COMMERCIAL LEAGUE PUTS OFF BRIDGING AND GRADING WORK

Representatives of the Commercial League of Miami and the City Council were called in and conferred regarding the project of bridging Coon Hollow and straightening Commercial Street to the south of Henry Weck's east corner. It developed that the County Commissioner's office had agreed to move the fifty-foot bridge from the Rasor Coon Hollow if the City of Miami would build the concrete abutments and fill in the approaches. As the City Council were without funds they could not take their part of the contract, the whole proposition was to fall through. Here is the Commercial League came to the aid of the City. The League agreed to raise the subscription, headed the list of \$100.00 subscription and raised the amount (\$500.00) required by the Commissioners, besides \$100.00 to be applied on street and grading work. We are of the richest beds of road gravel to be found anywhere. A good loading dump, has the two big Nash Quads equipped with beds for gravel and our streets and are threatened with some improvement work. We also proposed to throw open the Court House park to the public, providing water and rest camping ground. We expect an officially recognized Miami and Roberts County, offering ourselves in position to the State and Federal Highways now being distributed to Miami which are maintaining Auto Highways. WHEAT KING ENTHUSIASTIC

MAN BURIED ALIVE FROM FALLING BANK

Will Kent who lives at the old Carr place in west Miami was literally buried alive Tuesday morning when a high bank caved on him in the west end of town. Mr. Kent was getting gravel from the bottom of the creek along the edge of the bluff, which is 20 or 25 feet high, almost perpendicular. He was against his gravel wagon, and the several tons of dirt and large clods crushed him down against the wagon box which was made of 2x6's, covering him completely up and all of the wagon except the tops of the wheels and broke a good portion of the bed. M. W. O'Loughlin who was passing soon after the accident noticed the team standing and the wagon covered and on investigation could hear the groan of Mr. Kent and aid was soon coming.

Only for the protection of the wagon box which held the dirt out of his face and gave breathing room, Mr. Kent would have suffocated, but this protected him and he only sustained four broken ribs and a general crushing. He is reported getting along nicely today.

FAVOR THROUGH MAIN ROADS

Motortrucks Expected to Play Prominent Part in Transportation Facilities.

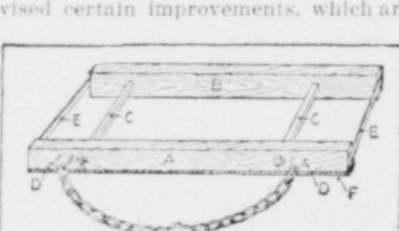
England is now debating roads for motor transportation, for, although she is amply equipped with railroads, it is believed that hereafter motortrucks will play a prominent part in the business of the country. Systems of special highways are being mapped out, and the plans proposed include an apparently excellent feature. To avoid the delays and congestion incident on traversing towns, it is suggested that the main road be located beyond the borders of the town, and this would certainly expedite traffic, as it would not be necessary for every vehicle using the route to painfully thread its way through every village on the way. Of course this would not appeal to the local tradesman who hopes to catch an occasional penny from the passing cars, nor to the local magistrate who inflates his own income, and the funds of his town, by his interpretation of the law; but this is a matter of national interest and not to be restricted by petty local considerations.—Scientific American.

IMPROVING KING ROAD DRAG

Found Too Weak for Work in Pennsylvania and Strengthened by Wrought Iron Strips.

The old form of King road drag was merely two sides of a split log, fastened so that the sharp sides of the split surface faced forward, the straight surface extending vertically; the two parts were spaced about two feet apart and connected by struts to hold them parallel; the outfit was dragged by a chain, fastened to the front half-log, and the angle at which the contrivance was dragged over the surface, was controlled by the manner in which the team was hitched to the chain, the chain itself being fastened permanently at both ends to two staples in the front log, which altered the angle at which the team was hitched, writes L. Ruppel of Pennsylvania in Rural New Yorker.

"We found the original form too weak for our road work here, so we devised certain improvements, which are

shows in the sketch, the most important of which was that we shod the front log with a strip two inches wide, one-half inch thick, of wrought iron, said strip being placed at the lower edge with the two-inch width extending vertically along the front log."

SAVE PERISHABLE PRODUCTS

Rural Motor Transportation Affords Opportunity to Get Crops to Market Quickly.

With the advent and development of rural motor transportation comes direct encouragement to raise better and bigger crops because of the better and broader market thus afforded. In the production of marketable produce there comes an opportunity for the saving of perishable products by quick deliveries, and for higher prices because of the excellent condition in which these commodities can be delivered.

