WHITTLIN'

Because we supported it and favored it, we were disappointed that the school bond election failed. It didn't only fail, it fell flat on its face, being defeated by a margin of more than 2-1. Never before have we felt so outnumbered. As the editorial in last week's issue of The Blade pointed out, we were for approval of the bond issue and the improvements and expansion proposed for the school facilities. As it turned out, we were in the distinct minority. The feeling which this brings about is, no doubt, akin to what those unfortunates who voted for Goldwater back in '64 must have felt.

Even though we were on the losing side in the election, it is our sincere belief that no direct damage has been done to the school system or to the community.

Indirectly, however, the story could be a different one. This was the first time, for instance, that a major bond election here has failed to carry. Maybe we've been lucky up to now in that respect. It's a bad sign to have bond elections defeated when you have dedicated, sincere local governments making the proposals. A defeat indicates negative thinking to a certain extent and that is bad, we feel.

When negative thinking becomes dominant in a community, and certainly we're not saying such is the case here now, progress is handicapped.

Ask 10 different people why the election failed to carry and you're apt to get 10 different answers. Here are some of those:

1. "There was no immediate need for the things proposed;"
2. "The plans were not definite enough to suit me;"
3. "Our taxes are too high now. We don't need to be increasing them;"
4. "We should build more classrooms before we consider spending money for athletic facilities;"
5. "The proposed program would have cost more than the 22 per cent they said it would;"
6. "We don't think that school enrollment will continue to increase as much in the future as it has in the past;"
7. "The farm program (cut-back of up to 50 per cent of productive acres) has made everyone cautious about business and borrowing money;"
8. "We'll build what we need when we need it—not what we need 10 years from now;"
9. "The school board has no business with a blank check signed by the taxpayers;"
10. "If the election had been broken down into different parts instead of being it just one big package, the people would have liked it better."

There's some overlap in those answers, of course, and there are probably a lot more different reasons for the election to fail.

Some people feel that there was a lack of information available to the people about the election and that this caused some to vote against the bond issue. We heartily disagree with that theory, of course, because part of our business is public information. If we had known a better way to tell people about the bond issue, we would have done it. The people who sincerely wanted to know about the election had access to all the information. No attempt was made to withhold information or to present it in a way which would influence a vote in favor of the \$600,000 bond issue.

We hope that Saturday's election outcome won't hinder the present school board, or any board in the future, from doing what it thinks is best for the progressive improvement of the school.

In all fairness, maybe we should point out here that a vast majority of the people who told us they were against the bond issue also said they were in favor of a better and improved

Freakish Snow Surprises Area

A freakish, late season snow surprised residents of the area Tuesday morning.

The snow, which was unexpected, totaled approximately four inches here. It was reported to be heavier—up to an eight-inch total—west of town.

Though the snow was a surprise, it was a pleasant one because of the much-needed moisture which accompanied it. The moisture total was estimated at .25 of an inch.

The humidity was high Monday prior to the snow Tuesday night and the temperature was unseasonably low. This might have been a clue as to what was to come to the astute weather observer.

Though temperatures were lower than usual Monday and Monday night they were still exceptionally warm for a snow. Even at the temperature rate, though, the snow hung on for a few hours Tuesday morning. Then it melted as quickly and as quietly as it had started.

Roads were not slick from the snow because of the lack of ice.

Though farmers were appreciative for the moisture, the total wasn't enough to eliminate the serious dry spell which has been with the area since winter.

