New York, June 23.—A conversation at the Waldorf-Astoria in which Senator Bailey of Texas participated a few evenings ago, has occasioned a great deal of comment among the persons involved and those to whom they have related it.

Mr. Bailey, who had made a flying trip to New York, was seated at a table at the Waldorf with some friends, when several persons prominent in corporation affairs came up. Some of them were officials of the Standard Oil Company. The gentlemen at Mr. Bailey's table were acquainted with them and introduced them to the Senator.

They sat down and the conversation naturally turned on the recent events at Washington, the determination there to make things unpleasant for corporations and in particular the passage of the railway rate bill with the stringent amendments added in the Senate.

Mr. Bailey didn't say much at this stage of the conversation. He listened to the Standard Oil men, who gradually became stronger in their expressions. They complained bitterly at the disposition manifested

in Washington to make things unpleasant for them and sharply attacked the rate bill and the Senate amendments. Finally Mr. Bailey, who had been listening patiently, struck into the conversation in an emphatic and menacing tone.

"You gentlemen who run these corporations," he said, "must obey the law. If you had obeyed it in the first place you would not have this new legislation to complain of. All of your properties are held by virtue of the popular respect for law and yet you are the very men who are doing most by your acts to break down this respect for law."

"Every time Congress passes a law you violate it. You have violated every law we have given you. We gave you the interstate commerce act; you violated that. Then we gave you the Sherman anti-trust law; you violated that. Then we gave you the Elkins law and you violated that. Now we give you a new one. If you violate that we will give you another that will have iron teeth."

A pause followed this declaration of Senator Bailey and after a while one of the corporation officials present asked, "What do you mean, Senator, by a law with iron teeth?"

"I mean a law that will send every one of you to the penitentiary," Senator Bailey answered.

The ownership of competing corporations by the same hands can not go on. This Pennsylvania Railroad combination is one that will have to be broken up and it will be.

Afterward in speaking to others on the same subject Senator Bailey said: "These corporation officials who violate the law that Congress enacts are doing more to create anarchists and Socialists than all the propaganda these people can put in operation from now until doomsday."

in Austin, and in return received 3,000,000 acres of land in Texas.

Mrs. Babcock avers that her husband was given one-eighth interest in these holdings whereas he should have received one-fourth.

Since it came into possession of the property, the company has disposed of 1,357,000 acres, for which it received \$2,800,000. Subsequently a ranching company was formed, and it is alleged that this syndicate not only took all of the profits in payment for the risk of managing the enterprise, but that it conducted a ranch in Montana from which the Farwells reaped all of the profits.

At the time the 3,000,000 acres of Texas land was turned over to the investment company it is alleged that it was worth only \$2.50 an acre, but in spite of this fact it was put in at an approximate value of \$12,000,000.

Mrs. Babcock alleges that sales of the land which have been made since the company came into possession of the property have been made at an approximate loss of

\$3,000,000.

The petition asks that the transactions of the company for the past two decades be gone over by the court, and that the charges of sharp practices, by which she claims her rightful share be investigated.

California's Fruit Crop. Information resulting from careful inquiry concerning the present prospects of the California fruit crop is to the effect that the recent convulsion will not diminish its value by a single dollar. The only considerable locality where fruit was the leading commercial interest was in the Santa Clara valley, where the property losses were large, but fruit suffered no injury whatever.

City's Good Investment. Father Knickerbocker has been very successful with all his real estate ventures, but never more so than in the case of Central Park. Less than half a century ago the present Central Park was a waste of rocks and swamps.

In Cleveland a man who was convicted of having four wives was fined \$50 and was sentenced to prison for 90 days. Perhaps the judge thought that the four had punished him enough already.

THE RAILROAD RATE BILL

Synopsis of the Important Provisions of the New Law.

The Term Common Carriers Includes Railroads, Express Companies, Sleeping Car Companies and Pipe Lines—Passes May Be Issued to Railroad Employees—Authority of Commission to Fix Rates.

Washington.—The following is a synopsis of the important sections of the railroad rate bill.

Section one makes the law apply to corporations or persons engaged in the transportation of oil or other commodities, except water, by pipe line, to those engaged in transportation of passengers or property by railroad or partly by railroad and partly by water, between states.

