Newspaper 1894 Reaches us

We have discovered two older newspapers than the Chief which have been published here

Miami is really an older newspaper than we thought, and in the past had two newspapers before the Chief was established. Through the courtesy of H. P. Chisum, who preserved them we have with us a copy of THE MIAMI NEWS, published on Dec. 21, 1894. It is also a copy of THE TEXAS PANHANDLE, which was published in Miami Jan. 14, 1898.

Among the interesting things in the issue of THE MIAMI NEWS, which was published by Jno. B. Street, and dated Dec. 21, 1894, we learn that the paper was at that time six months old, and that it had only six months. The Official Actory at that time was as follows: M. Baker, District Judge, E. C. G. District Attorney, T. M. Cunningham County Judge, R. P. Hutton Sheriff, S. G. Carter, Treasurer, Jno. W. Clark, Clerk and C. A. Whaley, Assessor. The county Commissioners were J. A. King, F. N. Hamilton, W. Ledrick and H. P. Chisum.

At the annual Conference of the M. E. Church held at Amarillo last week, a new pastor was appointed to fill the local pulpit for the coming year. He is Rev. E. P. Bowen, but we have failed to learn just where from to Miami.

Rev. Ed. R. Wallace has been transferred to the White Deer and Green circuit and will move his family this week. Rev. Wallace has done a good years work at Miami, and the members regret to see him go.

Rev. P. G. Huffman, we note from the list was sent to Stratford for the coming year.

Among the other nearby appointments were for Canadian, Rev. A. B. Davidson; General Evangelist, Rev. F. M. Neal, Conference Sunday School Secretary, W. H. Tory.

New M. E. Pastor Here

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Miami 1; Canadian 0 Foot Ball Game

The High School Team which stepped on the gridiron at Canadian last Saturday was not typical of the older combination, George-Elkins-Barhart, of former years, and often referred to as the best team which ever represented Miami, but the old fight which characterized all former teams, was present in a condensed dose. The "purple and gold" was surpassed by the Canadian team in weight, age, and in the number of experienced players, but Miami surpassed Canadian in team work, and pure grit as unquestionably, as several of the Canadian players surpassed the age of twenty one. The team which represented Canadian was not a High School Team, and as such can lay no claim to the game, which automatically belongs to Miami 1 to 0.

The rooters of Miami stood solid behind their team to the last quarter, and the team even in the face of adverse officiating-officiating which drew for the light Miami team penalties aggregating over the length of the field—fought the Canadian team off its feet and ripped the "orange and black" line open from end to end on line bucks. Ed Russell hit left tackle for fifteen yards and our only touchdown. By straight bucks Miami carried the ball four separate times to within ten yard line, but failed to score on downs or else drew such heavy penalties that she could not put the pigskin over. The people of Miami ought to be proud of their team, and the team is working hard to be worthy of their loyal support.

Miami kicked off and Canadian was downed in place. After trying their line bucks and end runs, Canadian had to resort to a criss-cross end run, and the forward pass. For the remainder of the game these were the only two plays which amounted to a reasonable gain. They worked well against a string of in-experienced forwards. Stone, Waterfield, and Green Ayers were the outstanding stars for Canadian. For Miami, Stribling proved to be a good strapping. Alexander's game at center is going to win Panhandle recognition before the season is over and the backs would place on any high school team in the state. Cunningham was crippled before the game but managed the team like a veteran, and the end runs of Russel, line plunging of Humphries, and the strong defensive work of Nelson, featured Miami's playing. The two wins for the first game of the season did well, but were light and a little nervous, and a little too anxious to get into the plays. They were pitted against two of Canadian's best players, and were handicapped severely.

Mr. and Mrs. Rhoten will make their home in Miami, and have the good wishes of many friends.

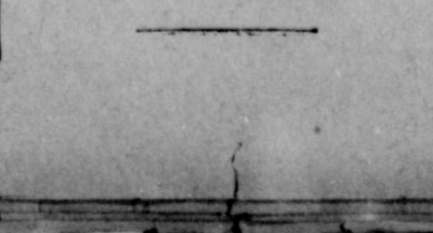

CANYON ON AIR ROUTE EL PASO TO TULSA

The government is establishing air routes over the country, and has given notice to Postmaster A. W. Blough that a line passes through Canyon from El Paso to Tulsa. This explains the meaning of the line of signal towers which have been erected during the past few weeks by government agents.

