THE TAX REFORM bill of 1986 continues to make the news. As we have stated before, we are always a little skeptical when the politicians start promising us a better deal.

As President Reagan said in a recent speech, the ten most feared words in the English language continue to be: "I'm from the government and I'm here to help you."

For example, the tax proposal as being considered by the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives would do away with many deductions for those taxpayers who go the deduction route on their tax returns.

Some of the deductions which are getting the ax include interest on car payments, credit card payments and other non-home loans. The sales tax deduction also would be pitched out.

At a time when the nation's automotive industry is hurting, we're somewhat surprised that congress has decided to eliminate interest on car payments as a deductible item on our income tax reports.

Perhaps they thought that people would continue to buy new cars, whether or not the interest was deductible. However, we would still like to go back to the original point, where congress promised to make taxes more fair to those in the middle-class bracket.

When the two houses of congress first tackled the tax problem a few months ago, a few politicians made the news by stating that they were going to be adamant in seeing that the middle-class taxpayer was protected by the tax changes.

That sounded good to their constituents on the evening news, but in reality, virtually everything that has been done in regard to changing the tax structure has once again set up a bigger burden for the large, middle-class section of taxpayers.

In spite of the fact that congress is warned that every time they change the tax situation, they end up making it harder on the segment of the population that is providing 90 per cent of the tax revenues for the 40 per cent of our population that is on some sort of government program, they just continue to stack it on the taxpayers.

In Monday's edition of *USA Today*, the newspapers' financial specialists did a study of the new tax program for five American families, showing what they had paid in taxes in 1986, and what they would pay in 1987, under the proposed changes.

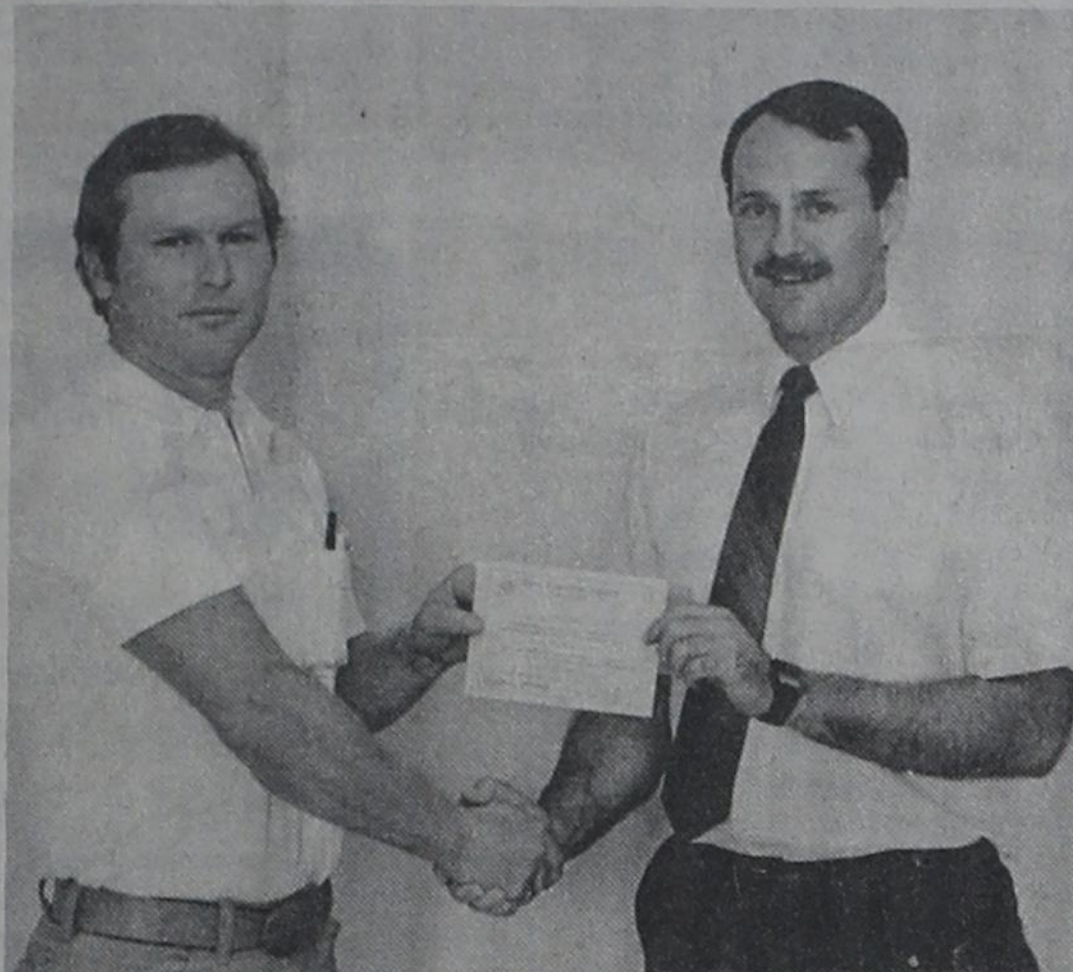
Four of the five families surveyed would pay more taxes for their 1986 income, given the loss of deductions and various other changes.

Of those surveyed, two were individuals, one was a family of four, one was a married couple and another was a retired couple. Only one of the single women would benefit from the tax overhaul.