"Common Carriers" Defined. The term "common carrier" is described as follows:

The term "common carrier," as used in this act, shall include express companies and sleeping car companies. The term "railroad," as used in this act, shall include all bridges and ferries used or operated in connection with any railroad, and also all the road in use by any corporation operating a railroad, whether owned or operated under a contract, agreement or lease, and shall also include all switches, spurs, tracks, and terminal facilities of every kind used or necessary in the transportation of the persons or property designated herein.

All charges made for any service rendered or to be rendered in the transportation of passengers or property as aforesaid, or in connection therewith, shall be just and reasonable; and every unjust and unreasonable charge for such service or any part thereof is prohibited and declared to be unlawful.

What Passes May Be Issued. The section relative to the issuing of railway passes is as follows:

A. No carrier subject to the provisions of this act shall hereafter, directly or indirectly, issue or give any interstate free ticket, free pass or free transportation for passengers, except to its officers, agents, employees, surgeons, physicians, actual and bona fide attorneys, and members of their immediate families; to ministers of religion, local and traveling preachers of Young Men's Christian associations, inmates of hospitals and charitable and educational institutions; to indigent, destitute and homeless persons, and to such persons when transported by charitable societies or hospitals, and the necessary agents employed in such transportation; to inmates of the national homes or state homes for disabled volunteer soldiers and of soldiers' and sailors' homes, including those about to enter and those returning home after discharge, under arrangements with boards of managers, and female nurses that served during the civil war; to ex-union soldiers and sailors and ex-confederate soldiers; and to owners and caretakers of livestock when traveling with such stock or when going to point of shipment or returning from point of delivery.

Exceptions to the Rule. Provided, that this provision shall not be construed to prohibit the interchange of passes for the officers, agents and employees of carriers, and members of their immediate families, nor to prohibit any carrier from carrying passengers free with the object of providing relief in cases of general epidemic, pestilence or other calamitous visitations, nor prevent such carrier from giving free or reduced transportation to laborers transported to any place for the purpose of supplying any demand for labor at such place.

Cannot Own Coal Mines. All common carriers are prohibited from transporting from one state to another any article manufactured, mined or produced by the carrier or under its authority, and owned wholly or in part by the carrier; except that pipe lines operated by oil companies may transport their own commodities as well as those offered for transportation by competitors.

Section 2 amends section 6 of the present law so as to make it obligatory on the part of carriers to file with the commission and keep open to the public schedules showing all rates, fares and charges between different points on its own route and points on other routes, when a through rate is made, and no change should be made in these rates without giving 30 days notice of change. It also provides for the filing of all contracts and agreements between different lines.

Faults Are Provided. The penalties provided for violation of these rates are as follows: That section 1 of the act entitled "An act to further regulate commerce with foreign nations and among the states," approved February 19, 1905, be amended so as to read as follows:

Girl Zionists. A Zionist society of young girls has been organized in Brooklyn, N. Y.

and publish the tariffs or rates and charges as required by said acts, or strictly to observe such tariffs until changed according to law, shall be a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof the corporation offending shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$20,000 for each offense, and it shall be unlawful for any person, persons or corporation to offer, grant or give, or to solicit, accept or receive any rebate, concession or discrimination in respect to the transportation of any property in interstate or foreign commerce by any common carrier subject to said act to regulate commerce and the acts amendatory thereto whereby any such property shall by any device whatever be transported at a less rate than that named in the tariffs published and filed by such carrier, as is required by said act to regulate commerce and the acts amendatory thereto, or whereby any other advantage is given or discrimination is practiced.

Every person or corporation who shall offer, grant or give, or solicit, accept, or receive any such rebates, concession, or discrimination shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$2,000; provided, that any person, or any officer or director of any corporation subject to the provisions of this act, or the act to regulate commerce and the acts amendatory thereto, or any receiver, trustee, lessee, agent or person acting for or employed by any such corporation, who shall be convicted as aforesaid, shall, in addition to the fine herein provided for, be liable to imprisonment in the penitentiary for a term of not exceeding two years, or both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court.

