



nteresting Gossip by Our Correspondent in Gotham-Obesity s a New Cause for Divorce-Many Illegal Separations During the Past 20 Years.



NEW YORK .- Young maidens, beware! If single blessedness does not appeal to you and you are contemplating matrimony, be careful and do not put on too much weight in your new home you may be relegated to the ranks of the

grass widow. Why? Because obesity is now an officially recognized cause for divorce. Hereafter slender maidens may recall with a pang as they take the marriage vow that "Till death us do part" means "Until I get fat." And the well established ten-dency of American women to press the limit of comfortable plumpness may well become a shad-ow over many homes.

Fat as a cause for divorce was put into the records by Louis Link, a tailor, who was legally eparated the other day from his wife by the supreme court.

According to the story of the Links—and nusband and wife agree on that point—when Louis married Sarah 18 years ago she was fair to look upon, with a figure that was more like a Diana than a Venus. But, alas! time changes all things, and Sarah is no exception. From a willowy maiden she passed through the varying stages, becoming by turns plump, large, stout, fat, and finally obese.

Louis couldn't stand the last, and so he applied to his local rabbi for a divorce according to the Talmudic law. When he told the good man that Sarah had increased from 130 to 225, the decree was granted immediately. Louis in his childlike simplicity did not await the formality of a divorce under the statute law, but immediately married a young woman whose em-

Sarah went to court and had this second marriage annulled, and Louis and Sarah determined to try to live down the past.
"I spent hundreds of dollars," said Louis, "buying her anti-fat, but it only made her larger. When she grew to 250 pounds I could stand it no

MANY DIVORCES FOUND ILLEGAL.

Speaking of divorces, amazing irregularities many of the divorces granted in this city with the past 20 years have been discovered. So r there is a flaw in one divorce out of every five examined.

These defects were found by William H. K. Jarvis, of the census bureau, and his corps of 15 "divorce girls," sent from Washington for sta-tistics of divorces. If made known they would make bigamists of many couples married in good

faith and illegitimatize many children. How much and how many of these discoveries will be made public depends largely on action to be taken by Mr. Jarvis. If he applies to the court for necessary data in thousands of cases an order may be granted to "unseal the

From 1886 to 1896 divorces were granted in the superior court and in the court of common pleas here and in Brooklyn. The average was about 490 a year for the ten years. Since they were replaced by the supreme court in 1896 the divorce records of these two courts in New York county have been filed away in the ounty courthouse. 20 per cent. of the papers filed away are incomplete. They do not contain any final award or decree signed by a judge. Without this they are invalid.

It used to be the custom for many judges to announce their decisions from the bench, "Decree granted to the plaintiff" or "defendant," as the case might be. Then it was the duty of the attorney to prepare a formal decree, have this signed by the judge, and file it for record. Many lawyers neglected to do this. to do this.



A Law to Protect Birds. The threatened extermination of all beautiful birds in this country in order to satisfy the demands for ornamental millinery has led to the enactment in several states of greatly needed laws for the protection of wild birds. Commissioner Whipple, of the New York state forest, fish and game department, has recently served notice through the press to the williners of the state, retail and wholesale, that his department intends to use every legitimate means to enforce the law prchibiting the possession or sale of the bodies or feathers of wild birds, whether taken in this state or elsewhere. The penalty for each violation of the law is \$60 fine, and an additional \$25 for each bird, or part thereof, sold, offered for sale, or possessed. This law seems to be sweeping enough to constitute an efficacious remedy so far as the state of New York is concerned. SERMONETTE.

Nadab and Abihu, the sons of Aaron, had been consecrated to the service of God in the Tabernacle, and for this reason their sin was all the more glaring and called for summary punishment, for this first instance of contempt for sacred things demanded swift judgment, just as at the commencement of the Christian dispensation the sin of Ananias and Sapphira called for speedy punishment. (Acts 5:1-11).

This sin of Nadao and Abihu indicates an utter lack on their part of appreciation of their place in God's service, of the holiness of God, of the necessity of obedience, of the fact that there was but one way of approach unto God.

We cannot too often remind ourselves of the three facts 3 which this incident brings out: First, the holiness of God and the sacredness of the approach unto him

Second, the proneness of the human heart to fail to understand and appreciate the reverence due God and the necessity of obedience to the Divine order of worship and service.

Third, the recognition of the righteousness and faithfulness of God's judgments against sin, even though such judgments may fall upon those who are near us and whom we love. 