The program was sponsored

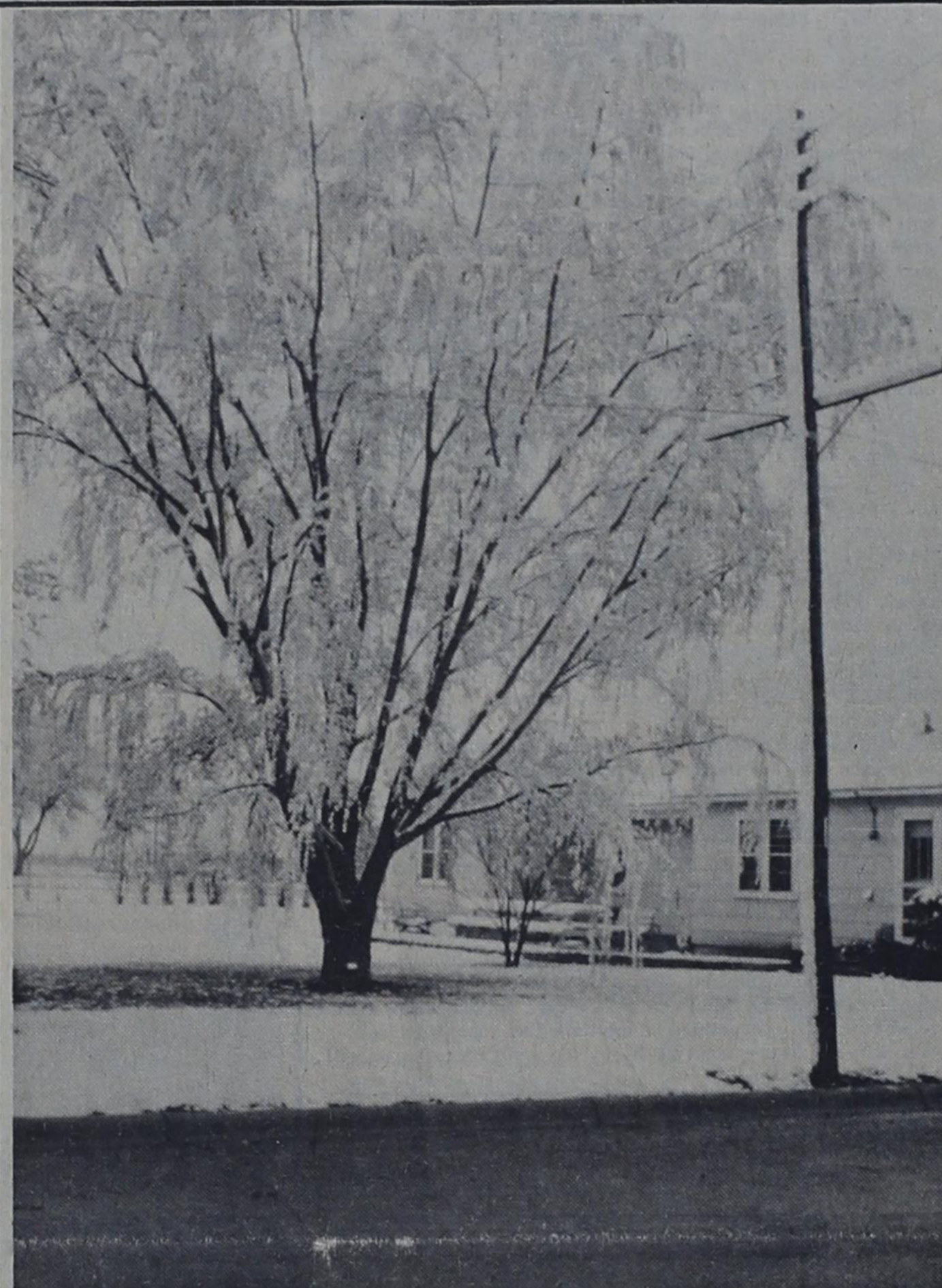
for the clinic fund by Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Caldwell Elected Bovina Mayor

Bedford Caldwell is new mayor of Bovina.

He led a field of three candidates in Tuesday's city balloting.

Caldwell unseated a veteran city official, Boyd Gilreath, who has been the town's mayor for the past four terms.

Gilreath ran a close second in the race.

Caldwell had 90 votes, Gilreath 80, and Jimmy Ware 48.

Named to three vacant positions on the city council were Charles Corn, Billie Sudderth and Owen Patton. They lead a field of five candidates.

Jaycees' Easter Egg Hunt Here Sunday

Bovina Jaycees will stage a gigantic Easter egg hunt for youngsters of the community Sunday.

The hunt, which will be for children through 12 years old, will be one and a half miles west of town on the Pleasant

Hill highway and then one mile north. It is scheduled to begin at 3 p.m. A total of 6,600 eggs will be

hidden by Jaycees for youngsters in four age groups. Age groups are 0-3, 4-7, 8-10 and 11-12. Each age group will have a roped-off area.

