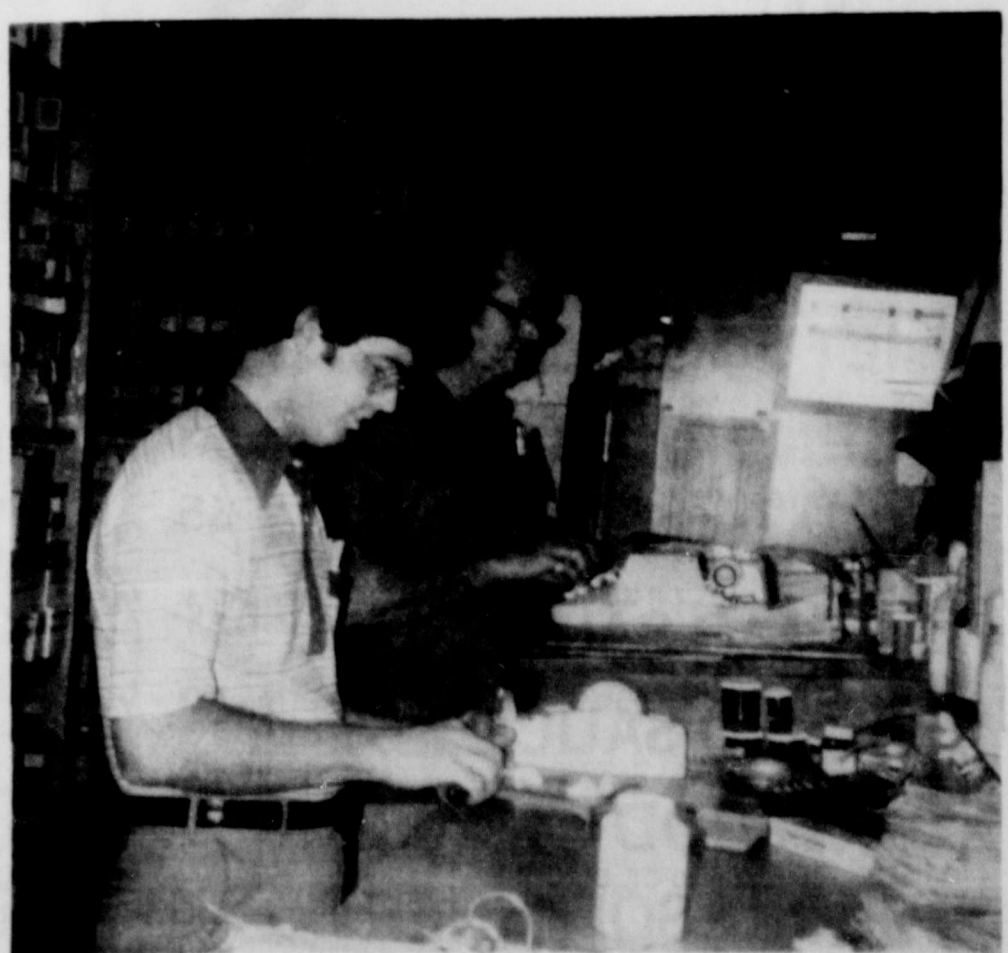
AUGUST 24 - 8:30 and 6:00 - Workouts continue till school starts.

AUGUST 28 - 7:30 Black and White Intersquad Game

AUGUST 30 or Sept. 1. Scrimmage will be set with Lometa here. Time and date are not yet definite.

NOTE: 6th - 7th and 8th graders will be issued equipment and start workouts on the first day of school.

All high school athletes must report for two-a-days or make special arrangements with me if they plan to play football. Positively NO EXCEPTIONS.