The Government asks that each town designate landing fields, to mark and maintain the same. These landing fields may be used either by commercial planes or government planes. The government believes that when the routes are fully developed there will be a great amount of traffic, and that the landing fields will be equipped with radio, air-ports, etc.—Canyon News.

UNCLE SAM CHECKS UP \$500,000,000 GOLD IMPORTS

Our gold imports have now passed the \$500,000,000 mark since January 1, 1921. The official figures for the eight months' period ending August 31st show the enormous total of \$496,451,732 in American vaults from overseas.

Never before has there been such a flood tide of gold bullion rolling in upon us, and never before has the United States occupied its present dominant position as the creditor nation of all the world. On this foundation of solid gold our next era of prosperity will rest, and already now easier credit facilities and easier money rates are paving the way for a gradually advancing state of general business activity.

During the last eleven days of the golden tide before September 1st the shipments of bullion and specie rose to \$31,607,859 of which European nations supplied more than three-fourths. Among the European contributors to our half billion gold imports Great Britain leads with \$143,108,454, followed by France with \$136,320,603 for the eight months' period, writes Sugarman's Indicator.

The Kitchen Cabinet

Oh! for a new generation of day dreamers. They will not ask whether life is worth living—they will make it so. They will transform the sordid "struggle for existence" into glorious effort to become that which they have admired and loved.

EVERYDAY GOOD THINGS.

A good custard pie well made and baked in a dessert which it is hard to equal. It is not necessary to use four eggs to a pie nor are three indispensable—two eggs with a tablespoonful of flour mixed with the sugar will make a very good custard. If one desires a richer custard, three eggs may be used.

Coffee Custard.—To three slightly beaten eggs add one-half cupful of sugar, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, one cupful of strong coffee and a cupful of cream. Strain into cups, set in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven until firm. Serve cold with:

Caramel Sauce.—Melt one-half cupful of sugar in a smooth omelet pan, stirring constantly. When melted add one-half cupful of boiling water and simmer until the sugar is dissolved.

Potato Timbale.—Spread a pan thickly with butter, then cover with fine dry crumbs, roll beaten egg lightly all over the surface, then dust with crumbs again. Fill the pan with hot mashed potato, seasoned highly with salt, pepper and butter, onion juice with cream and two egg yolks to each pint of potato. Bake thirty minutes in a moderately hot oven. Invert on a hot platter and let stand ten minutes before removing the mold.

Popovers.—Beat one egg until light, add one cupful of milk to the beaten yolk, then stir in one cupful of flour and fold in the egg white with one-eighth of a teaspoonful of salt. Bake in deep granite or crockery cups, well greased. This recipe makes seven popovers which should bake about 40 minutes in an oven hot enough to bake bread.

A DAY WITH SALADS.

A salad may be prepared of almost any edible food. Beginning the meal, a mixture of fruit is called a cocktail, and may consist of any combination pleasing to the palate. A delicious one is prepared of balls of yellow muskmelon, using a potato scoop to prepare the balls, and the fruit should be ripe but firm. Fill the glasses with the golden balls and pour over a nutmeg sauce, using orange juice, a dash of lemon, sugar and grated nutmeg for flavor. Cool, and pour over the muskmelons, and serve with a sprig of mint or chervil for a garnish. A sauce of ginger sirup with some of the canton ginger added, finely chopped, makes a delightful combination for those who enjoy ginger.

Marshmallow and Apple Salad.—Take finely cubed, good-flavored apples, sprinkle with lemon juice, add a few blanched almonds and equal quantities of celery, then a generous handful of quartered marshmallows; stir into a cupful of whipped cream, three tablespoonfuls of boiled salad dressing, adding such seasoning as seems good, and serve.

Date Salad.—Cut an orange into sections, using care to keep them whole, removing the connecting tissue; add one cupful of diced celery, one-half cupful of nuts minced in bits and two cupfuls of diced apple with one-half cupful of dates. Add a spoonful of lemon juice, and serve with any good, well-seasoned salad dressing.