PROPER CARE FOR ROADSIDE

Substantial Addition to Value of Adjoining Property and Aids Appearance.

Proper attention to the roadside means a definite increase in the pleasure of traveling over it, a positive preservation of the road itself and a substantial addition to the value of adjoining property. No matter how smooth and well constructed the traveled road may be, if the roadside is not properly cared for, a good impression as a whole will not give a good impression. Macadam or gravel roads particularly need the protecting shade of trees.

Add to Social Advantages.

Good roads add to social advantages. They strengthen the country, bring a good class of people into a community, and help to hold a bigger share of the best boys and girls on the farm.

Cost of Good Road.

It has been found that it costs about \$2,500 a mile to build a really first-class road, but when it is properly constructed it is as permanent as a railway.

SILK RIVALS WOOL IN SUMMER SUITS



HOW ATTRACTIVELY OUTFITTED

For a summer time promenade is the beautiful girl pictured here! She has arrived at a stunning appearance by employing simple means, and in this case the character of the fabric used is almost altogether responsible for the success of the costume. This is one of many spring suits made of heavy fiber silk, which are vying with those of wool materials in the spring displays. These silks have a brilliant luster and are woven in many novel patterns employing one or two colors. They have been used heretofore for sports wear, more than for any other, but progress in weaving them has opened a new field of usefulness and they are delighting designers by supplying a new and wonderful medium for street and formal suits.

There is a great variety of weaves in this modern silk, the crepe and ribbed effects predominating, with many new drop-stitch designs. These new weaves inspire designers to further efforts in the invention of styles suited to them. Such brilliant effects in the material make much decoration quite out of the question and this accounts for the simplicity which is so effective in suits and costumes that are made of colorful or lustrous fabrics. In the suit pictured two tones of color, gray and green, both in rather dark shades, are woven in plain crepe and checkboard pattern. The plain weave makes the skirt and is used on the coat in collar and girdle. The collar merges into a facing below the waist-line. There is nothing to describe in the suit that may not be gathered from the picture. Its very long, close-fitting sleeves with fascinating frills of lace falling over the hands and the plaited jabot of wide, net-top lace, that plays the part of a vest at the front, are details that cannot be spared from this design.

Hat, shoes, stockings and parasol have all been carefully selected for this suit. The hat in light gray and dark green has a spice of black in narrow bands of patent leather, to give it sparkle. Shoes and stockings are gray and green predominates in the parasol where bands of black repeat the black note in the hat.



Economy Corner

UNBLEACHED domestic cotton, in the heavy, strong qualities, is among the reliable things that the high cost of living has brought into new uses. A few women have made themselves bungalow aprons and house dresses of it for summer wear and it proves surprisingly attractive with a little simple needlework as its finish. Where it proves most useful is in attire for little folks in dresses and slips or aprons. The natural color or makes a fine background for little figures worked in cross-stitch on pockets or belts—bunnies, chickens, birds, kittens and other small friends of the youngsters.

In the matter of price, for several things, the steady upward progress appears to have reached the point where women balk at paying it. They are demanding less expensive millinery for one thing and are determined to do without silk garments unless the prices become stable and less exorbitant for silk fabrics. In a few cities, leagues have been formed whose members pledge themselves to wear their clothes until they are worn out. Suits and dresses of wool are remodeled and worn with good grace since it is hard to get reliable goods even at the increased prices. Shoes are maintained by journeys to the repair shop—where new half soles and rehabilitated heels, give them a prolonged term of service. These economies are enforced in most cases, but it is a good thing that American women are going through this experience for they have long been accused of being the most extravagant and wasteful of civilized people.

This season there is a good chance to economize in millinery because hats include many shapes that were worn last year, or even in earlier seasons. Saller shapes, wide brimmed leghorns, some of the "cloche" or drooping brimmed hats as well as toques and turbans of former seasons need only a little alteration to make them entirely up-to-date. The light colors that have become soiled may be varnished with a darker color or black, and it is the simplest thing in the world to do this work at home. There are several stains or varnishes on the market, usually for sale in drugstores, that are easy to apply. The vogue for dotted Swiss organdie in facings and trimmings suggests one way of bringing the hats of yesterday up-to-date. These materials are used over straw shapes and to make entire hats. Collars and cuffs to match the hat, made of the same Swiss or organdie, add the smartest kind of touch to a street outfit. Of course, every woman has a right to one new hat in the spring, but she is entitled to others if she is clever enough to make them herself and one hat will hardly answer all purposes. Even if it would there is pleasure in a little variety in one's headwear.