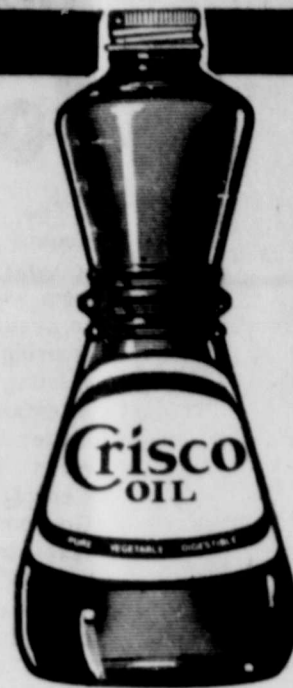

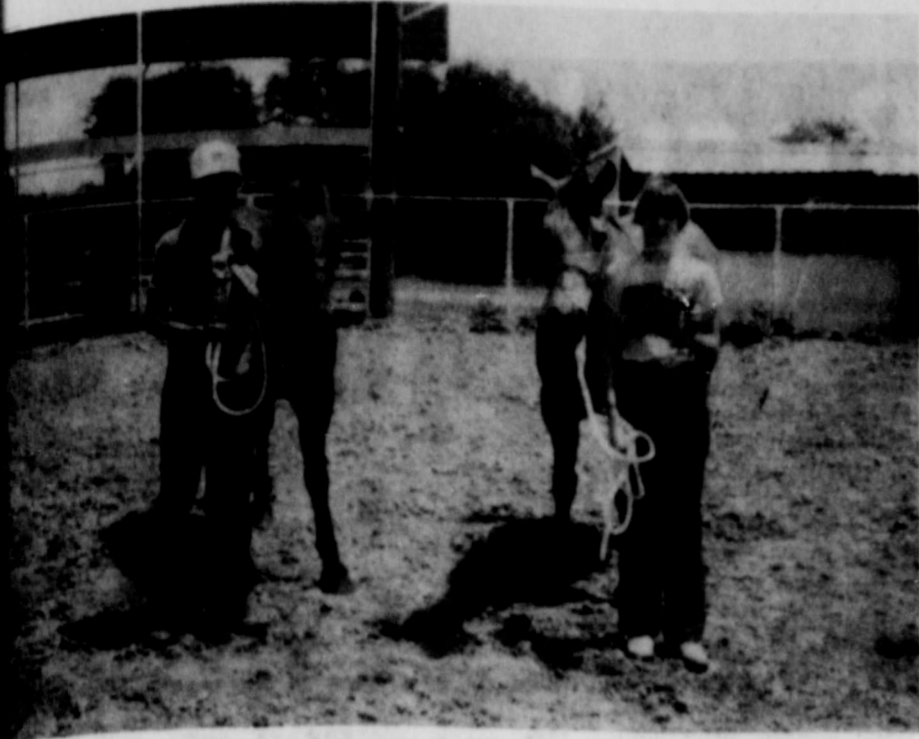

#### NEW FUNDING FOR SOCIAL SECURITY?

Everyone who pays Social Security taxes has been hard hit by recent increases in the tax rates. They dread the day when these rates will be increased even more — and there are already built-in increases in the law.

On the other hand, people who receive Social Security benefits are worried about not getting all the benefits which the present law promises. They are worried there will not be enough money in the Social Security trust fund to cover all their benefits.

There is no question that the financial problems of Social Security must be dealt with. One proposed solution is the imposition of a Value Added Tax (VAT).

Simply put, a VAT is a multi-stage levy based on the value which is added in each stage of production and distribution. In other words, as iron ore becomes steel then becomes an automobile, a tax would be added at each stage on the increased value of the original iron ore.

Interest in a VAT is increasing. Both Senator Russell Long, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Congressman Al Ullman, Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, have expressed an interest in examining the feasibility of a VAT in financing Social Security.

As this tax would add to the final cost of a product,

it is a regressive tax. But the Social Security tax, as now constituted, is a regressive tax. Also by adding to the cost of a product, a VAT would thus add to the cost of living. But if Social Security taxes could be held down or possibly reduced even slightly, it would give workers more take-home pay. The workers could then determine what they want to buy and thus have a little more personal control over their earnings.

In addition, it has been suggested that the amount paid by an individual through VAT could be computed much like the amount paid in state sales tax is now computed for deduction from income taxes.

There are arguments against the tax. Some feel, as this is a hidden tax, people will not realize how much in taxes they are paying. Also because it is a hidden tax, government might find it too easy to increase the rates. There are those who argue, and with good reason, that to give certain lawmakers a new tax then they will surely find new ways to spend the money.

It is assumed that certain items would be exempt from a VAT. Some of the nations exclude medicine, or at least prescription drugs. Knowing the history of similar taxes in this country, there would be strong support to exempt food. Certain other necessities might be exempt.

Assumptions based on limited exemptions indicate that at 1977 income levels, VAT has the potential of raising \$9.5 billion for each percentage point of the tax. By its very nature, the tax would increase with increases in the Gross National Product.

These points are presented to stimulate your thinking. There will be increased talk about a VAT later in the year as the Congressional committees begin investigating the tax in detail. I look forward to these hearings, for it is obvious we must do something about Social Security taxes.

