This is the basis for our assertion that the richest part of the plains is that of the south plains country adjacent to Miami and around Pampa.

More Panhandle grown wheat is marketed in Miami than anywhere else in the Panhandle. More binders were sold to farmers in one day in Miami than were probably sold in Amarillo the whole season, and we feel sure the number sold in Miami during the season is greater than that sold in any other town in the Panhandle proper.

Miami has a flour mill, the machinery just being installed. Also a grain elevator just completed. Save Amarillo no other place in the picture have such.

Probably the largest vineyard in the Panhandle is that of Judge Carter's one and a half miles from Miami, fifteen hundred thirty vines, coming into bearing three years ago and making three crops. Yield heavy and the fruit large and well flavored.

An apple tree with forty bushels of fruit on it is not a bad sample of what the soil here will produce in fruit. There has been several loads

\$60 worth of Irish potatoes from three-fourths of an acre besides what he reserved for home use. There are many fields of alfalfa and the crop flourishes. Alfalfa and hogs is engaging the attention of many of our prosperous stock-farmers.

Three steam and two gasoline plowing outfits operate in the country adjacent to Miami, slice the sod from the fertile prairie ten and twelve feet at a swath. A larger line of farming implements is carried in Miami than in most places in the Panhandle even much larger. This shows the business men have confidence in this section as a farming country.

Miami has a press brick plant. Arrangements have just been made to install electric lights. Miami has the most substantial stone and brick business buildings of any place its size in the Panhandle. And also many pretty homes.

Several yards in Miami evidence how well flowers do here, and show a rank growth of shade trees. Miami is a city of churches. The Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterian have neat church edifices here. The Christians have an organization but no house of worship yet.

Not another public school in the Panhandle surpasses that of Miami. The wells in Miami are from 40 to 100 feet deep and on the plains about 300 feet. The water is cool, clear, soft, and free from organic matter and the supply inexhaustible. Recently more thought has been given to raising good horses and mules and it is quite a change over old conditions to see the fine two and four horse teams of horses and mules that line the street.

Miami is situated in the valley of Red Deer Creek. Either side north or south from the railway depot 2 1/2 miles will bring you to the perfectly level rich plains lands. The crop yields on this land have been quoted by real estate men all over the Panhandle as "yields in the Panhandle" which was true only as it applied to this particular section.

All of the plains land of the Panhandle is good, but being favored with just a little better seasons and the soil just a little richer the crop yields of this section are usually a little heavier.

Hot Time Promised. Dallas, Texas, Aug. 4.—W. B. Moses, of Fairfield, Texas, member of the Democratic State executive committee, who was in Dallas today, said he expected the convention of the party to be held here on Aug. 14 to be one of the most exciting in years.

"The prospects for a very hot fight are excellent," he said. "In fact, there seems to be nothing which can prevent a struggle which will be remembered for years to come."

"We are going to have great trouble with the ballots for State officers. It will require at least 24 hours to compute the result of each ballot and maybe longer. There is no telling when the convention will adjourn. The convention auditors are going to have an awful time."

Per Capita Apportionment. At a meeting of the State board of education on Wednesday of last week at Austin a per capita apportionment of \$5 was declared, for scholastic year beginning Sept. 1, 1906 and ending Aug. 31, 1907. This apportionment is for 870,513 children of scholastic age in the state and aggregates \$4,352,575. It exceeds total amount apportioned last year by \$159,351. The apportionment this year is 25 cents per capita less than last year, which is due to the fact that the last legislature increased the scholastic age, fixing it at seven to seventeen years, while before it was eight to seventeen. This has added 100,000 children to the scholastic population of the state.

Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture says that Uncle Sam's hens lay 15,600,000,000 dozen eggs in a year. By the census reports poultry and eggs comprise 16.3 per cent of the total animal products of the United States. Exclusive of the eggs and poultry used by owners of hens, eggs sold annually bring \$225,000,000 to poultry raisers. Poultry sold annually amounts to \$150,000,000.—Ex.

EMIGRANT STEAMER SANK.

The Italian Ship Sirio Went Down off Hornigans Islands and 300 Persons Were Drowned.

Carratena, Spain.—A terrible marine disaster occurred Saturday evening off Cape Palos. The Italian steamship Sirio, from Genoa for Barcelona, Gadh, Montevideo and Buenos Ayres, with about 300 persons on board was wrecked off Hornigans island.