Frocks Are Interesting. Smart modes in dresses are in evidence on all sides, until it is difficult to pick out any one mode for word portrayal, but frocks of tricotine are decidedly interesting when developed with plaited skirts and tailored surplice bodices that wrap about the waist and finish with sash effect, the entire bodice being almost completely covered with Japanese embroidery.

A Lingerie Convenience. Those who have had the annoyance of having the lingerie tape slip from the bending of camisole or gown will appreciate this simple hint. When the tape or ribbon is first put through the eyelets or bending, turn under the ends and sew a white pearl button to each end. The button should be large enough, of course, not to slip through the tape.

FARM STOCK

SHEEP SCABIES ERADICATED

More Than Ten Million Dippings Made by Employees of the Department of Agriculture.

In the work of eradicating sheep scabies from the United States employees of the United States department of agriculture made more than 22 million inspections and supervised more than ten million dippings during the last fiscal year. The work was conducted in co-operation with state officials. No cases of sheep scabies are now known to exist in Montana or North Dakota, in addition to numerous other states where the disease had previously been eradicated. In Idaho a spread of the in-

fection during the previous year has been brought under control. Sheep scabies is a disease that has been prevalent chiefly in the western part of the United States.

KEEPING CATTLE AND SWINE

It Remains to Be Determined What Are Most Common and Best-Paying Propositions.

The keeping of cattle and of swine appear to be almost inseparable operations. This fact is being brought out in the returns of the "Better Sires—Better Stock" crusade of the agricultural colleges, the United States department of agriculture and co-operating agencies. This general practice has long been known, but much more definite information is being gathered, and the purpose is to extend it to such an extent as to determine the relationships among all meat animals.

If nearly every man who keeps cattle also keeps hogs, and if nearly every man who keeps hogs also keeps cattle, the inevitable conclusion is that the combination pays, especially when purebred sires are used. But it remains to be determined what are the most common and the best-paying propositions. The same thing applies also to combinations of cattle and sheep, or swine and sheep, or cattle and sheep and swine. One benefit of the work will be that it will enable the man of small personal experience to avail himself of the wide experience of a great number of men in working out the combinations of meat animals that he will carry on his farm.

ECONOMICAL FEED FOR BEEF

As Silage Becomes Better Known Feeders Will Better Appreciate Its Feeding Value.

There is no doubt but that silage is an economical feed in the beef-cattle ration and as its value becomes better known feeders will better appreciate its merits. In spite of the fact that it is an unbalanced feed itself, it can be fed with one of the highly concentrated feeds, such as oil meal or cottonseed meal, and makes a ration which is surely hard to beat in fattening cattle.

CARE OF EWE IS IMPORTANT

Machine Through Which Lamb Will Obtain Qualities to Enable It to Top Market.

What is done for the lamb is not so important as the care and liberal feeding of the ewe. The ewe must be regarded as the machine through which the lamb will obtain the qualities that will enable it to top the markets.

LIVE STOCK NOTES

It is very essential that ewes should be properly fed.

A self-feeder can be used to excellent advantage for fattening hogs and pigs.

Better live stock aids the breeder both in direct returns and by giving a locality a favorable reputation.

In the cold months many farmers fail to give the stock enough salt. Salt is a vital part of each animal's ration.