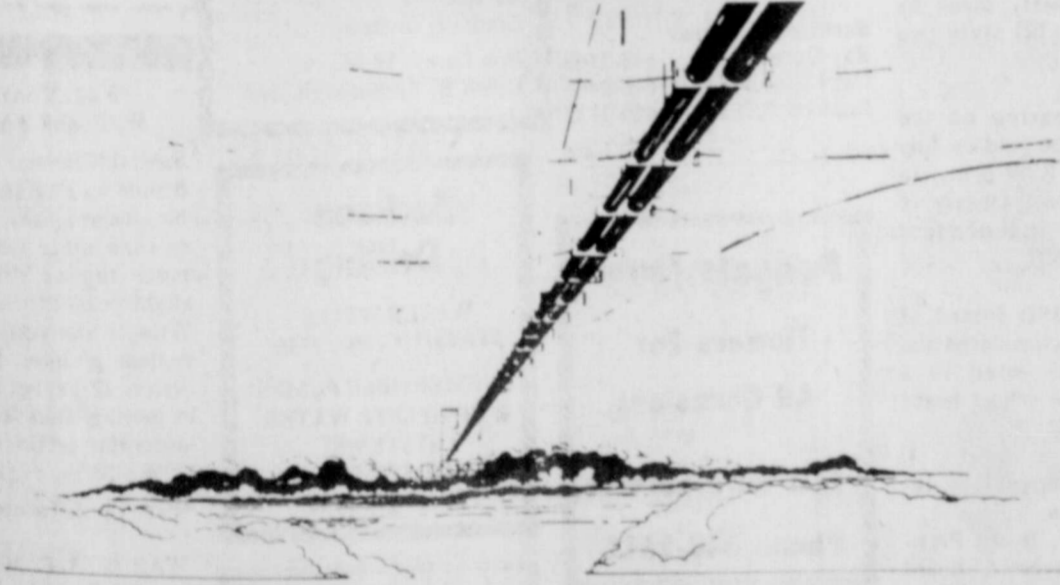

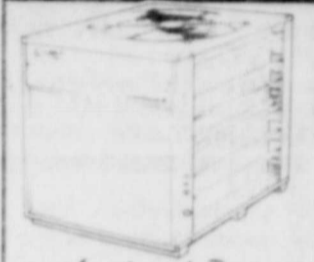

## The Moline Menace

Something of value... A great deal of attention was given to the tour of the beautiful art treasures of King Tut. But of all the Pharaohs of early Egypt my favorite has always been Amenhotep IV. He really didn't want to be Pharaoh, he just wanted to be happy. He was burdened by the Hittites (Syrians) and other distant peoples balking at sending in their contributions. It was Ramesses II later, who straightened them out, and restored Egypt to great power.

Amenhotep was not a warrior king. He wrote beautiful poetry, much about nature and the sun. He was a family man with seven daughters. Yet he was the greatest of them all! He defied the priests with their hundreds of gods, moved them to another city and declared there is only one God. It was the sun, but if you read into his poems, it is clear that he believed in God, and the sun - the giver of life - was an instrument of the divine. He changed his name to Ikhnaton, Keeper of this God's Supreme Rights.

In those days, about 1375 B.C., all art and wall paintings had to be fashioned in the old standard cartooning. A figure was made according to exacting rules.

Amenhotep caused a statue to be formed, of himself. He defied the old standards and commanded that it was to be fashioned as he really appeared. The artists had no choice. To defy the Pharaoh was to lose one's head rather quickly in those times. A number of statues were made. He was sculptured in one instance with his wife upon his knees, in another kissing her in a chariot. Some historian referred to him as a "gloomy fanatic." We can discredit this fool at once. Gloomy fanatics never make happily married husbands!

His wife was the exquisite Nefertiti, whose bust I am sure you have seen for it is printed in thousands of books. She is the one with the small pretty face contrasted by the ever widening cylindrical crown. It is in the Berlin museum, and this bust almost caused a war. Von Schlemann, the archaeologist, covered it with a larger plaster roughly hand-done copy of something, and smuggled it out of Egypt. Germany and Egypt nearly went to it over this.

I admire Tut's personal possessions surely, but Amenhotep gave us something greater. There is a lesson in this bit of history. Not only was he the first in the world to state there is only one God, but when he had those statues made, he reached through thousands of years of time to tell us something. He was saying, "Tell it like it is!"