A most delicious salad combination is apple, pear and celery. Add any desired salad dressing and serve on head lettuce hearts. Shred the apple, celery and pears in uniform strips, marinate with French dressing for an hour before serving.

Salad combinations are not always easy to conform to the recipe in hand. One must use imagination and substitution—a bit of this and a bit of that, much tasting and an eye for garnishing will make a pleasing salad out of odds of foods that would otherwise go to waste.

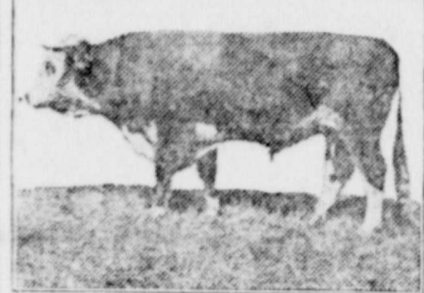
FARM LIVE STOCK

AID BETTER SIRE CAMPAIGN

More Than 5,000 Pastors to Carry Message into Rural Districts of the South.

Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The message that better sires offer an effective way of obtaining better live stock of all kinds is to be carried into rural districts of the South by more than 5,000 country pastors. In

accordance with a request from the board of missions of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, the United States Department of Agriculture has supplied the rural survey secretary of the board with the necessary information.

A stereopticon lecture based on a set of 70 lantern slides prepared by the bureau of animal industry is to be used as a part of the work. "We feel that we can be of material assistance to you," the rural survey secretary of the board stated to the department, "in carrying your message to the people who need it most."

CAUSE FOR UNTHRIFTY PIGS

Dr. Evvard of Iowa Station Suggests That Round Worms May Be at Bottom of Trouble.

When young pigs are not doing well, it may be that round worms are the cause of their unthriftiness. A 100-pound shote at the Iowa experiment station was very unthrifty. It was killed and examined. John M. Evvard, in charge of swine feeding work, says that in one-half foot of that hog's intestine there were 63 worms that weighed two-fifths of a pound.

To prevent such conditions, keep the pigs growing. Feed well. Keep the lots clean and free from rubbish. Drain the pastures and lots. For emergency cases use santonin and calomel, about five to ten grains each for a 100-pound pig, or 7½ to 15 grains each for a 200 to 300-pound pig. It may also be well to allow free access to such conditions as air-slaked lime, charcoal, slack coal, powdered sulphur, glauber's salts and common salt, these being allowed free choice style, each being placed in a separate compartment of a self feeder.

HORSE SHORTAGE IS FEARED

Secretary Dinsmore of Horse Association Says Demand for Draft Animal Is Strong.

Reporting the fact that citizens of Denver recently rejected an ordinance which, if passed, would have made it a horseless city, Wayne Dinsmore, secretary of the Horse Association of America, says in a recent communication received by the animal husbandry division at University farms:

"We need more good draft horses. The demand for them is stronger and prices are higher than at any time in history, and unless everything possible is done to bring about horse breeding we will have a shortage in coming years which will materially increase the cost of production and transportation."

FURNISH FOALS WITH GRAIN

When Pastures Begin to Dry Up Young Animals Must Have Feed for Best Development.

As the pastures commence to dry up the proper development of the foal calls for the feeding of a little grain in order to maintain the milk fat and keep the foal developing to the best advantage. Colts that belong to working mares should have a separate feed box and receive a little grain each time the mother is fed. Those on pasture should be provided with a creep where grain can be kept available for the foal at all times. If these methods are followed the colt will continue to gain and will not shrink when weaning time comes.

EWES DISOWN THEIR LAMBS

Trouble Sometimes Overcome by Penning Mother Up With Her Young—Other Plans.

Ewes that will not own their lambs may sometimes be induced to do so by penning ewes up and forcing them to permit the lamb to suck, a few lessons of this sort usually being sufficient. Some shepherds moisten the lamb's head and neck with the ewe's milk, claiming that this will make the ewe own the lamb. Shutting the ewe and her lamb by themselves for a few days should prove effective, though a vicious ewe will sometimes kill her own lamb if shut up alone with it.

Entering Legion work early, Mr. Chapman was a member of the committee which wrote the non-political clause into the organization's constitution. He boils down his biography to this: "I am a member of the A. F. & A. M., B. P. O. E., and K. of P. I am an American by birth, training and inclination; an Episcopalian by faith and a prohibitionist by law. I sing, dance, play the piano and am married. What else could I ask?"

