DEMANDS WERE REFUSED CHICAGO FREIGHT HANDLERS

Chicago, Sept. 14.-Demands of the members of the Freight Handlers' Union, of Chicago, for an increase of 10 per cent in wages or an arbitration of their demands and the demand for a conference was refused. The general managers of the twentytwo railroads centering in Chicago notified President P. J. Flannery, of the union, that negotiations were end

The news of the refusal of the gen eral managers to grant the increase in wages and the declination to hold a conference was received angrily by the men. They immediately arrang ed to call a series of mass meetings to consider the action of the roads.

At the meeting of the railway offcials there was little discussion as to what the action of the railroads should be. The meeting lasted only a few moments, and before adjournment the officials of the railroads had pledged themselves not to deal individually with any committee of the freight handlers. It developed after the meetings that the general freight agents had communicated with the freight handlers as individual employes, and informed each of them that the railroads were paying the highest wages it was possible to pay. Couple at Braman, Oklahoma can be repaired. Rescuing parties Burned to Death.

Mrs. Outlaw arose about 6 o'clock and started the fire to cook break-Not knowing that there were live coals in the stove, she picked up the two gallon can of oil and poured some of it onto the kindling. Instantly flames shot up from the stove and an explosion resulted, which threw burning oil over the whole of the woman's body and over the kitch-

Enveloped in flames and screaming with pain, Mrs. Outlaw ran from the kitchen into the bedroom, where her husband lay. He had been awakened by the explosion, but before he could arise his wife had thrown herself upon the bed in an effort to smother the pondent adds that no Armenian firms

Outlaw attempted to assist by body, but the flesh was already burn- Gordi, fifty miles from Triflis. ing and the flames destroyed the quilt. The bedding had caught fire by this time and Outlaw himself was in flames.

Both then ran again into the kitchen, where Mrs. Outlaw stumbled and fell. Her husband was unable to assist her, as the kitchen was on fire and his own hair and clothing in flames. He managed to make his own way outside, where he fell down unconscious from pain.

While this horrible scene was being enacted a brother of the unfortunate woman, who with a friend slept in one of the front rooms of the house, had come to the rescue. They were up at the sound of the explosion, but by the time they reached the kitchen Mrs. Outlaw was already beyond

They threw water on the flames in the kitchen and when the smoke had cleared away sufficiently so that her blackened body could be seen attempted to pick her up. The flesh fell from her body at their touch, although she was still fully conscious.

A physician was immediately summoned and he did everything in his power to relieve the awful suffering of the woman. An examination of her husband's injuries developed that he. too, was burned severely. He lingered until 1 o'clock in the afternoon, when he died.

RIOTS STILL CONTINUE Calumet

Situation Steadily Growing Worse In Baku District.

INCENDIARIES

Soldiers Fired Into Crowd of Work men - Seventeen Persons Killed -Landed Proprietor Assassinated at Gordi-Oil Situation.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 13.-The lat est private telegrams to be received from Baku report that the situation

there is growing worse. Other uninformed dispatches assert that the rioters are stubbornly continuing their attacks and that the tartars and Kurds are plundering in "black town" district. The dispatches say that on Sunday the soldiers fired into a crowd of Russian workmen, killing seventeen. A dispatch to the Caucasus Oil Company from Baku says that the fires in the oil district are practically exhausted and that the military authorities are stationing guards in the district.

During the night, the dispatch says, incendiaries tried to land at Biebieat from small boats, but were driven off by volleys from the Cossacks. They then attacked steamers in which the employes of two oil companies had taken refuge during the uprising, but the attack was repulsed. The incendiaries succeeded in setting fire to three machine shops in the Uolshkin district, killing the proprietor of one. In the "black town" district the patrol fired a volley into a crowd of Russian workmen, from which a shot was supposed to have been fired, but the dispatch to the Caucasus Oil Company states that no one was killed Throughout the "black town" district the patrols are acting energetically in suppressing the disorders.

WHIPPING IS LEGAL.

Corporal Punishment Is Not Barrea in Kansas Schools.

Topeka, Kan., Sept. 13.-State Superintendent of Schools Dayhoff has defined what sort of corporal punishment can be legally administered to a pupil of the public schools by a "Any corporal punishment," says he

in an opinion handed down, "such as the use of a rubber hose, a paddle or a switch is legal; also the slapping with the open hand on the cheek or any fleshy part of the body not over any vital organ. No teacher has the right to use any punishment that will leave marks on the pupils for days. Boxing the ears, pulling the ears, twisting the nose, pulling the hair or the use of a ruler on the palm of the hand is prohibited."

The state superintendent deemed a decision on this question necessary. Some of the teachers of the state have been extremely brutal in the past They would resort to almost any kind of punishment to conquer a pupil. While no permanent injury has ever been reported. frequently teachers have been arrested for assault and battery.

"The forms of punishment that are legal will do just as much to bring a pupil to time as the severer punishments," said the superintendent. Then why go beyond the limit? believe a school board is justified in discharging a teacher who administers brutal punishment to a child. provision covering that point should be covered in the teacher's contract."