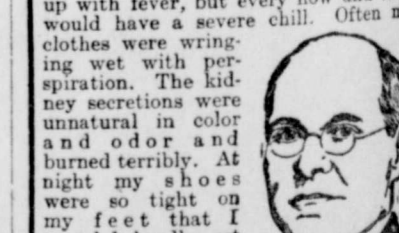

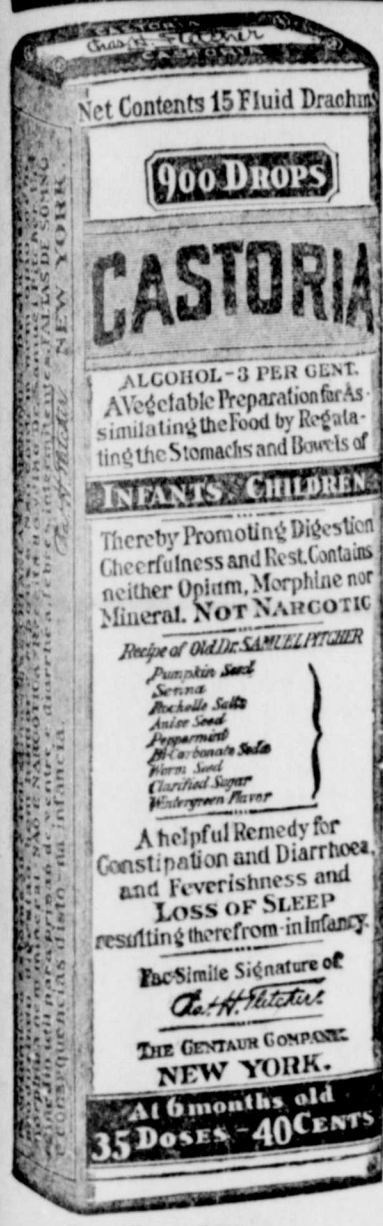

LITTLE CHANGE IN PHYSIQUE

Report That Average Stature of American Men Was Affected by War Declared Untrue.

The wholesale clothing manufacturers assert that there has not been any change in the size of their garments since the war. They are manufacturing more garments, but the proportion of larger sizes is no greater now than it was three years ago. In short, their size patterns have not changed. Yet changes would be necessary if the stature of American men had been affected in any appreciable way by the year and a half or two years of military training.

Manufacturers of ready-to-wear shirts and undergarments agree with the clothing manufacturers that there has been no change in their size patterns despite the reports of numerous individuals who take "a size larger" today than they did before the war. As one manufacturer put it, the proportion of soldiers who need larger sizes in shirts or suits today than they did two years ago is so small that it has no effect on wholesalers. Salesmen naturally remember certain individual cases of increased chest development, but, taking the country by and large, there has been no appreciable change in the physique of the male portion of the population, at least as far as their clothing is concerned.

"SLANG" ROOT OF LANGUAGE

Idiom of Today in Correct Usage Tomorrow, Declares University Professor of English.

That the slang and idioms of today will be correct English tomorrow is the opinion of Prof. H. Glicksman of the English department, University of Wisconsin.

"Our language is made up of what was once slang, idiom, colloquialism, and jargon," he said lately, and warned that the most deplorable feature about slang was its tendency to produce mental slovenliness.

Professor Glicksman then referred to the word "mob" as slang of 200 years ago and as such denounced in the Spectator by Addison.

"It is an abbreviation of the word 'mobile.' Even so the word 'pep' is vital and virile and will survive with the word 'snappy.' But to gain recognition slang must be free from vulgarity and cheapness," said Professor Glicksman.

"The term 'How do you get that way?' is condemned because it is meaningless, but the term 'he has a pull' is approved as it is the opposite of 'push,' a word that has forged ahead through its own strength."—Outlook.

Afternoon Tea Doughnuts

2 eggs
3 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon grated nutmeg

2 tablespoons shortening
6 tablespoons milk
2 cups flour

Beat eggs until very light; add sugar, salt, nutmeg and melted shortening; add milk, and flour and baking powder which have been sifted together; mix well. Drop by teaspoons into deep hot fat and fry until brown. Drain well on unglazed paper and sprinkle lightly with powdered sugar.

Crullers

4 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
3 cups flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
4 cup milk

Cream shortening; add sugar gradually and beaten eggs; sift together flour, cinnamon, salt and baking powder; add one-half and mix well; add milk and remainder of dry ingredients to make soft dough. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4 inch thick and cut into strips about 4 inches long and 1/4 inch wide; roll in hands and twist each strip and bring ends together. Fry in deep hot fat. Drain and roll in powdered sugar.

ROAD BUILDING

FAVOR THROUGH MAIN ROADS

Motortrucks Expected to Play Prominent Part in Transportation Facilities.

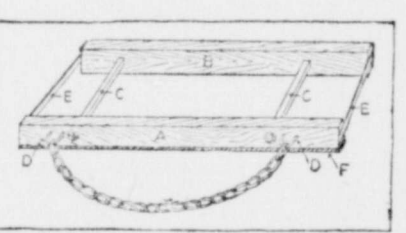
England is now debating roads for motor transportation, for, although she is amply equipped with railroads, it is believed that hereafter motor-trucks will play a prominent part in the business of the country. Systems of special highways are being mapped out, and the plans proposed include an apparently excellent feature. To avoid the delays and congestion incident on traversing towns, it is suggested that the main road be located beyond the borders of the town, and this would certainly expedite traffic, as it would not be necessary for every vehicle using the route to painfully thread its way through every village on the way. Of course this would not appeal to the local tradesman who hopes to catch an occasional penny from the passing cars, nor to the local magistrate who inflates his own income, and the funds of his town, by his interpretation of the law; but this is a matter of national interest and not to be restricted by petty local considerations.—Scientific American.

