WILD ANIMALS NEARLY EXTINET

Co'orado the Only Preserve Left, and

Game Grows Scarce There. Among the distinct purposes of the annual meeting of the National Association of Game and Fish wardens and commissioners, held at St. Paul recently, were: Elimination of politics from the department in each state; uniform laws for the protection of game and the propagation of fish, says he Denver Post.

Calorado is considered the most important state in the Union so far as the preservation of game is concerned. Big game in all Middle West and in the Northwest is becoming exlinct. Some is still preserved in the mountain fastness of this state. Sportsmen, both in and out of office, regard Colorado as the battle ground for the enactment and enforcement of laws that will curb the wholesale laughter of the distinctly American wild animals.

Colorado is the only state where the elk still survives in his native haunts where there is practically a closed season. The statute permits the kiliing of this animal between November 1 and 5, but even this provision is suspended until 1907. At the next session of the legislature it is probable that the time for enforcement of the provision will be still further extended, so that the closed season for elk will be made permanent.



The bill to prohibit gambling in the territories resulted in a sharp clash petween Delegate Mark Smith of Arisona and Mr. Littlefield of Maine, Stating that in Arizona and New

Mexico and other territories gambling s licensed Mr Littlefield (Maine) enered a motion to suspend the rules and pass a bill reported by the judiciary committee making gambling in he territories illegal. The bill makes gambling a misdemeanor nunishable by a \$3,000 fine and one year's imprisonment. The bill classifies gambling as faro, monte, roulette, la squenet rouge et noire, rondo, tan, fan tan, poker, seven and a half, twenty-one, chuck a luck or any banking or percentage game, or any other kind of a game played with cards or dice.

Vigorous opposition was made by Delegate Mark Smith (Ariz.). "I do not wish it understood that I am here in sympathy with gambling," he began, "but I do protest against the gentleman from Maine, the furthermost point from my home, to coming here to meddle in our quarrels when, with prohibition in his own state there are 150 saloons open in the town of Bangor, Maine. It is a prohibition that don't prohibit. I submit the gentleman should confine his philanthrophies to his own state instead of spreading out over the southwest."

He declared that there was no pure motive behind the bill; that it was for the purpose of influencing votes in Arizona for joint statehood. Mr. Smith contended that the territory would prohibit gambling at its next session. He said he would ask unanimous consent to amend the bill so as to make it apply to "Territory under the jurisdiction of the United States.' He said this would include Alaska, the Philippines, Porto Rico, the District of Columbia and all other territories.

Tuesday. February 20. Washington.-The senate committee on territories met to resume consideration of the Curtis bill, which has passed the house, providing for the winding up of the affairs of the Five Civilized Tribes in Indian Territory. ORCHARD . WITH . BOTH . SIDES DURING COLORADO STRIKE.

NOW FACES SERIOUS CHARGE

The Day Before the Independence Depot Explosion He Collected Some Life Insurance Money Due Him Because of the Death of a Relative.

Denver, Colo., Feb. 22.-The Times says: "Harry Orchard, who is under arrest in Idaho charged with assassinating former Gov. Steunen berg, and who has made a confession charging the leaders of the Western Federation of Miners with instigating a number of dynamite outrages and murders, was in the employ of the Cripple Creek Mine Owners Association as a detective during the strike in the Cripple Creek district. This most important fact will be used in the defense of the accused labor leaders when they are brought to trial in the courts of Idaho.

"The following facts have come to the Times from a most reliable source and have been varified:

"Orchard was a member of the Western Federation of Miners and employed in the Cripple Creek district when the famous strike was ordered. In November, 1903, he approached a conductor named Jones on the Florence and Cripple Creek railroad and introduced himself as a brother mason. 'I am a member of the Miners union,' said Orchard, 'and last night I heard some of the members of the union planning to wreck a train on this road. I do not believe in such methods and thought I would come and tell you and tell of the plot. I picked you out because you are a mason."

"Jones immediately took Orchard to Scott and Sterling, the detectives for the Mine Owners Association. He repeated his story and Scott and Sterling immediately employed him for a detective, to work for the Mine Owners Association. He was instructed to attend the meetings daily and re-

"Orchard continued his employ of the Mine Owners Association until June, 1904.

"The day before the explosion which wrecked the Independence depot he collected some life insurance due him because of the death of a relative.

"Then came the explosion at the Independence depot on June 6, and Orchard disappeared. A mob took possession of Cripple Creek and Victor, and attempts were made to force confessions from many suspected parties. A young man was suspended by his thumbs and he finally agreed to tell the name of the flend who had caused the explosion. When he was lowered to the ground he said: 'Harry Orchard did it.'

"The pursuit of Orchard was taken up, bloodhounds being employed. Orchard and a companion named Neville immediately after the Independence explosion secured a rig and drove out of Cripple Creek. They went across the country, avoiding the more important towns. When they reached Greeley they disposed of their rig and took a train for Cheyenne, where Orchard received a considerable sum of money from friends in Colorado and disappeared. He returned to Denver last April and visited the headquarters of the Western Federation of Miners in this city. He said that he feared arrest because of the charges made against him in connection with the Independence explosion and had therefore changed his name to Hogan. For a time he worked for various insurance companies in this city, and last August left Colorado, saying he was going to New York. The next heard of him be had been arrested in Idaho charged with the assassination of Steunenberg.

"Neville was arrested in Wyoming and taken back to Cripple Creek, but no serious attempt was ever made to prosecute him. Sheriff Bell of Crip-Creek claims that Neville confessed to him that he and Orchard dynamited the depot. It is said that Neville is now dead. This latter statement the Times has been un-



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