General Douglas Haig, "Earl and Field Marshal"; Beatty, "Admiral of the Fleet."

Decorations and titles won by 42 distinguished British and Canadian guests at the third annual convention of the American Legion in Kansas City, October 31, November 1 and 2, are testimony of their notable records during the World war.

General Douglas Haig bears the titles of earl and field marshal and has the right to use the following letters, indicating decorations, after his name: "K. T., G. C. B., O. M., G. C. V., O. K. C. I. E."

Admiral Beatty's official designation is "Admiral of the Fleet, the Right Honorable Earl Beatty, G. C. B., O. M., G. C. V., O. D. S. O." The correct manner to address the commander of the Canadian corps in France is "Gen. Sir William Currie, G. C. M. G., K. C. B., K. C. M. G., C. B., Principal of McGill University."

SWALE WAS A DISHWASHER

Commander of Legion's Washington Department Licked Kitchen Boss, Then Took His Job.

The story of how a fist fight made him a dishwasher is told by Thomas W. Swale, commander of the American Legion's department of the state of Washington.

While the down-trodden bookkeeper of a Great Northern construction gang, Swale was enjoined into an encounter with the gang's bully, who held the rank of camp cleaner of the pots and pans. 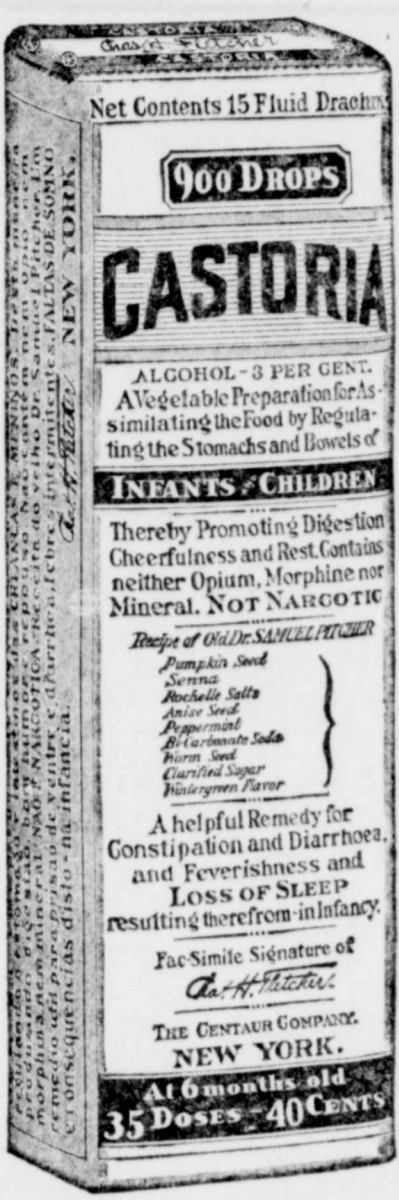

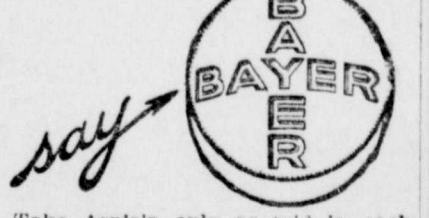

If one desires a richer custard, three eggs may be used.

Coffee Custard.—To three slightly beaten eggs add one-half cupful of sugar, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, one cupful of strong coffee and a cupful of cream. Strain into cups, set in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven until firm. Serve cold with:

Caramel Sauce.—Melt one-half cupful of sugar in a smooth omelet pan, stirring constantly. When melted add one-half cupful of boiling water and simmer until the sugar is dissolved.

Potato Timbale.—Spread a pan thickly with butter, then cover with fine dry crumbs, roll beaten egg lightly all over the surface, then dust with crumbs again. Fill the pan with hot mashed potato, seasoned highly with salt, pepper and butter, onion juice with cream and two egg yolks to each pint of potato. Bake thirty minutes in a moderately hot oven. Invert on a hot platter and let stand ten minutes before removing the mold.