IMPROVING KING ROAD DRAG

Found Too Weak for Work in Pennsylvania and Strengthened by Wrought Iron Strips.

The old form of King road drag was merely two sides of a split log, fastened so that the sharp sides of the split surface faced forward, the straight surface extending vertically; the two parts were spaced about two feet apart and connected by struts to hold them parallel; the outfit was dragged by a chain, fastened to the front half-log, and the angle at which the contrivance was dragged over the surface, was controlled by the manner in which the team was hitched to the chain, the chain itself being fastened permanently at both ends to two staples in the front log, which altered the angle at which the team was hitched, writes L. Ruppel of Pennsylvania in Rural New Yorker.

"We found the original form too weak for our road work here, so we devised certain improvements, which are

shown in the sketch, the most important of which was that we shod the front log with a strip two inches wide, one-half inch thick, of wrought iron, said strip being placed at the lower edge with the two-inch width extending vertically along the front log."

SAVE PERISHABLE PRODUCTS

Rural Motor Transportation Affords Opportunity to Get Crops to Market Quickly.

With the advent and development of rural motor transportation comes direct encouragement to raise better and bigger crops because of the better and broader market thus afforded. In the production of marketable produce there comes an opportunity for the saving of perishable products by quick deliveries, and for higher prices because of the excellent condition in which these commodities can be delivered.

PROPER CARE FOR ROADSIDE

Substantial Addition to Value of Adjoining Property and Aids Appearance.

Proper attention to the roadside means a definite increase in the pleasure of traveling over it, a positive preservation of the road itself and a substantial addition to the value of adjoining property. No matter how smooth and well constructed the traveled road may be, if the roadside is not properly cared for, the highway as a whole will not give a good impression. Macadam or gravel roads particularly need the protecting shade of trees.

Add to Social Advantages. Good roads add to social advantages. They strengthen the country church, tend toward better living, bring a good class of people into a community, and help to hold a bigger share of the best boys and girls on the farm.

Cost of Good Road. It has been found that it costs about \$2,500 a mile to build a really first-class road, but when it is properly constructed it is as permanent as a railway.

SILK RIVALS WOOL IN SUMMER SUITS



HOW ATTRACTIVELY outfitted for a summer time promenade is the beautiful girl pictured here! She has arrived at a stunning appearance by employing simple means, and in this case the character of the fabric used is almost altogether responsible for the success of the costume. This is one of many spring suits made of heavy fiber silk, which are vying with those of wool materials in the spring displays. These silks have a brilliant luster and are woven in many novel patterns employing one or two colors. They have been used heretofore for sports wear, more than for any other, but progress in weaving them has opened a new field of usefulness and they are delighting designers by supplying a new and wonderful medium for street and formal suits.

There is a great variety of weaves in this modern silk, the crepe and ribbed effects predominating, with many new drop-stitch designs. These new weaves inspire designers to further efforts in the invention of styles suited to them. Such brilliant effects in the material make much decoration quite out of the question and this accounts for the simplicity which is so effective in suits and costumes that abound of colorful or lustrous fabrics. In the suit pictured two tones of color, gray and brown, both in rather dark shades, are woven in plain crepe and checkboard pattern. The plain weave makes the skirt and is used on the coat in collar and girdle. The collar merges into a facing below the waist-line. There is nothing to describe in the suit that may not be gathered from the picture. Its very long, close-fitting sleeves with fascinating frills of lace falling over the hands and the plaited jabot of wide, net-top lace, that plays the part of a vest at the front, are details that cannot be spared from the design. Hat, shoes, stockings and parasol have all been carefully selected for this suit. The hat in light gray and dark green has a spice of black in narrow bands of patent leather, to give it sparkle. Shoes and stockings are gray and green predominates in the parasol where bands of black repeat the black note in the hat.

