RAILROAD EARNINGS.

The Net Amount per Mile Was \$3,580 on a Total of 220,026 Miles of Road Reporting.

Washington. - A preliminary report of the interstate commerce commission on the income account of the railways of the United States for the year ending June 30, last, contains reports from companies operating 220, 026 miles of lines, or about 99 per cent of the mileage that will be covered in the final report.

The total gross earnings of the roads were \$2,319,760,030, being equivper mile, and freight earnings \$1, 640,942,8k2, or \$7,458 per mile. Operating expenses were \$1,532,163,153, or \$6,963 per mile. The net earnings of the roads were \$787,597,877, being \$3,580 per mile, and nearly \$970,000, 000 more than the corresponding amount for the previous year. 




