### GOVERNMENT LIGHT.

HISTORIC CHICKAMAUGA PARK ABLAZE WITH ILLUMINATION.

United States System of Lighting Millitary Post Pronounced Gratifyingly Successful-Six and One-Half Miles of Mains-Sixty-Five Street Lights.

Chickamauga Park Ga., May 31 .years died Thursday on Mountain The United States government has here in operation one of the largest acetylene gas plants in the world. The military post at the entrance of the historthirty thousand Union and Confederate soldiers were lost in the memorable battle of Sept. 19 and 20, 1863, contains about one hundred buildings, the seventy-five principal ones of which are lighted with acetylene. To accomplish this six and one-half miles of mains and two miles of service pipes are in use, while sixty-five street Denison and carried a load of cotton lamps brilliantly illuminate the ave-

In 1903 the War Department in stalled a test acetylene plant at Fort Meyer, Virginia. Shoemakers Once Were Well Paid. Thirty years ago, when all shoes were made by hand, the shoemaker earned a fair salary of from \$12 to \$16 per week. Every shoe shop had from five to ten shoemakers working. Shoes and boots cost from \$8 to \$15 and they received much more repairing than do the shoes of to-day. Now girls are working in the factories and hundreds of good shoemakers are look

ing for something to eat. Over half of the shoemakers who formerly worked in the shops are working at other lines of business, and making more money. A journeyman cobbler seldom makes nore than \$8 or \$9 per week.

One may wonder why it is that the cobbler nearly always finds a mean, dirty hole to crawl into and to call it a repair shop. The fact is, he cannot afford to pay much rent. In the average shoe shop in the good seasons -spring and summer-he can do \$4 worth of repairing a day, and not more than \$6 if he works in the night time. Four dollars per day and six days a week make \$24 per week.

Are the Packers Receiving Fair Play? When the Garfield report on the business methods of the packers appeared, after eight months' investigation, it was severely criticised and roundly denounced. After three months of publicity it is significant that those who attempted to discredit it have failed to controvert the figures contained in that exhaustive document. The public is beginning to notice this omission, and the feeling is rapidly growing that the sensational charges out of which the "Beef Investigation" arose were without foundation. If the official statements of the report are susceptible of contradiction, a good many people are now asking why the facts and figures are

not furnished to contradict them. The truth seems to be that most of the charges contain unfounded sensational assertions. A flagrant example of this appeared in a recent article in an Eastern magazine, to the effect that "forty lowa banks were forced to close their doors in 1903-4 by the Beef Trust's manipulation of cattle prices." Chief Cierk Cox, of the banking department of the Iowa State Auditor's office, has tabulated the list of banks given in the magazine article and has publicly denounced the statement as utterly untrue. He gives separately the reasons for each failure mentioned and officially states that they have been caused by unwise speculations and by reckless banking methods. it may be well to suspend judgment upon the packers until the charges against them are proved.

heir financial and moral support angered the teamsters, and they lost no time in calling upon the representatives of the building trades and demanding to know what they meant by going back on the teamsters in the thick of the fight. It was made plain to the teamsters that in the opinion of the trades they had overstepped their jurisdiction in causing members of their union to do constructive work. The particular ·ause of complaint was that teamsters employed in handling safes and vaults had placed them in buildings. This part of the work the building trades contended belongs to them. President Shea of the Teamsters' union, declared that he would order out every safe mover and machinery rigger in the city and stop work on all buildings where the members of the building trades are employed. No attention was paid to this threat by the building trades representatives and finally a committee, composed of Michael Casey of San rancisco; John Sheridan, of Chicago, and Ed Gould of New York, all members of the executive council of the teamsters, was appointed to confer with the building trades over the matter of jurisdiction. No time was specified for the meeting.

Several new efforts were made during the day to settle the strike, but none of them amounted to anything. The Chicago Team Owners' Association made another effort to induce the teamsters to arbitrate the question of delivering goods to boycotted houses. The Chicago Masons and Builders' Association offered its services to arbitrate all things connected with the strike.

#### LIVES WITH BROKEN NECK. Muskogee Boy Walks But Cannot Di-

rect His Steps. Muskogee, I. T., May 30.-Although he broke his neck, Ray Valliuette, 13 years old, of this city, still lives to tell the story of the accident. The location of Haichow, China which Germany was reported to have occupied, is shown on the map. It lies about 200 miles southeast of Kiaochau and has an extensive bay and important shipping facilities. From Kiaochau Germany has built a railway inland to I-chau, tapping vast coal fields, and another road connecting with Haichow could easily be constructed. Kiaochau was occupied in November, 1897, and now is held by Germany on a nine-nine-year lease. Region of Vladivostok And The Peninsular Suffer.

CHINESE ORDERS ARE IGNORED.

Tokio, May 29.-It is rumored here the Japanese and Russian fleets under Vice Admiral Togo and Vice Admiral Rojestvensky have engaged in the Korean straits.

