

THE MIAMI CHIEF HORRIBLE WRECK ON THE ROCK ISLAND

Smoking Car and Crowded Day Coach Were Burried in the Raging Waters of the Cimarron River. Later Reports Indicate 25 or 30 Killed. Number Uncertain

THE ENGINE AND TENDER ARE BURRIED IN THE QUICKSAND

Number of Dead May Never be Known. Driftwood Had Lodged Against the Bridge and Forced it Out of Line. Engineer Set the Brakes, But Too Late. Thrilling Escape of Enginemen and Passengers From the Overturned Smoker.

Hennessey, Okla., Sept. 19 .-- A few minutes past 8 o'clock this morning Rock Island train No. 12 two hours late running at the usual speed struck the bridge over the Cimmaron, when the first span gave way and the engine and all the cars except chair car and sleeper were precipitated into the waters of the treacherous Cimmaron, carrying with it its load of human freight. The loss of life is estimated at about 100 persons.

Sheriff Love of Kingtisher made his way through a window of the coach and was carried five miles down stream and then succeeded in landing safely. Attorney Moore, Arthur Cashion and John Short all of Hennessey, were slightly injured but swam ashore.

Engineer Iles seeing the condition of track put on the air brakes and he and Conductor Conditt jumped. Men, women and children were soaked and bruised and many seriously injured. After the accident a Dover resident who was an eye witness saw four men sitting on a partly submerged car and the remaining piers of the bridge giving way swung to the north side of the river hitting the coach upon which the unfortunate victims sat completely submerging the car and hurling the men into the raging water and they were nover se in again. The water is still rising and nothing can be done towards recovering the bodies of the dead until the river subsides. A partial list of the injured follows:

DUE TO HIGH WATER.

Guthrie, Okla., Sept. 18.-Eight people are dead, twenty more or less injured, and as many more missing in the most disastrous wreck in the history of the Rock Island, which occurred three miles from Dover, Okla., at 8:30 this morning.

The engine, tender, baggage and mail cars, smoker and day coach of passenger train No. 12, north-bound, left the high bridge that spans the Cimarron river and plunged into the current flanked by treacherous quick sands. The locomotive disappeared from sight almost immediately.

The accident was due to the defective condition of the bridge, which was swerved out of line by the pressure of driftwood carried down by the swollen stream.

The train was an hour late and was running at high speed to make up time. The engineer did not see the condition of the bridge until he was within a few yards, when it was too late to stop. REPORT FROM KINGFISHER.

Kingfisher, Okla., Sept. 18.—Rock Island passenger No. 12 went through the Cimaron river bridge near Dover this morning about 8 o'clock and it is thought the loss of life will be 20 or 30. The day coach and the smoker, mail and baggage cars were swept down the river. The day coach which was loaded went ashore about one hundred vards down the river and the men, women and children from that car all escaped drowning. Many of them are in precarious condition from effects of bruises and exposure. One lady and one child who were in this car will die. Conductor Thomas worked like a trojan and won the admiration of every one. The smoker had 20 per-W. J. Bryan gave out a statement sons and up to this evening most of these have shown up. Sheriff Love of this place was in this car and when it went down swam from the middle of the river to the bank, an accomplishment that few could have performed. He is now at his home threatened with pneumonia. Four members of Forepaugh-Sells show were in the smoker and all have shown up except one man by the name of Littlefield, who was drowned. It is impossible in the confusion to find out how many were lost. Some have been swept down the river and have been reseucd by farmers who have them at their homes. Others have been brought to town and are in the hands of physicians. Very few in the front cars escaped without some bruises and all are suffering from the exposure to which they were subjected.

It was reported this evening that a few had been swept to the north side of the river and had been taken to Dover. The entire bridge is gone as well as the wagon bridge over the Cimaron, in this

SCENE OF TERRIBLE CONFUSION.

When the engine struck the bridge the whole structure suddenly collapsed, precipitating the engine and coaches into the water.