Authorized to Fix Rates. Section 15 authorizes the interstate commerce commission to fix rates as follows: Sec. 15. That section 15 of said act be amended so as to read as follows: "Sec. 15. That the commission is authorized and empowered, and it shall be its duty, whenever, after full hearing upon a complaint made as provided in section 13 of this act, or upon complaint of any common carrier, it shall be of the opinion that any of the rates, or charges whatsoever, demanded, charged, or collected by any common carrier or carriers, subject to the provisions of this act, for the transportation of persons or property as defined in the first section of this act, or that any regulations or practices whatsoever of such carrier or carriers affecting such rates, are unjust or unreasonable, or unjustly discriminatory, or otherwise prejudicial, or otherwise in violation of any of the provisions of this act, to determine and prescribe what will be the just and reasonable rate or rates, charge or charges, to be thereafter observed in such case as the maximum to be charged; and what regulation or practice in respect to such transportation is just, fair and reasonable, and to be thereafter followed; and to make an order that the carrier shall cease and desist from such violation, to the extent to which the commission find the same to exist, and shall not thereafter publish, demand, or collect any rate or charge for such transportation in excess of the maximum rate or charge so prescribed, unless the same shall be suspended or modified or set aside by the commission, or be suspended or set aside by a court of competent jurisdiction."

Any person, corporation, or company who shall deliver property for interstate transportation to any common carrier, subject to the provisions of this act, or for whom any such carrier, or consignor or consignee, any such carrier shall transport property from one state, territory, or district of the United States to any other state, territory or district of the United States or foreign country, who shall knowingly and willfully, by employee, agent, officer or otherwise, directly or indirectly, by or through any means or device whatsoever, receive or accept from such common carrier any sum of money, or any other valuable consideration, as a rebate or offset against the regular charges for transportation of such property, as fixed by this act, shall be deemed guilty of a fraud, which is hereby declared to be a misdemeanor, and, shall, upon conviction thereof in any court of the United States of competent jurisdiction within the district where such offense was committed, in addition to the penalties provided by this act, be subjected to a fine equal to three times the sum of money so received or accepted, and three times the value of any other consideration so received or accepted, to be ascertained by the trial court; and in the trial for such offense, all such rebates or other considerations so received or accepted for a period of six years prior to the commencement of the action shall be considered as if the said fine shall be three times the total amount of money received or accepted, or three times the total value of such considerations so received or accepted, as the case may be; provided, that the foregoing penalties shall not apply to rebates or considerations received prior to the passage and approval of this act.

Orders of the Commission. Any carrier, any officer, representative, or agent of a carrier, or any receiver, trustee, lessee, or assignee of the carrier, who knowingly fails or neglects to obey any order made under the provisions of section 15 of this act, shall forfeit to the United States the sum of \$5,000 for each offense. Every distinct violation shall be a separate offense, and in case of a continuing violation each day shall be deemed a separate offense.

Provision for Court Review. The court review provision of the bill is as follows: If any carrier fails or neglects to obey any order of the commission, other than for the payment of money, while the same is in effect, any party injured thereby, or the commission in its own name, may apply to the circuit court in the district where such carrier has its principal operating office, or in which the violation or disobedience of such order shall happen, for an injunction and restraining order, which shall be by petition, which shall state the substance of the order and the respect in which the carrier has failed to obey it, and shall be served upon the carrier in such manner as the court may direct, and the court shall prosecute such inquiries and make such investigations, through such means as it shall deem best, to determine the facts of the case, and upon the hearing of such petition, if upon such hearing as the court may determine to be necessary, it appears that the order was lawfully made and duly served, and that the carrier is in disobedience of the same, the court shall enforce obedience to such order by a writ of injunction, or other proper process, mandatory or otherwise, to restrain such carrier, its officers, agents or representatives, from further disobedience of such order, or to enforce upon it, or them, obedience to the same; and in the enforcement of such process the court shall have those powers ordinarily exercised by it in compelling obedience to its writs of mandamus.

From any action upon such petition on appeal shall lie by either party to the supreme court of the United States, and in such court the case shall have priority in hearing and determination over all other causes except criminal cases, but such appeal shall not vacate or suspend the order applied for from.

The so-called Allison provision provides that all cases for the setting of a rate as made by the commission should be brought in the district where the carrier against whom such order of requirement may have been made has its principal office.

Other provisions of the bill provide that the commission shall be empowered to require annual reports from all common carriers, and providing that such reports shall be of the following character: giving the commission at all times access to the books of common carriers, heavy penalties are enjoined for false entries in accounts. A fine of \$5,000 or imprisonment for a term of two years, or both, is decreed for any examiner who shall wrongfully divulge information acquired through examinations of accounts. Circuit and district courts are to have jurisdiction to issue writs of mandamus compelling common carriers to obey the orders of the commission. Bills of lading are to be issued by any common carrier accepting goods for transportation, making railroad companies liable for loss or damage done in transit over their or any other line. The commission is empowered to employ special agents or examiners with full powers.