A trophy will be presented in each age group to the youngster who finds the prize egg, announces Billy Whitecotton, a member of the Jaycee committee in charge of the Easter egg hunt.

This will be the second annual hunt here. Last year's event, which was held in the city park, attracted an estimated 400 Easter egg hunters.

Jaycees hope to have as many as 600 for the event this year. Soft drinks will be available at the site of this year's hunt, Whitecotton announces. Also, there will be some seating provided for adults who accompany the youngsters to the hunt.

If there's anything better than sponsoring a nice group of players, it's sponsoring a nice group of winning players!

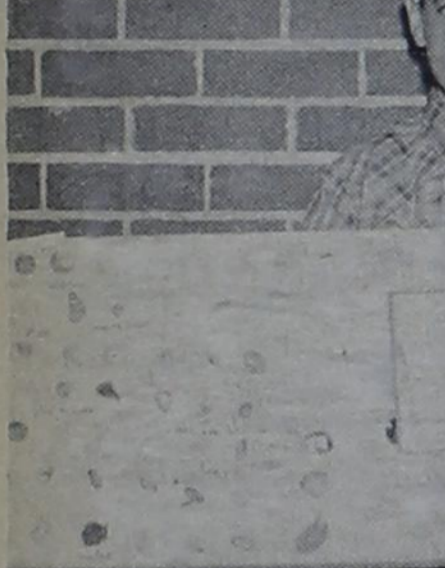

152; Sudderth, 131; Patton, 129; Dolph Moten, 108; and Sonny Spurlin, 86.

A total of 216 voters went to the polls Tuesday, according to A. B. Wilkinson, election judge.

Receiving write-in votes, one each, were Lloyd Gober, a retiring member of the council; Carl Rea, and Bob Estes.

Assisting Wilkinson in holding the election, which was in the American Legion Hall were L. M. Grissom, Mrs. Allen Cumpston and Mrs. Lloyd Gober.

The mayor and the three new councilmen will join two hold-over council members on the city board. The holdovers, with one year remaining on their terms, are Edward Issac and C. E. Trimble.

The city government is presently on the brink of a \$48,000 water system improvement and expansion program and a new paving program is set to be launched in the near future.

Corn was a candidate to succeed himself on the board. He was appointed several months ago to fill an unexpired term. Tom Bonds and Gober are the other councilmen whose terms expired.

This year's vote total was more than twice as much as last year's 107 and was one of the highest turnouts in history. Other previous totals were 143 in '64 and 94 in 1963.

Dear Fellow Texan:

At the present time, Texas ranks 30th in the Nation in expenditures per capita for education, but its libraries are ranked an even lower 37th in the Nation - an exceptionally low level for a state which is sixth in the Nation in gross income.

Education is the key to future progress. Adequate library facilities are essential tools for learning for both adults and children in school or out of school. Yet, almost one million Texans - close to 10 per cent of all the people in Texas do not have access to any public libraries, an embarrassing fact which is a contributing factor in our lack of educational progress.

At the present time, Texas spends 84¢ per person a year on libraries, while the National level is \$1.50 - almost twice as high as the Texas level. There are barely 1 1/2 million Texans who have access to a nationally average library, which means that more than 8 1/2 million Texans have below the national average in library service.

Since I came to the Senate in 1958, Texas has received almost \$4 1/2 million in Federal money for libraries under the matching grant provisions of the Library Services Act. An additional \$11 million has been received under the Higher Education Facilities Act for libraries in Texas. It is estimated that Texas will receive another \$15 million this year alone for the upgrading of its libraries from the Federal government under various library acts we passed.

I have supported every bill of library assistance that has come before the Senate in this past nine years, because I realize the necessity of libraries and the poor status of libraries in Texas. I also recognize that the Federal government cannot and should not provide all the money. For Texas to rise out of its impoverished library condition, it is necessary that the State government provide the necessary matching funds for these Federal programs.