The couple would see their taxes go up over seven per cent, mostly due to the loss of deductions of interest on credit card purchases. This is another area that will hit taxpayers a big blow.

The family of four would see their taxes increase 10.9 per cent the first year; a single engineer would see his taxes go up a whopping 23.1 per cent for the first year. The retired couple would see their taxes go up 7.7 per cent, as they will lose a deduction on a "passive investment" which was supposed to help them through retirement.

The only taxpayer surveyed by the article who would save money is the one who is making the least amount of money. The others surveyed have had a little money to "work with," or perhaps invest, in previous years. But not in the future.

Car Located, But Suspect Not Found

The Parmer County Sheriff's office continued this week to search for Rene Garcia, 22, after the car he had stolen was found burned in Louisiana.

Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan said that Louisiana officers found the car in Livingston Parish, which is near Baton Rouge.

"After we explained the circumstances to the Louisiana officers, they went back out and double-checked the vehicle to make sure there were no human remains in the car. There were none," Morgan said.

Garcia is being sought in connection with the shooting death of Christi Sotelo, 25, early the morning of August 3 west of Bovina. Garcia also allegedly shot Tonya Parkinson, 23, who has been released from the Clovis High Plains Hospital.

Missing since the shooting is 18-year-old Ida Sotelo, who was reportedly taken at gunpoint by Garcia following the shooting spree.

The Sotelos live just outside of Muleshoe. Miss Parkinson is a close family friend.

Valuations Dropped 20 Per Cent

The Parmer County Appraisal Review Board announced an economic adjustment for all homeowners, rural improvements and small retail businesses, following the conclusion of their interviews this week.

The adjustment will amount to approximately 20 per cent, and applies countywide on all the property referred to, whether or not the property owners met with the board.

The board interviewed approximately 250 taxpayers during the board hearings, which required the better part of three weeks.

Chief Appraiser Ron Procter said that his office is now in the process of making the recommended changes, and then would be working on the effective tax rate.

Everyone is urged to come out and watch the boys in their scrimmage, and also to enjoy a good meal.

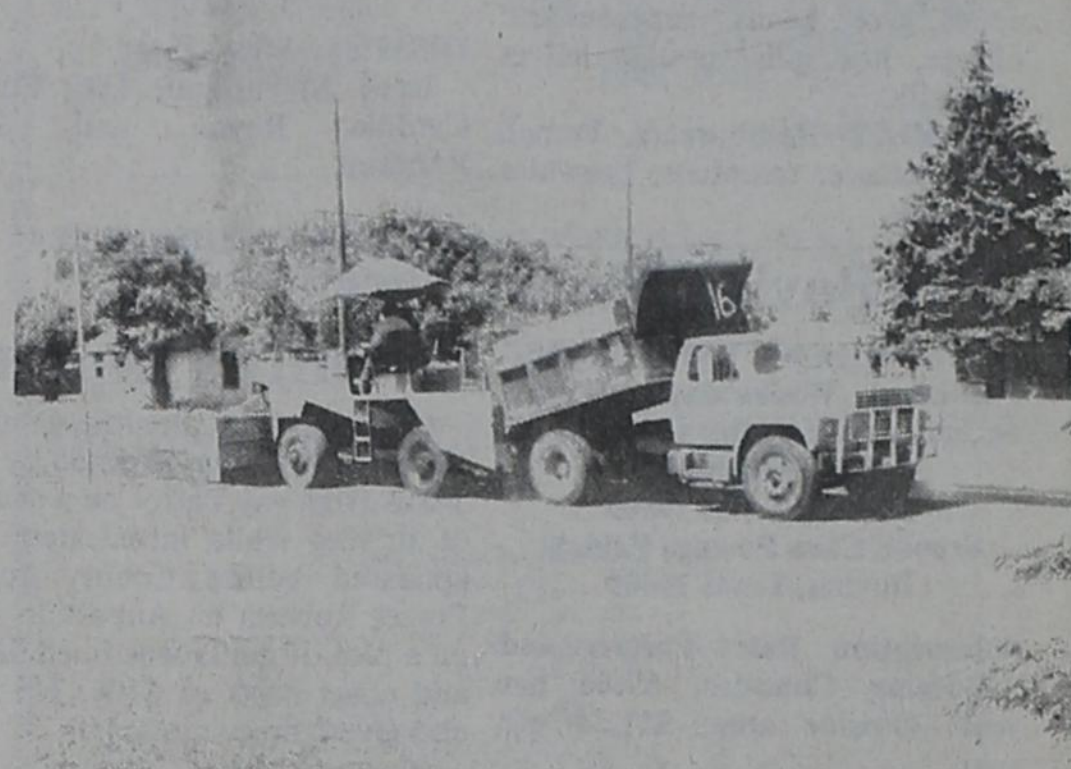

3. Diagnosis and treatment of high blood pressure in males or females under age 65

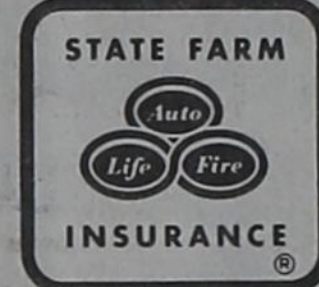
