



Pudding With Cake Texture Has Fragrant Molasses Touch



Reminiscent of gingerbread in flavor, yet with a more moist tex-ture, is wonderful old-fashioned molasses pudding. This early-American dessert, championed by every generation

tasting it, continues to be a specialty at many fine restaurants featuring American recipe classics.

Superb of flavor, it's truly simple to make. The dry ingredients (flour, sugar and spices) have the butter "cut in" as for a crumb-type topping. As step two, combine delicate unsulphured molasses, water and soda. Alternate layers of the crumb mixture and the liquid in a square pan, and the pudding is ready for baking. The dessert can be cut into squares or spooned into serving dishes, and you'll have a moist gingerbread cake marbled with spicy crumb mixture. Serve hot or cold with a favorite fruit sauce.

21/4 cups sifted allpurpose flour teaspoon nutmeg

Old Fashioned Molasses Pudding ½ cup butter or margarine 1 cup unsulphured molasses

1 cup water 1 teaspoon baking soda 2 3-ounce packages cream cheese

11/2 teaspoons cinnamon 2 tablespoons milk Sift together flour, sugar, nutmeg, cinnamon and salt. Add butter; cut with two knives or pastry blender to resemble coarse meal. Combine unsulphured molasses, water and soda. Alternate crumbs and liquid in a greased 8 x 8 x 2 inch square pan, beginning and ending with crumbs. Stir gently only 2 or 3 times with a fork. Bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) 1 hour. When ready to serve, blend together cream cheese and milk. Cut cake into squares; place spoonful cream cheese on top of each square. Top each serving with *Orange Sauce.



COFFEE: A Conversation Piece

American use, few have as legendary and romantic a background as coffee. Some of its

One Arabian legend relates that coffee came into use when it "got the goats" of a herdsman named Kaldi. He reported to the abbot of a monastery that his flock went into a frolicsome dance after eating berries off a certain tree. When the cleric boiled the berries in water, he derived an exhilarating brew which helped his monks to stay awake during midnight prayers.

This monastic coffee ritual was

This monastic coffee ritual was the predecessor of the daily cof-



fee break enjoyed by millions of American workers and house-

American workers and house-wives. In a survey among plant managers, 82% credited coffee breaks with a reduction in worker fatigue and 62% said they increased productivity.

Coffee has also been a factor in adventure and espionage. The famed Polish spy, Franz Kolschitzky, who saved Vienna from beseiging Turks, opened the first Viennese coffee house. As reward for his heroic exploits, including swimming the Danube several times to circumvent enemy lines, he was given sacks of green coffee abandoned by the fleeing Turks.

Today, you can find coffee houses in nearly every metropolis of Europe, many with their own history of famous patrons and epochal events. In England, Samuel Johnson established the Turk's Head coffee house which became a gathering place for artists and writers of his era. It is rumored that in the archives of the old Cafe Central in Herrengasse there is an unpaid bill for | memorable world events.

In the U.S., Boston's Green Dragon coffee house was called "headquarters of the Revolution" by Daniel Webster, and the Merchants' House in New York was the scene of Washington's preinaugural reception. A forerunner of the Revolution itself,—the Boston Tea Party,—when colonists dressed as Indians dumped British tea into the harbor to protest taxes, accelerated coffee's popularity in this country. Today, Americans drink more than 300 million cups of coffee a day.

In addition to its role in adventure, history and literature, coffee — or the lack of it — has been the point of issue in the courtroom. In Turkey, at one time, a husband's failure to provide coffee for his wife was legitimate grounds for divorce. In affairs of the heart, Madame du Barry was among ladies who were wooed with gifts of coffee, and Bach's Coffee Cantata sings of a girl who insists on a marriage contract stating that she may have coffee whenever she