Unbleached domestic cotton, in the heavy, strong qualities, is among the reliable things that the high cost of living has brought into new uses. A few women have made themselves bungalow aprons and house dresses of it for summer wear and it proves surprisingly attractive with a little simple needlework as its finish. There are several stains or varnishes on the market, usually for sale in drugstores, that are easy to apply. The vogue for dotted Swiss organdie in facings and trimmings suggests one way of bringing the hats of yesterday up-to-date. These materials are used over straw shapes and to make entire hats. Collars and cuffs to match the hat, made of the same Swiss or organdie, add the smartest kind of touch to a street outfit. Of course, every woman has a right to one new hat in the spring, but she is entitled to others if she is clever enough to make them herself and one hat will hardly answer all purposes. FAIR MILK STOCK

SHEEP SCABIES ERADICATED

More Than Ten Million Dippings Made by Employees of the Department of Agriculture.

In the work of eradicating sheep scabies from the United States employees of the United States department of agriculture made more than 22 million dippings and supervised more than ten million dippings during the last fiscal year. The work was conducted in co-operation with state officials. No cases of sheep scabies are now known to exist in Montana or North Dakota, in addition to numerous other states where the disease had previously been eradicated. In Idaho a spread of the in-

fection during the previous year has been brought under control. Sheep scabies is a disease that has been prevalent chiefly in the western part of the United States.

KEEPING CATTLE AND SWINE

It Remains to Be Determined What Are Most Common and Best-Paying Propositions.

The keeping of cattle and of swine appear to be almost inseparable operations. This fact is being brought out in the returns of the "Better Sires—Better Stock" crusade of the agricultural colleges, the United States department of agriculture and co-operating agencies. This general practice has long been known, but much more definite information is being gathered, and the purpose is to extend it to such an extent as to determine the relationships among all meat animals.

If nearly every man who keeps cattle also keeps hogs, and if nearly every man who keeps hogs also keeps cattle, the inevitable conclusion is that the combination pays, especially when purebred sires are used. But it remains to be determined what are the most common and the best-paying proportions. The same thing applies also to combinations of cattle and sheep, or swine and sheep, or cattle and sheep and swine. One benefit of the work will be that it will enable the man of small personal experience to avail himself of the wide experience of a great number of men in working out the combinations of meat animals that he will carry on his farm.

ECONOMICAL FEED FOR BEEF

As Silage Becomes Better Known Feeders Will Better Appreciate Its Feeding Value.

There is no doubt but that silage is an economical feed in the beef-cattle ration and as its value becomes better known feeders will better appreciate its merits. In spite of the fact that it is an unbalanced feed itself, it can be fed with one of the highly concentrated feeds, such as oil meal or cottonseed meal, and makes a ration which is surely hard to beat in fattening cattle.

CARE OF EWE IS IMPORTANT

Machine Through Which Lamb Will Obtain Qualities to Enable It to Top Market.

What is done for the lamb is not so important as the care and liberal feeding of the ewe. The ewe must be regarded as the machine through which the lamb will obtain the qualities that will enable it to top the markets.

LIVE STOCK NOTES

It is very essential that ewes should be properly fed. A self-feeder can be used to excellent advantage for fattening hogs and pigs.

Better live stock aids the breeder both in direct returns and by giving a locality a favorable reputation.

In the cold months many farmers fail to give the stock enough salt. Salt is a vital part of each animal's ration.