By its failure to build and support libraries in the past and its failure to provide the necessary matching funds, Texas has lost out each year in obtaining all the Federal matching funds available to it for its libraries. Much of what has been done in Texas in recent years in public library service is a result of matching funds furnished through the Federal government. First, under the Library Services Act applying to rural cities of 10,000 population or less, and then the Library Services Act applying to all cities of whatever size and now the Higher Education Facilities Act, Higher Education Act and Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

I will continue to support these Federal programs for library assistance and I will continue to vote for the appropriations to make them effective programs. But until the government of Texas concerns itself with our drastic library situation and votes the sufficient Texas matching funds to utilize the Federal monies available, these Federal programs alone cannot raise Texas from its position of 37th in the Nation.

More must be done about the library situation in Texas. Now it is time for the government of Texas to take proper action to insure that our libraries are given enough money to serve the people of Texas adequately. Texas has started, it is moving, but it must move more rapidly to bring Texas into the mainstream of educational opportunities in the Nation with books as well as with schools. There must be books for adult education as well as books in the schools.

Teter and Bob Wilson are running for the three positions.

SIX YEARS AGO... April 6, 1960

For the first time since '56, Bovina Lions will stage their always popular Minstrel Show, Friday. Proceeds for the show will be used by Lions Club for its various civic projects, especially the summer youth program, Lion Boss Wendol Christian, points out.

Marion Carson, a write-in candidate, and Grady Sorley were elected to the school board Saturday. Both are farmers. Carson, whose name was brought into a write-in campaign less than a month ago, polled more votes than any other candidates. Another write-in candidate, Billy Marshall, missed election by only 11 points.

Bovina will have entries in all three divisions of the district track meet at Happy Saturday. Freshmen and junior high teams will be defending champions in their divisions. Several freshman athletes will compete in both freshman and high school divisions.

TEN YEARS AGO... March 21, 1956

Construction began Monday morning on the Sands Motel, a 10-unit building that will be located on the north side of Highway 60 in Bovina. Raymond Sudderth, local real estate man, is building the motel.

Farmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace told the Bovina city commission Monday night in a called meeting at the city hall that the city commissioners court had agreed to pay \$150 a month toward the salary of a combination deputy sheriff and city marshal for Bovina. The Bovina officials agreed to let the recently-appointed planning board decide if the people of Bovina wanted to create such an office. The planning board will also study the city's financial statement and determine if the city can afford to pay the remainder of the salary.

SIX YEARS AGO... March 23, 1960

During the past nine years, Bovina has been one of the fastest growing towns in Texas. Confirmation of this locally-suspected fact was made recently by Texas Municipal League, an organization for cities in the state. It is headquartered in Austin.

A news release from the league says: "Texas small towns -- incorporated cities under 10,000 population -- will generally register steady rates of growth on the 1960 census next month. Bovina and Friona were among the 17 Texas towns which have more than doubled population since 1950."

SNIFFLER-CHASERS

Wouldn't you rather eat a tangerine or sip its juice than take a pill to relieve your sniffles?

Cold sufferers should welcome this good news from the U. S. Department of Agriculture. At the Florida Agricultural Experiment Station recently researchers were studying how plants use nitrogen from fertilizers when they made an exciting discovery. They found that tangerines contain the decongestant synephrine in an abundant amount.

Prior to its discovery in nature, synephrine was made in the laboratory and medically prescribed as a stimulant and decongestant for the relief of colds. Since 1927, it has been recommended for children and adults in minimum doses of 100 milligrams. An equivalent amount is contained in only 8 to 12 ounces of tangerine juice, the researchers explain.

Although citrus fruits have long been recommended for warding off colds, there is the new possibility that eating tangerines can give relief from sniffles after you catch a cold. So reach for a tangerine or some vitamin C rich food instead of a "sweet morsel", when tempted to nibble. It has much less calories too.