Three hundred emigrants, most of them Italians and Spaniards, were drowned.

The captain of the steamer committed suicide.

The bishop of San Pedro Brazil, also was lost and it is reported that another bishop is among the missing.

The remainder of the passengers and the officers and crew got away in the ship's boats and were rescued by means of boats sent to them from the shore.

A number of fishermen who made attempts at rescue were drowned. These rescued from the vessel were Sunday night at Cape Palos in a pitiable condition, being without food or clothing.

The Sirio struck a rocky reef, known as Bajo Hornigans and sank soon after stern first. Hornigans island lies about two and a half miles to the eastward of Cape Palos.

RUSH TO GOLD FIELDS.

Rich Deposits in Thousands of Acres of Placer Claims Reported in Douglas Creek District.

Cheyenne, Wyo.—Thousands of acres of placer claims in the Douglas Creek district, the mineral deposits of which are estimated by experts to be worth from \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000, will be opened as the result of a report received here by Frank Bevins from David T. Day, chief of the division of the United States geological survey.

Samples, the poorest which could be found in the center of the placer field, were sent, and his assay has just been received showing the dirt runs \$780.10 to the ton in gold, 39 per cent of magnetic iron and 54 per cent of hematite, making these among the richest placer mines in the country. The sands also carry platinum, upon which Mr. Day made no report. There are thousands of acres of these lands and every foot is being taken up.

REAR ADMIRAL TRAIN DEAD.

He Was Commander-in-Chief of the Asiatic Fleet—Would Have Retired Next Year.

Chefoo, China.—Rear Admiral Charles J. Train, commander-in-chief of the United States Asiatic fleet, died at 10 minutes past 9 Saturday morning of uremia.

Washington, D. C.—As commander-in-chief of the Asiatic station the important duty of maintaining strict neutrality in Philippine waters during the Russian-Japanese war devolved upon Admiral Train. He was 61 years old and would have retired from active service in May of next year. During his service of almost a score of years at sea he served on many stations. During the Spanish war he commanded the auxiliary cruiser Prairie in the North Atlantic patrol squadron and he had been a rear admiral since 1904.

Increasing Cable Capacity.

Washington, D. C.—The signal corps headquarters in this city has been advised that the cable duplexing apparatus sent to Seattle for use on the Alaskan cable has been a complete success. As soon as the cable-sheath Burnside completes its work laying cables between the forts, defending the entrance to Puget Sound, which probably will be in about a week, it will go to Alaska and install duplexing equipment at the Alaskan end, thus giving the Alaskan cable, which is now overtaxed, twice the capacity it has at present.

Postmasters May Go.

Washington, D. C.—A leave of absence for not exceeding ten days has been granted to postmasters of second and third class offices by Acting Postmaster General Hitchcock, to enable them to attend the convention of the National Association of Postmasters of second and third class offices to be held in Detroit on August 23, 24 and 25.

Indians Join the Navy.

Washington, D. C.—Among the recent recruits for the navy have been a number of young Indians who were educated at the Carlisle Indian school in Pennsylvania. Edward M. Ell's, a grandson of Red Cloud, the famous Sioux chief, is one of these. He is a petty officer.

Condition of Cotton Crop.

Washington, D. C.—A statement at noon Friday by the crop estimating board of the department of agriculture, shows the average condition of cotton on July 25 to be 82.5.

Osteopath's Association Meets.

Put-in-Bay, Ohio.—The tenth annual convention of the American Osteopathic association was opened here Monday with 600 members present. The association voted not to receive the graduates from the Los Angeles College of Osteopathy into membership.

Killed a Chief Gendarme.

Warsaw, Poland.—Gen. Markgrafsky, chief of the Warsaw gendarmarie, was shot and killed near here at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

Mayor Rose's Case Docketed.

Washington, D. C.—A case of notable interest was docketed in the supreme court of the United States Monday. It was that of W. W. Rose of Kansas City, Kan., against the state of Kansas on a writ of error from the supreme court.

Gov. Cummins to Speak at Tulsa.

Tulsa, I. T.—Governor Cummins of Iowa, has accepted an invitation to deliver an address at the labor day celebration in Tulsa September 3.

TWELVE INCHES OF RAIN.

Southern Part of Texas Flooded and Much Damage Results. Colorado River from Four to Six Miles Wide and People Are Driven from Home.