Popovers.—Beat one egg until light, add one cupful of milk to the beaten yolk, then stir in one cupful of flour and fold in the egg white with one-eighth of a teaspoonful of salt. Bake in deep granite or crockery cups, well greased. This recipe makes seven popovers which should bake about 40 minutes in an oven hot enough to bake bread.

A DAY WITH SALADS.

A salad may be prepared of almost any edible food. Beginning the meal, a mixture of fruit is called a cocktail, and may consist of any combination pleasing to the palate. A delicious one is prepared of balls of yellow muskmelon, using a potato scoop to prepare the balls, and the fruit should be ripe but firm. Fill the g'lasses with the golden balls and pour over a nutmeg sauce, using orange juice, a dash of lemon, sugar and grated nutmeg for flavor. Cool, and pour over the muskmelons, and serve with a sprig of mint or chervil for a garnish. A sauce of ginger sirup with some of the canton ginger added, finely chopped, makes a delightful combination for those who enjoy ginger.

Marshmallow and Apple Salad.—Take finely cubed, good-flavored apples, sprinkle with lemon juice, add a few blanched almonds and equal quantities of celery, then a generous handful of quartered marshmallows; stir into a cupful of whipped cream, three tablespoonfuls of boiled salad dressing, adding such seasoning as seems good, and serve.

Date Salad.—Cut an orange into sections, using care to keep them whole, removing the connecting tissue; add one cupful of diced celery, one-half cupful of nut meats broken in bits and two cupfuls of diced apple with one-half cupful of dates. Add a spoonful of lemon juice, and serve with any good, well-seasoned salad dressing.

A most delicious salad combination is apple, pear and celery. Add any desired salad dressing and serve on head lettuce hearts. Shred the apple, celery and pears in uniform strips, marinate with French dressing for an hour before serving.

Salad combinations are not always easy to conform to the recipe in hand. One must use imagination and substitution—a bit of this and a bit of that, much tasting and an eye for garnishing will make a pleasing salad out of odds of foods that would otherwise go to waste.

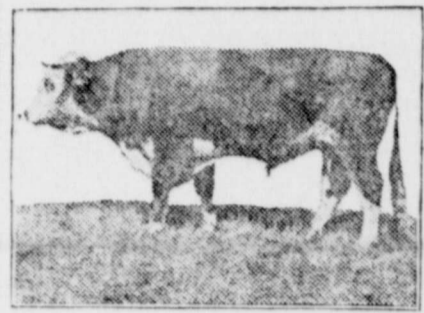
FARM LIVE STOCK

AID BETTER SIRE CAMPAIGN

More Than 5,000 Pastors to Carry Message Into Rural Districts of the South.

Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The message that better sires offer an effective way of obtaining better live stock of all kinds is to be carried into rural districts of the South by more than 5,000 country pastors. In

accordance with a request from the board of missions of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, the United States Department of Agriculture has supplied the rural survey secretary of the board with the necessary information.

A stereopticon lecture based on a set of 70 lantern slides prepared by the bureau of animal industry is to be used as a part of the work. "We feel that we can be of material assistance to you," the rural survey secretary of the board stated to the department, "in carrying your message to the people who need it most."

CAUSE FOR UNTHRIFTY PIGS

Dr. Evvard of Iowa Station Suggests That Round Worms May Be at Bottom of Trouble.

When young pigs are not doing well, it may be that round worms are the cause of their unthriftiness. A 100-pound shote at the Iowa experiment station was very unthrifty. It was killed and examined. John M. Evvard, in charge of swine feeding work, says that in one-half foot of that hog's intestine there were 63 worms that weighed two-fifths of a pound.

To prevent such conditions, keep the pigs growing. Feed well. Keep the lots clean and free from rubbish. Drain the pastures and lots. For emergency cases use santonin and calomel, about five to ten grains each for a 100-pound pig, or 7½ to 15 grains each for a 200 to 300-pound pig. It may also be well to allow free access to such conditions as air-slaked lime, charcoal, slack coal, powdered sulphur, glauber's salts and common salt, these being allowed free choice style, each being placed in a separate compartment of a self-feeder.

HORSE SHORTAGE IS FEARED

Secretary Dinsmore of Horse Association Says Demand for Draft Animal Is Strong.

