Evidence, we were a little hasty in pointing out that Bovina's city officials are overpaid at \$25 a month. At about same time we were making that statement which has been called "ridiculous" and "absolutely right" by a few scattered readers since, Olton's city council was voting to raise

its mayor's pay to \$100 a month. According to Bill Turner's Olton Enterprise, reasons given for the pay raise were to bring mayor's drawing more in line with other towns in area and that some past mayors of Olton had spent more money serving as mayor, in addition to their time, than they made from it. Mayor's pay was increased from \$35 per month.

To all owning or claiming any property abutting on the hereinbefore mentioned portions or streets and avenues in the City of Bovina, Texas, and to all holding any liens on any of said abutting property and to all owning or claiming any interest in any of said abutting property;

The City Council of the City of Bovina, Texas, has, by ordinance duly passed and adopted, ordered that the hereinbelow mentioned portions of the streets and avenues of the City of Bovina, Texas, be improved by raising, grading, excavating and filling, and providing with caliche base and triple asphalt surface, and by constructing curbs and gutters where necessary, all as provided in the plans and specifications for said improvements prepared by the engineer for said city and now on file in the office of the City Clerk and heretofore approved by this City Council, and a contract with the firm of PIONEER PAVERS, INC., of Lubbock, Texas, has been entered into for the making and construction of such improvements, which contract has been executed by the City and is on file in the office of the City Clerk, which said plans and specifications and said contract are referred to for all pertinent purposes.

It is proposed, and provision will be made, that a portion of the cost of all of said improvements will be assessed against abutting property and owners thereof, as follows: Not more than all of the cost of constructing, reconstructing, repairing, and re-alligning curbs and gutters and sidewalks, and not more than 9/10 of the remaining cost of such improvements as shown by such estimate. By this is intended 100% of the cost of constructing, reconstructing, repairing and re-alligning curbs, gutters and sidewalks in front of the property and along the sides of the property, and 90% of the cost of the remaining improvements in front of the property and along the sides of the property.

By the term "front" as used herein is meant; where a parcel of property is unimproved, the front thereof is the street or avenue on which same faces according to the official recorded maps or plants of the original town of Bovina, Texas, and any additions where improvements are ordered made; and where parcels of property are improved, the front thereof is the street or avenue on which the improvements face. Estimates of the cost of such improvements of the portions of the streets and avenues in the various districts or units of construction

as hereinafter designated and set out have been prepared and filed by the Engineer and approved by the City. The portions of such streets and avenues ordered to be improved are divided into and designated as separate and independent districts or units as hereinafter set out. The estimates prepared and filed as aforesaid show the costs of improvements and the amounts to be assessed against abutting property and owners thereon in such separate districts or units, and the improvements will be in such separate districts or units, numbered and designated as UNIT NUMBERS ONE TO TWENTY-FOUR, inclusive. The portions of the streets or avenues to be improved in each district, together with the estimated costs of the improvements in each district, the amounts per front foot to be assessed against the abutting property and owners thereof on the portions of the streets and avenues to be improved in each district, and the total estimated amount to be assessed against property and the owners thereof in each district are as follows:

# Same For Barbecue

Requirements

The U.S. Department of Agriculture said no to a proposal which would have permitted the use of the term "barbecued" on labels for meat cooked by infra-red heat from an electronic source.

The USDA announcement on March 31 said barbecued meats prepared under Federal meat inspection will continue to be limited to products cooked by dry heat from burning hardwood or hot coals formed by burning hardwood.

The decision to make no change in present Federal requirements followed a 60-day review of all pertinent information, including comments and views received by the Director of the Meat Inspection Di-
