ton seed, two cars of certified potatoes, two and a half cars of cer-tified sweet potatoes and seven carloads of commercial fertilizer have been shipped into the county this year—convincing evidence of Fast'and County's determination to make its farms reach the maximum of productivity and thereby add to the foundation for permanent prosperity for all.

This year will see the comple-

tion of a two-year program in the county for placing 1,000 acres is pecans by budding to native seed-lings. A great deal of nursery stock, especially around Rising Star and Pioneer, has been planted also.

In these varied activities, the vocational agriculturists and the county agent have taken the lead The corps of workers consists of County Agent J. C. Patterson and three vocational agricult rists—F. A. Loyd of Rising Star, Ben Whitehouse of Ranger and E. H Varnell of Csico.

A project that Eastland is put-ting into reality is the Eastland County Farm Market which, Dr. County Farm Market which, Dr. H. B. Tanner, secretary of the chamber of commerce pointed out will provide a market for the surplus farm products of the trade territory. Stockholders are Eastland business and professional men. A large warehouse will be obtained and a sweet potato drying plant will be provided. Production of potatoes, both Irish and sweet onions and watermelons will be encouraged. Economy Asked.

To All County Officials of Eastland County: As county officials, to whom the citizens of Eastland county have entrusted the management of the county's affairs, we are all alike interested in maintaining the county's A-1 rating. We realize that under the present

Practice of strict economy in the administration of the affairs of their offices was sought of every county official in a letter from the commissioners court to these officials recently.

Condition of the revenues of the county was set forth in the letter.

The average monthly expenditure out of the general fund of the county for the first four months of the year was reported as 36,922.57. This rate of expenditure promises a deficit in the fund, the commissioners court pointed out, revealing that the total income for the purpose is \$63,671.65, representing 85 or 90 per cent of the potential total.

The court urges that officials make every effort to reduce expenses of the county so as to bring them within the revenues to be obtained so that there will not be necessary a raise in the tax rate.

BROOM BUYING MADE EASY

Brooms, because of their farm ancestry, are now among the com-modities labeled according to standards set by the United States Department of Agriculture. By a decision of the Broom Institute (Inc.), recently organized in New York, N. Y., under the auspices of the National Standards Council, all brooms made by member manufacturers must conform to comparable standards for broomcorn.

The matter of supporting the Eastland band was also discussed and Dr. Tanner agreed that he would take over the management the National Standards Council, George W. Shearer, pastor of First Methodist Church, offi-These broomcorn standards are among the many drawn up by the Department of Agriculture in the last 15 years to help the farmer get prices commensuate with the quality of his products and to provide a reliable guide for buyers.

Under the new standards household brooms are in three general grades: Supergrade, made from selected, fine-fiber A quality broomcorn; fancy grade, made from the regular run of A quality broomcorn; and service grade made from B quality broomcorn, which, although not as good as A quality, is still of high quality. Warehouse and industrial brooms come in two grades: Service grade Under the new standards house warehouse and industrial brooms come in two grades: Service grade for which B quality is specified: and utility grade, for which C quality broomcorn (sound, service-able broomcorn, but with certain defects) is used.

RENTER FINDS PASTURE IMPROVEMENT PAYS

Sherman—"If everyone had to pay rent on pasture land, we'd have better pastures," declares Herbert Taylor, Grayson county farmer, who has improved two acres of pasture that he figures will be worth \$150 to him this year. Mr. Taylor became interested in the pasture demonstrations of B. F. Gray, county agent, because a little study showed him that he had to pay about the same rent for grass land that he did for corn land—an average of \$5 per acre. He sowed a mixture of sweet and burr clover and black medic on land grown up to volvateer wheat, oats and barley. Granting of the patents brings o a close five years' work by Mr. Smith on the device. He filed his application for a patent in April, 1930, and it was finally granted

on May 19, last.

The new device is so designed that so long as there is a continuous flow of liquid in a pipe the flow remains undisturbed, but when, for any reason, the flow is stopped the valves close and re-nains closed until released and eset by human hands.

The purpose of the device is to

protect from flooding by gas, oil or water, when for any reason, the pressure is released and then put on again. For instance if the gas pressure were cut off in the city mains and gas stoves were left on, when the gas was again turned on the fire would have been extin-guished and could not consume the gas, therefore the gas would nat-urally fill the room. By the use of this safety valve, it is pointed out, when the pressure is cut off in the main lines the valves im-mediately close on all other lines and remain closed until re-opened by someone. The device will also prove valuable to oil tank gaugers and others since, when draining a storage tank, the valve can be left open with the assurance that when the oil is all out the valve will close leaving the tank ready to re-ceive more oil without the gauger having to return to it to close the