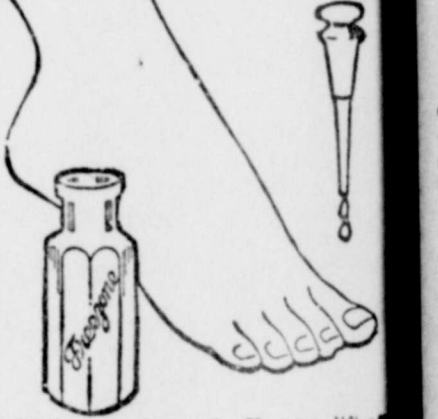

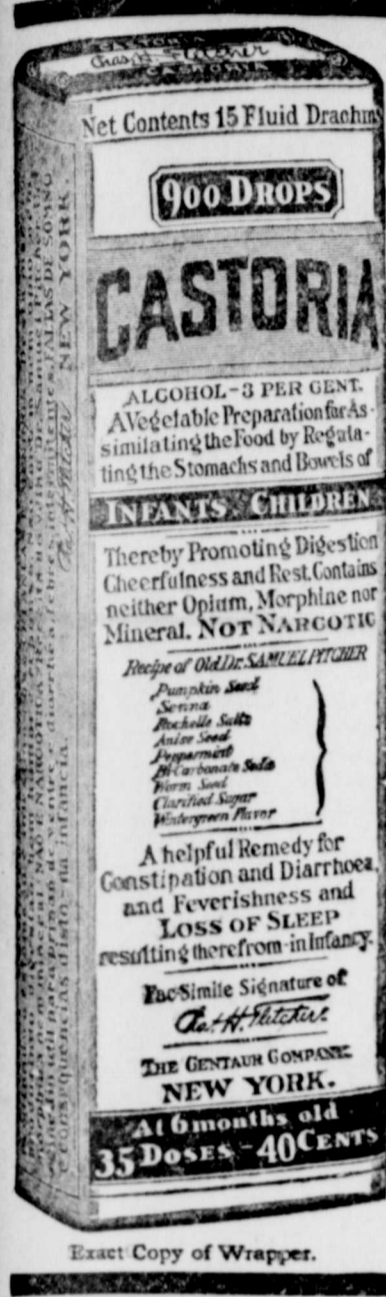

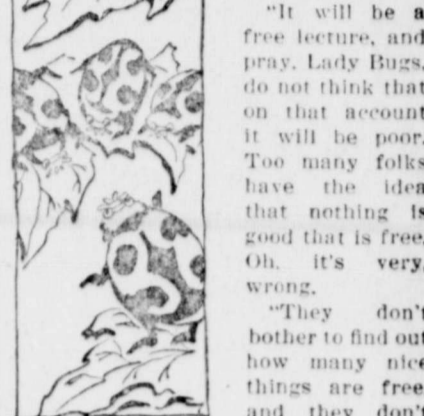

Report That Average Stature of American Men Was Affected by War Declared Untrue.

The wholesale clothing manufacturers assert that there has not been any change in the size of their garments since the war. They are manufacturing more garments, but the proportion of larger sizes is no greater now than it was three years ago. In short, their size patterns have not changed. Yet changes would be necessary if the stature of American men had been affected in any appreciable way by the year and a half or two years of military training.

Manufacturers of ready-to-wear shirts and undergarments agree with the clothing manufacturers that there has been no change in their size patterns despite the reports of numerous individuals who take "a size larger" today than they did before the war. As one manufacturer put it, the proportion of soldiers who need larger sizes in shirts or suits today than they did two years ago is so small that it has no effect on wholesalers. Salesmen naturally remember certain individual cases of increased chest development, but, taking the country by and large, there has been no appreciable change in the physique of the male portion of the population, at least as far as their clothing is concerned.

Cream shortening; add sugar gradually and beaten eggs; sift together flour, cinnamon, salt and baking powder; add one-half and mix well; add milk and remainder of dry ingredients to make soft dough. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4 inch thick and cut into strips about 4 inches long and 1/2 inch wide; roll in hands and twist each strip and bring ends together. Fry in deep hot fat. Drain and roll in powdered sugar.

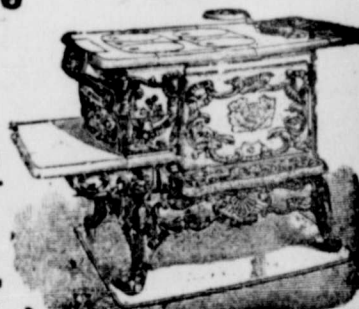

In Portugal

TO PORTUGAL, land of almost eternal sunshine, American investors are going, with great schemes for the development of the latent resources waiting only for the capital and energy necessary for their unfolding.

An electric railway will connect it with Lisbon and Cintra, whose chief attraction is the Pena castle. Cintra, once the home of the Moorish kings, and later occupied by the kings of Portugal.

A large casino is being erected on the beach, and several large hotels of American design and furnishings will be built along the shores of this charming site.

Everything but Energy. Portugal is a country rich in all things save in popular energy. Germany and France, until the late war, exploited its sardine industries, one of its most valuable items of commerce.

The Portuguese peasants have been called the most kindly and dependable of all Europe. Each province is distinguished by a different and most picturesque costume.

At the present time the Mother of Navigators, as Portugal has been named, is less known by geographers and archeologists than any other country on the continent.

Portugal is an agricultural country, but the sardine industry makes up a large part of her commerce. Millions of boxes of this product of Portuguese canners bear the imprint of French packers, some even with France as the country of origin.

The cork tree, which produces a new bark once in ten years, gives an important article for export. Each stripping furnishes about \$10 worth of bark per tree.

Ethnologically Portugal is a conglomerate. The people of the northern province of Entre Douro and Minho and Tras-os-Montes are of Galician stock.