Reporting the fact that citizens of Denver recently rejected an ordinance which, if passed, would have made it a horseless city, Wayne Dinsmore, secretary of the Horse Association of America, says in a recent communication received by the animal husbandry division at University farm:

"We need more good draft horses. The demand for them is stronger and prices are higher than at any time in history, and unless everything possible is done to bring about horse breeding we will have a shortage in coming years which will materially increase the cost of production and transportation."

FURNISH FOALS WITH GRAIN

When Pastures Begin to Dry Up Young Animals Must Have Feed for Best Development.

As the pastures commence to dry up the proper development of the foal calls for the feeding of a little grain in order to maintain the milk fat and keep the foal developing to the best advantage. Colts that belong to working mares should have a separate feed box and receive a little grain each time the mother is fed. Those on pasture should be provided with a creep where grain can be kept available for the foal at all times. If these methods are followed the colt will continue to gain and will not shrink when weaning time comes.

EWES DISOWN THEIR LAMBS

Trouble Sometimes Overcome by Penning Mother Up With Her Young—Other Plans.

Ewes that will not own their lambs may sometimes be induced to do so by penning ewes up and forcing them to permit the lamb to suck, a few lessons of this sort usually being sufficient. Some shepherds moisten the lamb's head and neck with the ewe's milk, claiming that this will make the ewe own the lamb. Shutting the ewe and her lamb by themselves for a few days should prove effective, though a vicious ewe will sometimes kill her own lamb if shut up alone with it.

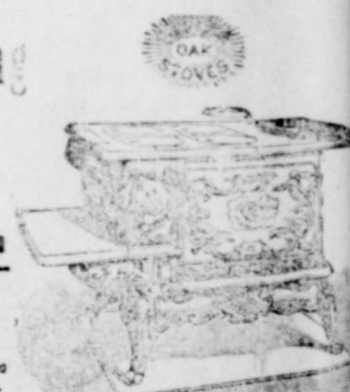

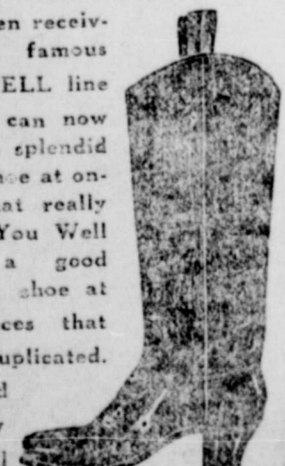

Highway Improvement

GOOD ROADS AID PROSPERITY

Instance Cited of Virginia Community Where Great Progress Has Been Accomplished.

That good roads are closely related to prosperity there is no question of doubt. Only a few years ago this section of Virginia had but one macadam road, one creamery, which went to the wall, and a mere handful of pure-bred dairy cattle, writes C. C. Conger, Jr., of Virginia in the Practical Farmer. One not familiar with the many blessings good roads bring about might wonder in what way good roads would affect creameries and pure-bred cows. Let us take, for instance, Rockingham county, and see just what good roads did in this section in the dairy business alone, to say nothing of the prosperity good roads brought about in various other ways. Previous to our good roads the one creamery did some business during the summer months, when the dirt roads were at their best, but business dwindled to nothing during the winter months because farmers could not get over the roads to deliver their milk. The creamery finally closed down for the lack of milk. About this time a mere handful of progressive farmers began a movement for better roads, calling a meeting at a little village centrally located in the county. The attendance was good, and a great deal of "good roads" enthusiasm was aroused. It was the first step in better roads that gained impetus by leaps and bounds. Today, in a few short years, we have a network of fine macadam roads throughout the entire county. Following good roads came creameries. They sprang up over night like mushrooms, till today the county is dotted with creameries, the sight of which does not look much like closing down for the lack of milk, particularly during the early hours of the day, when auto trucks are pouring in from the country, bringing milk from every nook and corner of the county. Pure-bred cows came with the creameries, till today scrub stock no longer dominates our farms. Ask any farmer why he disposed of his scrub cows, replacing them with pure breeds, and he will tell you the creameries did it.

Ask him what brought the creameries, and he will tell you better roads. While milk has slumped somewhat at times in this section, it has never halted the dairy business, and farmers are now reporting fair profits in dairying. The wealth that good roads has brought to this section in dairying alone is astonishing. We are striving for more wealth and prosperity by building still more good roads. Experience has taught us that good roads, wealth and prosperity go hand in hand.