To night the derailed cars are lying near the bank of the river, A party of searchers is working with torches and lanterns to lend aid to any who may be within the coaches or recover the bodies. It is the opinion of people who are at the scene of the wreck that a few bodies will be found inside the smoker.

It will be impossible to ascertain the exact number of dead for several days. Many of those reported missing may show up safe at some point down the Cimarron.

MILITIA IS HELPING.

Gov. Frantz this evening detailed the engineer corps and part of the signal corps of the national guard, under Captain Frank B. King, to watch the Cimarron for bodies. Searchlights will be used tonight and temporary telephone lines from the city to the river have been strung by the signal corps.

Nothing in the way of a death list is obtainable tonight as the river has been too high to allow of any search for bodies. Reports are still coming in to Kingfisher over rural telephone lines of people pieked up along down the river or seen floating on wreckage, and these may diminish the number of fatalities.

The Age of Machinery.

We live in the age of machinery The thinking, directing mind becomes daily of more account, while mere brawn falls correspondingly in value from day to day. That eccentric philosopher, Elbert Hubbard, says in one of his essays, "where a machine will do better work than the human hand, we prefer to let the machine do the work.

It has been but a few years since the cotton gin, the "spinning Jenny" and the power loom displaced the hand picker, the spinning wheel and the hand loom; since the reaper and binder, the rake and tedder, the mowing machine took the place of the old cradle, scythe, pitchfork and hand rake; since the friction match superseded the flint and tinder; since the modern paint factory replaced the slab and muller, the paint pot and paddle.

In every case where machinery has been introduced to replace hand labor, the laborers have resisted the change; and as the weavers, the sempstresses and the farm laborers protested against new-fangled looms, sewing machines and agricultural implements, so in recent times compositors have protested against type-setting machines, glass blowers against bottle blowing machines, and painters against ready mixed paints. And as in the case of these short-sighted classes of an earlier day, so with their imitators of to-day, the protest will SHARP WARNING TO CUBANS be in vain. It is a protest against civilization, against the common weal, against their own welfare.

The history of all mechanical improvements shows that workmen are the first to be benefited by them. The invention of the sewing machine, instead of throwing thousands of women out of employment, increased the demand to such an extent that thousands of women have been employed at better wages, for shorter hours and easier work where hundreds before worked in laborious misery to eke out a pitiable existence. It was so with spinning and weaving machinery, with agricultural implements-in fact, it is so with every notable improvement. The multiplication of books in the last decade is a direct result of the invention of linotype machinery and fast presses.

The mixed paint industry, in which carefully designed paints for house painting are prepared on a large scale by special machinery, is another improvement of the same type. The cheapness and general excellence of these products has so stimulated the consumption of paint that the demand for the services of painters has correspondingly multiplied. the advent of these goods a well-painted house was noticeable from its rarity, whereas to-day an ill-painted house is conspicuous. Nevertheless, the painters, as

rule, following the example set by the weavers, the sempstresses and the farm laborers of old, almost to a man, oppose the improvement. It is a real improvement, however, and simply beuse of that fact the sale of such products has increased until during short of 90,000,000 or 100,000,000 gal-

TWO CENT FARE AGITATION.

An Attempt Is Being Made Throughout United States to Obtain Uniform Legislation.

Harrisburg, Pa. - s. M. Williams, secretary of the Pennsylvania state board of trade, Sunday made public copies of letters received from the governor's of several states on the movement to obtain uniform legislation throughout the United States for a two cent maximum fare on all steam railroads.

A number of governors are personally favorable to a two-cent fare and, in a few instances, they tell of the movements in their states to obtain the passage of such legislation in the next session of the legislature.

Governors of some western states say that because of the sparsely settled condition of their states the time is not yet ripe for radical reduction of fares, but that such a reform will come about when the population increases to give the railroads enough business to justify a cut.

The western governors express their approval of the movement so far as it applies to the thickly populated states of the east.