The Jews, after their forced conversion by King Emmanuel, intermarried with all races. On the southern coast from Cape St. Vincent to the Spanish frontier the influence of African ancestry is very apparent.

Portugal has a distinct national personality in art, music and literature—each having a unique vigor. It

has been said that all Portuguese are singers. On fete days and on Sunday the roads abound with gayly costumed peasants carrying mandolins and singing the songs of Portugal.

In art and architecture the names Carlos Reis, Santos Braga, Teixeira Lopez, Colombano, Adelide Lima, Malho, Salgado, and Fernandez stand out. The cathedrals, veritable monuments to the architectural genius of succeeding generations, vie with the noblest examples of ecclesiastical edifices in Europe.

NOT YET FULLY CIVILIZED

Solomon Islanders at Times Apt to Go Back to Pleasant Diversion of Head Hunting.

The Solomon Islands are famous as one of the last strongholds of head-hunting and cannibalism. Some of the natives have been converted to a civilized respect for human life, but the native taste of the Solomon islander still approves a ceremonial feast once in a while, with several members of a hostile tribe tastily cooked and served.

Head-hunting has for centuries been a part of the islander's religion and is pursued with great zeal and a kind of ecstatic enjoyment to all except the victims. Head-hunters from one tribe set out for a hunt to the lands of another tribe.

If the attacked tribe knows of the plan beforehand it will retire to its tree houses, where it is safe for a while. These houses are built fifty or sixty feet from the ground in the branches of giant trees.

Usually a hunt is now instituted only for one or two sacrifices, and skulls as decorations in the houses are less fashionable than they once were.

Grand Canyon of Arizona, Now a National Park, Called Most Sublime of Earthly Spectacles.

Grand Canyon National park, in the northwest corner of Arizona, is the newest of our national playgrounds, having been brought into the national park family by an act of congress in 1909.

The canyon is a titanic gash in the earth's crust, a stupendous chasm, in places 10 to 13 miles wide from rim to rim, over 200 miles long and more than a mile deep.

Now the skill of man has made it accessible both by train and by automobile, and every year thousands of tourists view this crowning wonder of the American west.

NEW STREET-LIGHTING PLAN

Kansas City Authorities Believe They Have an Improvement on the Cluster Effect.

Something new in the way of street lights is planned for Baltimore avenue by property owners between Twelfth street and Southwest boulevard, says the Kansas City Star.

The accompanying illustration shows the style of light and standard the property owners have adopted. It is the same style used along Michigan avenue in Chicago—a single pear-



shaped opaque globe on a graceful reinforced concrete standard. There will be 36 such lights on widened Baltimore avenue and the council already has passed an ordinance authorizing them.

The light will be "staggered" at approximately 100-foot intervals. Tests show that with the internal reflectors the single light will give greater efficiency than the old-fashioned clusters.

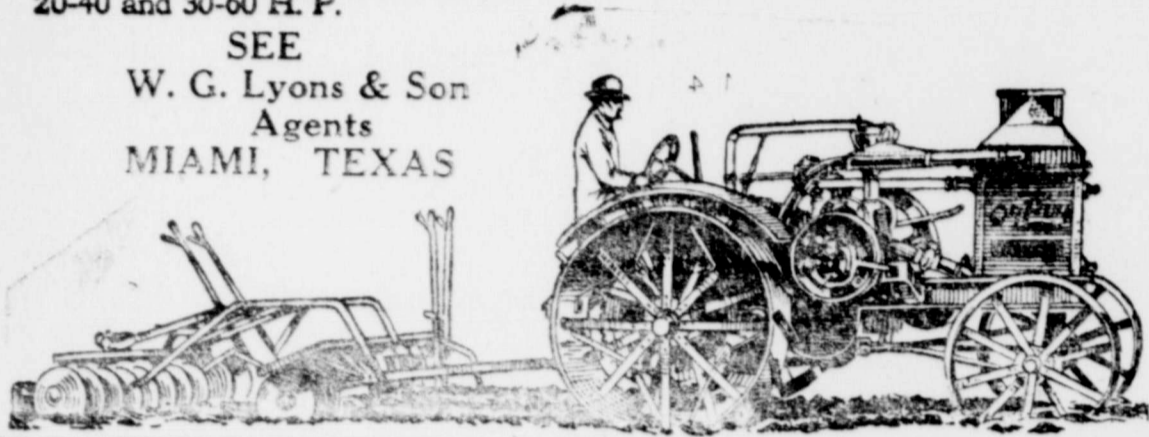