ROAD MARKERS AID TOURISTS

Trunk Highways Designated by Number to Correspond With One on Official Map.

Since the adoption of a standardized system of highway markers by the state of Wisconsin, five other states and England have followed the model plan. Each of the state trunk highways is designated by number to correspond to the number on the official road map. Markers have been placed at close intervals carrying the number shown on the map, making it easy for the tourist to reach the most remote villages in the state.

AUTHORITY ON ROAD TRAFFIC

William Phelps Eno, Graduate of Yale College, is an Expert on Highways.

HOME TOWN HELPS

QUESTION OF TREE PLANTING

Problem Is Worthy of Very Much More Consideration Than Is Usually Given It.

What kind of tree should one plant beside one's home? asks Good House-keeping. Obviously it should be a fast grower. Also it should be ornamental. Preferably it should give a shade that is lofty and not too dense. A productive tree will answer as well as one that is merely ornamental. If a grafted tree is planted rather than a seedling it will produce in a very few years.

Nut trees are both ornamental and productive. The black walnut and the pecan seem to be well suited to this sort of planting. Why not try one or the other, or possibly both, one on each side of the house?

The black walnut is a rapid grower, reaches large size, and has foliage of great beauty. A mature tree will produce a great quantity of nuts. The pecan is also large and beautiful, as well as long-lived. Among the most beautiful and stately of the trees at Mount Vernon are pecan trees planted by George Washington and still in excellent condition. Commonly one thinks of the pecan as a tree for warm latitudes only. Both it and the English walnut will thrive much farther north than is commonly supposed. For planting near the house, then, the black walnut, the pecan or a good shagbark tree would be an excellent choice. The foliage of the walnut is always beautiful and in the fall the leaves of both the hickory and the pecan are symphonies in brown.

ECONOMIC VALUE OF PAINT

Great Mistake to Imagine That the Only Use of the Brush is for Ornamentation.

Observation in most localities leaves the impression that too many buildings suffer from lack of painting. A great many property owners seem to assume that the use of the paint brush is the special prerogative of the rich, that it holds no advantage for the average man, if he can forego the pleasure of having ornamentation about. But painting is not chiefly valuable for ornamentation. It is chiefly valuable for sanitation, greater life, better service.

While paint does, of course, serve to improve the appearance of property, it is far more useful for protection than for ornament. A small amount of money and work expended in keeping a valuable piece of machinery painted will greatly add to its length of life. The same may be said of buildings.

Another useful object which is accomplished by painting is the improved sanitary condition of buildings and outhouses. The cost of such work (painting) is small, the necessary equipment is not expensive, and with proper care this will last a lifetime.

Beacons for Motorists.

The flashing beacon used on the high seas by the leading nations of the world is now to be used as a highway guide for motorists.

Like the beacon at sea, the city traffic is an unwelcome light, automatic in operation for months at a time. Fuel is supplied by an acetylene gas accumulator in the base.

To these beacons and highway light-houses is applied the national system of colors approved by the committee of standards of the American Association of State Highway Officials, and by other national organizations and many cities in the United States. Red is used for first degree danger, yellow for second degree, and green for traffic danger only.

Two hundred cities are reported to have standardized on this national color signaling, which is that of the railroad systems, and almost as many have made installation of the flashing light traffic beacon as an effective warning for drivers who are partially, or wholly, color blind, and those who find it hard to distinguish the ordinary signal from other city lights.

The flashing beacon is the invention of Dr. Gustav Dalen, winner of the Nobel prize in physics in 1912.—From The Motor.

Advantages of City Planning.

"City planning is merely a common sense set of rules and regulations for the city's growth," declares Charles A. Favrot, an ardent advocate of the proposed "City Planning Commission."

"A city plan shows where homes should be built, where industries should be located, and how traffic should be regulated so as to carry people from one part of the city to another with the minimum delay, while at the same time protecting the city's paving and the lives of its children."

Diamonds in China.

The gold mining bureau of Kwangyinsan, Kirin province, China, has discovered deposits of diamonds in a gold mine now being worked, says Millard's Review. The stones are large and of an appreciable fineness, and specialists have given the opinion that the deposit is worth while as a working proposition.