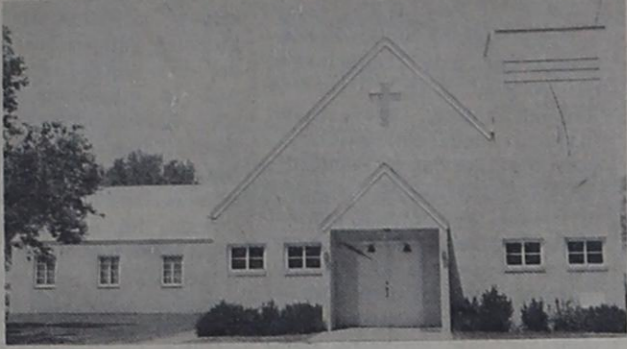

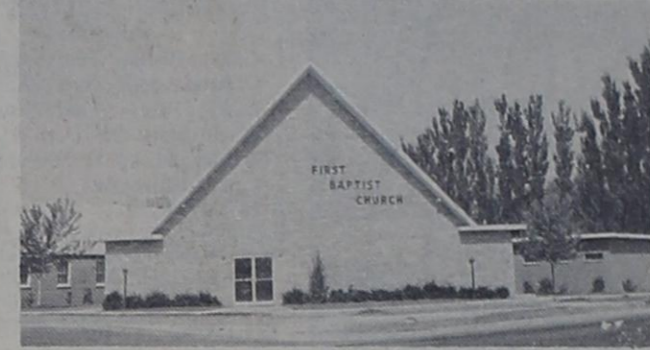

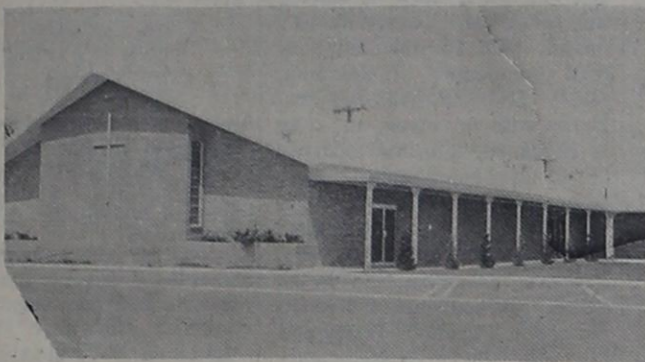

I have finished the work which Thou gavest Me to do, John 17:4

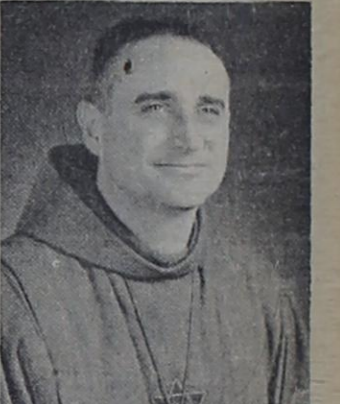

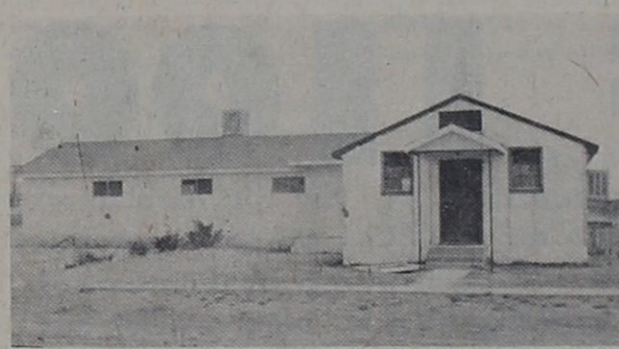

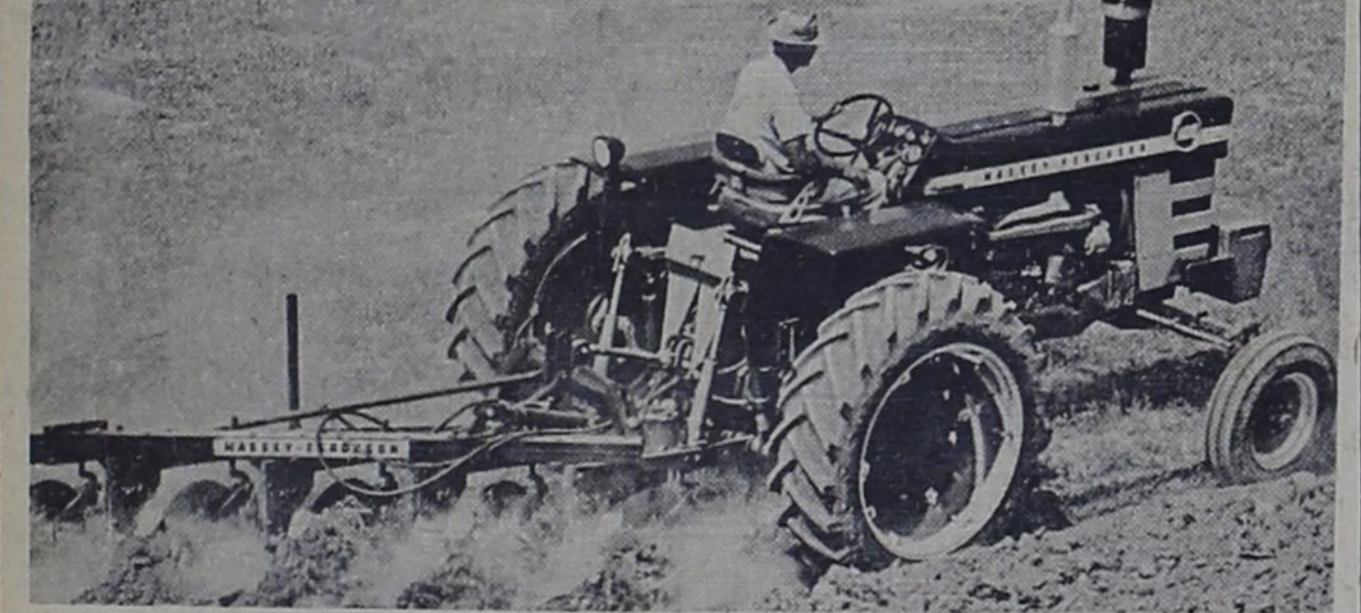

On The Farm In Palmer County

By JOE VANZANDT

Charcoal rot of sorghum can be a serious disease in grain sorghum here in Palmer County. The fungus is known to attack at least 280 other species of plants, including several which are economically important in this area.

The disease may cause seedling blight of late planted sorghum, but generally the greatest damage occurs as the plants near maturity. Sudden lodging occurs in the field at this stage. A red or black rot develops and quickly disappears, sometimes within 48 hours. Therefore, the rot is often overlooked.

If lodged stalks are split and closely examined, the pith will be in various stages of destruction. This may occur in several internodes above the ground and into the roots below the soil surface. At maturity, heads of diseased plants

are not fully developed and a poor yield of shrunken grain. Charcoal rot is caused by a fungus which can exist in more than one form. The one causing charcoal rot is called *Macrophoma phaseoli*. The growth of the organism and its ability to cause plant diseases are greatly influenced by temperatures, moisture and association with microflora. The fungus is very resistant to adverse environmental conditions, being able to survive plus the wide range of host plants means that many soils are infested with the fungus.

High temperatures and moisture stress favor the development of the disease. Recent information indicates that moisture stress, temperatures of 95 degrees F. or higher, and sorghum plants that bloomed two to four weeks before these conditions exist are

necessary for severe damage from charcoal rot. Plant population may have indirect effect. Under conditions of moisture stress heavier stands appear to suffer more because of need for more moisture. The disease appears to be worse on land continuously cropped to sorghum.

Since all hybrid grain sorghums are susceptible, management practices which will develop the sorghum past the danger period before moisture stress and high temperatures occur should be used. Under irrigation needed moisture can be supplied and adequate waterings is the main way area farmers can help fight charcoal rot.