St. Louis, Mo.—A special to the Post-Dispatch from Fort Worth, Tex., says: Twenty-five people are known to have been drowned, hundreds were rendered homeless and \$500,000 worth of property was destroyed as the result of a flood in South Texas Tuesday when the Colorado river was forced out of its banks by heavy rains.

The rush of water came without warning and inhabitants at San Angelo and Ballinger were forced to flee for safety in their night clothes. An entire family at Ballinger named Cook were drowned as they attempted to leave their homes on an improvised raft which struck an obstruction. The Colorado river is from 4 to 6 miles wide in some places and the tributaries south are out of their banks. Two thousand cattle are killed. The Santa Fe tracks and bridges are washed out and traffic is at a standstill. Persons made homeless sought refuge in churches. Provisions and clothes were rushed to the scene of the disaster.

Twelve inches of rain fell all over South Texas Monday night causing all rivers to overflow their banks. Relief trains were rushed out but were unable to reach their destination. Rescue parties in boats are going from house to house taking people from second stories and carrying the dead to morgues. Heartrending scenes were witnessed in towns where lost children were hunting parents. It is estimated that 200 miles of track were washed out. The death list increases hourly. Telegraph offices are besieged by crowds demanding news from the flooded district.

IOWA DEMOCRATS NOMINATE.

Claude R. Porter Was Named for Governor—Platform Favors Tariff for Revenue Only.

Waterloo, Iowa.—The democratic state convention Tuesday nominated a full state ticket, headed by Claude R. Porter, of Appanoose county, for governor, adopted a platform and adjourned sine die Tuesday night.

The platform favors a tariff for revenue only, the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people and demands the enactment of such legislation as will effectually destroy all trusts.

The platform expresses sympathy with the purposes of national labor organizations as set forth in recent addresses by Samuel Gompers, John Mitchell and others calling on labor to assert its political rights at the ballot box.

A resolution was adopted pledging to William Jennings Bryan the support of Iowa democrats for the presidency in 1908.

Killed in Runaway Accident.

Des Moines, Iowa.—In a runaway accident near Lehigh, Ia., Friday two children of Mr. and Mrs. Axel Johnson were killed and two more children and the mother were badly injured. The accident happened on a hill down which Mrs. Johnson and her children were driving. The dasher saved by throwing mother and two children who were killed under the horses where they were trampled.

Chicago Grand Jury Secured.

Chicago, Ill.—The special federal grand jury which is to take up the investigation of the business methods of the Standard Oil company and the transportation of its products by various railroads was sworn in Tuesday before Judge S. H. Beaman in the United States district court. The taking of evidence will be begun Thursday.

For a Larger Conductor.

Belfast, Eng.—It was reported Monday that the Hamburg-American line had given an order to Harland & Wolff to construct a steamer larger than the Cunard line Lusitania. The Lusitania is 290 feet long, has 88 feet beam, her molded depth is 69 feet 6 inches, draft 33 feet, and she is 40,000 tons displacement.

Rain Causing Damage.

Tulsa, I. T.—Passenger traffic on Midland Valley and Frisco railroad was at a standstill Tuesday on account of washouts. Six days of excessive rain has done great damage to cotton, corn and potato crops of Northern Indian territory.

Democrats Nominate Ridgely.

Chanute, Kan.—The democratic county convention at Erie Monday nominated E. R. Ridgely, editor of the Erie Sentinel and ex-congressman from this district, for representative from Neosho county.

Lightning Struck a Church.

Deatur, Ill.—Lightning struck the Walnut Grove church Sunday. Sunday school was being dismissed. Several children were hurt. Carl Sutton was probably fatally burned. Carl Emerson's finger was burned off and Earl Biers' toe was burned off.

Peirce Arrives in Norway.

Christiania, Norway.—Mr. Herbert H. D. Peirce, the newly appointed American minister in Norway, arrived here Monday afternoon.

A Drunken Man's Crime.

Nowata, I. T.—Violently insane from drink, P. C. Childers, one of the best known farmers in this section of country shot and killed Monday afternoon and fatally wounded his wife, twelve miles northeast here.

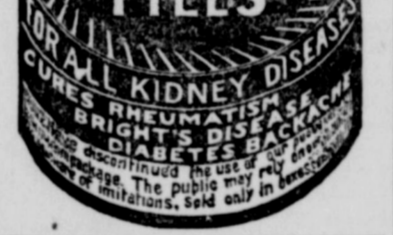