St. Petersburg.-The Russky Slovo, of Moscow, prints a dispatch from Vladivostok which indicates that the inhabitants of the whole maritime region of eastern Siberia, including the island of Sakhalien and the Kamchatka peninsula, are facing starvation on account of the situation pro duced by the war. Word has been brought from Vladivostok from Okhotsk, Eastern Siberia, that the fish supply of Sakhalin was exhausted last winter and that the inhabitants ate their dogs. There is no flour on the island, and the people are confronted with death by starvation. A similar situation exists at Kamchatka, where the people are practically left to their fate. No work is going on in the Amur districts, beggars are roaming about everywhere, and the Orochans, a Siberian tribe, who live on the shores of the gulf of Tartar, are dying of starvation

The dispatch concludes: 'Should the war continue six months longer, starvation will be universal in all this remote region." St. Petersburg.-News of a success

DEATH CLAIMS FAMOUS WOMAL

Eventful Career of Mrs. Mary Liver

Mrs. Mary Ashton Livermore, famous as an abolitionist, a temperance suffrage, died May 23 at her home in Melrose, Mass. Bronchitis, complicated with an affection of the heart, caused her demise. The body will be cremated and the ashes placed in the family tomb in Wyoming cemetery at

Mrs. Livermore's maiden name was Rice. She was born in Boston, Dec. 19, 1821. She was graduated from the public schools and subsequently from a female seminary at Charlestown, where for a time she was a teacher of Latin, Greek and French. She was but a mere girl when she went South to take charge of a school in Virginia, and it was there she became familiar with the barbarities of slavery. After three years she returned to Boston, and began on abolitionist propaganda. In 1845 she was married to Prof. Daniel P. Livermore, a Unitarian clergyman, and in 1857 the couple moved to

Mrs. Livermore became conspicuous in Chicago in working for the poor and suffe and also she distinguished herself in connection with the sanitary co sion to procure supplies for the Union army. Mrs. Livermore next identified herself with the suffrage movement, and was the first president of the Illinois Woman Suffrage asociation. established the Agitator, which she edited, and later moved to Boston to assume charge of the Woman's Journal. For years she had been famous as a lecturer and writer. She had been a widow since July 5, 1899.



## EXCITEMENT PREVAILS

Russians Are Almost Wild by Report of Naval Victory.

### NEWSBOYS ARE KEPT HUSTLING.

At Warsaw Jewish Disturbances Continue-Eight Persons Have Already Been Killed and 100 Wounded-Nineteen Seriously.

St. Petersburg, May 27.-An admiral of high rank said to the Associated Press this afternoon:

We have known for some time that Rojestvensky would not attempt to pass through the straits of For mosa, where the waters are shallow and could easily be mined ahead of his ships. Rojestvensky will undoubtedly keep far out to sea in order to avoid torpedo attacks. A wide detour will also make it harder for the Japanese scouts to communicate with Togo. The evening papers have got out extras to the report of Rojestvensky's victory and the newsboys are crying the tidings on the Nevski Prospect and were almost mobbed by the people in their eagerness to learn the de-

Warsaw. - The disturbances continued all day and were still in progress late tonight. Eight persons have already been killed and 100 wounded, 19 seriously. The damage to prop erty has been considerable. There has been no pilage, but the destruction of the furniture in the various houses has been absolute.

The mob armed with axes, smashed the doors and windows and brought the furniture out on the streets, where they broke it into small pieces. The owners of the furniture, in attempt ing to defend their belongings, were attacked, beaten, and even killed. Knives and revolvers were used free ly and many persons were terribly in-

The authorities took no steps to prevent the riots until tonight, when the Cossacks fired on the crowds at two different places, wounding four persons.

The correspondent of the Associat ed Press spent several hours in the disturbed district, but did not see single active policeman. During the day patrols occasionally appeared, but they witnessed the proceedings merely as spectators.

The character of the disturbances is unprecedented. The whole affair is a conflict between the respectable Jewish socialist classes and the disreputable Jewish element. There are conflicting stories as to the origin of the trouble. One report is to the ef fect that the respectable Jews, tiring of the members of their race called keepers of disorderly houses, thieves and usurers and other opprobious names, resolved, as the police were receiving bribes for protecting disre putable houses and persons, to take the matter into their own hands. An other report has it that Jewish roughs in the guise of members of the Bund, were levying blackmail upon shor keepers, thus enraging the socialists In any case the socialists seemingly determined on a crusade against the undesirable persons of their own race with the result that crowds of men ruining the disreputable houses.

### AGGRESSIVE MOVE MADE

Chicago, May 29.-What is regarded as an aggressive move in the efforts of Chicago's municipal vote to obtain a legal decision as to the holdings of the street companies was made today when quo warranto proceedings seeking to learn by what authority the Chicago City Railway and the Traction Company continue in their use of the streets were begun in the superior court in the name of

the state's attorney. The petition for the judicial inquiry alleged that the companies have exceeded their franchise rights by a substitution of electricity for horsepower as originally granted, and have thereby forfeited their claim to the use of the streets.

The petition was presented to Judge Chytraus, and he ruled the defendants to answer June 5.



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