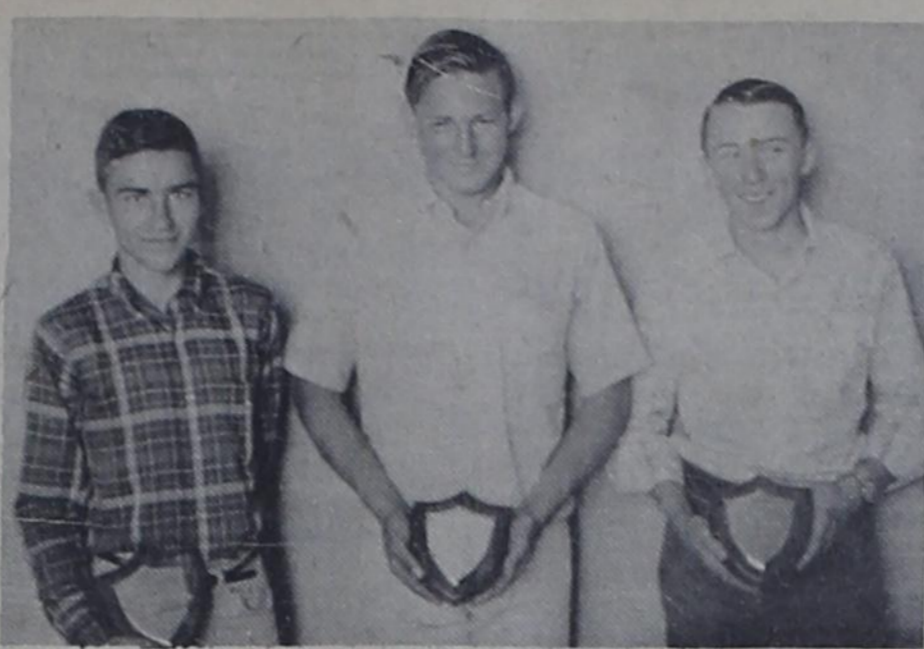

John Littlefield, district supervisor for the Lazbuddie Community, supervised the contest and presented the awards.

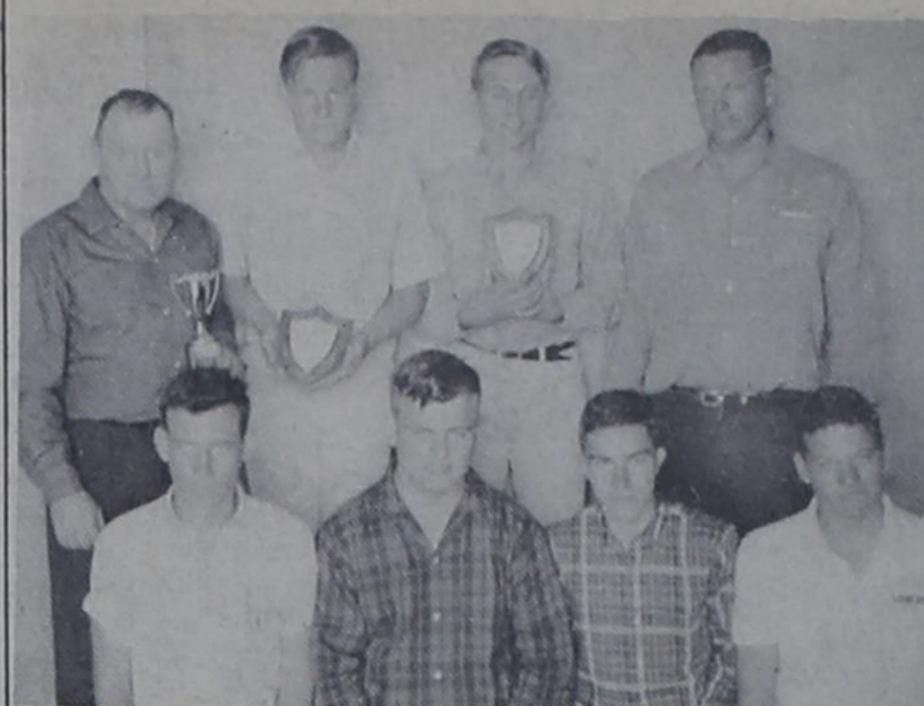
Happy Wins 1-Act Play Competition

Spring puts the zing in bass fishing, because it's that magical time of year when the largest fish are caught. And there are but two things you must know to catch these lunkers: 1) how to find them and 2) how to fool them.

Some fishermen believe big bass are where you find them. Well, after you've found one that's true. But there are methods that will keep you fishing where big bass are known to be, and thus increase your chances of catching them.

The primary item to consider is, how early can you start bass fishing? Some will tell you, right after the ice leaves the lakes. Others will tell you, when the water temperature reaches 55 to 62 degrees.