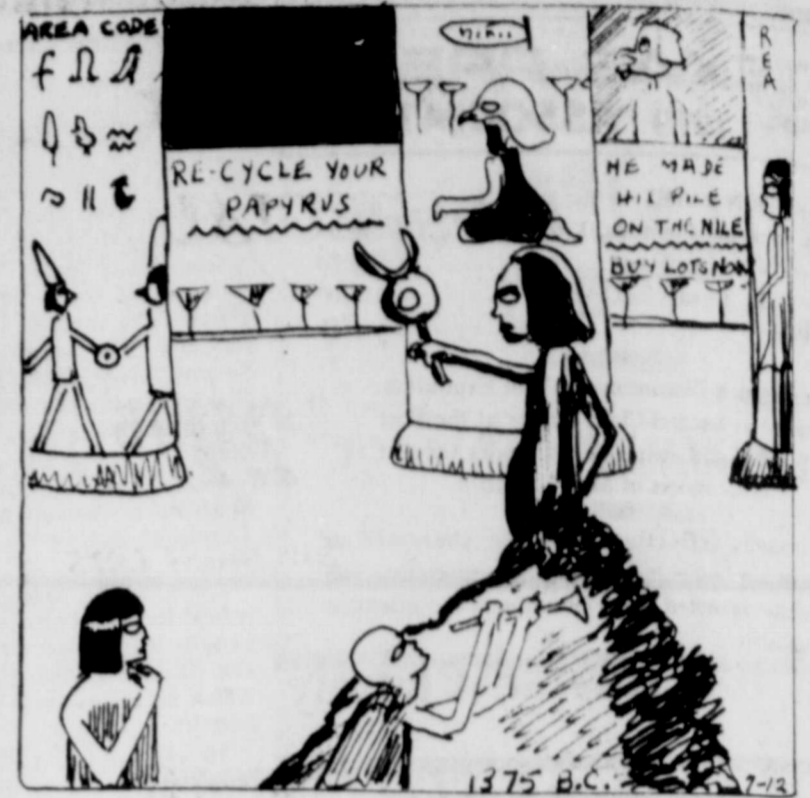

## Extension Highlights

Stockmen might want to consider buying hay now, during harvesting, rather than take their chances later in the year.

A number of uncertainties must be evaluated when deciding to buy hay for winter supplement; namely, hay and pasture growing conditions the rest of the

year, quantity of hay on hand, number of livestock, and the severity and length of the coming winter.

Evaluate your livestock's winter forage requirements, and compare the cost of buying now and storing until the feeding season against the anticipated hay cost during the feeding season.

Statistics have proven that the average hay price is

generally lower during the May-July period than waiting to buy hay in the following January or February.

So, on the average, it's best to buy high quality forage during the harvest season. By doing this, transportation costs may also be less since hay may be obtained near where it will be stored.

Teenagers can "think" food and "plan" fun during the summer to shape up.

**"THINK" FOOD**

"Think" milk group foods and choose to make milk shakes with plain or non-fat milk, vanilla flavoring, a little sugar and lots of ice instead of eating a banana split piled high with scoops of ice cream.

Remember, a malted milk contains approximately 500 calories and a regular milk shake contains 400 calories - a glass of fruit juice contains about 100 calories.

"Think" meat group foods - and make hamburgers from lean ground meat instead of using ground meat with more fat. Broil meats instead of frying them.

"Think" fruit - and - vegetable group foods -- and use less butter or margarine on baked potatoes. Use less fat in seasoning vegetables, and less salad dressing on salads.

Choose fruit juice with lots of ice as a quick refresher instead of a frosted punch; or, eat a plain apple rather than a slice of apple pie.

"Think" bread and cereal group foods -- and eat a plain roll instead of a sweet roll, use less butter on bread, and eat no more than four slices of bread per day.

Drink tea without sugar or add only a teaspoon of sugar to sweeten it.

**"PLAN" ACTIVITIES**

Choosing activities that burn up more calories will help in losing weight.

Walking at a normal speed uses 1.8 calories per minute, compared with brisk walking that requires about 3.5 calories, while hard swimming uses 8.7 calories per minute.

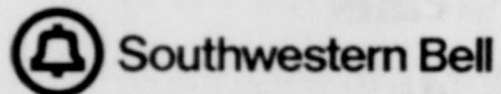

## Farm Bureau Newsletter

Truck Strike Causes Texas Losses - The truckers' strike continues to cause severe problems for Texas farmers and ranchers. The San Antonio winter garden is one of the hardest hit areas.

Frio County FB president, Filemon Ornelas, says that the harvest of melons, potatoes, and other crops is nearing the critical point and up to 75% of the perishable crops could be ruined before next week.

Knox County FB president, Larry Smith, reports that they "are desperate for refrigerated trucks," and are not finding any. They could immediately lose up

to 125 acres of potatoes.

According to Joe Van DeWalle, Sr., of Van DeWalle Farms, Inc., San Antonio, harvesting of potatoes, cabbage and carrots is "still being held up because we can't find any trucks," and, trucks that are still hauling the produce are charging rates that make shipments to some parts of the country impossible. He has already abandoned 100 acres of potatoes as a total loss.

After several weeks of extended debate on H.R. 2444, the bill creating a separate Department of Education, it now appears that the final vote in the U.S.