When water temperature falls below 55 degrees, the metabolism of the bass declines in proportion. "The lower it drops, the more torpid become the bass, until virtually all need for feeding ceases to exist," points out Homer Circle, Special Features Editor of Sports Afield Magazine. But at 55 degrees, the water is as compatible to a bass as 85-degree bath water is to you. And at 55 degrees or more, bass start looking for a place to spawn.

Spawning areas are easier to locate in lakes than in streams. One way is to observe the shore surface: where you see a rocky or gravelly terrain, then the lake bottom should be rocky or gravelly also. The other way is to

slowly cruise the shoreline, looking for those telltale light, circular spots in three to four feet of water. These are bass beds which the male makes by fanning his tail and sweeping always the silt, right down to gravel or rocks.

Such areas are your primary targets. Secondary areas would be shallow bays with stumps, or weed beds just beginning to show signs of growth. This is where the bass will come for its food, between periods of lowest construction.

The general rule for fishing in early spring is—slow and deep. This calls for lures like the jig, or jig-and-worm combinations; spoons; weighted spinners; bucktails and pork eels. These can be retrieved so slowly they'll nudge the bottom, and that's deadly at times.

Hromas Boy Hurt Friday

Greg Hromas, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Hromas, received a severe head and shoulder injury in an accident Friday afternoon at Bovina

Wheat Growers' elevator on the south side of the railroad here. Greg was playing at the elevator with some other boys at the time of the accident. He went to the top of the elevator on a man-lift. After getting to the top and into the elevator, he struck his head and shoulder, causing a severe laceration on his head.

Norman Jones and Bob Holcomb, employees of Bonds Oil Co., which is nearby across the tracks north of the elevator, heard Greg's cries for help and quickly rescued him from a top of the elevator.

He was rushed to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona. He was released from the hospital Sunday afternoon.

The man-lift is counter-balanced for a man weighing approximately 180 pounds, according to Jerry Wright, assistant manager of the elevator. Thus, Greg's weight of less than 100 pounds caused the lift to go up much faster than it would with a man. After reaching the top and the headhouse, the extra force caused Greg to strike his head and shoulder, resulting in the injury.

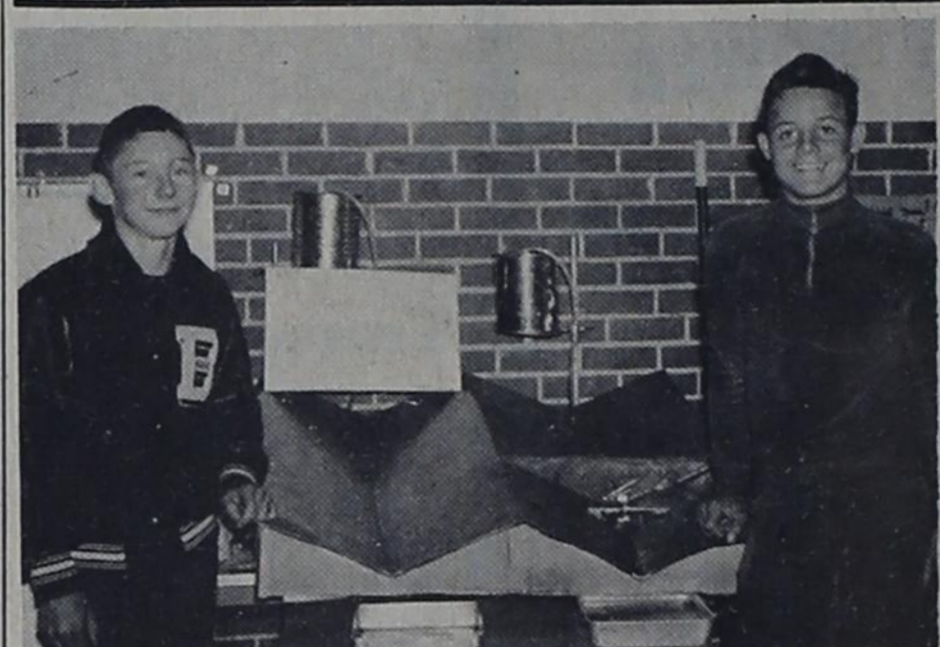
